





Fishermen and Loggers Gather

VANCOUVER (P)-A fleet sailed and an army marched Monday toward Vancouver. Their intentions were'nt entirely peace-

ful, either. A \$1,000,000 herring fleet was inward bound from the west coas Vancouver Island and from o-coast after a record haul, and some 36,000 loggers began to tramp out of the British Co!umbia forests for the Christmas and New Year break. When the fishermen and loggers hit town

it will be more like Mardi Gras. It's annual time out for fishermen in some 150 seiners, packers and other fishing vessels—the period between December 15 and January 4. When they reach port they'll bring with them the waterfront's touch of Christman color-Christmas trees perched atop their masts.

The big wooden seiners netted fish so fast last Friday that the 30,000 ton northern quota was cleaned up several hours before the season had been scheduled to end officially.

The bonanza in waters close south of Prince Rupert was so heavy that an application has been made by herring men to have the quota extended after New Years.

The B.C. Packers seiner Maple Leaf C hauled in the record single catch, 1,260 tons. The old mark was 1,165 tons.

The top "highliner" on the coast now is Cant Mel Stauffer of Alert Bay, Indian skipper of the Maple Leaf C.





sons for overcalling? Well, you; can end up buying a contract you can make. You can lay a groundwork for a profitable sacrifice for your side. You can indicate a winning lead to your partner in case your left-hand opponent plays the hand. You can talk your opponents out of something. You can crowd the opponents bidding and prevent them from finding their best contract You may push your opponents beyond their depth.

How can an overcall show a go set more points than the enemy could have made playing the hand. You can cause partner to get off to the wrong lead. You can make it easy for an opponent to cue-bid if he is void in your suit. You may help opponents in their bidding and play by "placing" certain high cards in your hand. You may ometimes save them from bidding too much.


NELSON (P) - Resettlement of Canada's 3,000 unpredictable Sons of Freedom, possibly in a foreign land, was recommended yesterday by the consultative committee on Doukhobors.

The committee with a definite aim—to end fifty years of strife in a manner fair to both Canada and uncompromising Freedomites — has some tentative ideas of relocation but it is not ready to make them public. The consultative committee

revealed it has asked ten nations. so far unnamed, whether they would welcome the Sons of Freedom. However, the fire-raiding radical Doukhobors, although respecting the laws in recent months, still are not considered

Nine of the countries have not bothered answering. A tenth replied but the answer was "No." Relocation should "at an early date," the committee stressed, be in Canada or another country.

This move would be in the interests of the whole country," the committee said, adding that resettlement would be specifically designed to promote peace IS Laid at Rest and security of the orthodox group as well as the welfare of the Sons of Freedom.
