## UNITED STATES MAY MOVE INTO PALESTINE

### Hagana Scores Victory Over Arabs In Battle For Strategic Port

#### C.F. Wants Japs Back on Coast

VICTORIA (CP)—The Legislature yesterday passed a motion of C.C.F. Opposition Leader Harold Winch which would remove all discrimination against Japanese of British Columbia. After a stormy debate adopted instead an amendment by Attorney General Gordon Wismer which would alter conditions of crown timber contracts to allow the employment of Japanese in interior of British Columbia areas east of the Cascade Mountains where they are permitted to reside.

#### AMENDMENT TO LAW

Hon. E. T. Kenney, minister of lands, warned the Legislature that adoption of Mr. Winch's motion would open the way for the return of the Japanese to the fishing industry on the coast. "Never in the history of British Columbia," he said, "have our native Indians been as prosperous as they are now due to the elimination of Japanese competition in the fishing."

#### Herbert Hargrave, C.C.F., MacKenzie, was asked if he wanted the Japanese back in the fishing industry and he replied that he did, providing there was no discrimination.

#### Harriman Is Named as U.S. Ambassador

WASHINGTON D. C. — Secretary of Commerce W. Averill Harriman was nominated yesterday by President Truman as ambassador to Europe under the Marshall European Recovery program. It will be his duty to relinquish his duties as Secretary of Commerce as moving ambassador to Europe. He will have to keep in close and constant touch with the cabinet members through the ERPP program.

#### REUTER LOSES PART OF ARM

PROT—The condition of Reuther, president of the Automobile Workers of America, shot at his home by a assassin Tuesday night, is critical but doctors say he never regain the use of his arm. Meanwhile a great amount for Reuther's assailant with rewards totalling \$10,000 being posted for information leading to apprehension.

#### REASON IS GIVED AT SEA

OTAWA—On a recent Sunday the Caribbean Sea, Chaplain Ernest Foot of New Glasgow, N.S., was transferred from a steamer to the destroyer Nootka on a jack-stay between the two ships. It was the first time in his new experience for him to be on the Nootka, following his transfer from the Ontario, which was conducted. The two ships were about 100 feet apart and almost 30 miles per hour spray flying in air, seas often spilled over the forecastle.

#### WHITEHORSE SEES PRINCE RUPERT AS PORT OF ENTRY FOR ALL NORTH

The position of Prince Rupert as a port, was given considerable attention at a recent meeting of the Board of Trade in Whitehorse when the importance of the Haines Cutoff was stressed.

It was pointed out that, if the Jones Act should be amended by the United States Congress, as is contemplated, then the importance of Haines as a port of entry would be greatly enhanced and its future assured. Furthermore, in such an event, Prince Rupert would become the chief Canadian port of entry for mercantile traffic from the eastern States to the north, with possibly Chicago as the pivotal point in the United States.

#### IS ACCLAIMED BY THUNDERER

Mr. King Commended for Not Rushing into Conscriptio 6

LONDON—The London Times yesterday paid tribute to Prime Minister Mackenzie King of Canada in achieving the longevity record for a Prime Minister in the British Empire. He had won an endurance test and achieved a long distance record. He had not been a dynamic leader but had always been a trusted guide and counsellor.

The Times commended Mr. King for having refused to permit Canada to be rushed into conscription during the war.

**WOULD BAN COMMUNISTS**  
OTTAWA—One of the resolutions passed at the Progressive-Conservative Association national meeting here this week favored a ban on the communist party.

**FLOOD WATERS RISING**  
WINNIPEG — Rising flood waters today continued across the prairie provinces, leaving a wake of damaged bridges and dams, isolated families and railway service.

**SECRETARY OF COMMERCE**  
WASHINGTON — President Truman today nominated former Ambassador Charles Sawyer of Ohio to be Secretary of Commerce, succeeding W. Averill Harriman.

**RAIN STOPS FIRE**  
KINNAIRD, B. C. — Heavy rain today halted a forest fire which had swept a two-mile front, threatening destruction of homes in this town, 17 miles east of Trail.

**SOO BANK ROBBERY**  
SAULT STE MARIE—A lone gunman walked into the Steelton branch of the Royal Bank of Canada shortly after noon today and scooped up an estimated \$10,000 in small bills while he threatened the bank staff at pistol point.

#### RESCUE OF FISHERMAN

VANCOUVER — Patrick Kelly, 41-year old Steveston fisherman, was rescued Wednesday from his slowly sinking gill-netter after clinging to the mast of the vessel for 26 hours.

Kelly was enroute to the Skeena River for summer fishing when his boat was swamped by heavy breakers in Howe Sound. He was swept with his derelict into waters outside English Bay when the plight was observed by Second Officer Robert Pennington of the Nanaimo ferry steamer Princess Elaine which went close to shallow water to rescue him. Only six feet of the mast was then above water.

#### Cannot Infringe Upon Party Name

VICTORIA — Under one of the amendments to the Provincial Elections Act now before the Legislature is one banning use of the name or part of the name of a recognized political party by an independent candidate.

#### First Ship Enters St. Lawrence River

MONTREAL—The first ship of the season to enter the St. Lawrence River, the 8,300 ton American freighter Colabee, was reported last week off Bale Comeau, Quebec. She had sailed from New York to load a 600 ton cargo of newsprint.

**BOEING PLANT TIED UP**  
SEATTLE—In a dispute over wages, 14,000 employees of the Boeing airplane manufacturing plant went out on strike at midnight. Production contracts amounting to \$200,000,000 will be held up.

#### Jews Win At Haifa

Obtain Control of Port—Arabs Charge "Massacre"

HAIFA—An all-out battle between Jews and Arabs for control of the important port of Haifa, developing as the British withdraw, resulted in a complete victory for the Jews. Twenty-five thousand Arabs have left the city for the country to reorganize their forces. Meantime they have asked for British mediation.

The Arabs, in admitting defeat, claimed, however, that it amounted to a massacre, a charge which the Jews deny.

The virtual seizure of control by the Jews of Palestine's richest port city followed heavy night fighting, following which the Arabs sued for peace, asking the British military authorities to mediate.

"It was a massacre," said one Arab spokesman. "It was another Stalingrad. We were not prepared."

The Jews issued a cease fire order shortly after noon today. An Hagana spokesman said that the terms handed the Arabs included: Disarmament of all Arab forces and surrender of all arms. Delivery of all foreign Arab troops to Hagana for immediate deportation.

#### Cars Collide On Highway; Four Hurt

Four persons were taken to hospital suffering injuries and shock and two others were treated for minor bruises after two automobiles collided on the Port Edward road at 1 o'clock this morning.

Injured were the driver and passengers of a taxi which was heading toward the city when it collided with a private car going to Port Edward. The accident occurred about three-quarters of a mile past the Galloway Rapids bridge toward Port Edward.

In hospital are: Miss Winnie Peters, 18, of Vanderhoof, suffering lacerations to her right hand. She is a waitress at the Empire Cafe.

Thomas Shaw, 22, of Hartley Bay, injured right leg. Shaw is a fisherman for Nelson Bros.

Miss Margaret Matthews, 32, of Kitiwaga, lacerated scalp and forehead.

Jake Anton, 42, driver of the taxi, chest injuries.

Slightly injured and requiring no hospitalization were Curtis Ellert and a man named Robinson, also passengers in the taxi. Reports of the accident indicate that the two vehicles, one driven by Thomas A. Newton and the other by Jake Anton, collided near the crest of a low hill on a fairly straight stretch of road just past the Galloway Rapids bridge.

Newton was heading for Port Edward and the taxi toward the city. The injured passengers were taken in another car to the Miller Bay Indian Hospital, about a mile away, where they were given emergency treatment and then sent to the Prince Rupert General Hospital.

Anton, whose chest was injured by contact with the steering column, was taken directly to hospital here, arriving at 1:20 a.m. The three passengers were taken to hospital by city ambulance from Miller Bay. Staff Sergeant G. A. Johnson and Constable Edward Anderson of the provincial police investigated the accident.

#### MINERS RETURN TO THEIR JOBS

WASHINGTON D. C. — A general back to work movement among soft coal miners appears to be in full swing now following the appeal of John L. Lewis, president of the United Mine Workers of America, who faces heavy penalties for civil contempt of court if the strike continues.

#### Industrial Board On Defence Formed

OTTAWA — The government plans to keep a close eye on Canada's industrial war potential. Defence Minister Brooke Claxton told the House of Commons Tuesday that a 14-man industrial defence board was being established. "This important board is being created," Claxton said, "with the object of insuring that, in the event of war, Canadian industry will be able to make a maximum contribution with a minimum of delay."

#### SALES TAX ROUGH RIDE

VICTORIA — It was not without four divisions that the three percent retail sales tax measure finally received its third reading in the Legislature. The divisions were called as the C.C.F. led in fighting the bill. Opposition Leader Harold Winch moved unsuccessfully to free all goods brought into the province up to the value of \$100 from the tax. He also attempted to exempt old age pensioners.

Attorney General Gordon Wismer said that pensioners would pay only about \$1.80 per year in tax while between \$7,000,000 and \$8,000,000 would come from industry.

#### ST. GEORGE'S AND ZEEBRUGE

Tomorrow, St. George's Day, is also the anniversary of the attack on the harbor at Zeebrugge, on April 23, 1918. It was a great naval feat of gallantry and skill. Through the sinking of craft that blocked the harbor, the movement of enemy submarines was halted and the place rendered practically useless until the obstructions were removed. All this was done under heavy enemy fire.

Among those who were present at the acton at Zeebrugge were D. G. Borland, formerly manager of the Capitol Theatre in Prince Rupert, and now of Vancouver, F. A. McCallum, formerly of the Bank of Montreal in Prince Rupert, and Chief P. O. Hill, formerly instructor to Sea Cadets at Prince Rupert.

#### Removal of Margarine Ban Being Advocated

OTTAWA—More senators joined yesterday in supporting the proposal to remove the ban on margarine. Among them was Senator W. Rupert Davies, publisher of the Kingston Whig-Standard newspaper.

#### Australia Insists on Partitioning

WASHINGTON, D. C. (CP)—Administration officials predicted today that President Truman will ask Congress to approve use of American troops to police Palestine. Thus, he might in an extreme emergency, order limited forces into the Holy Land to protect American lives and property. Officials are deeply concerned lest Arab-Jewish fighting flare on an even larger scale next month when Britain starts withdrawing her troops.

Meanwhile at Lake Success, Australia demanded today that the United Nations proceed immediately to carry out the partitioning of Palestine.

The Soviet satellite bloc also reopened its attack on the United States proposal to switch from partition to trusteeship.

In a direct challenge to the American proposal to discard partition, Australia laid a three-point demand before the fifty-eight member political committee of the United Nations general assembly.

#### BREACH IS WIDENING

Western Powers Moving to Set Up Separate Regime in Their Part of Germany

LONDON — With the split between eastern and western Germany apparently becoming wider, United States, Great Britain and France are laying the groundwork for plans to restore financial stability of the western section and to give it wide self-governing powers.

While a Tass dispatch from Moscow to London said a Russian commission had blamed the British plane for the fatal crash on April 5, in Vienna, United States and Russia blamed each other for a clash on Monday on the streets of the American zone when three Russian officers attempted to arrest a displaced person in the United States sector. It was a woman whom the American military police wrested from the Russians.

St. George's Day

IN EVERY CONTINENT of the world—perhaps in every country—there are English-speaking people who will honor tomorrow for the memory of St. George.

It may seem odd, at first thought, that a young Roman officer, born in Cappadocia in the third century when England was little but barbaric wilderness, should have come to symbolize the England that later led the world as a champion of freedom.

Born a Greek Christian in the year 270, St. George rose to a high command under the Emperor Diocletian. The young officer opposed Diocletian's persecution of Christians, resigning his commission and demanding liberty for his fellow worshippers.

But reverence for his gallantry spread throughout the East, churches were built in his honor and centuries later the Crusaders adopted him as their soldier saint. In 1222 the Council of Oxford decreed that St. George's Day commemorating his death be observed as a national holiday.

St. George has another link with England, a link that may have been one of the small turning points in the destiny of nations. History records that while on a mission to Britain during his military service he converted to Christianity the Roman ruler of Britain, Constantius, and his consort, Helena. It was Helena's son who afterwards became Constantine the Great, the first Christian emperor of Rome.

Besides its association with St. George, April 23 is famous in British history as the anniversary of Shakespeare's birth and death, and of the celebrated British blockading of the Belgian harbors at Zeebrugge and Ostende in the First World War.

This attempt to bottle up two vital, German-held bases in the spring of 1918 when German submarine flotillas were strangling Britain's sea lifelines remains one of the most daring enterprises in the history of naval warfare. Though only partly successful, the exploit—in which 637 men were killed, wounded or missing, and nine heroes earned V.C.'s—sent a breath of inspiration throughout the hard-pressed Allied Forces.

Englishmen and sons of England everywhere may well recall these lines by England's imperial poet:

"This royal throne of kings, this sceptred isle, This earth of majesty, this seat of Mars, This other Eden, demi-paradise; This fortress, built by Nature for herself, Against infection and the hand of war, This happy breed of men, this little world, This precious stone set in the silver sea, Which serves it in the office of a wall Or as a moat defensive to a house, Against the envy of less happier lands, This blessed plot, this earth, this realm, This England —"

## Port Arthur Is In Final

Canadian Amateur Hockey Association Charged With Commercialism

TORONTO (P)—Port Arthur West End Bruins won the Western Canada junior hockey title Wednesday night by handing the Lethbridge Native Sons an 11 to 1 trouncing in the seventh and deciding game of the series to qualify for the Memorial Cup finals against Barrie, Ontario, Flyers.

Move of the Canadian Amateur Hockey Association in ruling that the final game of the Western Junior Hockey playoff be played at Toronto's Maple Leaf Gardens brought numerous charges of "commercialism" from western sports scribes.

Maurice Smith of Winnipeg Free Press was quite perplexed at the thought of a western final game being played in eastern Canada. He commented: "The only conclusion we can draw is that the C.A.H.A. will stop at nothing to make a few extra bucks."

Smith said a report, supposedly from C.A.H.A. officials in Regina, had given as the reason for the move "It was felt unfair to give Port Arthur more than four 'home games.' He branded this "The lamest excuse we have heard in many a moon" and added there were two obvious inconsistencies in the move.

He instanced the Winnipeg Monarchs-Port Arthur Bruins western semi-final series in which the first two games were played at the Lakehead city with the rest of the series, provided there was no split, slated for Winnipeg. Smith declared that "There was no thought then on the part of the C.A.H.A. of the arrangements being unfair to Port Arthur by compelling the Bruins to play five games in Winnipeg. So why the sudden change of heart now?"

Maurice also notes that Hamilton Tigers, eastern senior finalists with Ottawa Senators, will not get a single game on their home ice. He quoted Tiger Coach George Redding as saying: "It's very unfair that Tigers have to play all of their games away from home because the C.A.H.A. feels that the Hamilton rink is not big enough. . . . If the C.A.H.A. weren't such a money-grabbing organization Hamilton fans would have a chance to see the team that has carried their colors into three successive Allan Cup semi-finals."

Smith said Hamilton had sought at least one home game in their best-of-three series for the Ontario title with Renfrew Lions, but authorities reportedly said they couldn't make it a best-of-five series and give Hamilton a game because there wasn't time—then the Tigers had to lay off 12 days waiting for the Senators to qualify.

He concluded: "Great boys these C.A.H.A. moguls."

Arthur Murray, president of the Prince Rupert Basketball Association, urged the development of athletics from the youngest of school children so that Prince Rupert might win championships not only in basketball but in other lines of sport. He expressed appreciation to Mr. Black and the Famous Players-Canadian Co. Later in the evening the team members were guests of the Canadian Legion at the Legion Hall.

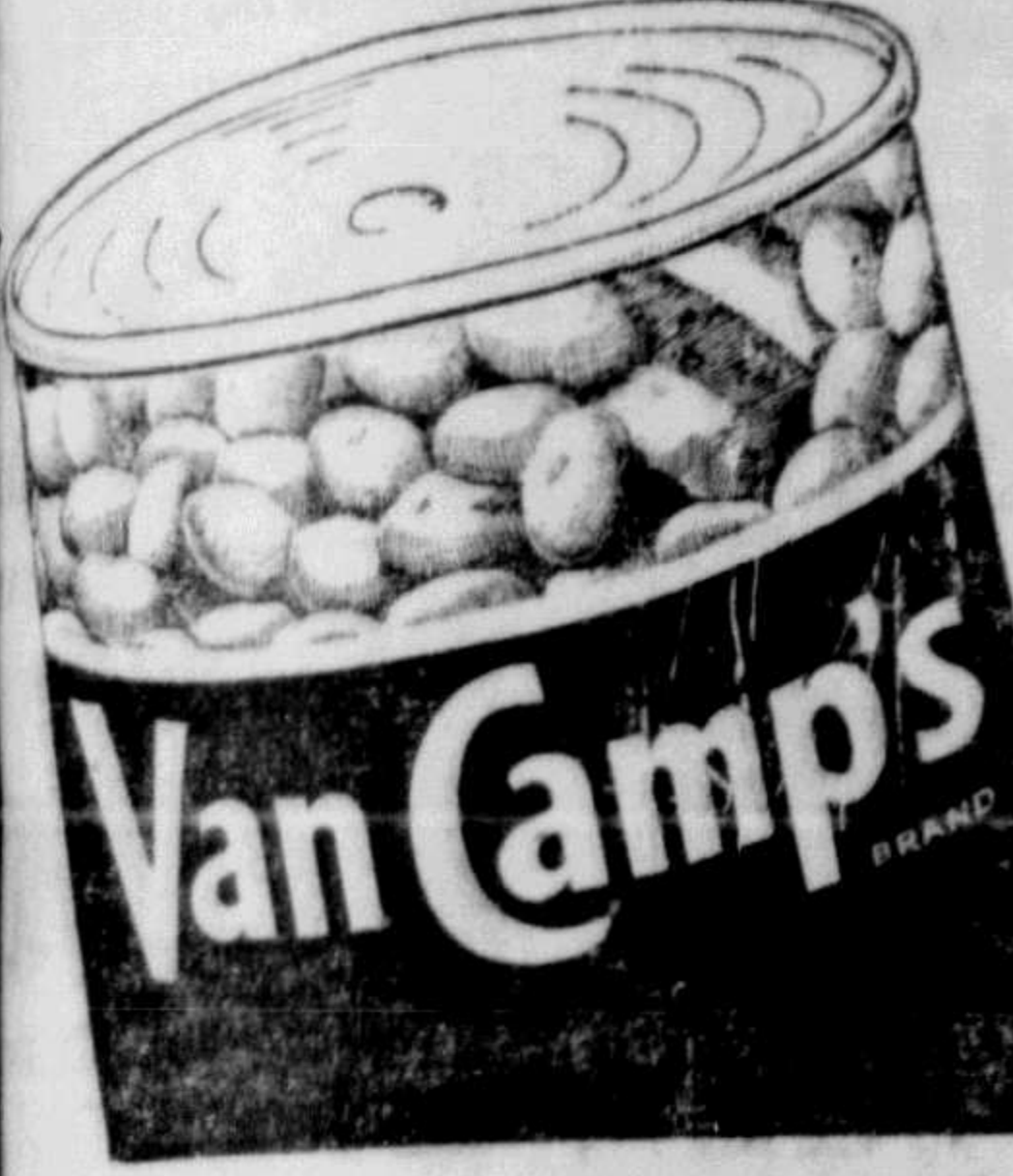

**WATER SCARCE, "POP" PLENTIFUL**

**Kinsmen's Club Hears of Trip to Australia**

Australia is a land where water is scarce but "pop" is plentiful according to Roy Van der Sluys who last night sketched the highlights of his flying trip to the land of the Southern Cross in an informative and anecdote-packed address to members of the Kinsmen Club during their regular meeting at the Civic Centre.

Leaving Vancouver on the second regular flight of the Australian National Airways plane last year, Mr. Van der Sluys had a taste of spontaneous American hospitality when the craft was forced to make an unscheduled landing at Sacramento when weather prevented a stop at Oakland. Although the party was not expected, there was no delay in getting cars for them and taking them to the best hotel in the city where they were entertained by the Chamber of Commerce. It was the first Australian passenger plane to call at that city and the leading citizens made the most of it. There was no customs red tape and when the passengers left they were loaded down with mementos and tourist folders.

There was a stop-over at Honolulu and then they flew on to the coral atoll of Canton where the humidity was oppressive. On the Fiji Islands, Mr. Van der Sluys met the King of the capital city, Latoga, for whose daughter he had years before made a wedding cake. Regollection of the incident caused the King to extend a hearty welcome to the travellers and among other things they were permitted to visit the sacred temple in the city.

At Sidney, journey's end, the passengers were not permitted to leave the plane until the doctor was over an hour late and some of

the travellers were nearly fainting from the heat. Mr. Van der Sluys was on the point of leading a minor revolt against the regulations that kept them in the plane when the doctor arrived.

In Australia Mr. Van der Sluys found there was a scarcity of many things such as tobacco and clothes. There were point coupons for clothes and queues for tobacco. What men's clothing there was consisted of standard designs and colors. There was an abundance of evening clothes.

Due to its heat and lack of high mountains, Australia gets very little rainfall, a fact that makes water more precious than whiskey. However, very good pop is sold for 25 cents a gallon in Sidney so one does not have to go thirsty. Electric power, generated by steam turbines creates a drain on the water supply so such equipment as electric refrigerators is scarce in Australia.

Food, particularly meat, is cheaper in Australia than in Canada but there is not the same variety. Cars are expensive and hard to get and gasoline is rationed.

The magnificent beaches stretching along the east coast of the island continent are the Australian's natural and national playgrounds. Practically everyone swims despite the threat of man-eating sharks. On most beaches, handy to centres of population, shark nets and guards perched on high towers, protect swimmers from the vicious killers.

Although Mr. Van der Sluys is thankful that Prince Rupert is his home he pointed out that it is very nice to be able to step into a plane at a point where winter is in full swing and after some 46 hours flying, set down in a land of summer sun
