

Need For Fire Safety

DEPLORABLE apartment house fire tragedy at Ocean Falls illustrates how holocaust may strike even, under the most desirable of conditions and with the most adequate precautions, in frame dwellings, particularly of the multiple type.

Ocean Falls is well known for the comfortable and safe type of its living quarters generally and, as far as is known, the Balsam Apartment was no exception.

The tragedy points up the urgent necessity of the utmost of fire precautions and the best of emergency life-saving equipment in dwellings especially where many people are grouped together in separate residence. There must be such insurance against these dead of night fires when dazed people seek exit in haste and often in panic.

There are certainly situations in Prince Rupert where fire breaking out as people sleep might have consequences as black as that which occurred in the paper town down the coast early yesterday morning. The fire authorities do the best they can but they must have realization on the part of the public of the dangers and co-operation in allaying them.
