> Very welcome news has been received by. Ted Applewhaite, Liberal candidate for Skeena in the federal election, that the Minister of Mines and Resources at Ottawa has ratified the cost to build the Tidelake road to the Morris Summit mine in the Portland Canal area. A maximum of \$70,000 is set for the Dominion's share.

The announcement is one of the most important and gratifying items of news received for Stewart in some time and should put new heart into the mining industry in the Portland Canal District.

The other two-thirds of the cost of building the road, will be shared equally between the provincial government and the company.

It is expected that work on this project will be commenced shortly and the reopening of the mine very soon thereafter. Co-incident with the federal announcement came another today from Premier Byron Johnson that the provincial government has made a similar appropriation of \$70.000.

Work on the road construction will commence this year, thereby permitting construction of the mill and mine operation next year.

The road will benefit more than fifteen other mining prospect and will result in employment of 100 miners on the Morris Summit alone.
