

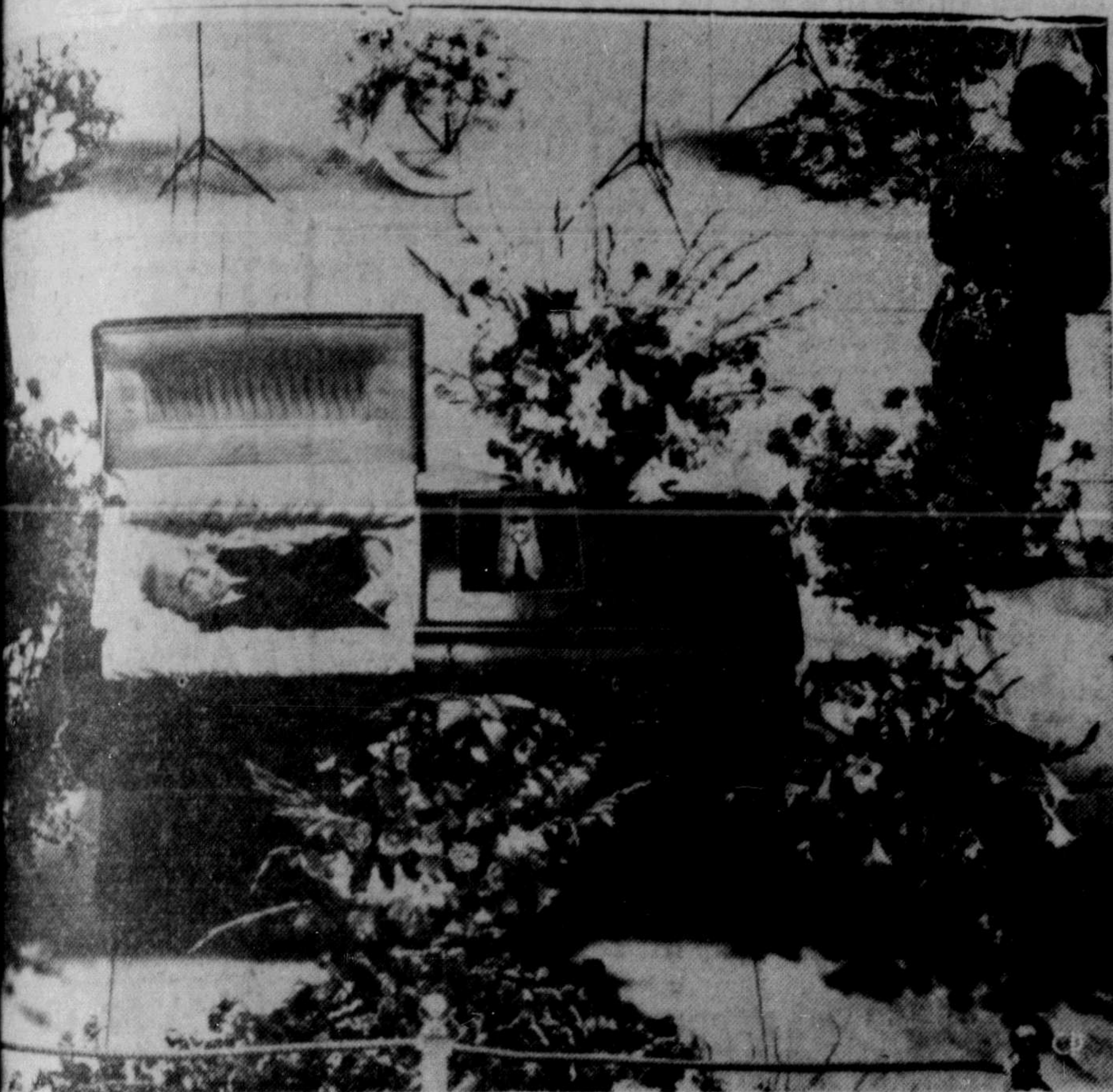

# Korea's Biggest Battle Is Looming

## Military Aid For South Korea Is Urged By C.C.F.

VANCOUVER—(CP)—Military aid for United Nations forces in Korea was recommended Wednesday by the national council of the Co-operative Commonwealth Federation.

In an emergency resolution presented at the opening of the convention, two hundred delegates were told that "the C.C.F. believes all nations, including Canada, which have pledged support to the action of the United Nations should participate according to their ability. The burden of military action in Korea should not be left to one nation alone. Reconvening of Parliament at Ottawa, owing to the gravity of the international situation, was termed 'imperative.'"

Retiring Secretary David Lewis admitted a recession of Socialism in Canada and said that the party needed new vitality. Prof. Frank Scott, national chairman, also announced his intention of retiring.

## Conservatives Lose By 1 Vote

LONDON—Winston Churchill today told the Commons Britain has no equipment in use currently which can withstand a Soviet Armored avalanche cut loose in any widespread war.

The Conservative leader and wartime Prime Minister was defeated by a single vote 296-295 in an attempt to force a secret session for defence debate. Foreign Secretary Ernest Bevin, back in the House for the first time since May, turned the vote in favor of the government.

## Vigorous Allied Counter-Attack Meets Success

NOT USING A-BOMB  
WASHINGTON — President Truman said today that use of the atom bomb in the Korean war was not being considered. The President reaffirmed his hope of an ultimate peaceful issue of the situation. He did not consider wage, price and manpower controls necessary at this time unless in the case of total mobilization.

TOKYO—(CP)—A vigorous South Korean counter-attack drove northern Communists back seven miles today as a prelude to what might be the beginning of the Korean war's biggest battle. South Korean troops, with United States air support, delivered two sharp punches, one on the northeast of the Yongdong sector and one on the east coast. In both cases they drove the Red forces back.

## Old Timer Of Smithers Dies

Elmer K. Steele, well known pioneer of Smithers, passed away this morning in Prince Rupert General Hospital at the age of 74 after a week's illness.

Born in Winnipeg, Mr. Steele was for many years an insurance agent at Smithers until his retirement a few years ago. He was an ardent stamp collector and helped many people in Prince Rupert with their collections since coming here in April 1942. He was named honorary president of the Civic Centre stamp collectors' club this year. He was never married.

Surviving are two sisters, one of whom is Mrs. W. J. O'Neil, Smithers.

## Old Timer Of Smithers Dies

At Maromwon, 15 miles north-east of Yongdong, the 24th Regiment combat team, the only negro unit identified as being in action, beat off a Communist attack.

The Communist radio at Pyongyang in North Korea said that Red coastal batteries had sunk an American warship off Yosu, a port which the Reds say they have captured. It is some 20 miles south of Suncheon behind the southern front.

Allied planes have knocked out two of five northern tanks in the Hamchang area in giving aid to the South Koreans along the 200-mile long Korean front. Northern forces have started a new drive toward vital supply lines east of Red-held Yongdong. They were met by a curtain of United States artillery fire and Allied planes.

General Douglas MacArthur, United Nations commander, was near the front as the battle went into its final stages. "That we will have new hatches and new setbacks is inherent in the situation," he said, "but I was never more confident of victory — ultimate victory — in my life than I am now."

### UNIFYING DEFENCES

LONDON — Atlantic pact partners got down Wednesday to the detailed job of forging a unified army out of Western Europe's individual armed forces. Less than 24 hours after they had convened in London for the first session, a civilian high command for defences of the west, the pact's council of deputies plunged into technical aspects of the problem behind closed doors.

## Showdown In Belgium Near

Anti-Leopold Movement of Socialists and Liberals Gains Ground

BRUSSELS—Socialists and Liberals, whose party followers launched a wave of sabotage and strikes throughout the country on Wednesday, walked out of the Belgian Chamber of Deputies. Along with Communist deputies, they marched out of Parliament once again as the pro-Leopold Roman Catholic Social Christian party, entrenched behind a strong majority, passed a vote of confidence in the government which it controls.

Following their announced intention of showing every manner of protest against the return of the King after six years' exile, the Socialists sent a paper to Leopold resigning their titles and decorations.

## Search For Second Drowning Victim Is Continued By Police

SMITHERS (Special To The Daily News)—The holiday waters of Lake Kathlyn at 10:30 this morning yielded the body of Aime Bourque, one of two mining men, who are believed to have been drowned early Sunday morning. Search operations for the second supposed victim, William E. Forbes, are continuing.

## No Troops For Korea?

TORONTO—Informed quarters said today unusual meeting of the federal cabinet aboard the funeral train of the late prime minister held the view that Canada's decision of "no troops at this time" for Southern Korea still stands.

Minister of National Defence Brooke Claxton said a decision had been made on the subject. The decision is expected to be made public at Ottawa within 24 hours by the Prime Minister.

MONTREAL—Robert Harry Gale, aged 72, who was mayor of Vancouver for four terms, died in hospital here Wednesday after a brief illness.

## Crowds Watch King Cortège

TORONTO—Downtown Toronto was hushed today as the body of Mackenzie King was borne slowly up broad University Avenue for burial in Mount Pleasant Cemetery.

Men, women and children were lined ten deep across from the Union Station when the solemn funeral procession started. Crowds lined the whole route. The 15-car train in which the former prime minister's body was brought from Ottawa arrived at the station some hours before the cortège started its five mile journey to the cemetery. Fifteen or sixteen cabinet ministers rode on the train from Ottawa.

There was a brief committal service with members of the cabinet and close friends surrounding the grave.

No Isolated Incident

THE aggression in Korea, where the Communists continue to make advances which must be viewed with a considerable degree of alarm, cannot be thought of in isolation. There is still hope that the fighting may be localized but still the problem which presents is not a local one. It is a problem set by the fact that we now have to recognize that the use of armed aggression as an instrument of policy is not merely a theoretical contingency but a practical possibility.

Failure to recognize this was one of the fatal blunders of the years before World War II. Each act of aggression from the Japanese seizure of Manchuria onwards was thought of as a local event, having no relevance to "other areas."

It has become abundantly apparent now that Russia has no intention of co-operating reasonably to secure the restoration of peace in Korea itself. Russia's "offer" to discuss the "broad Korean question" in the Security Council if the Chinese People's (Communist) government is admitted to the Council is rather a "demand" than an "offer."

The Prime Minister of Norway has said bluntly that "one word from Stalin" would end the war in an hour. The phrase is not to be taken too literally. But the facts are plain enough. The Soviet Government certainly has considerable influence with the North Korean Government. If that influence were used for peace, the war would end. But the Soviet Government shows no willingness to use it.

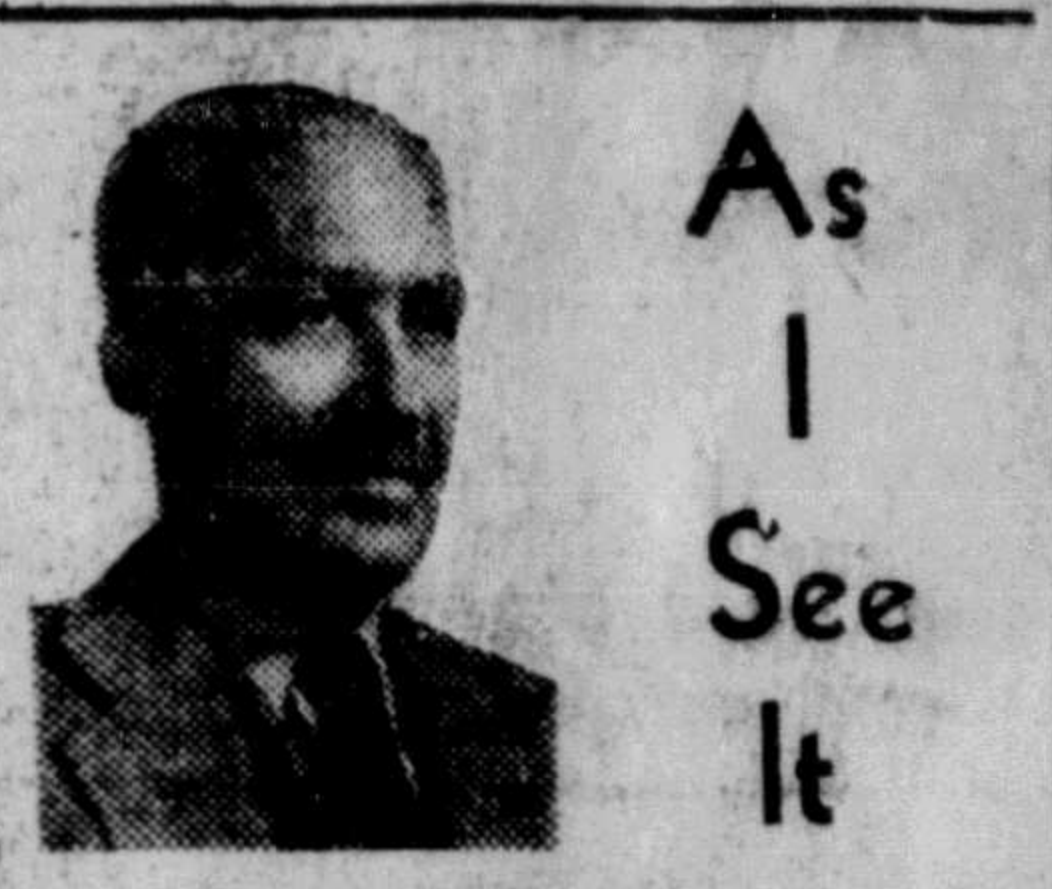
WE SOON FORGET

And, of course, if it had been a Communist we would have had no choice but to demonstrate our respect and grief.
