Schuman Plan and Britain

THE reserved stand that has been taken by the British government on the Schuman Plan for the pooling of Western steel and coal resources is the principal topic of discussion in international affairs today.

In spite, however, of the political fulminations on the subject, there would appear to be one central fact—that is that the policy which the British government has assumed is by no means a repudiation of efforts to build a western community. It rather appears to be seeking a different road than the one being followed toward the goal.

On that different road the British Commonwealth of Nations would play a more central role than the continent of Europe. That, incidentally, could be good politics in Britain at this time when the Labor party, with its precarious foothold, needs some extra support.

There are aspects of the matter that might make one wonder whether the British government stand involves "Socialism First" than "Britain First." No matter what it may be, however, the political scene in Britain will be watched with the utmost of interest these next few days, particularly next Monday when the Schuman plan is to come up for debate in Parliament and when the big Opposition guns are expected to lead another assault upon Mr. Attlee and his administration.

BLAMING THE ATOM

THERE is a tendency today to blame on atomic forces anything in the way of evil machinations, even the changeable weather. Well, there may be something in it. But one cannot get away from the fact that 67 years ago—that was in 1883—a series of volcanos in the East Indies started something that lasted on and off for weeks. On one island alone, 37,000 perished. Some days no daylight would appear. There were tidal waves of incredible size and number. One was even felt in the English Channel, eleven thousand miles away. But in 1883 people were not worrying themselves sick on this or that kind of a bomb. They never heard of such a thing.

Election In Australia

CANBERRA — A program liable to bring early dissolution of Parliament and new elections appears for Australia today, as Labor accepted a government challenge on a bill now in Parliament to dissolve the Communist party.

The government, a coalition of Liberal and Country parties, sponsored the bill and Prime Minister Robert Menzies threatened Labor opposition, which ruled the Senate, that their plans to amend the bill in the upper house would bring an election on the Communist issue.

The bill would make the Crown prove communism only if the accused should appeal and be prepared to give evidence on oath. The Labor opposition wants the Crown to have to appeal Communism in every case.

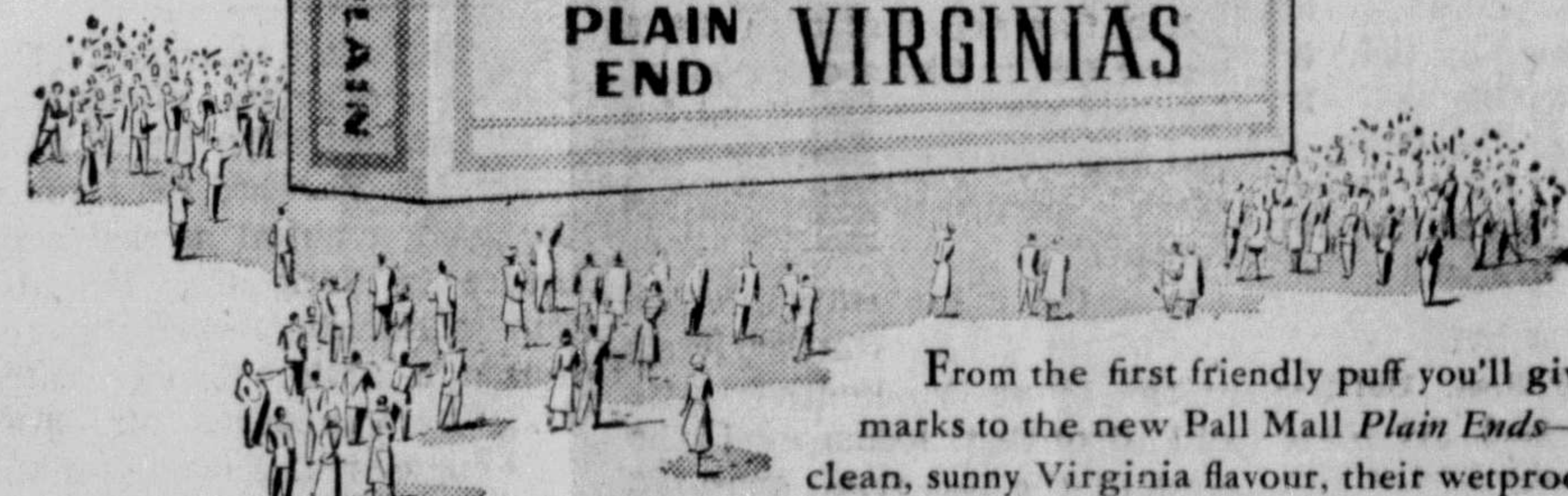

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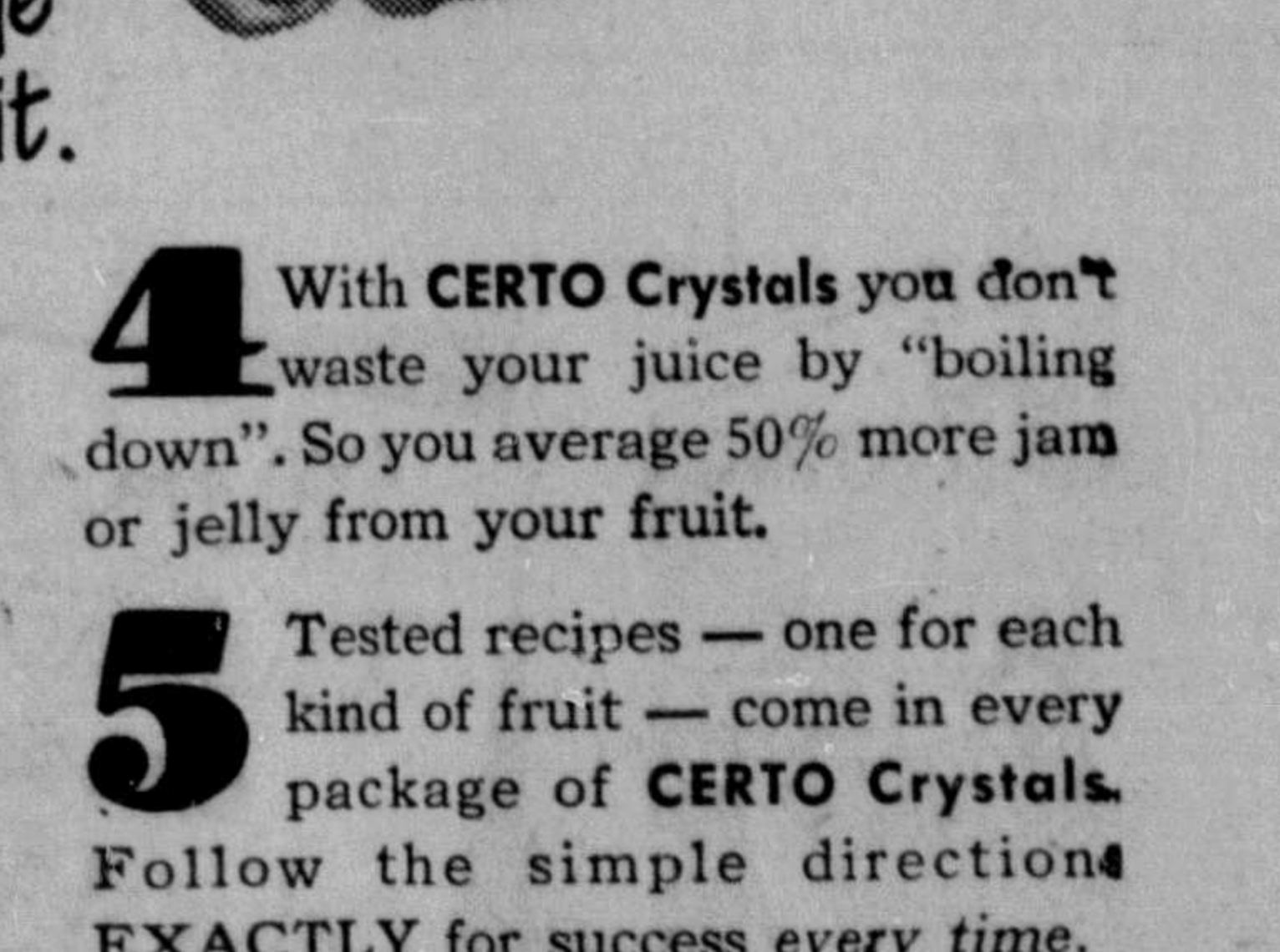

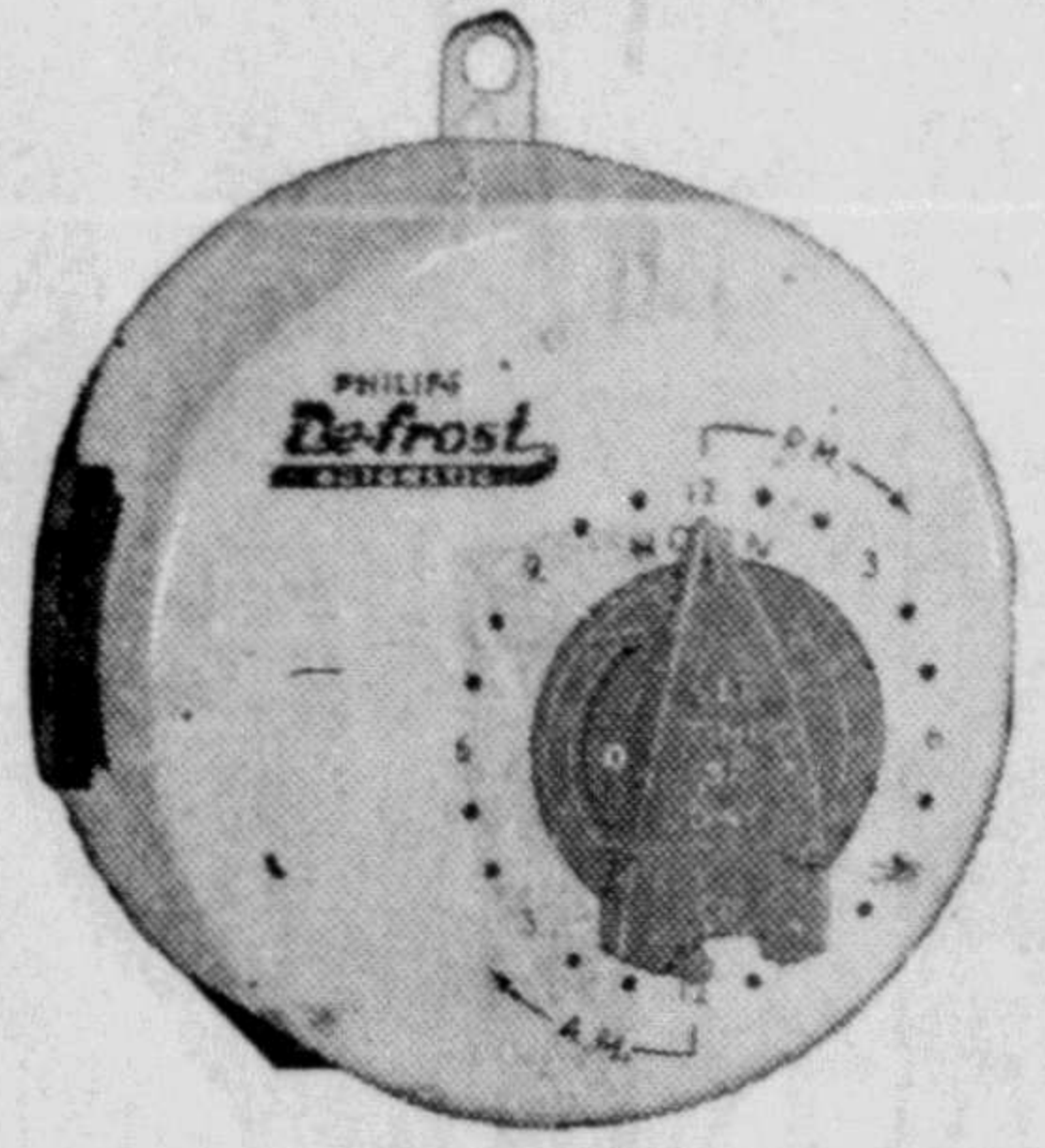

Pope Has Long Day

NEW YORK — Pope Pius arises daily before 6 a.m. and seldom retires to bed before midnight, says a Canadian-born priest in a book describing a typical day in the life of the head of the Roman Catholic Church.

The 64-page book, "A Day with the Pope," is written by Rev. Charles Hugo Doyle, who was born in Kingston, Ont., and now is assistant pastor of St. Teresa's Parish, North Tarrytown, N.Y.

The book (published by Doubleday and Company, Inc.) is copiously illustrated with pictures of his holiness. He is shown at his office desk, conducting private audiences, greeting distinguished visitors or members of the church hierarchy, and in other phases of his daily routine.

The author stresses the exacting nature of the Pope's daily routine. Many of the Pontiff's papal writings are done at night in his private suite, after his day's official business is completed.

"The awful toll that such a full schedule exacts of any Vicar of Christ is brought out by the fact that the average reign of the last 24 Popes has been only 12 years," says the Tarrytown priest.

Pope Pius, the former Eugenio Cardinal Pacelli, became Pontiff in 1939. He now is 74 years old.

The author, who was educated for the priesthood at St. Joseph's Seminary in Edmonton and St. Augustine's Seminary in Toronto, was stricken with heart disease 10 years ago while a pastor in Alberta. At that time he was given only a year to live. He was transferred to North Tarrytown to be near specialists.

Since then he has written four other books about the Pope and one giving advice to those contemplating marriage or newly married.

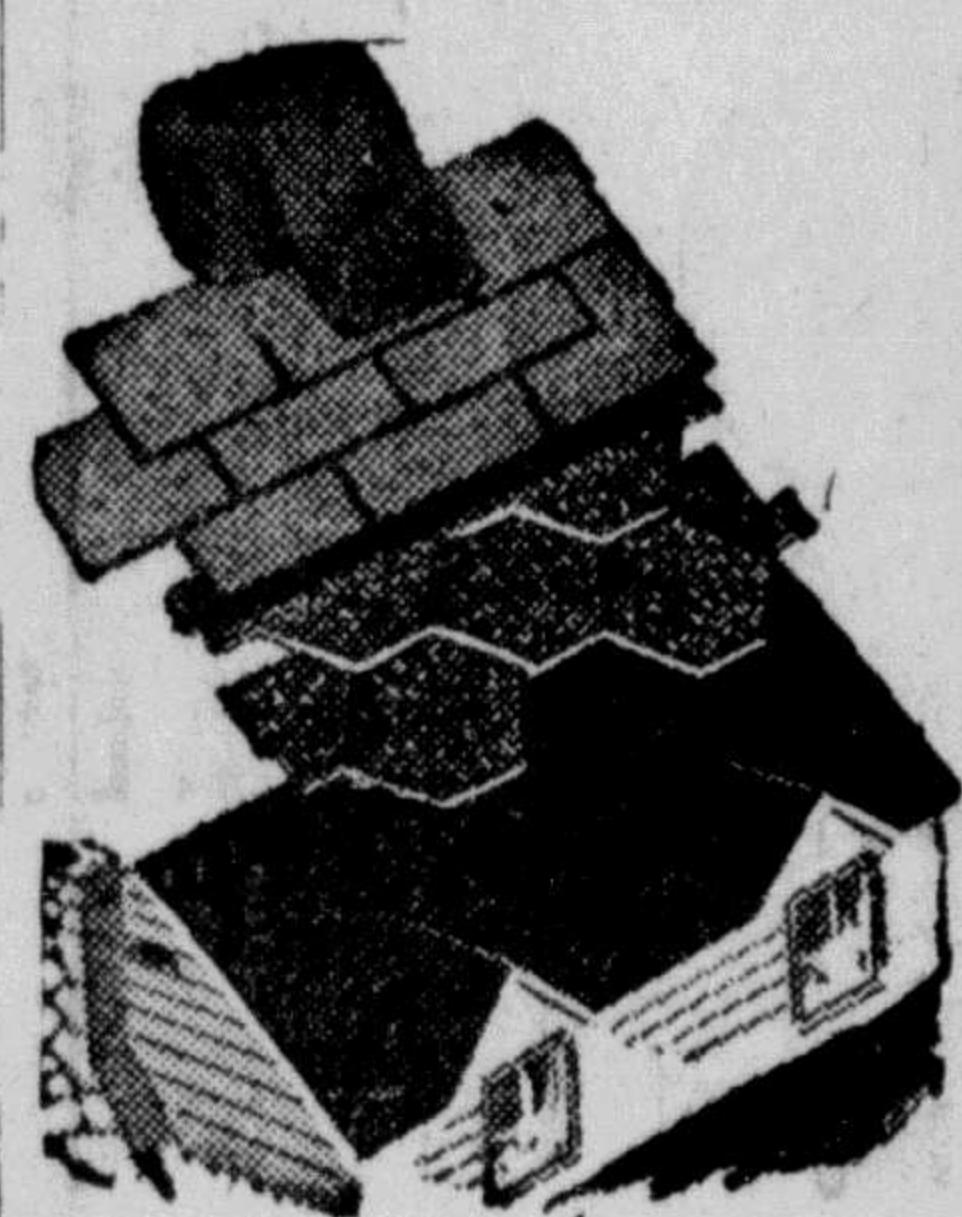

Experimental Train Leaves

Tonight three particularly important cars of frozen halibut leave Prince Rupert for Toronto and Montreal. They are being used as tests for refrigeration methods in rail transportation in a joint test conducted by C.N.R., C.P.R., Fisheries Research Board and the National Research sub-committee on engineering of the Canadian committee on food preservation.

The three cars will be a standard mechanically cooled car, a standard overhead ice cooled car and an improved overhead ice cooled car. Improvements include improved construction of the overhead ice tanks and the addition of fins to provide a greater cooling surface. This car was developed by the National Research Council, Ottawa.

Although temperatures in the tanks themselves, with the addition of salt to the ice, get down to six degrees below zero, the temperatures in the cars reach down only to 10 degrees above. It is hoped that the fins will bring the temperature down another five degrees to five above. If that target is reached, according to J. L. Townsend, general superintendent of perishable traffic for the Canadian National Railways, Montreal, it will be possible to bring temperatures down to below zero by the addition of ammonium nitrate to the brine. Success in the experiment can save the companies a great deal of money in purchase of equipment, Mr. Townsend claims, and the non-mechanical cars will be more adaptable to carrying cargoes that perish at too low temperatures.

On the train with the test cars will be Mr. Townsend, P. E. Broughman, chief superintendent of perishable traffic, C.P.R., Montreal; Alec Menzies, inspector of perishable traffic, C.N.R., Winnipeg; Alec Olynik, research engineer, C.N.R., Montreal; Chester Coombe, inspector of perishable traffic, C.P.R., Winnipeg; Cy Dunn, observer, Thermo Control Company, Minneapolis; George Baker, technician, fisheries research board, Vancouver; Ted Rooke, technician, national research council, Ottawa; Claude Lentz, research council, Ottawa; Marcel Rochon, mechanical engineer, C. P. R., Montreal; D. McVeigh, superintendent of perishable traffic, western division, C.N.R., Winnipeg; and G. F. Morrison, superintendent of perishable traffic, C.P.R., western division, Winnipeg.

O. C. Young of the fisheries research board is in Prince Rupert helping set up the experiment. He will not accompany the party on the train.
