Premier Talks to School Children

Take Part in I. O. D. E. Empire Day Demonstration

Seven hundred Prince Rupert school students had an opportunity to hear British Columbia's Premier address them briefly Monday morning at the annual Empire Day rally sponsored by the Imperial Order, Daughters of the Empire held in the Capitol Theatre.

Premier Johnson accepted an invitation from Municipal Chapter, I.O.D.E., and expressed gratitude at the opportunity to bring children greetings from the government of British Columbia.

Introduced by Mayor Nora Arnold, who represented the city of Prince Rupert, Mr. Johnson commended the I.O.D.E. on its objective of encouraging patriots among the children of Canada.

Recalling attending similar Empire Day celebrations a half-century ago at Victoria, Mr. Johnson commented that children of today "still have the same privilege for freedom and advancement which I knew as a boy."

Chairman of the program was Mrs. G. R. S. Blackaby, who introduced Mrs. Jens Munthe, regent of Municipal Chapter, Mrs. Munthe summarized the ideals of the I.O.D.E. after which Mayor Arnold was introduced.

"The city council is very grateful to the I.O.D.E. for giving practical lessons in the ideals of Canadianism," Mayor Arnold said. "We in Canada are very favored and must do our part to help other parts of the world by living up to the ideals of Democracy."

The meaning of the fine traditions which Canadians have inherited was explained to the children by Mrs. Blackaby in an address in which she symbolized the meanings of service, friendship and faith.

Various schools, King Edward, Borden and Annunciation then contributed to the program with skits and exercises which were enjoyed by the children. King Edward presented a skit, "The British Empire, 1999" under direction of Joe Goscoe.

The British Commonwealth's present position was explained in an exercise by a group of Borden Street pupils and Annunciation students put on a flag drill.

Between these numbers, the children sang patriotic songs, directed by Mrs. E. Piche, of King Edward teaching staff accompanied by Mardell Soiland and the piano.

FAKE PASSPORT RING UNCOVERED

OTTAWA, (CP)—Canadian immigration officials, acting on a tip from French police, have blocked off a possible influx into Canada of persons using faked passports.

Dr. H. L. Keenleyside, deputy minister of mines and resources, says that information had been received "five or six weeks ago" indicating that false French passports had been prepared by a passport ring operating in Paris. The source said that the number might be as high as 4000.

Dr. Keenleyside said that entrance into Canada would be difficult even with passports because a visa is usually customary.

Federal Government Puts Up \$70,000 For Salmon Gold Road

Very welcome news has been received by Ted Applewhaite, Liberal candidate for Skeena in the federal election, that the Minister of Mines and Resources at Ottawa has ratified the cost to build the Tidlake road to the Morris Summit mine in the Portland Canal area. A maximum of \$70,000 is set for the Dominion's share.

The announcement is one of the most important and gratifying items of news received for Stewart in some time and should put new heart into the mining industry in the Portland Canal District.

The other two-thirds of the cost of building the road, will be shared equally between the provincial government and the company.

It is expected that work on this project will be commenced shortly and the reopening of the mine very soon thereafter.

THE VICTORIAN ERA

VICTORIA WAS BORN when Waterloo was still fresh in the memory of Europe and died when the Boer War was regarded by some as a prelude to what happened in 1914. There is a tendency today to sniff at the Victorian Age. Perhaps it was an era of propriety, correctness, a straight-laced way of looking at life and righteous or sanctimonious homes. Doubtless, in a national sense, there were blunders. But rarely, if ever before, had British prestige stood higher. 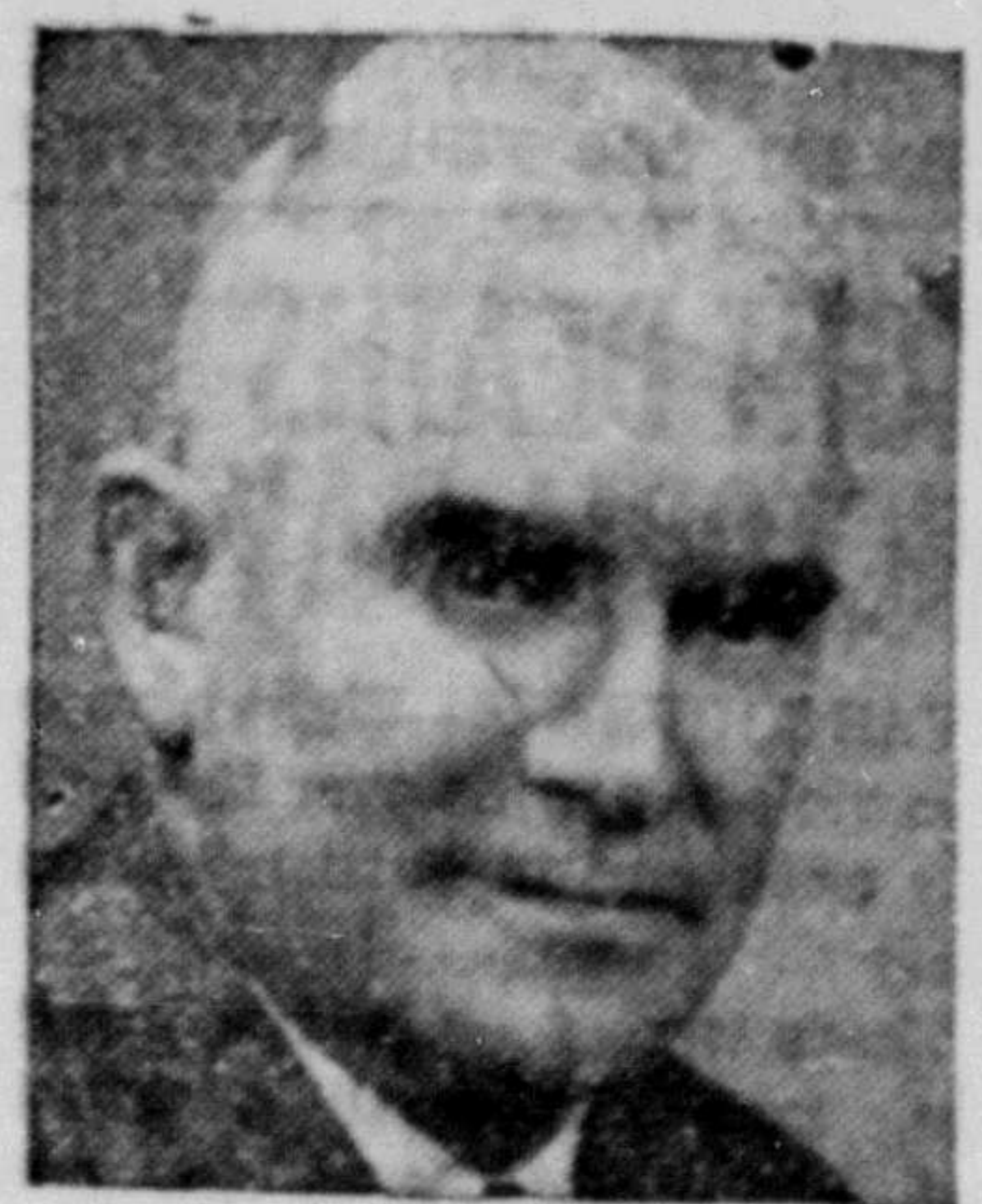

The bride is employed at the Family Shoe Store and the groom by Columbia Cellulose Co. They have taken up residence at 530 Eighth Avenue West.

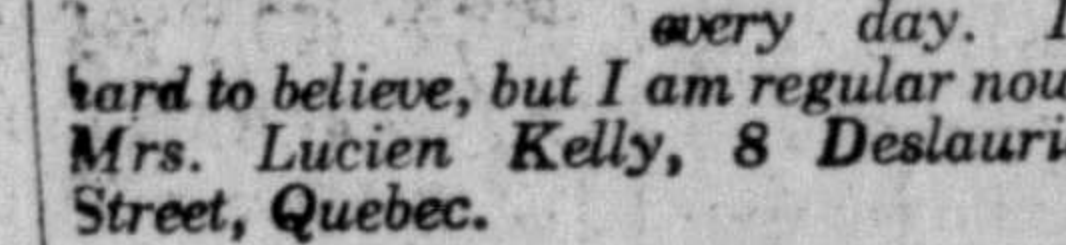

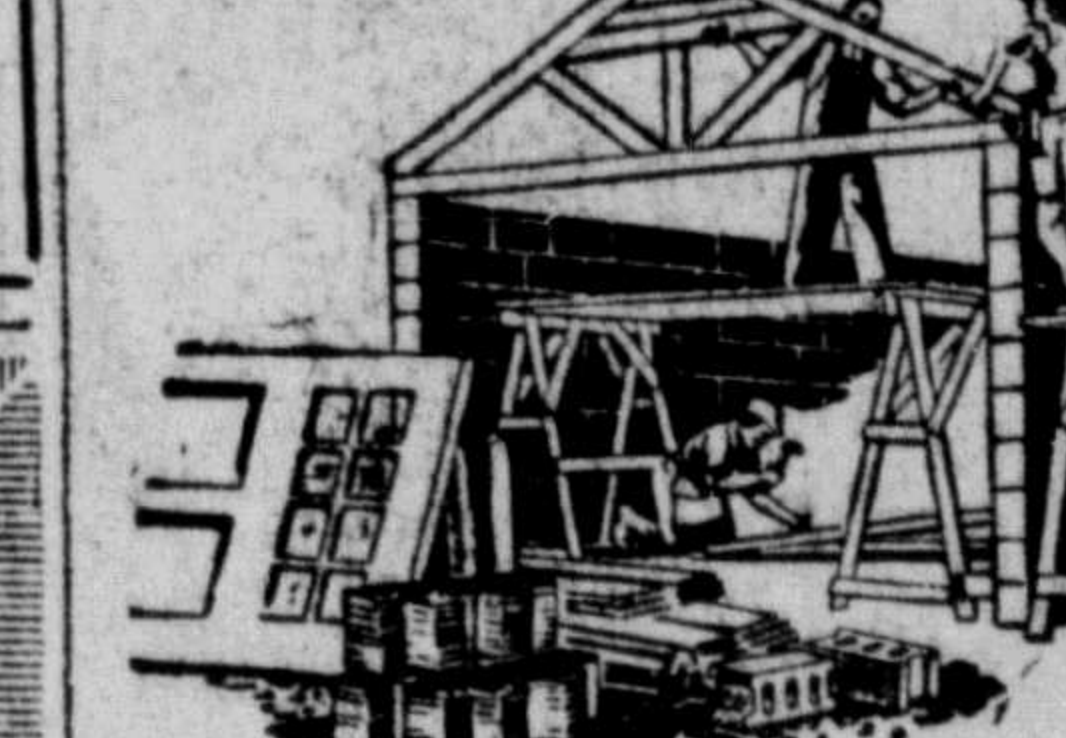

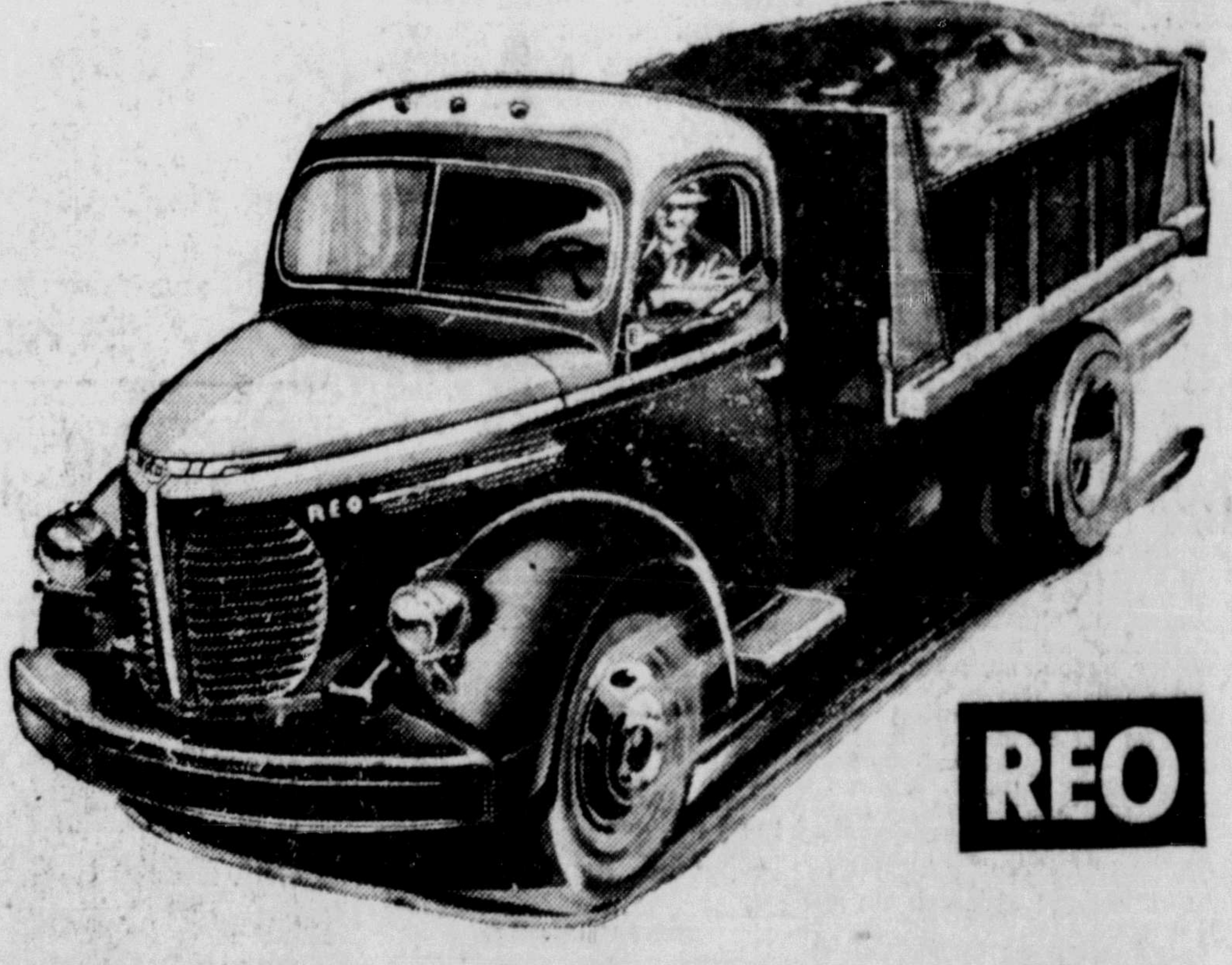
