Don't Cross Line in Korea Cancelled

TOKYO — A spokesman at Gen. MacArthur's headquarters said today the "mission of United Nations forces is to clear Korea." That was in answer to questions as to whether there is a line south of the Manchurian border which American and British troops are not to cross. Earlier a "don't cross line" was reported drawn 20 miles south of the Manchurian frontier. Later the order was reported withdrawn.

Still No Trace Of Lost Plane

EDMONTON — For the eleventh straight day, intensive aerial searching by the Royal Canadian Air Force yesterday failed to locate trace of a war surplus Cessna aircraft missing with five men in northern Alberta. The search was resumed today. The five duck hunters were flying from Grande Prairie, Alberta, to Edmonton when their aircraft vanished October 4.

Norton Youngs Enters Field

With two well known business men already in the field, labor deciding to enter the field and retiring aldermen considering seeking re-election, early indications are that there should be no dearth of candidates at the December civic election in Prince Rupert. Latest candidate to definitely announce himself is T. Norton Youngs, who has already had two years' aldermanic experience and has long been active in various forms of public service, particularly the Civic Centre. Mr. Youngs this morning authorized the Daily News to announce his candidature.

British People Lauded by King

LONDON — The speech from the Throne at the prorogation of Parliament today commended the British people's sacrifices for the nation's economic recovery. It cited the "generous help" from Canada and the United States as contributing to the upturn in Britain's fortunes. The speech, read by the King, reported great improvement in the balance of overseas trade, notably with North America.

Aggression Is Worst Crime

United Nations Assembly Asked by Western Powers To Brand It
LAKE SUCCESS — Great Britain, United States and four other countries yesterday asked the United Nations General Assembly to brand open or fifth column aggression "the greatest of all crimes against peace and security throughout the world." The resolution was introduced as the western answer to the Russian "peace" plan asking for armaments reduction and the branding as a war criminal the first government to use the atom bomb.

U.S. MARINES MAKE ANOTHER LANDING

SEOUL (CP)—The Allied spearhead reached Communist China's Manchurian border tonight as South Korean patrols raced unopposed to the south bank of the Yalu River. They were the first United Nations troops to complete the long thrust up the mountainous peninsula. Communist forces were today reported to be attacking South Korean troops 50 miles south of the Manchurian border. The South Korean field commander near Onjong reported his unit was almost surrounded, and called for reinforcements. Meantime a Republican division's forward elements were driving unchecked on Yongsan, only eight miles from the zig-zagging Communist Manchurian frontier formed by the Yalu River, its spearhead reaching the river tonight. These developments came not long after United States Marines spearheaded a 50,000-man landing force on Korea's east coast at captured Wonsan. Unidentified Canadian Navy forces took part in the amphibious landing.

EISENHOWER FOR SUPREME COMMAND

WASHINGTON, D.C. — It was reported today that North Atlantic Pact military men will recommend that an American be appointed without delay as supreme commander of the combined western European defence force. Gen. Dwight Eisenhower may be given the post, it was reported here.

Canada Aids Dutch Army

OTTAWA — A Dutch Army Division will be the first North Atlantic Treaty force equipped with Canadian arms under Canada's \$300,000,000 arms-assistance program for Europe, Hon. Brooke Claxton, minister of national defence, announced yesterday. Mr. Claxton said that armament equipment for the division, consisting of about 15,000 men, had been approved by the cabinet for immediate shipment. One shipment will leave Montreal about mid-November and another from Halifax later.

Canada and United States Are Coordinating Defence Resources

WASHINGTON, D.C. — Canada and the United States, in an unprecedented move, formally agreed today to co-ordinate their resources, skills and economies for "common defence" of both countries. Rt. Hon. C. D. Howe, minister of trade and commerce, said the agreement marks a new advance in peacetime economic co-operation. The agreement provides for common supply of strategic materials through an interchange of technical knowledge and creation of allocation and priority controls.

Chinese Reds Marching In

BERLIN (CP) — The Russians announced today that Chinese Communist forces had crossed Tibet's frontier early Tuesday. It was the first word that Chinese Reds had actually entered Tibet. The Peiping radio yesterday announced that Chinese Communist forces from South China had been ordered to advance to Tibet. The Chinese Reds have been hinting at an invasion for several months. The Radio Peiping broadcast that the Chinese Reds were moving on Tibet, mid-Asian country seldom seen by white men, said that the purpose of the Chinese Communist advance was "to free 3,000,000 Tibetans from imperial aggression." The grave news of possible new Communist-inspired war in Asia, this time on the opposite side of China from Korea, swept Asian capitals.

Flash ONLY ONE WASHINGTON — President Truman has no information that the Russians have ever produced more than one atomic explosion, he said today. He told a press conference the only atomic explosion in Soviet Russia was September 23 last year.

WEATHER Synopsis

An intense Pacific storm lies 400 miles west of the Oregon coast this morning and is expected to move through Washington tonight. Gale winds are looked for in waters adjacent to southern end Vancouver Island but rainfall is not expected to be heavy. Northern parts of the province will not be affected but there will be showers in the southern interior tomorrow.

THE WORLD has made much progress in the last decade in the matter of improving the health and physical well-being of the older people but there has not been the same progress on the economic side. More and more people are being retired between the age of 60 and 65 whether or not they are fitted financially or mentally for retirement.

And the ironic feature of the situation is that many men, because of greater experience, are actually more valuable to the firms employing them than they were at 45. The large majority of them could continue to perform useful work—and they would be healthier and happier if they remained on the job—even if they worked only a portion of each day.

Sooner or later something along definite lines will have to be done to stay the present trend.



As I See It

By ELMORE PHILPOTT GUNS BEFORE HOMES

SHINGLE AND saw mills are closing down here in B.C.

The lumbermen on both sides of the international border are wondering what hit them. The financial editors are explaining to the public why the price of lumber dropped by almost 50 per cent in one week.

We are now learning the hard way that the phrase "guns before butter" is no empty saying. We can't have our cake and eat it. We can't have an armament race and normal peacetime production at one and the same time.

We can't have both guns and homes.

IT IS INSTRUCTIVE TO SEE just why the bottom dropped out of the lumber market; or rather, how the plug was pulled out of the bathtub.

The New York Times of October 8 reported on page one: "RESERVE BOARD SET TO CUT BANK CREDIT AS INFLATION BRAKE."

Reports from New York yesterday indicated that Federal agencies were preparing to clamp down on the financing of the current housing boom. The restrictions, to be announced this week, will cut the number of housing units to be built next year by about 50% or to 700,000 structures."

APART FROM THE STUNNING demonstration of how the lives of the people are affected by the dictates of the money power, the world now sees more clearly why the U.S.A. has become the virtual dictator over the destinies of other nations.

The Federal Reserve Bank of the U.S.A. decrees, as the Times reports, that two and a half billion dollars worth of credit is to be "siphoned off." Within a week the whole lumber industry of the Pacific North West is hit. Within

workers everywhere on this continent.

But the effects are also intercontinental—they leap across all oceans.

At the recent political party conferences in Britain, Laborites and Conservatives vied with each other to see who could offer the people the most in the way of better housing.

The Conservatives over-rode their own leaders and demanded a flat increase of 50%. They specifically named their goal as 300,000 new housing units per year instead of the present 200,000.

Poor blokes! Obviously they do not read the small print of the financial pages, otherwise they would have known that the E.C.A. officials (that is, the Marshall Plan men) had already told Britain on the q.t. that she would have to cut below the 200,000 per year mark of the recent past.

IN SEVERAL OF THE BOOKS of the Old Testament of the Bible there are stories of dramatic scenes in which the prophets compelled wayward people of wicked kings to choose between two ways of life:

"Choose ye this day which god ye shall serve?" Sometimes they even entered into public contests with the priests of false gods to show who could "draw down from heaven" the most devastating fire.

Too bad that our generation has no such voice of thunder to make homo sapiens choose between tanks or tractors, between bombs and butter, between cheap bottled milk and costly bottled war germs, between guns and homes—between life and death.

If we really did choose life and peace, we would swiftly transform the UN into a true world democratic parliament—with power to compel every nation on earth to take its own armies home, and keep them there forever; and to beat its swords into plowshares and melt its bombs into bath tubs for new homes.

Family Life Main Concern

Problems arising out of disturbed family life comprise the major part of the social welfare work in Prince Rupert, E. D. Coughlin, supervisor of welfare here, told the Prince Rupert Gyo Club at luncheon yesterday. And maladjustment in family life was not all in the lower income class or due to poverty, he declared. As a matter of fact, there were sometimes found in poverty, even in dirt, happy family relationships. The all important factor was parental responsibility, the maintaining in the children of the feeling that they "belonged." The speaker emphasized the importance of good family relations. "Everything good emanates from the family," he said, reminding fathers that the mothers, more especially in these times, could not be expected to assume all the responsibility for bringing up the family.

There are a number of distressing family situations in Prince Rupert, Mr. Coughlin disclosed and, in the interest of proper juvenile tendencies, some of these cases would require drastic action. He referred to the risk of emotional upsets which arose among children with unhappy family lives. However, the speaker said, there was always the effort to bring families together and hold them there and the supreme satisfaction for the social worker was when happy reconciliations could be achieved as was sometimes done.

Of course, there were the cases where nothing could be done but to take the children away from incapable or irresponsible parents and one of the phases of social welfare work was to find suitable foster homes. And, once such homes were found, the last thing the social welfare worker desired to do was to "snoop" on the foster parents.

Mr. Coughlin described the organizational and administrative set-up of the social service, headed by the minister, the deputy minister, the director and assistant director of welfare. Then the province was divided into five regions, each with its administrator or supervisor and the staff of workers. Girl Guides' Scroll To Cross Continent

Of modern literature Miss Faure says: "Most stories are insipid—they aren't even bad!" "My father taught us to do everything for God and to enjoy the Bible. I remember an old psalm that says the Lord is the sun of righteousness. Perhaps that's why people are like sunshine. Sometimes I think we are sunshine."

Teaching Sunday School has always been as close to Miss Faure as her painting.

FREE RELIGION

"But with me churches are the same. I can worship just as well in a Catholic church as in a Protestant," says Miss Faure who believes that religion must combine with true art.

"If I were a Catholic, Fra Angelico would be my saint," said Miss Faure referring to the fifteenth century Italian master who is said to have never painted anything without prayer.

"His paintings are inspired. In a painting he did of an angel, instead of dressing it in white, Fra Angelico used many bright colors.

"The word 'religion' is cold. To me, God is love; but don't go thinking I'm perfect!" added Miss Faure.

Recalling her own youth: "There is a fire of youth which wants to help God do his plan. Restless, young, not yet mature; that is a good thing.

"When I was young, above all I wanted to be a boy; to put on a pack and tramp through the fields and sleep out all night, watching the sparks of a fire.

"But I'm now glad I'm a woman. My paintings are my work—I call them my children," confided Miss Faure.

"We must recognize our talents. I want to do something besides cooking and making clothes.

"Still the greatest calling for a woman is to raise children and be silent," says Miss Faure who believes there is nothing greater in life than the warmth of a home.

"Woman must know her place. We are here to comfort and love," stresses Miss Faure who enjoys baking bread. She has even milked cows in her domestic chores.

"Ah, the men! They like eat-

ing, but they don't want to do anything about it!" exclaims Miss Faure.

"But the man can make his home loving, too. Still, he has his own work."

Recalling Italy where Miss Faure visited the early Christian catacombs, she says: "It was inspiring to see these landmarks where men risked their lives for faith, but now men won't risk getting out of bed to church."

At 62, Miss Faure came to Canada from Holland, her native country.

"In Canada there is not the same social classes as in the old land. This is a busy working country," says Miss Faure who lives in Prince Rupert with her nephew Eric and his wife, Anne.

Miss Faure plans to resume teaching art to her Prince Rupert pupils next month.

"Many a one is an artist who

has never produced any work of art," says Miss Faure. "How often we will recognize the artist merely in the arrangement of flowers!"

The latest of Miss Faure's work, which is now on exhibit at the Civic Centre, is a tribute to northern British Columbia.

"I nearly worked myself to death," is how Miss Faure describes her painting sojourn in Telkwa this fall.

There is also a small display of Etruscan pottery and European curios.

The future is full of hope for Miss Faure, who plans to study portrait painting. "I know it is the greatest form of painting—that is where the masters excelled.

"But I am not a great master. I know that because I have seen the works of great masters," Miss Faure admits. "I am content if I have helped some way in God's plan."

PARIS (Reuters) — A new seamless couture which cuts in half the time needed to make a model gown is the sensation of Paris fashion circles at the moment.

The new method introduced by Madame Georgette Renal in her winter small shop collection may be the first step towards providing an answer for the smart woman whose taste is for hand-sewn clothes but whose budget is in the ready-made group. A client can order a gown in the morning, try it on at noon and have it ready for wear the same evening.

Madame Renal uses her seamless couture even for tailor-made suits. Tucks and darts replace seams and every gown has a marked waistline. The only seam used is for the set-in sleeve, but many dresses have sleeves cut in one with the bodice.

The underarm is slit but ends in a buttoned cuff which allows the sleeve to be wrapped around twice in a spiral movement, or, if worn open, to fall in an easy cape effect.

Models in this collection range from 25,000 to 40,000 francs (\$70-\$112) but Madame Renal admits that the savings in cost achieved by the new method has not been fully passed on to the clientele. One garment was cut in the normal manner and the other made by the seamless system.

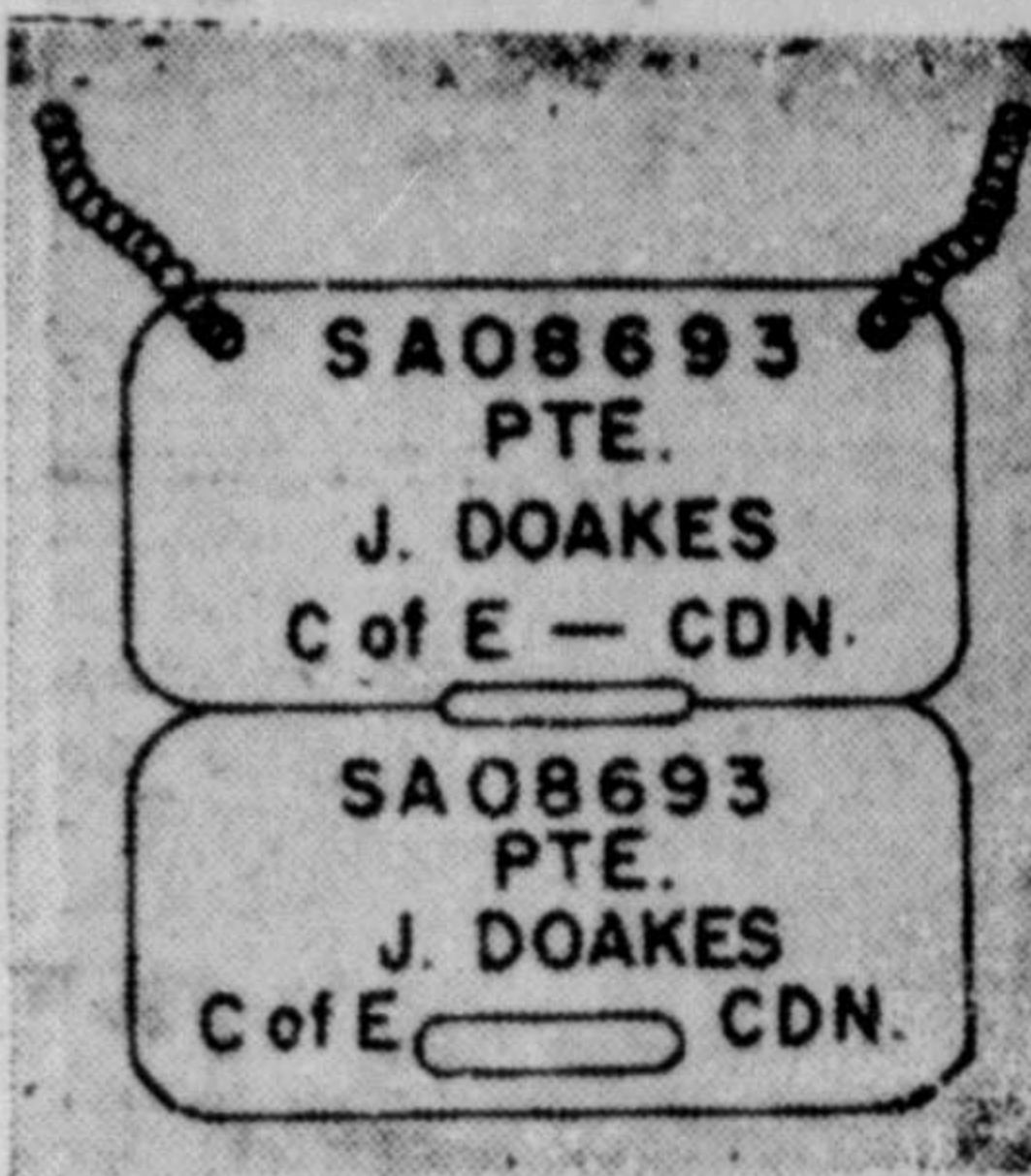
The first took eight days to complete. The second was made in less than two days.

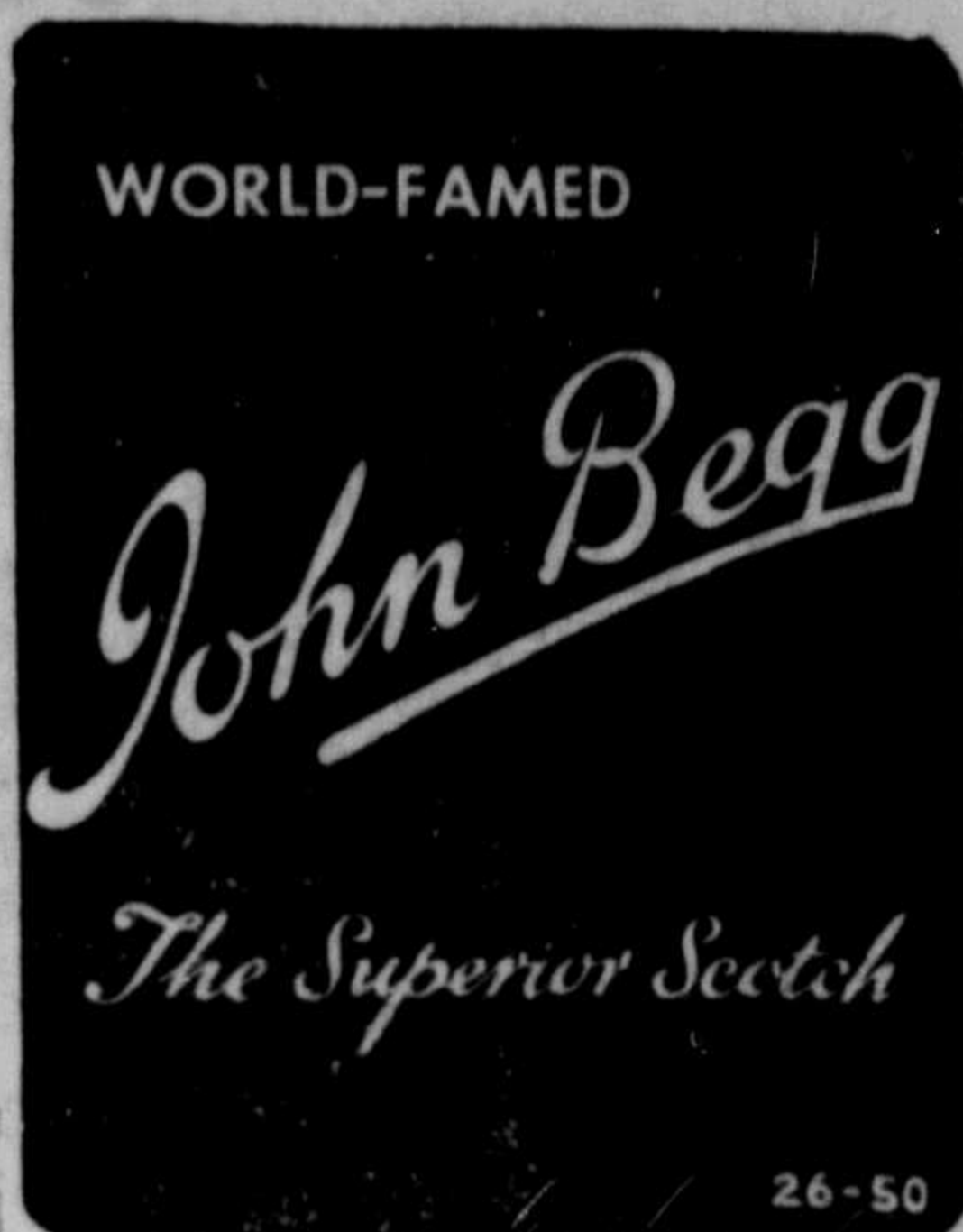

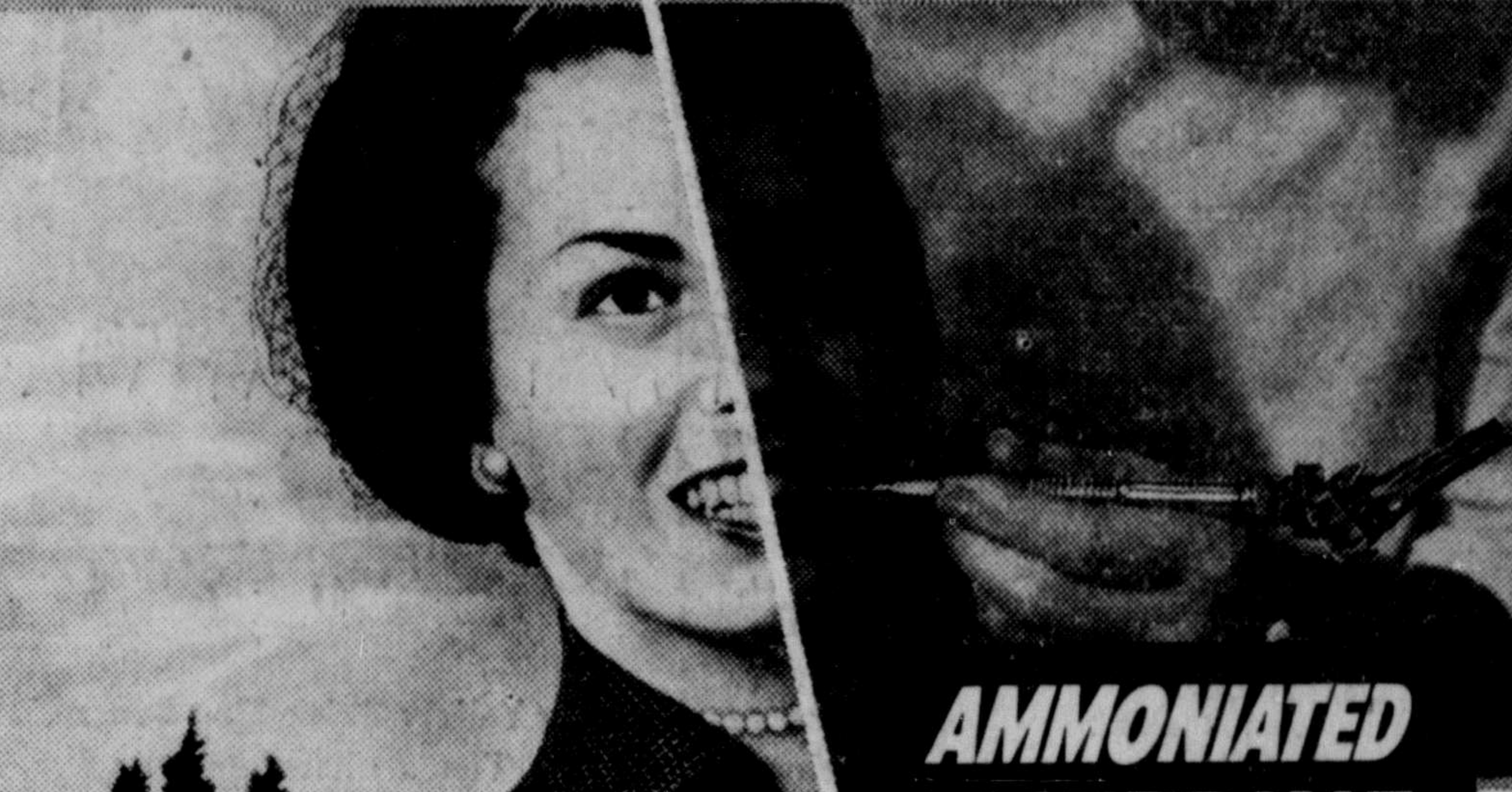
