It would appear that United States, as Great Britain has already done, will have to recognize Communist China sooner or later, not because she sympathizes with the Communist form of government but because it happens to be the government, even if by force of arms and the circumstances of its accession notwithstanding, is now in control of China. As for Chiang Kai-Shek and his Nationalist government, if it had given China better administration instead of having fallen into disrepute not only now but years ago, it would probably not have been in the position where it is today of having to beg for outside support to perpetuate itself after having become so weakened before its own people. Great Britain and United States may not like the fact that Communists now control China but it does not appear that the way of stopping further progress of Communism at this late date is either by snubbing the new regime there or by endeavouring to keep the old one going now that it has become virtually impracticable to do so any way.

# SAFETY IN SKATING

-HERE ARE FEW CANADIANS who have not enjoyed the thrill of the first skate of the season on a lake or pond. Each year, at this time, however, a percentage of these people lose their lives because of ice skating accidents.

Small bodies of water such as small lakes and ponds, and slowly moving streams form the safest ice for skating, or other winter sports. Ice over

for skating, no matter how thick it appears to be. Here are some skating safety rules:-Do not skate alone. Do not attempt to rescue someone who has fallen through the ice unless you know how to take care of yourself. Not only will you not help him but you may drown yourself. Get help. Do not crowd towards the break in the ice. Do not attempt ty rope attached to your waist. Lie flat on the ice and help him avoid panic. Have blankets or warm clothing available for the rescued person. Be prepared to treat ice-accident victims for shock, with warm drinks, blankets, etc. Do not give alcohol.

If you fall through the ice:-Do not panic. Exand call for help. Do not immediately attempt to climb back on to the ice surface. Get your bearings and make each movement count. Thrash the feet vigorously behind you to prevent the body from jack-knifing under the ice, and to help ward off chill. In this horizontal position, it is possible to gradually crawl forward until your hips are at the edge of the ice. Swerving slightly, you may now roll on to the ice surface. Keep rolling until you are away from the insecure ice at the edge of the hole. If the ice breaks ahead of you under your weight, continue until you either reach thicker ice or the shore. Rescue of a person who has fallen through ice may be done by a single individual with proper equipment, or by a small group when equipment is not available. One person must be equipped with skates or creepers to prevent being pulled in also. Use a reaching assist, such as a rope, long pole or branch, a plank, a ladder or ring-buoy. Plank or ladder may be pushed to within reach of the victim, enabling him to climb out. This distributes his weight over a larger ice surface. If he cannot climb out, have him hang on to the plank or ladder while you pull him out. You must keep low on the ice yourself, ind brace yourself by wearing creepers.
