

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The Election

W/E THINK that Prince Rupert, Central British Columbia and the province as a whole did the right thing at the polls in yesterday's provincial election.

Returned with an overwhelming mapority, the Coalition government has been accorded a mandate to carry on the good work which it has commenced. Many assurances were made by the coalition of its ambitious plans for the province if it was returned to office. The promising is now over and the people will be expecting the government to set about immediately with the fulfilment. As for ourselves we have no doubt of the government's intention and competence. The Johnson-Anscomb administration, we believe, will lead this province to a brighter and greater future although the difficulties and the problems that will be encountered are not to be discounted.

Prince Rupert is out of the political wilderness again with the election of Jack McRae, the young city business man, who we are sending to Victoria as a supporter of the coalition. Mr. McRae proved his mettle in the campaign, showing his comprehension, energy and presentability. We were pleasantly impressed with his ability on the hustings. In the Legislature we know we are going to have a representative who will be a distinct credit to the seat which he represents and who will be well able to present our case on all occasions and accomplish things on our behalf. We congratulate him on his victory and assure him of our full co-operation in connection with the promotion of the affairs of this riding.

Of almost equal interest and importance to us were the contests in the various interior ridings and Atlin to the north. We never had any doubt but that Hon. E. T. Kenney, the northern minister, would be re-elected with a thumping majority but we wish to congratulate him once again, also W. D. Smith, in Atlin, and Cecil Steele and Harry Bowman in the Omineca and Fort George ridings respectively.

We think that, after the season on the political outside, these northern districts were wise in getting back in the government column again.

Possibly it is unfortunate that a stronger opposition has not been elected. If there is to be good legislation and good government, vigorous and effective opposition is needed. 



Jack McRae, Pioneer Local

Boy, Young Business Man,

Naval Officer John Duncan (Jack) McRae, Prince Rupert's M.L.A.-elect, is member of a well known pioneer family of 40 years' standing, prominent young local business man and former nava officer. He was born 33 years ago in San Diego, California, while his mother was on a visit

there. He is the elder son of Mr. and Mrs. D. C. McRae. now residing at Duncan, Vancouver Island and at present visiting After obtaining his elementary

and High School education here, Jack McRae attended University of British Columbia where he was secretary-treasurer of his class. Returning to Prince Rupert from college, he joined the staf f of his father's stationery store, McRae Bros. Ltd.

On September 10, 1939, one day after the outbreak of World War II, he joined the Searchlight Battery here as a private' but soon transferred from Army to Navy as a sub-lieutenant. He won quick promotion to lieutenant-commander. After instructional service at H.M.C.S. Naden on this coast and H.M.C.S. Cornwallis on the East Coast he went afloat, specializing in gunnery, and saw service at Scapa Flow, off the Norwegian coast and in the Mediterranean, off North Africa. He put in destroyer time on the Atlantic convoy service in 1942-43. During one of the early Victory Loan campagns, he attained considerable distinction on being chosen as representative of the Navy in a "Carry the Torch" flight across Canada, the torch going on to Britain as a symbol of Canada's support of the war effort. In 1943 he was the admiral's gunnery officer on the Atlantic and his final asignment before the end of the war was as first lieutenant of H.M.C.S. Puncher, then Canada's only aircraft car-


EPIDEMIC HITS INTERIOR CITY
