Good Rains Last Month

January Prayers For Moisture Answered abundantly In February

Prince Rupert prayed for rain in January and got it in February with satisfactory abundance. The blessed moisture, during the recent month, fell to the amount of 10.87 inches including a substantial quantity of snow, and brought the two-month total so far in 1950 to 11.87 inches which was a great deal less than the 17.83 aggregate for the corresponding period in 1949.

While Prince Rupert was getting its welcome rainfall, it, of course, had to go without sunshine of which there was a scant 17.5 hours in February, bringing the 1950 total to 131.2 hours compared with 95 hours in the opening two months of 1949.

The weather summary for February, as announced by the Dominion meteorologist at Digby Island, was as follows:

- Maximum temperature, 44.2 on February 18.
- Minimum temperature, 25.4 on February 1.
- Mean temperature, 38.2.
- Maximum barometer, 30.34 on February 1.
- Minimum barometer, 29.07 on February 4.
- Precipitation, 10.81 inches (8.7 inches rain, 2.74 inches snow).
- Sunshine, 17.5.
- Maximum wind velocity, 44 from the southeast on February 14.

Capt. Poulton Kin Speaker

Capt. W. C. Poulton of the Salvation Army, speaking to the Kinsmen Club last evening, chose as his subject "The Story of the Beachhead," and described the happenings as far as Canadian Troops were concerned from "D Day" on.

The entire campaign was marvelously planned," said Capt. Poulton, "and the air cover was superb." He emphasized the action in the words of the German prisoners who often said to the Canadians: "How could we kill you boys? You travel too fast." The Captain concluded with the plea that "war settles nothing and we have got to stop war."

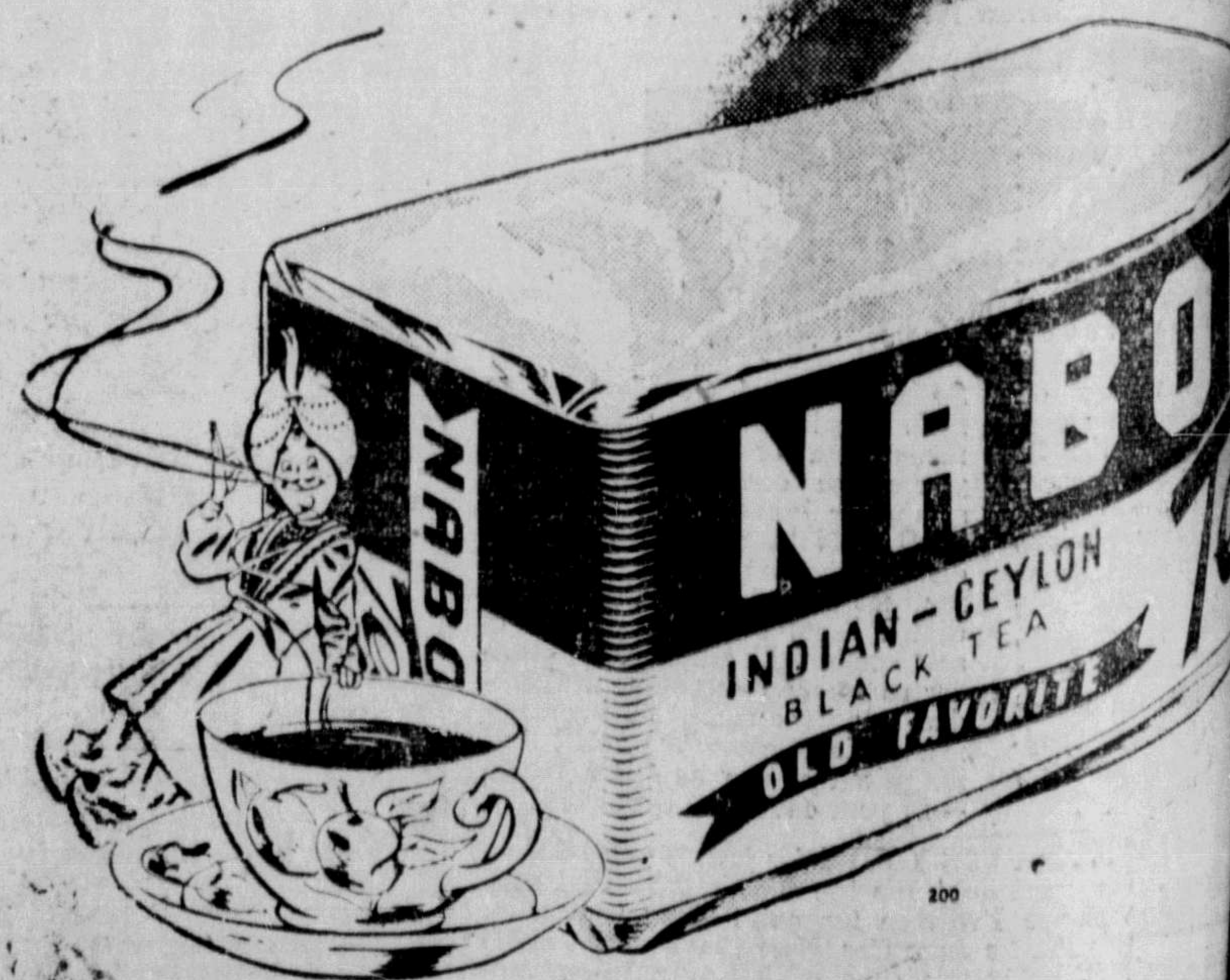
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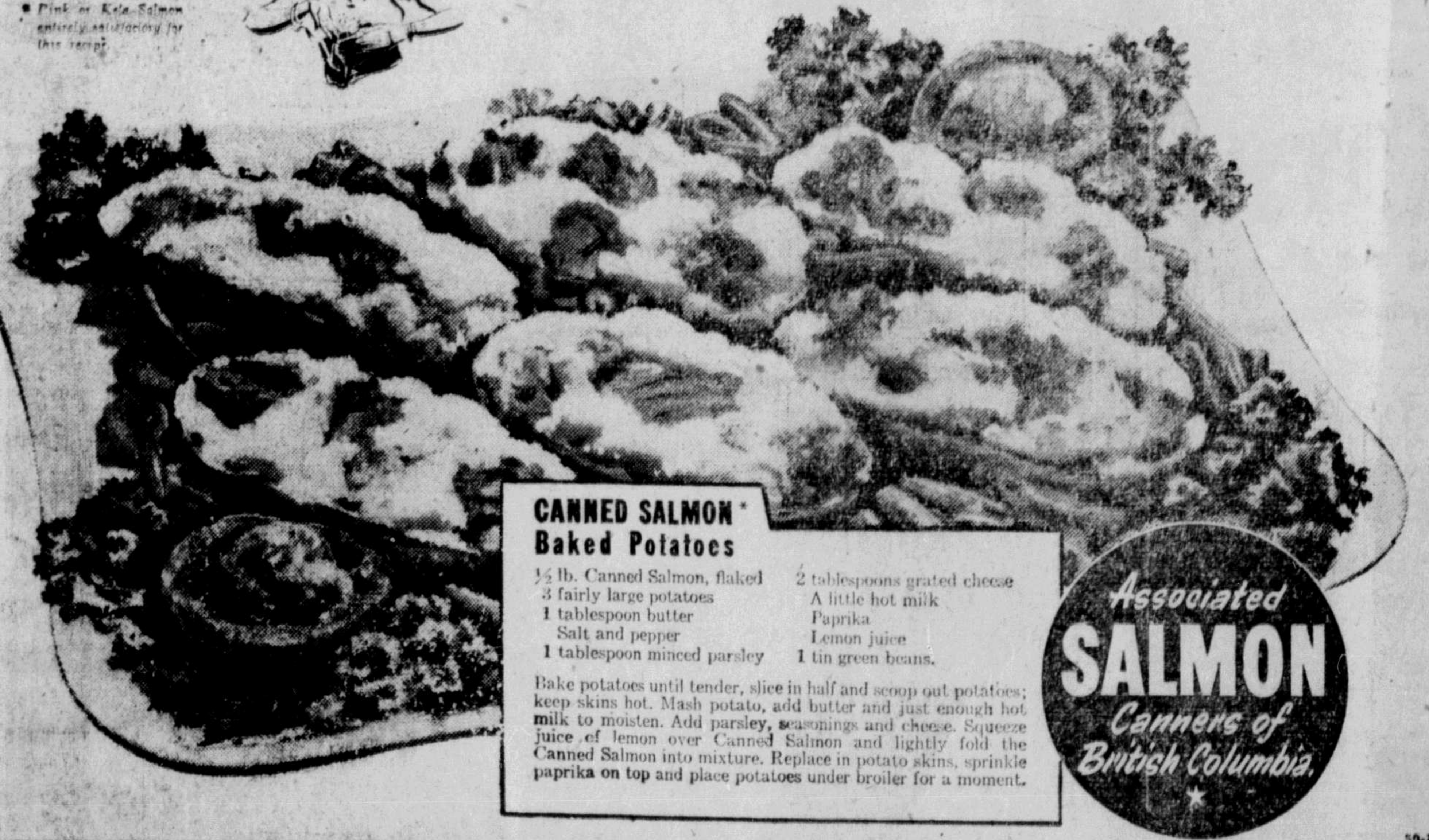
