No cargo from Alaska diverted from strikebound United States ports is being handled at Prince Rupert, it was emphatically stated by representatives of both employing and employee longshore organizations here today. Considerable canned salmon and lumber cargo is being handled through Prince Rupert it is stated, but it has all been normally booked for shipment this way and is definitely not "diverted" because of strike conditions at Seattle and other ports. Much of the business has been here before and the movement is entirely normal and similar to t hat which came through Prince Rupert at the end of the Alaska canning season last year.

Inquiries were made here on receipt of a dispatch from Seattle that William Gettings, Seattle C.I.O. longshoreman's representative, had said today that affiliated Canadian longshoremen at Prince Rupert and other British Columbia ports were refusing to unload cargoes "diverted" from strikebound United States ports.

It was recently reported that the bulk of the southeastern Alaska canned salmon pack, normally moving through Seattle, would be "diverted" to Prince Rupert.

The people spending their lives up here might do worse than know more about each other and their plans and ideas. For after all, this is the north.

P.C. CONVENTION

THE NATIONAL CONVENTION of the Progressive-Conservative party, arrangements for which are being completed, will be held in Ottawa September 30 and October 1 and 2. Its purpose will be to select a new leader. The occasion will be the fourth national convention, having the same objective in view. From the time of Sir John A. Macdonald, until 1927 no national conventions of the party, to choose a leader had taken place. Choice was always made by the senators and parliamentary members, representing the party, from among their own number. Now the membership at large, through its delegates, does the choosing.

NICE DOGGIES?

THE NOCTURNAL barking of dogs is protested by a member of the city council and a good many other citizens, doubtless, have a fellow feeling. For no one will dispute that the vocal message of "Prince," "Towser" or "Rover," any time after 1:30 a.m. can murder needed slumber and make a thorough job of it. Most of us like a good dog but who can hold them in affection when they are permitted to yap and yowl in the stille night?

Their natural home is on a ranch or out in the country. They are out of place in a town at best and the larger the community the more troublesome, embarrassing or downright impossible do they become. But if they must be here, the least their custodians can do is respect the feelings of others.

PEACE RIVER DISSENSION

A FEELING that there is not enough sympathetic interest at Victoria in the welfare of this province's northern half is expressed in an editorial by the Alaska Highway News. The editor of the Fort St. John publication feels strongly on the subject. He suggests to Peace River residents that now is a good time to discuss seriously the possibility of requesting the government of Alberta to incorporate within that province the B.C. district.

A number of reasons are given in the editorial for the cause of dissension in the Peace River Block sufficient to suggest its secession. Rightly or wrongly, the northern editor has made the following comparisons between B.C. and Alberta to the advantage of our eastern neighbor:

1. Alberta has successfully pushed its highway system north while B.C.'s northern highway policy is bogged down in waste and uncertainty.

2. Alberta has successfully attracted large oil companies to spend \$50,000,000 on drilling wells there while this province's dog-in-the-manger attitude has barred oil companies from prospecting its | E. McCookrie, and the others vast oil possibilities, especially in the Peace River country.

3. Alberta's land clearing policy is progressive enough to provide surplusses of home-grown food products while B.C., despite having to import essential foods, refuses to develop serious land clearing and land settlement.

4. Alberta's financing is of such character that the province is free from nuisance taxes such as the three percent exaction in B.C.

5. Alberta's railway policy is progressive as against B.C.'s policy of "millions for bond interest on our railway but not one cent for northern exen-

There is no doubt the Fort St. John editor is justified in some of his compaints. In these cases, Victoria should take heed. Possibly this is the result desired by the Peace River publication rather than the suggested joining with Edmonton.
