Blackwood Coming Famous Bridge Authority To Write for Daily News

"Bridge is part skill, part chance . . . and mostly just plain understanding human nature."

That's the claim of the man who should know, Easley R. Blackwood, originator of the popular Blackwood slam convention. The Daily News is about to start a winter series of bridge lessons by Blackwood.

A "slam" is to the bridge game what a home run is to baseball—and bridge players are just as anxious to bid a slam as any batter is to hit one over the fence. The thrill involved in each is, as any bridge player will tell you, just as great as the other.

A native of Birmingham, Alabama, Blackwood hit upon his famed slam convention while he was still in his early thirties. As he explains it, mathematics is his main hobby, with chess and music running close behind, and "mathematics and bridge are nothing short of inseparable." The convention resulted "simply from my study of mathematical probabilities as applied to cards."

"Simply" or otherwise, the results of his study put a new thrill in playing bridge, and the system was enthusiastically adopted by amateur and professional players alike. Today it has reached the point where, when four strangers sit down to play bridge, the first question is always, "Do you play Blackwood?"

Most people are surprised to learn that Blackwood is not just the name of the convention, but a real person. In fact, he is so real that he has a home and family in Indianapolis. His family consists of his wife (who stopped playing as his partner in tournaments because "he's so much better than I. Besides, he claims that I play 'ladies' bridge,"), and one son, Easley, Jr., aged 16.

Both Blackwood and his wife are rated as class A correspondence chess players, and Mr. Blackwood claims that their love for classical music has filled their home with so many albums that they are all but forced to move out to make room for them.

At the age of 11, Blackwood was given the choice of learning to play bridge, "or else." He was badly needed to fill out a family foursome which included his father, mother and grandmother. Bridge was his family's favorite hobby, and the four spent most of their leisure hours at it.

Blackwood has taken practically every mathematics course offered by universities, which fact has resulted in the invention of new thrills into America's favorite card game.

In his daily column, he will replace the standard North, South, East and West with varied and interesting characters, whose personalities will assert themselves in the column and the game, resulting in a true-to-life game being carried on in each column.

Hart Highway Nears Finish

PRINCE GEORGE — Only twenty-four miles of highway have to be built to connect Vancouver with Dawson Creek via the Hart Highway. This name was given to the road by the British Columbia government in honor of Premier Hart who originated the work of its completion.

It runs from Prince George, north via Summit Lake to Fort McLeod and east through Pine Pass to Dawson Creek. Between Prince George and Vancouver the Cariboo Highway would be used by trucks and other traffic.

The road is a 30-foot gravelled highway suitable for heavy trucking at moderate speeds.

Seattle and other coastal points already forecast that its use for Alaska Highway freight will mean a saving of two days as compared with the Edmonton route.

When completed an exclusive franchise for passenger and freight traffic is to be held by the Pacific and Great Eastern Railway company, which is government-operated.

Mrs. Arnold, who made the trip by air, enthused about the advantages of aerial travel—the speed, lack of bother and absence even of the necessity for tipping. An hour's stop at Iceland was an interesting interlude in the return flight.

She could have seen many places of interest in the Old Land, Mrs. Arnold said, but she had made the trip to visit with her relatives and she had concentrated on that purpose.

Nevertheless, she was able to make many observations and, in the telling, those proved of exceptional interest to her listeners.

Mrs. Arnold wore a \$25 "utility" suit which she had bought in England. Clothing was not particularly scarce in England any more. Standard styles were reasonable in price, but tailor-made commanded high prices.

Vegetables, grown there, were quite plentiful in England and were of good quality. Meat was, however, scarce and high in price. The meat an average Canadian would eat at a meal would suffice for three in present-day England.

Timely Recipe

An omelet becomes luncheon or supper fare when it is light and fluffy, and topped with a sauce that folks always rave over. "Omelet with Almond Cheese Sauce" is just that kind. The sauce has crunchy toasted almonds in it.

- Sauce**
- 1/4 cup roasted unblanched almonds
 - 2 tablespoons butter or margarine
 - 2 1/2 tablespoons flour
 - 1 1/2 cups milk
 - 1/4 cup grated Canadian cheese
 - 1/2 teaspoon salt
 - Few drops Worcestershire sauce
 - Dash cayenne pepper
 - Black pepper to taste
- Omelet**
- 6 eggs
 - 1/2 cup milk
 - 3/4 teaspoon salt
 - Black pepper
 - 1 tablespoon butter or margarine

Sauce—Chop almonds. Melt butter and blend in flour. Add milk and cook and stir until thickened. Blend in cheese and seasonings, and cook and stir over very low heat until cheese is melted. Keep hot over hot water while preparing omelet. Just before serving, blend in almonds.

Omelet—Beat eggs lightly. Blend in milk, salt and pepper. Melt butter in frying pan and pour in omelet mixture. Cook over low heat. As mixture cooks, lift with spatula so uncooked portion runs under cooked portion. When omelet is set, remove to hot plate. Pour part of sauce over omelet. Fold over and top with remaining sauce. Serves 4 to 6.

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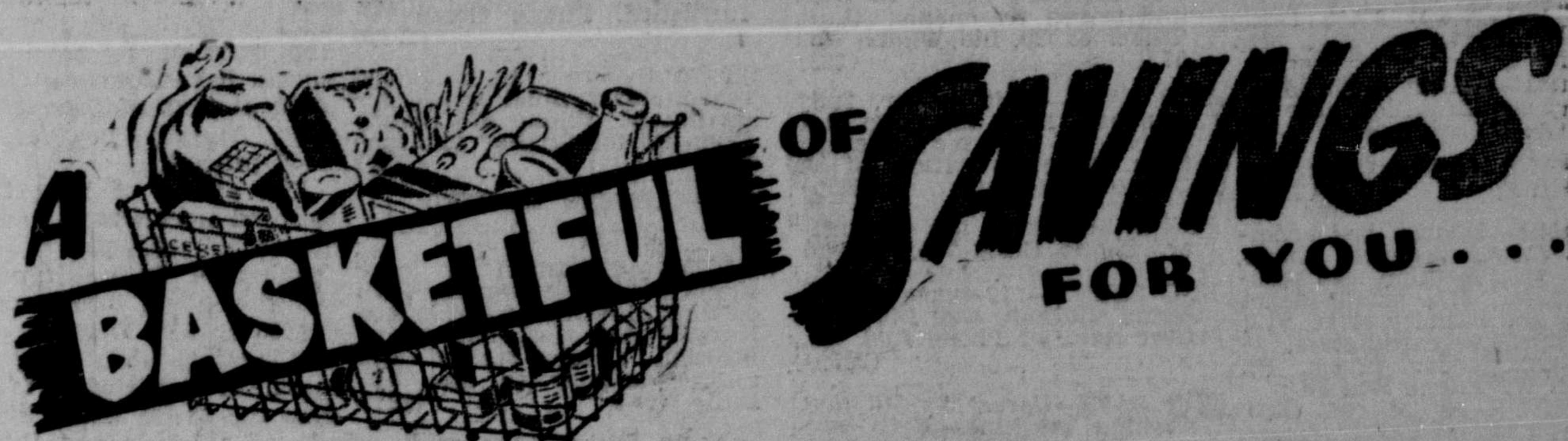

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Wonder Metal

TITANIUM, a new metal which is already being used to make beautiful gems, is likely to become a major structural material rivaling aluminum, magnesium and stainless steel within five or six years, according to the October Reader's Digest. The report by Harold Manchester is condensed from Science Monthly. Largest immediate North American source will be from a mine near Allard, Alberta which begins production in December. The metal is 45 percent lighter in weight than steel, and its strength and rust resistance make it a good material for military as well as household uses. The ease with which the metal resists penetration by acid tanks of the same thickness. And samples of metal immersed in the sea for 60 days show no corrosion, suggesting multiple naval uses which eliminate the need for painting. Titanium when fully developed may effect a possible 25 percent reduction in the weight of airplanes, doubling a plane's pay load. High full production uses are still in the experimental stage, government and industry have spent over \$15,000,000 on titanium research during the last four years. Titanium oxide is already used in the manufacture of white paints, face powders and creams as a whitening agent to make white things whiter. Gem-cut titanium oxide are not quite as hard as diamonds but more brilliant. "Titania" is the first new gem in history. It was discovered about 160 years ago, the metal is the ninth most common element in the earth's crust. The richness of North American deposits is independent of imports. The Lake mine, a joint project of the Kennecott and the New Jersey Zinc companies, contains the world's largest known ilmenite deposits. Estimated 200 million tons of ore in the reserve contain 35 percent iron, 35 percent titanium oxide.

RELEASING OF DOUKHOBORS

EARLY in the month of August these columns approved the decision of Mr. Justice A. M. Manson in passing sentences on Doukhobor demonstrators after they had given promise of their good conduct in the future. Unfortunately, since then even more demonstrations occurred in the way of parading, arson and other nuisances and the result was that nearly 400 Doukhobor men were sentenced to prison of up to three years and their accommodation has posed another problem.

On recommendation of a commission appointed to study the Doukhobor problem the Department of Justice at Ottawa has decided to release these men and women from prison.

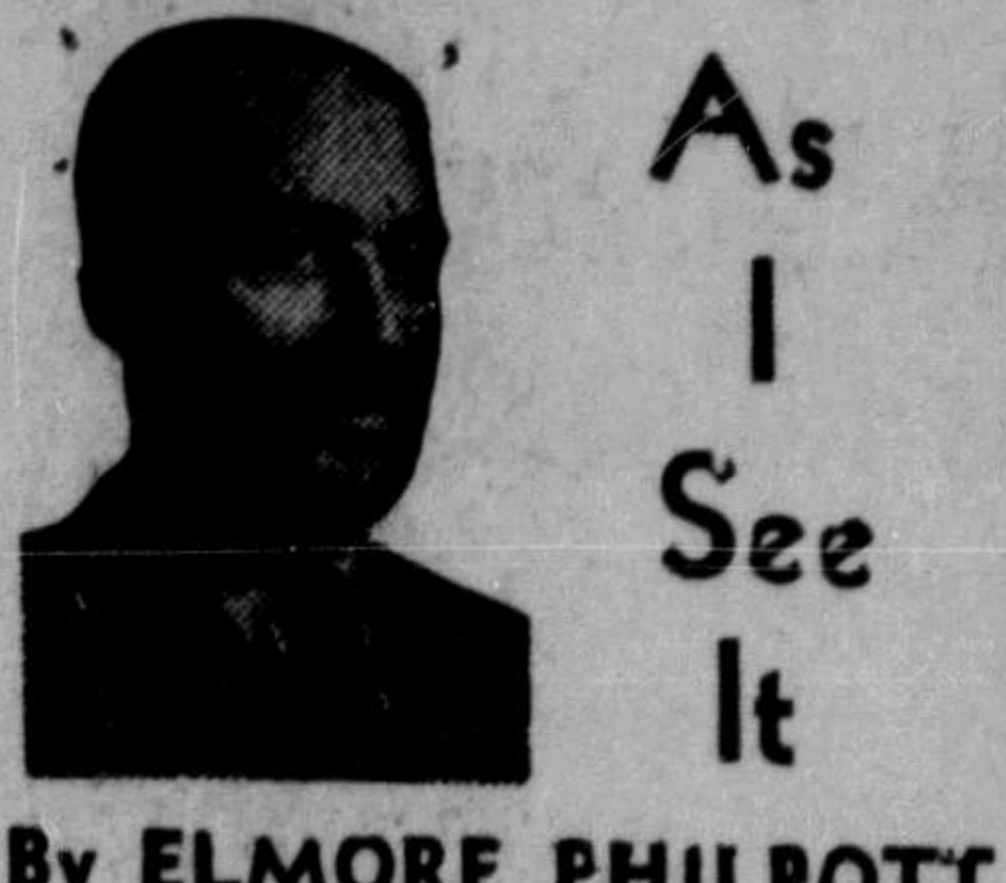
Some of the facts alluded to in the commission's report might appear to minimize the seriousness of the offences of the Doukhobors on the grounds that they were committed in remote places and had some ritualistic impulsion. We do not think much of grounds. Violation of the code is a crime wherever it is committed and it seems rather unjustification that it should be committed in a remote place. Nor is it a less flimsy justification, because it is a custom of a certain sect of a crime should be justified or condoned. All our only standard can be that of what is done in this country regardless of whether it may be done in another country.

The only acceptable justification, of course, for the release of the Doukhobors at this time is that they have been of good conduct during their incarceration to date and have undertaken to be of good conduct when paroled. This is to be implied from their desire to co-operate."

The question of accommodation and expense to the country of their incarceration is, of course, an important actuating factor in the amnesty that has been granted by the Department of Justice.

Maybe, the Doukhobors have learned their final lesson. We hope so.

UNCLE SAM'S DREAMS

IT SEEMS TO ME that all great nations follow a pretty consistent pattern of action: If you study what they have done in the past — more or less — you can get a fairly good idea of what they will do in the future.

I have often thought of that in connection with Uncle Sam, and in connection with Uncle Joe.

To take the latter first—Russia has played a remarkably consistent role in history. You can find it depicted by charts and graphs if you look in the appendix to Wells' Outline of History. Every few hundred years some dynamic force came sweeping west across Russia and into Europe. Then suddenly, always as a result of troubles in the rear, that dynamic force receded back into Asia.

NOW TAKE UNCLE SAM. The westward march of the American people from Atlantic to Pacific was one of the most remarkable in all history. It is now common knowledge that the white man's government broke every treaty ever made with the Indians. No matter how solemn the intentions of the white men who signed it, it was only a scrap of paper. For the great mass of white men (and women) kept right on coming. It was as if they were in the grip of some mighty urge. (Read John Steinbeck's classic little book, The Red Pony).

JUST BEFORE THE TURN of the century the U.S.A. began to move across the oceans. I

But it was during the Spanish-American war that the editor revealed what may be in the unconscious mind of Uncle Sam: "When this war began, Europe ruled the world and considered the United States a nation of shopkeepers. Spain called us Yankee Pigs, France and Germany echoed her. But the sinking of the MAINE broke the American shell and a new nation emerged; our courage won respect and chivalry won the love of the oppressed."

Now expansion is forced upon us by duty and destiny. The day will come when the Stars and Stripes will wave over every land, over a world with one language, one government, and one religion.

IT SEEMS TO ME that the U.S.A. is talking and acting right now much as she talked and acted just before she went to war with Spain.

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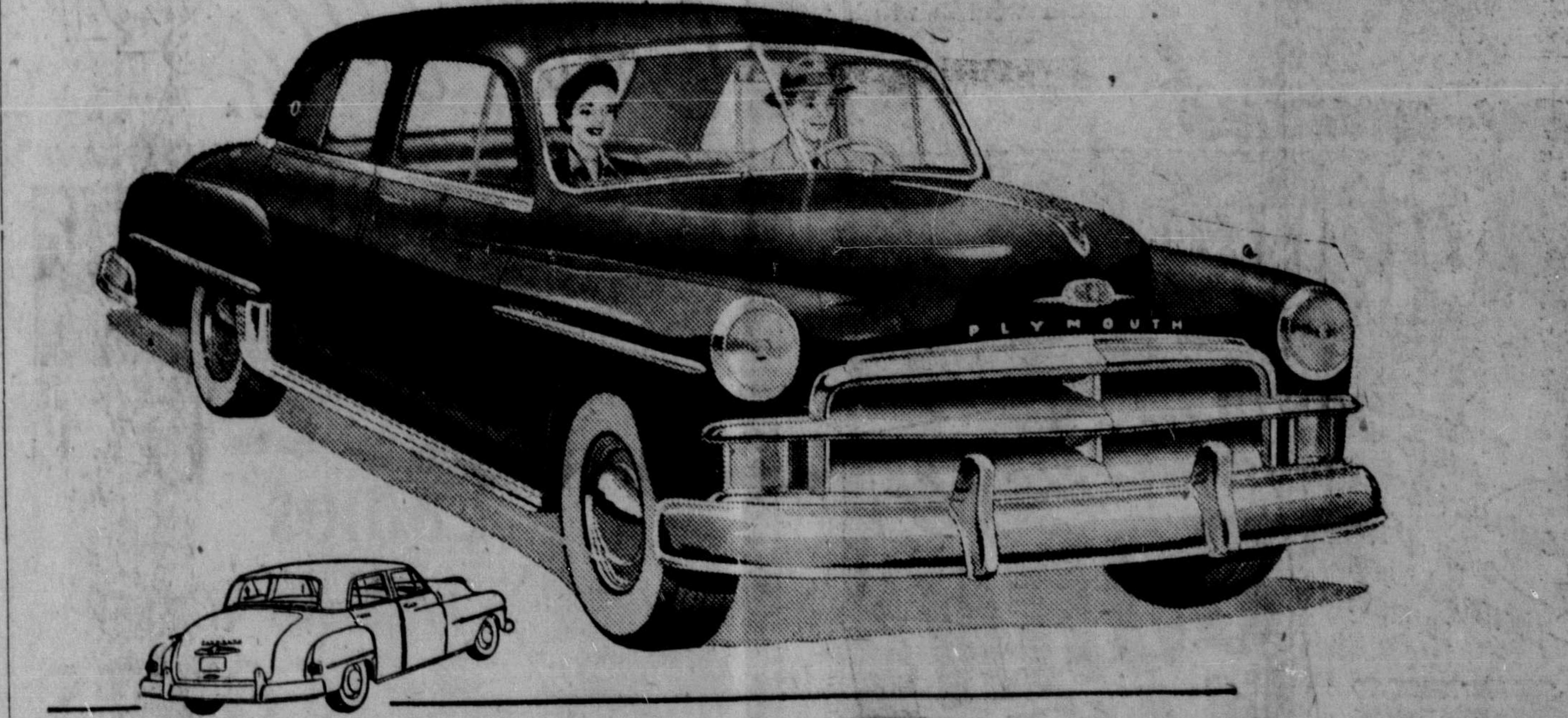
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**Ray Reflects
and Reminisces**

A cup of coffee consumed in Montreal is to cost fifteen cents. The sugar rate, for that quantity of coffee will be announced later.

Can it be literally true that today no one can think of building a dwelling unless he can command seven or eight thousand dollars? That's like starting close to the top, instead of the bottom. How did most of Canada's cities begin, anyway? How were houses built? There was such a thing as the cost of living, long ago, as well as now.

And it's a chinch no one waited until he could point to eight thousand, before he hustled down to the job of finding a shelter for his family and do better as time went on.

George Bernard Shaw, playwright and author, who broke his thigh, the other day, in a fall, is apparently making a satisfactory recovery. His age is ninety-four years. He has been a vegetarian part of his life. He must know his onions.

Few cities in Western Canada, for age and size possess a larger, better stocked and attractive library and reading room than what is found in Prince Rupert. From the very start, its growth has been steady, and one of the happiest features was moving of the books to the Civic Centre. Libraries, it might be said, are of relatively late development. Prior to 1870, the

great city of Paris was poorly served. Volumes numbered but 800 and these were not loaned. For a reason that seems impossible to understand, women were not admitted.

Had there been less pint size prejudice and more broad common sense, Prince Rupert could have had a fine appearing library building not long after the first sale of lots. Andrew Carnegie, whose beneficence is reflected in thousands of towns, offered to give the new city one, but this was rejected. A certain local group had no desire to accept anything from Carnegie. Others, unhappily in the minority, were quite willing to.

Sons of Freedom, sentenced up to three years for parading in the nude, will be released from prison at New Westminster. All told there are 278 men and 117 women. If they care to accept a word of advice it may be mentioned that birthday suits are out of style during Kootenay winters.

It's not so far back, in Prince Rupert's history that dozens of buildings which it was thought, had outlived their usefulness, were torn down. And possibly they were not so easy on the eyes. A little foresight might have avoided future worries, when housing pressure became more keenly felt and construction cost was still climbing. Years ago, a careful inspection minimum cash and credit outlay, and lick of paint could have gone a long way.

**Is Canadian National Railway
White Elephant, Asks Rideout**

At the last session of our parliament the sessional committee on railways and shipping was appointed, made up of 25 members of the house, including Hon. L. Chevrier and Hon. G. Drew. The committee had before it for questioning Donald Gordon, S. F. Dingle, T. H. Cooper of the C.N.R.

The committee held 16 meetings and delved into all branches of the CNR organization. Hence it was established the system has 33,046 miles of tracks, including 705 miles in Newfoundland, 133 miles in Maine, 80 miles in Connecticut, 67 miles in Massachusetts, 124 miles in New Hampshire, 433 miles in Vermont, 44 miles in New York, 1,846 miles in Michigan, 191 miles in Indiana, 112 miles in Illinois, eight miles in Wisconsin and 276 miles in Minnesota.

The C.N.R. also has a line of steamers plying on the Pacific coast, and 10 ocean liners plying

between Halifax and the West Indies, as well as the railway and auto ferries to Prince Edward Island, across Lake Michigan to Milwaukee and the Newfoundland line of 14 boats. Then, too, the C.N.R. is operating the Trans-Canada Airlines North American service, and also the Trans-Canada Airlines, Atlantic Limited.

As to hotels, while the number of hotels and lodges did not appear, yet Mr. Gordon stated the capital investment was \$27,438,286.00 and the profit over (Continued on page 10)

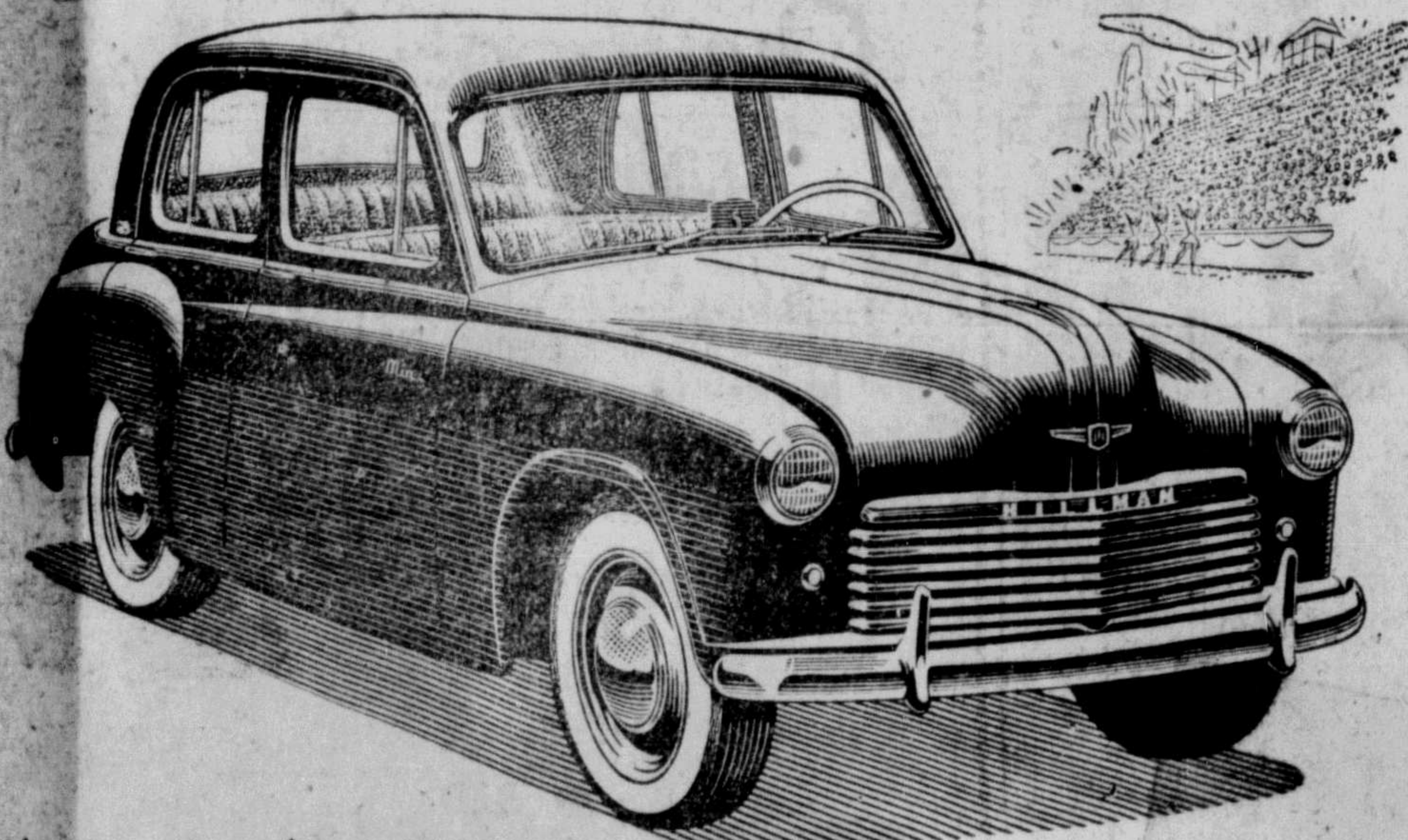
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PRINCE RUPERT BOOSTED— ALBERTA MAGAZINE CALLS VANCOUVER, B.C. HOG TOWN

The map that is shown fully illustrates the fact that everything in British Columbia must have its terminal at Vancouver, says "Norwest Miner of Edmonton" in commenting on a recent oil pipe line drawing featuring a route to the southern B.C. port. Many people must wonder why Vancouver is so big, and every other town in British Columbia so comparatively small. This latest suggestion of how railways, gas lines, oil lines, etc., must go to Vancouver clearly shows the frame of mind Vancouver people who have any say in the matter, are in.

It is to be noted that even Fort Norman oil is to go to Vancouver—yet Norman is only a few hundred miles from the navigable Arctic Ocean—even Edmonton gas and oil must go to Vancouver, notwithstanding the fact that Prince Rupert is a superior port, served by present railway interests with just a "branch line" instead of the Trans-continental railway, heralded some years ago.

Believe it or not, Prince Rupert is nearer Edmonton than is Vancouver. It also has ample provision for the leading of tankers, etc., and as for fertile areas, it has plenty in the Naas and Skeena Valleys to say nothing of the Stikine, Klappan, Groundhog and other Valleys.

Asserts Columbus Faked Ship's Log

BIRMINGHAM, England (Reuters)—An English professor claims Christopher Columbus didn't discover America in 1492. He says that was done five years earlier by a Portuguese explorer named Duhalmo.

Prof. A. Doves of Exeter University said Columbus "cooked" his ship's log.

He told scientists of the British Association there were "several features" about Columbus' first voyage suggesting that he knew land was there before he set out.

He said Columbus' brother, a map maker in Portugal, had told him about Duhalmo's discoveries. He knew, therefore, that he

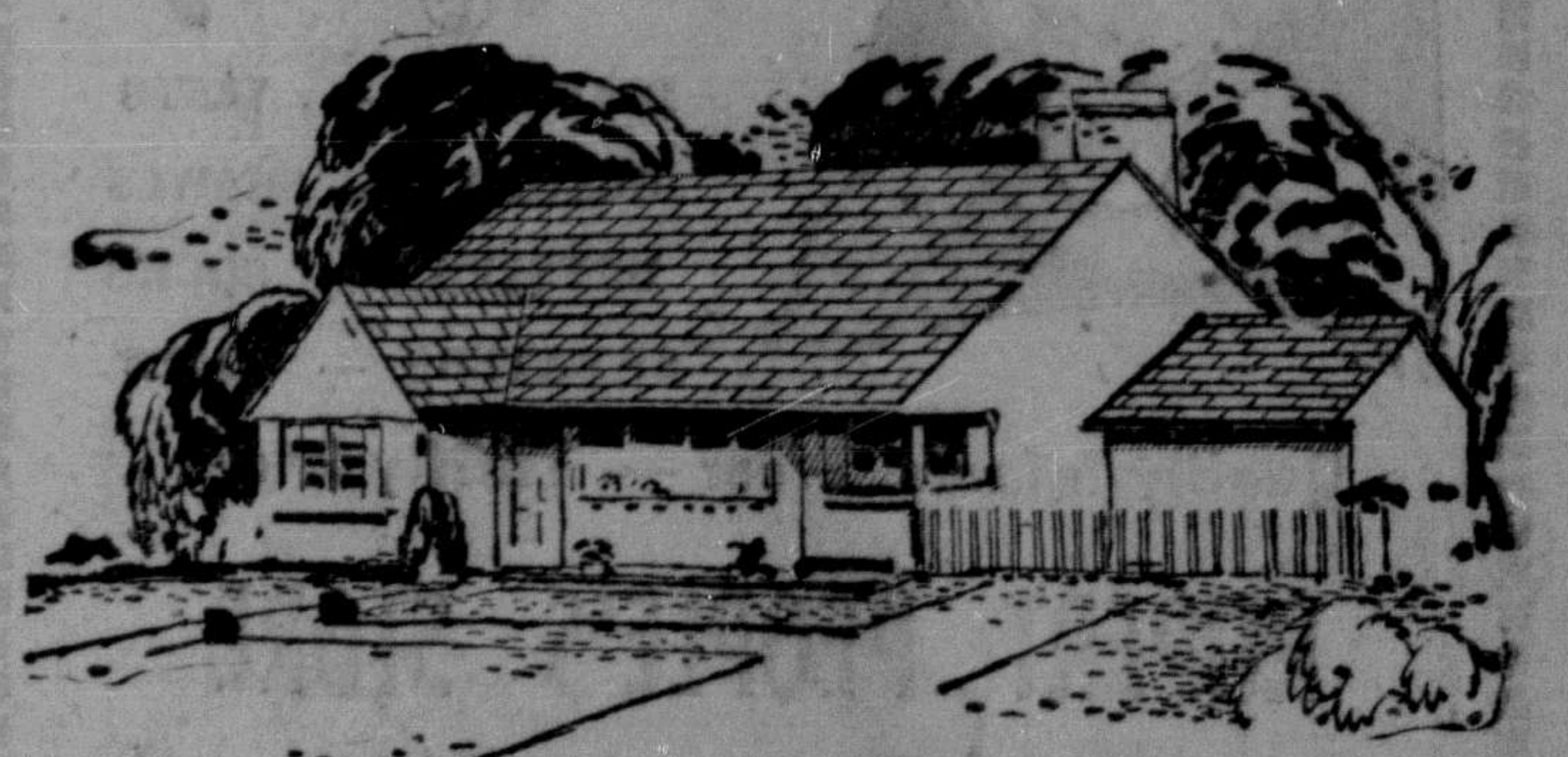
would find land 750 leagues west of the Canary Islands and he maintained a course due west from the Canaries to do so.

He added that as soon as the ships left the islands Columbus began to falsify the log and by the time the vessel had reached the West Indies it showed the ships had covered 900 miles more than they really had.

When Columbus landed in Cuba he recorded the latitude as 42 degrees north instead of 21.

The falsifications were deliberate so that he could claim a new discovery, the professor added.

He said that from 1500 onwards world maps began to appear based on Portuguese charts which showed the coast-line of North America in detail. That was years before the Spaniards began to explore the coast of the United States.
