Prince Rupert To (CP)—Top military lead-Be Greeted On Air ers of the United States asked Congress today for immediate expansion of the armed services and the drafting of men 19 to 25 years of age. Defence Secretary Forrestal grimly outlined recent turn of world events in urging steps to make United States military might match that of Communist Russia.

Forrestal Said that the odos still favor peace and the free countries of the world. Russia, he said, did not have the knowledge and capacity yet to wage atomic warfare.

"Because of the world situation as it exists today, there is certain detailed information which we cannot safely disclose in open session," Forrestal said. He asked for an increase in the present authorized strength of army, navy, marine and air force manpower by 349,500 officers and men. Current strength of the armed services is 1,392,

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Rule of Minorities

IME CANADIANS have never really accepted VV communism as a threat that could seriously affect our lives. We are so comfortably confident in our democratic beliefs, so assured that a majority is the one activating force. We were surprised when it was proved that certain individuals had been playing fast and loose with accepted loyalties. It seemed to us a breach of hospitality and of good sense and we were satisfied when some of the offenders were jailed for their activities. We saw these things as incidents, not as symptoms. There were no communists among our friends and the leftish-minded among them we indulged, as we would indulge other small peculiarities. We never doubted that the great bulk of our people were sensible and serious-minded. That in itself was ample protection. Sure in our democratic faith, we never doubted that the majority will always be sound:

All that does credit to our heart, if not to our intelligence. If we were conversant with contemporary history we would realize that Marxian doctrines don't wait for majorities. That is a trick of democracy. Communism plans to make minorities effective. Nowhere in the world is communism a majority cause. It is not so in Russia where it rep- lost.' resents perhaps the thinking of 5% of a docile people. It was not the majority thinking of Hungary or Roumania, or Poland or Yugoslavia. In Czechoslovakia communists control 38% of the parliamentary seats. Years ago Eduard Benes spoke for his people and democracy and lost to Hitler's demands. Only a short while ago he spoke for them again, this time as president. Democracy, he said, is "the only reliable and durable basis for a decent and dignified life." Two days later he had to bow to the will of the communist minority, girls. backed by the power of Moscow. In Finland communism had to team up with the Socialist Unionists to secure a bare 51 per cent of parliamentary votes. Too dangerous a union, we would say, to cause any trouble. But the tactics are the same. Elsewhere they have given minorities the necessary advantage. If these tactics succeed again, as few doubt that they will, Stalin can reckon a quarter of the area of Europe added to his boundaries, and a quarter of its people subject to his command. Where is the next move?. Where are the communist minorities ready to move? When will even we realize that the time to meet a threat is while it is still weak?

KEEP PARKS CLEAN

THE RAILWAY COMPANY is doing good work in improving and brightening up the park surrounding the rear and sides of the General Offices and overlooking the station and wharves. The postwar program of beautification has been under way for some time and this local beauty spot will probably be more attractive this spring and summer than it has ever been before. And its beauty will not only be for the visitors who come to us but also for the local people, many of whom are already appreciative.

But, unfortunately, there are also those who are unappreciative and abuse the beauty of the sheltered groves and grassy slopes with defacement and litter. They throw their debris and their bottles about. Now the railway company has even gone so far as to place at various points painted drums lettered "rubbish" in the hope that this may rectify the nuisance. Otherwise it has been suggested, and it sounds like a pretty good suggestion, that there might be a round-up of those who are responsible for the litter and that, under a little persuasion, maybe by a bright young policeman or someone in authority, they might be made do a little cleaning up for themselves.

And what goes for the railway park might also go for other similar spots around town that we know are similarly abused by the bush drinkers and others.

ENDED IN TIME

THE LONGER Germany is occupied, the greater becomes the conviction, that, if the war had lasted another six months, or even not that long, there might have been a different outcome to the vast struggle.

Not that the Allies were weakening. The enemy had been outfought and outproduced. What the allies were exposed to was the possibility of Berlin discovering some secrets or processes, useful to a terrifying degree, in making instruments of destruction.

It is known now that Germany, with defeat in sight, was, nevertheless, close to possession of revelations that would have given overwhelming power, perhaps offsetting much of what the Allies had gained. Hitler was desperate and few can dispute that he would not have paused for a moment in utilizing anything, even if such action involved undreamed of potentialities for woe.
