Crowds Watch King Cortege

TORONTO (P) - Downtown Toronto was hushed today as the body of Mackenzie King was borne slowly up broad University Avenue for burial in Mount Pleasant Cemetery.

Men, women and children were lined ten deep across from the Union Station when the solemn fueral procession started. Crowds Oils lined the whole route.

The 15-car train in which the former prime minister's body was brought from Ottawa arrived at the station some hours before the cortege started its five mile journey to the cemetery. Fifteen or sixteen cabinet ministers rode on the train from

Ottawa. There was a brief commital service with members of the cabinet and close friends surrounding the grave.
