And to the credit of Prince Rupert, Daggett and Wilkinson are just two of many local students who have found that applying oneself to the acquisition of good qualities of education and citizenship can be exceptionally profitable sometimes.

The Parent-Teacher Council has referred to the four P.T.A.'s resolution which has been passed to them by the Local Teachers' Federation for endorsement to the effect that current regulations be changed to permit teachers to hold civic office.

A survey will be conducted again this year to determine the number of kindergarten age children in the city, so that the P.T. Council will be provided with material to follow up the action begun last year in an effort toward the establishment of adequate kindergarten facilities here.

Two Tenders Are Accepted

Three tenders, two for servicing of typewriters and one for construction of teachers' desks, were opened at a meeting of the Prince Rupert Public School Board Wednesday night.

The successful tender for servicing of 44 typewriters at city schools was that of Brydges, McLean and Rudderham which stipulated servicing of each typewriter every second month at a \$1 fee.

Thirteen teachers' desks will be supplied by Woodbilt Products of Prince Rupert as a result of their successful bid for the contract. The desks, of wooden construction, will measure 42 feet by 26 feet and cost \$45 each.

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The Experts Say - -

Canadian Press Staff Writer. Fish Menus—This campaign for more use of fish can be a headache for a cook faced with preparing variations of sea food dishes.

Many recipes calculated to pep up fish use complete with tantalizing pictures of how the fish should look when ready for the dinner table are being put out. There's fried codfish saute, for which fresh cod filets, corn flour and vegetable fat are the necessary ingredients.

Wipe fish with a damp cloth. Cut into portions. Roll fish in flour, dip in salted milk and then roll in dried bread crumbs or in corn flour.

Melt some butter in a saucepan and while still bubbling pour over the fish. Serve with slices of lemon. Two pounds of filets will serve six persons.

Baked Fish Creole—Ingredients: two pounds cod filets or sliced halibut; one-third cup mixed onion; one cup chopped celery; one tin tomatoes; four tablespoons salad oil; salt and pepper.

Cook finely chopped onion and celery in salad oil for 10 minutes. Add tomatoes. Season. Clean fish. Cut into six or seven portions. Place fish in greased pan. Cover with vegetables. A few slices of lemon may be placed

on the dish. Cook 15 minutes in hot oven (500 deg. F).

Fillets in Turbans—add an extra something to the fish dinner.

Ingredients: small filets of sole or cod; prepared mustard; one egg; dried bread crumbs; vegetable fat.

Wipe filets with a damp cloth; salt, cover with a light coat of mustard. Roll and fasten with short skewer or tooth-pick. Dip in egg beaten with two table-spoons of water. Roll in dried bread crumbs and place on a greased baking sheet.

Cook 12 to 15 minutes in a hot oven. Serve with melted butter, not browned, which must be poured over fish while butter is still bubbling. Garnish with parsley.

Fish Corder—Ingredients: 4 table-spoons butter; two onions (thinly sliced); three-quarters cup minced celery; two cups uncooked potatoes, diced; two cups chopped uncooked codfish; four cups boiling water; three cups milk; one tablespoon minced parsley; one tablespoon salt; one-eighth teaspoon pepper.

Cook onion and celery five minutes in melted butter. Add boiling water, potatoes and fish. Cook until potatoes are soft. Add milk, parsley and seasonings. Do not let boil after having added milk.
