OTTAWA-St. Mary's Roman Catholic Church, 60-year old edifice in Ottawa's east end, was completely destroyed by fire early today in a two-alarm blaze which caused damage estimated at more than \$50,000. The actual cause of the fire is undetermined.

LABOR CONGRESS CASE

VICTORIA-Outlawing of company unions and elimination of supervised strikes vote clause from the British Columbia labor code was asked yesterday by the British Columbia executive of the Trades and Labor Congress of Canada. An 11-man delegation urged that hours of work be reduced to a weekly limit of forty and the basic minimum wage rate rise to 75c per hour. Old age pensions of \$60. month without means test were also advocated. It was also asked that the Industrial Conciliation and Arbitration Act be broadened to cover all workers, specifically civic, municipal and provincial government employees.

WOULD BAN IRON EXPORT

VICTORIA—Federal ban on the export of iron ores to the United States was sought today by the British Columbia government. Hon. R. C. McDonald, minister of mines, said that British Columbia wanted its own steel industry and exports, of raw material would endanger such a project. Incident On Egypt Patrol

Foreign Office Admits Help Being Sent to Help Protect Arabs

LONDON (CP) - Britain said today that five Royal Air Force planes had been shot down yesterday by Israeli aircraft while on reconnaissance patrols over Egyptian territory near the Palestine border. The announcement of the Air Ministry came after a Jewish spokesman in Tel Aviv said that two of five aircraft shot down by the Jews over Rafa were known to be British planes and two others were presumed to be.

Meanwhile Foreign Office officials announced that Britain, acting on the request of Trans-Jordan had sent troops to guard the seaport of Aquaba.



Port Edward Road

MITHIN the next few months construction of VV the Columbia Cellulose Co. Ltd. celanese pulp mill at Port Edward will commence. The plant is scheduled to be in operation by 1950. Upwards of a thousand men will be employed on the construction work after the initiation of which eight mile distant Port Edward, with the pulp mill added to the already large payroll of Nelson Bros. Fisheries Ltd: - plants, will become by far the largest concentration of employment in Prince Rupert area.

Nearly two years ago the provincial government, whose admitted co-operation had much to do with the final decision of the Celanese Corporation to select the Port Edward site for its big Canadian venture, gave its assurance that necessary - straightening out, widening and hard surfacing of the highway between Prince Rupert and Port Edward would be complete in plenty of time in advance of large scale operations at Watson Island. The preliminary surveys and plans, it is understood, "" have been made some time since.

Certainly no real commencement has yet been made on the necessary improvements to the highway even though it will only be a matter of a few months at the most now before the big construction work is scheduled to start. There is no point at this time in expressing opinion that the work should have been commenced and well under way if not completed long ere this. The thing now is that there should be no further delay in getting started.

When thousands of people start working at Port Edward, there will be a lot of business to be done between there and Prince Rupert and the best of transit facilities between the city and the work will be required. If these are not available, as we were assured so long ago they would be, Prince Rupert people will be even more indignant with the public works situation with which they have long since been justifiably dissatisfied.

It is interesting to note that the Prince Rupert Chamber of Commerce has requested the minister --- of public works, when he makes a public pronouncement on British Columbia highway affairs next week, to give some reassurance to the people of this part of the province who have not been very happy since the minister made a statement a few months ago that it was the intention to concentrate on the southern end of the highway system before doing very much hereabouts. We will await intently what he has to say.

CANADIAN POLITICS

AS THE NEW YEAR opens the political topics which hold the interest of observers are more numerous and varied than, perhaps, at any other time in the history of Canada. The effectiveness of the United Nations organization, the possibilities of the Atlantic pact and the aggressive designs of Communist Russia are the high spots in the discussions on our external relations, but Canadian Affairs still dominate in most circles.


With the Parliament opening January 26, even the most hardened and cynical are looking forward to it with lively anticipation. One prominent press i man claims it is because of "a belief that they are about to witness the opening tableau in a brand new political pageant."

There are a number of reasons for this feeling including the idea that it might be the last session before a general election. But the principal reason is new faces "new and dynamic personalities in new places." First interest is centred in the new Prime -Minister, Rt. Hon. Louis St. Laurent. Chosen as leader of the Liberal Party at its national Convention in August after seven years as a Minister of the government, all Canada will watch his leadership with confidence in his dignity and ability.

Three other personalities on the government side will be watched as they take new and higher places. Hon. Robert Winters, in the House of Commons since 1945, takes Mr. Ilsley's place as Nova Scotia's representative in the Cabinet. Mr. Garson has already achieved standing as a national figure while serving as Premier of Manitoba. He is recognized particularly as an authority on Dominion-Provincial relations and on freight rates. Mr. Pearson comes to the House of Commons after many years as Canada's best known civil servant.

It is not only the government side that has taken on a "new look." The official opposition has in Mr. George Drew a new and dynamic leader who will stir renewed interest in the battle of the House of Commons. Like Mr. Garson he comes to the House after a successful term as a provincial premier, marred only by his personal defeat in Toronto last

summer. Certainly January 26 will see eyes all across Canada focused on Ottawa. Only the C.C.F. and Social Sredit parties go to the opening with leadership unchanged. The pattern of their "opposition" is not expected to change from that followed since the 1945 general election.

DEATH CLAIMS PETE LA FRANCE

Was Associated With Northland Since Early Days

Peter LaFrance, pioneer Yukon and Portland Canal prospector, who became something of a legend in the north during 50 years of searching for metals, died this morning in the Prince Rupert Pioneer Home where he found the last haven of his 87 years of

A big, vigorous man, Mr. La France was the first man ever to cross the 21 miles of the Bear River Glacier at the head of the Portland Canal, an experience which he ranked among the most difficult of his life. Duran ice crevice and went 80 hours without eating.

Born in Montreal, Mr. La-France became the owner of a hotel in the Quebec city but sold out and came west in 1898 when tuberculosis took his wife and four sons.


