

OTTAWA, (P)—The Canadian government appealed to the steel industry yesterday to help solve Canada's critical shortage of steel.

"We have plenty of ore," the source said. "We have just not got the pouring capacity."

The United Nations

THREE YEARS AGO tomorrow a war-torn world, fresh from the wounds and griefs of the most terrific and devastating conflict it had ever known, turned face forward in high resolve and confident hope that wars would be no more and that they would march ahead together in harmony and mutually-resolved security. In the United Nations Organization nations professing their faith in democracy and peace had conjoined to insure the development and perpetuation of their profession. The occasion of October 24, 1945, was the coming into force of the Charter of the United Nations. Signficantly enough, it was the Union of Soviet Republics which deposited the twenty-ninth instrument of ratification, making the necessary number to render the Charter effective. The protocol was thereupon formally signed and proclaimed. The Charter had come into force.

Yes, three years have passed since that propitious and promising occasion. It would be an impractical idealist who would say that, on this anniversary, the progress of accomplishment of United - Nations objectives has been satisfactory or that the outlook is even midly roseate today. In fact, there is no gainsaying the fact that these are days of grave crisis for the peace of the world and for the very existence of the United Nations on the grand and brave scale which we had so confidently envisioned those three years ago.

But, if its accomplishments, through the domination of selfish nationalisms over the great principles of international goodwill and mutual security have been disappointing, the need for a strong United Nations is more apparent today than it ever was. Possibly, it may have to be a militant United Nations as well as a resolved and determined body. Some day, we hope it will be an efficient body even if regional defences may have to be planned meantime.

So as we dedicate ourselves to the task of U.N. perpetuation and effectiveness, let us work and hope and live for its principles. Even in these world outposts, we are as vitally concerned as any other part that war should not come again and that the United Nations should be a living and virile thing. We are vitally interested and we should be actively concerned. We may be only a few but it is the few that make the many. So, in that spirit, let us give thought to the day and govern ourselves accordingly in this time of trial and crisis which may well resolve the whole future of civilization.

And it is appropriate for us to reflect once again upon the resolution of the Charter:

"Determined to save succeeding generations from the sconge of war, which twice in our lifetime has brought untold sorrow to mankind, and

"To reaffirm faith in fundamental human rights, in the dignity and worth of the human person, in the equal right of men and women and of nations large and small, and

"To establish conditions under which justice and respect for the obligations arising from treaties and other sources of international law can be maintained, and

"To promote social progress and better standards of life in large freedom, and for these ends. "To practice tolerance and live together in peace with one another as good neighbors, and


"To unite our strength to maintain international

"To employ international machinery for the promotion of the economic and social advancement of all people, have resolved to combine our efforts to accomplish these aims.

Any organic matter can be used in a compost heap; and this means table refuse from the house. But it is not practical to use it except in a managed pile, where it can be covered with earth to kill odor.

The simplest way of creating a managed compost pile is to set aside a suitable location, out way, and preferably
