WASHINGTON, D.C. — (CP) — United Mine Workers of America Union was today found innocent of contempt of court in the soft coal strike. Federal Judge Richmond B. Keech, who heard the case without a jury, announced a verdict of "not guilty on both civil and criminal contempt of court charges." The judge found that the Union had done its best to get

the men back to work but that the members had gone on strike as individuals.

The judge said he had considered the government's petition and had found "on the record" that charges of contempt in the February 11 back to work order had not been supported.

The Union had contended that it was in no way responsible for the refusal of miners to return to work. Its defence was that the 372,000 coal diggers had each quit work by individual decision and not by direction of the union and that officers of the Union had done all they could to end MONTREAL Mrs. Donald the strike.

Another Rate Increase

THE FURTHER INCREASE of 7.4 percent in railway freight rates is not going to ride very well Such increases never are. Forty-one percent increase over wartime freight rates, which the latest of the succession of boosts means, is a lot of increase. It is a serious added burden for business and industry which has to pay. Whether or not it is going to solve the problem of railway financing, in view of the increasing operating costs including the hoists in wages which have been made or may be pending, is a question. The public, it may be expected, is going to seek means of transportation other than railway freight. The railways may lose out that way.

Antincrease in railway freight rates hits everybody and the consumer pays with the rest because much of the freight increase just goes on the price of consumer goods. We know that here in Prince Rupert where high prices on some commodities at least are blamed on the freights.

RENT CONTROLS

THE SUPREME COURT of Canada, in its wisdom, has upheld the validity of federal rent control and the government at Ottawa has intimated that the controls will be retained for another year.

The fact that the power of control remains in the federal government means that the levels of the controls can be revised, relaxed, or adjusted as the government authorities see fit. Controls or no controls, there are already signs that rent structures, in some cases, particularly in the higher clesses, are reaching a point of natural levelling off.
