

SSION BY PROXY — Korea is the first case of Russian aggression by proxy—that is, aggression by the Russian-armed sian-trained forces of a Russian satellite, which aims at extending Russia's sphere of power, but does not involve Russia nd diplomatically. Similar actions, indicated in this map by stippled arrows, are possible in Europe and Asia. In neither there a certainty that the existing local defence of the free nations is adequate to meet even this limited danger. Only buthern frontier would Russia have to move openly in order to conquer territory by military means. On the other hand, move, as the inset globe shows, would bring Russia to the shores of the Indian Ocean and neatly sever connections beast and West. To Nation Delivered

Brigade Being Raised for Service in Korea or Elsewhere Required

OTTAWA, (CP) -Prime Minister L. S. St. Laurent, in a solemn and historic message to the country Monday night announced that Canada is forming a special Army brigade primarily for Korea and said that defence production is being stepped up over a wide field of vital equipment. He told the people

that Parliament will be recalled within six or seven weeks or earlier if necessary to approve expansion and acceleration of Canada's defence program.

Authoritative quarters indicpower to send a new brigade three battalions of infantry and United police action ainst aggression. The brigade will not be fully trained until early next year.

Cabinet will decide the destination on the basis of the international situation which may breed out of Korea.

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Canada To Play Part

DEOPLE of Canada must be gratified to learn I from the Prime Minister that definite and extensive steps are being taken with a view to organizing the Dominion's fighting and industrial forces against the grim possibilities of the deteriorating international situation. The feeling had been developing that Canada was not moving quickly enough in that direction, was, indeed, not keeping pace with other parts of the Commonwealth, particularly the Motherland, Australia and New Zealand, in rising to the possible requirements of the United Nations and the North Atlantic Pact nations. The Prime Minister's statement should dispel to considerable extent dissatisfaction that there may have been along that line.

Meantime, Parliament is put on the stand-by order with the probability that a special session will be called six or seven weeks hence after various phases of the accelerated defence and mutual aid program have been perfected—or sooner if the emergency becomes suddenly more intensified. Then, when the session does come, Parliament will have the program and the facts before it and will be able to pass its certain approval with a minimum of delay.

/AKOV MALIK'S actions at the Security Council table at Lake Success, to which he has returned as chairman, provide a perfect example of the dual character of present-day Soviet diplomacv It is a mixture of subtlety and crudeness, of cunning and violence.

- Of course, Malik works to orders and behaves the way that Stalin wants him to behave. Stalin admires cunning and he also admires violence. When Malik manoeuvres adroitly, it is because Stalin wishes that. When he becomes hectoring and insulting that also is, doubtless, Stalin's wish. When the two are mingled confusingly, the confusion is Stalin's. It is characteristic and it is Langerous. One of the principles of Stalin's diplomatic strategy is to seek to divide and confuse the free world and at the same time consolidate the Communist world under his own absolute command.

The obvious way, of course, to disrupt western unity in the Security Council is to divert it from the Korean issue, on which the Council is virtually united, to the question of Communist Chinese representation, on which the Council has been evenly divided for six months. The effort of Pandit Nehru, no doubt with the best intentions, to link the Chinese question with the Korean question, presented Stalin with an opportunity. Then there is the added advantage of having Malik as chairman of the Council during this month of August.

One cannot restrain the thought that Stalin, in his Kremlin, is chuckling with approval. Things are going these days the way the dictators like.







They should also have their own game an fish wardens because they ur derstood the whereabouts of in her!ted trapping grounds and fishing camps. Then they would come to what is called "sel overnment.'

Regarding enfranchisemon Mr. Sinclair asked why Indians should be required to surrender legal rights to becom "citizens of our own native soil..." He then asked what else was required of the Indian people before they became fully recognized citizens of their own country.

The speaker said his people patronized stores in this country and had paid taxes, social security taxes, whether on or off the reserve. "We have served the country we love wholeheartedly in times of peril. Therefore, we ask for freedom and justice for our people and their children in days to come. Then we would all be united free citizens of the country and true brothers and sisters.'.' he declared.

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
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
