
Checking on the Palestine Truce

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## Melody of Spring

CPRING COMES TO CANADA once again with a rush of robins. From the new province of Newfoundland, all across the Maritimes, Quebec and over the prairie lands to British Columbia the robin is warbling his silver flute. He is being heard in the groves alongside Prince Rupert streets.

That the bird may not be a robin at all but a large migratory thrush is of no consequence save to the professional ornithologist, and does not influence the robin's song to the extent of a single sour note. Robin redbreast the bird was named by first arrivals from Europe in remembrance of that beloved bird "back home" and the name will always stick.

Bird songs have had an irresistible appeal for Canadian poets but an hour of listening with heart and ear attuned to the spring season, a morning or evening hour in some Canadian field or woodland can bring melody and joy beyond the power of poetry to translate.

### RISKING ORTHODOX

BRITISH COLUMBIA DAILY is printing the life of Christ and in so doing risks taking liberties with the orthodox, although this is not suggesting there is any desire to falsify. Yet, so far, there is a "breeziness" in which some might find grounds for criticism. ## NEED OF COASTGUARD

IT IS FITTING that important officials of the federal Department of Transport should come to Prince Rupert this week in the course of atrip to the coast to study the needs and possibilities of a coastguard service. It was, in fact, in Prince Rupert that agitation for a coastguard service has been initiated and pursued during recent years.

The federal government has admitted the need of such a protective service and a few weeks ago announced its intention of providing vessels which, however, would be pitifully small and inadequate. Suggestion has been made that, if the Department does not feel disposed to go to the outlay involved in new construction of suitable coastguard ships, there might be available former naval vessels which could be converted with not too much expense.

The big thing, however, is that the coastguard set-up should be established effectively and without delay for the protection of traffic along this coast which is increasing by leaps and bounds.
