## Flash Halibut Fleet Clears For Grounds For What May Be Shortest Season

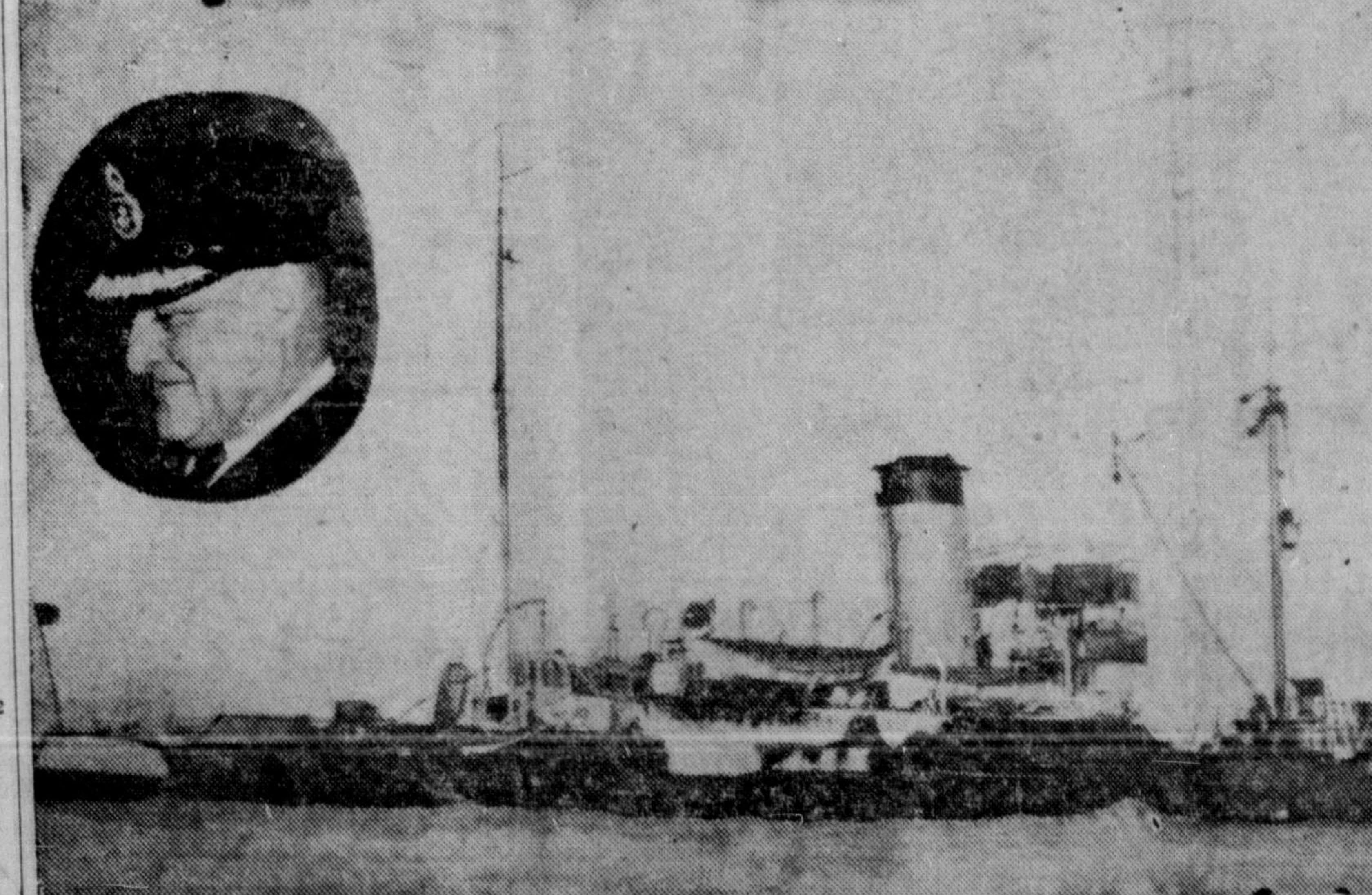

## Native Is Candidate

Frank Calder of Aiyansh C.C.F. Candidate For Atlin Riding. Not only will the native citizens of British Columbia vote for the first time in the forthcoming provincial election. They will have a candidate for the Legislature, it was announced in Prince Rupert today.

The candidate will be 34-year old Frank Calder of Green-ville village on the Naas River who has been nominated as C. C. F. standard bearer for Atlin riding. Jack Scott, formerly of Stew- art and now of Prince Rupert, withdrew in favor of Mr. Calder.

Mr. Calder, born at Naas Har- bor, was the first native to en-rol in the University of British Columbia and graduate there- from with a degree in theology. He has long been identified with organizational work among the natives and is a member of the United Fishermen's and Al- lied Workers' Union. At one time he was engaged in free lance writing for newspapers.

Expressing gratification at being chosen to represent the C.C.F. as their candidate in At- lin, Mr. Calder, although he is general secretary of the Native Brotherhood of British Colum- bia, wished to make it clear that he does not represent any native organization in the candi- dature but only the platform and policy of the C.C.F.

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## Europe Must Unite

THE MEETING of Foreign Ministers in London in the first days of May will definitely found the "Council of Europe" or the "European Union" — or whatever name may be finally chosen for the new organization of democratic European States.

That will be an historic event. Since that vague union of "Christendom" which was both the Papacy and the Holy Roman Empire, there have been many schemes for a voluntary union of European States. They have ranged from Henry IV of France's "Grand Design" to Briand's concept of the "United States of Europe." None of them has until now come into being.

The possible advantages of unity have always been apparent. The obstacles to unity have always been insuperable. The conflicts were always stronger than any urge to union. And yet they were the chief reason for union. Because, to the European peoples, European unity and peace seem in a way indivisible.

To the European until half a century or so ago, Europe was the "civilized world." The Americas and Australasia seemed offshoots and projections of Europe. Asia and Africa were either under European rule or destined very soon to be so. The smallest continent was the master continent of the world, and world quarrels were its quarrels.

Within ordinary lifetimes the whole world picture has changed. Western Europe is now questing after unity not because it is master of the world, and because European unity would imply world unity and world peace. It is questing after unity because of a feeling that, in the new shape of the world, Western Europe can only play a great role if it can act as a united whole.

That is one emotional urge behind the movement for union. The other is more immediate—one hopes more transitory. Today Western Europe feels itself and its way of life as a whole threatened as never since "Christendom" felt itself threatened by "Islam." "Europe" as a whole has never, since Sobieski saved Vienna, felt a common consciousness of a menace from the East. It is—let us face it frankly—a community of defensive need rather than any community of tradition or community of economic interest which it at last compelling the states of Western Europe—roughly the "successor states" of the Western Roman Empire—into some kind of union.

## IS CHINA POLICY RIGHT?

THERE DOES SEEM something inconsistent about the policy of the western nations towards China. We are supposed to be for republican China rather than communist China, justifying the policy of doing nothing to aid the Chinese republic against the communists because Chiang and his government are so rotten. So we allow the communists, who are controlled at least in part from Moscow, to take over China as they are now doing with rapidity.

It may be a little late to talk about it now but history of the next generation may show that our present acquiescence in a communist victory may indicate that we watched affairs in Europe too closely while turning our backs on Asia where another cold war, long and costly, may now be brewing.

We have already suggested that the apparent softening of the Russian attitude in Germany may not be without some relationship to the deteriorating situation in the Orient.

## FIRST AID ORGANIZED

While the classes continue to provide the pool of workers, these workers are now being mustered on a brigade basis in Prince Rupert. The training is thereby being organized for practical application with the workers going into uniform for routine duty such as attending sports or public gatherings for emergency purposes. At the same time they will be ready on a larger scale to spring into action in case of any major disaster or catastrophe.

## Candidate of Conservatives

Business and Community Service Blend in Career of W. R. McAfee

Thirty years of active business life in the Prince Rupert district and wide participation in community activities lie behind Welden R. McAfee, who was chosen Wednesday night by the city Progressive-Conservative Association to seek the Coalition candidacy in the forthcoming provincial election.

Since 1919, Mr. McAfee has been identified with the lumbering industry at Prince Rupert and nearby Georgetown and at the same time has made his services available to a number of organizations, including the Chamber of Commerce, local War Finance Committee, Red Cross, Rotary Club and the Masonic Order.

Born at Wakefield, Quebec, in 1898, Mr. McAfee is the son of the late George McAfee, a pioneer Prince Rupert lumber operator. He came to Prince Rupert following service in the First World War and has maintained unbroken residence here ever since.

Mr. McAfee first came to British Columbia in 1902, settling with his family in Vancouver. He attended Vancouver schools and was graduated in Arts from the University of British Columbia. Subsequently, he took a post graduate year at Harvard, specializing in economics.

He enlisted in the Canadian Field Artillery at Kingston in the First World War and served overseas for three years. On his return from overseas, he went to Georgetown, where he began his career in the lumber business.

From 1919 to 1933 he was employed by the Big Bay Lumber

Co. which operated mills at Georgetown and Seal Cove. In 1928, he moved to Prince Rupert and in 1933, in partnership with the late S. E. Sunbury, purchased the Georgetown mill, one of the oldest operations of its kind on the coast.

Operation of the Georgetown mill occupied Mr. McAfee until about a year ago, when the operation was closed.

In 1942, Mr. McAfee served as president of the Prince Rupert Chamber of Commerce. He also is a past-president of the Rotary Club, having served in that office in 1937. During the war he was president of the Prince Rupert Red Cross Society and vice-chairman of the local War Finance Committee. He also was second in command of the wartime First Battalion, Prince Rupert Regiment (MG) with the rank of captain. He is a past Master of Tyee Masonic Lodge and is a member of the Canadian Legion.

In 1924, Mr. McAfee married Miss Nina Munn, of Vancouver, a former college classmate. They have four children, George, who this year graduates in commerce at the University of B.C., Jean, studying Arts at the same university and Mary and Danny, attending Booth Memorial High School here.

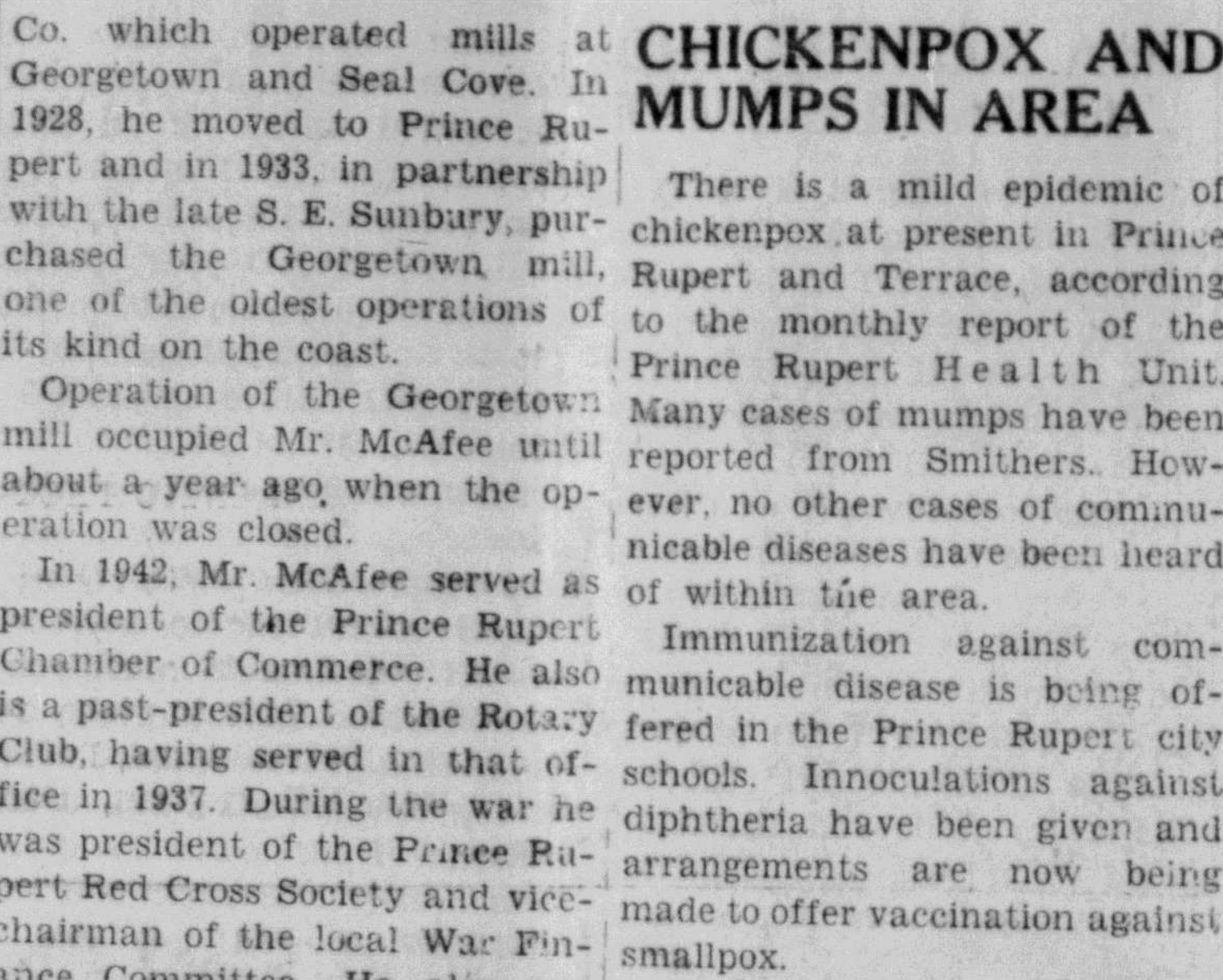

## CHICKENPOX AND MUMPS IN AREA

There is a mild epidemic of chickenpox at present in Prince Rupert and Terrace, according to the monthly report of the Prince Rupert Health Unit. Many cases of mumps have been reported from Smithers. However, no other cases of communicable diseases have been heard of within the area.

Immunization against communicable disease is being offered in the Prince Rupert city schools. Innoculations against diphtheria have been given and arrangements are now being made to offer vaccination against smallpox.

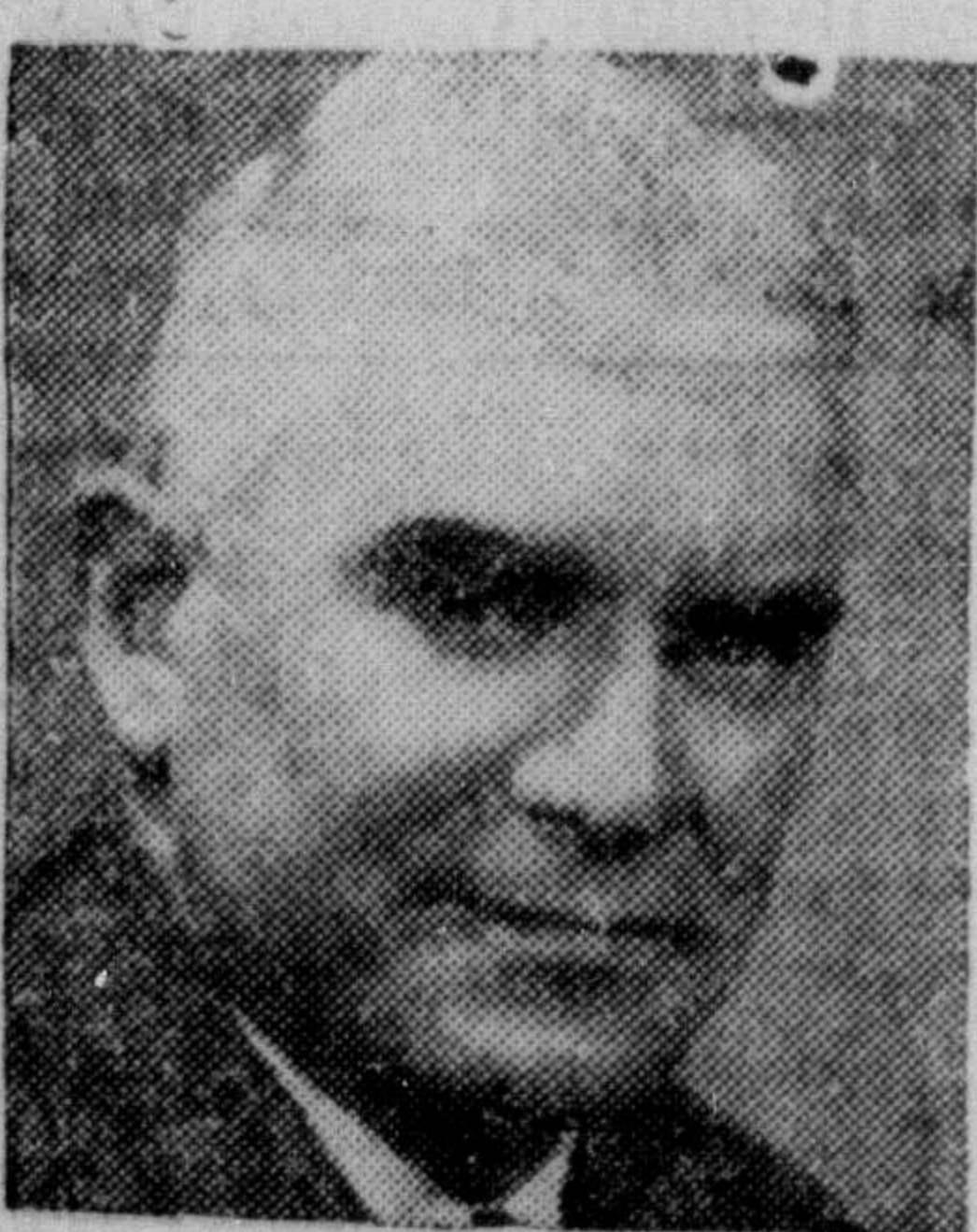

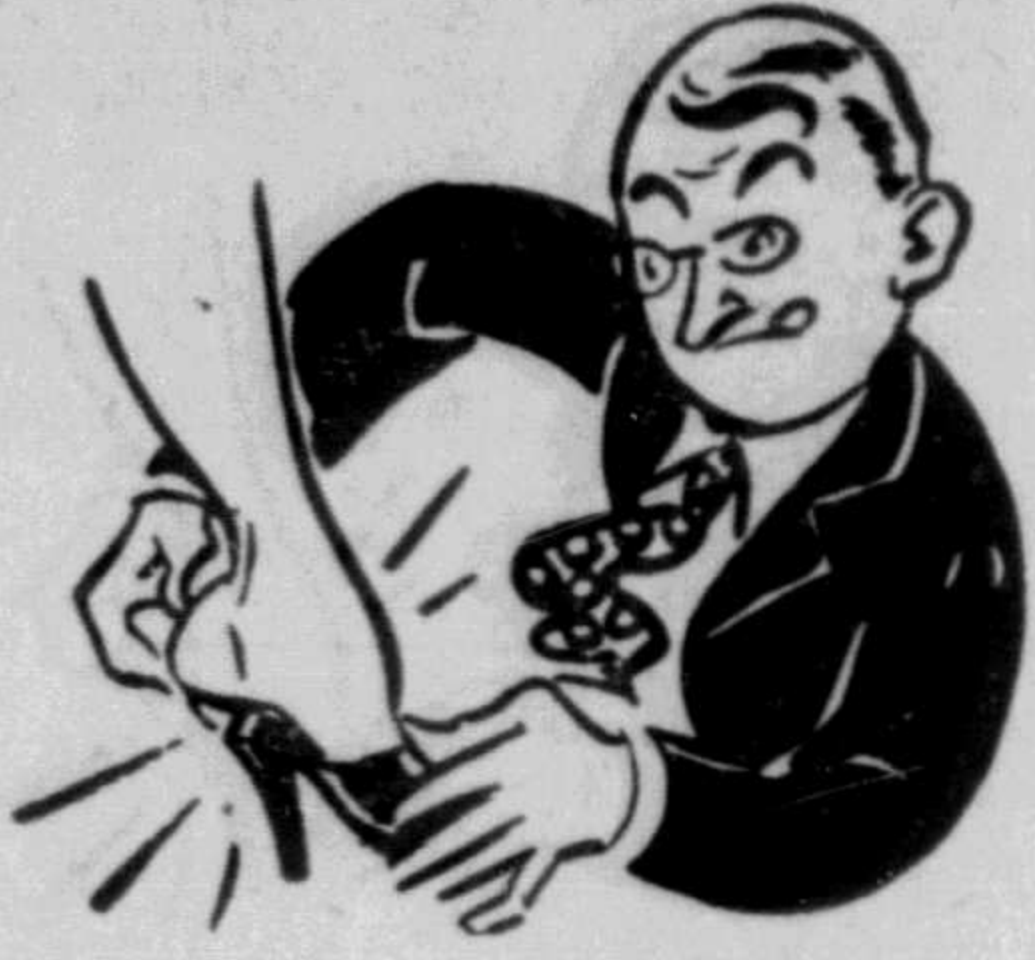

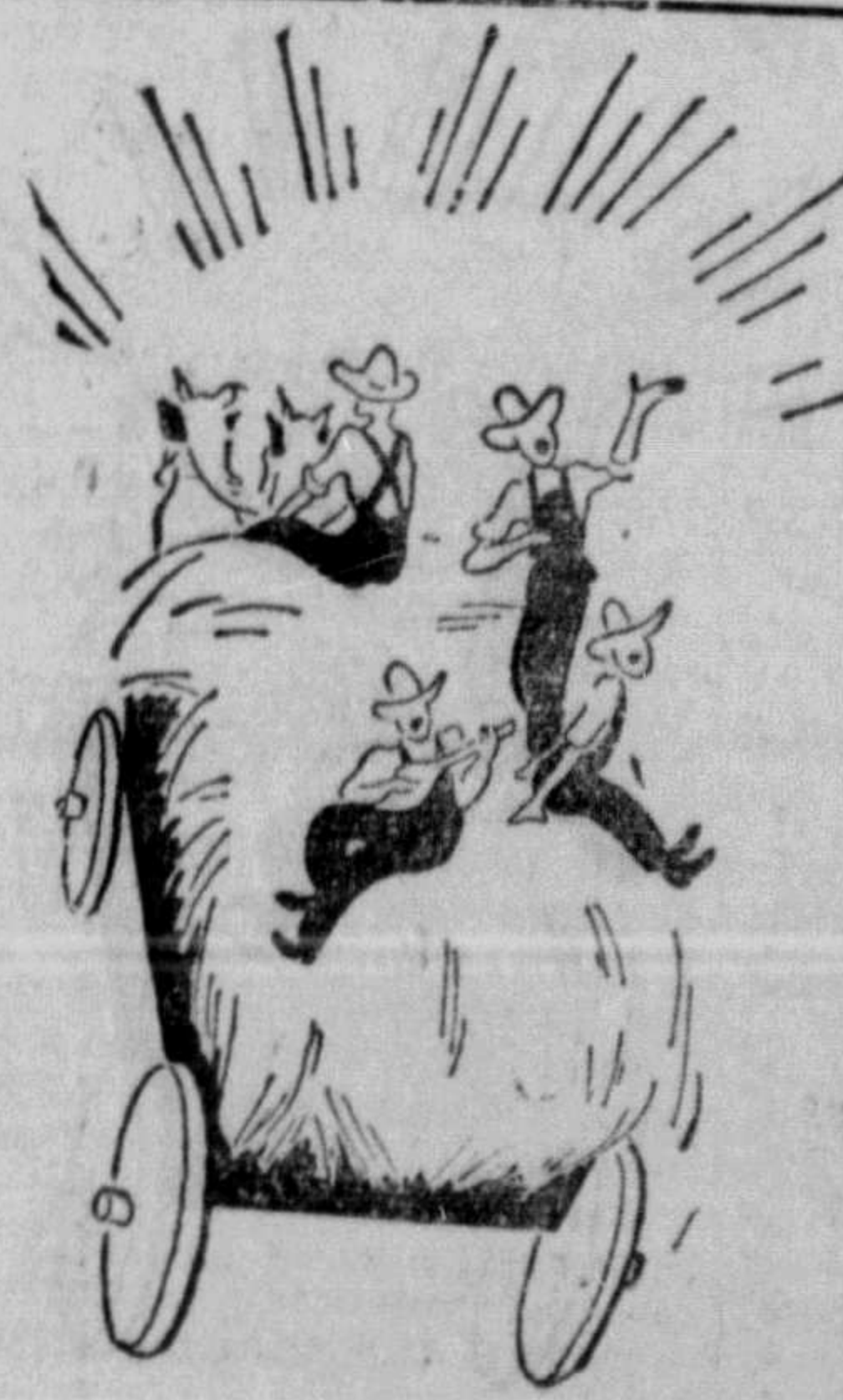

came out in the open when they were forced to oppose a plan aimed at improving the lot of Europeans." The Russians not only refused to join in the Marshall Plan but turned their chief propaganda agency (the Cominform) against it.

What help has American aid been so far?

Acheson told Congress it has "put an end to black markets, an end to hunger, it has given greater security and it has given hope to Europe's youth."

Figures show that Europeans are eating a few more calories each day than they did just after the war. Production rates have jumped all over the continent. Britain leads the march, turning out more than she did before the war. But there is still unemployment in Austria, Italy and Greece.

None of the nations could yet stay fed and at work without American help. Europe will be off the hook only when all the nations are making enough to foot their foreign bills. The O.E.E.C. has said that won't be true even in 1952.

DEVELOPMENTS IN U.S.

E.C.A. has had some trouble at home:

1. Congress said half the E.C.A. goods must go to Europe in U.S. ships. But American shipping costs are higher than European. As a result, Europeans are spending dollars for shipping that they might use for machinery. So far Hoffman has lost his battle to permit Europe to use its own ships entirely.
2. American industries with surpluses have tried to get E.C.A. to bail them out, regardless of whether their goods were necessary to rebuilding Europe.
3. Europeans who get U.S. help must put aside enough of their own currencies to match the help they get. Five percent of those funds is supposed to buy "strategic materials" for the U.S. That program lags.
4. About a fifth of America's \$5,055,000,000 first year's aid was supposed to be in loans to Europe. Europeans took the gifts quickly but lagged on writing loans. Experts here thought there were few worthy loan risks over there. Chances are they will advise dropping the loan provisions.
5. Very few private American investors have enough confidence in Europe yet to send any money over there.
6. One object of American

planning is to get Europeans to buy from each other because the more they do, the less they depend on us. But all Europe needs heavy goods most, like steel, cement and machinery.

They shy at buying luxuries from such nations as France, E.C.A. finally had to ask the nations which produce wanted goods, like Britain and Belgium, to put other Europeans on the cuff—which means Europeans are still going into debt to other Europeans.

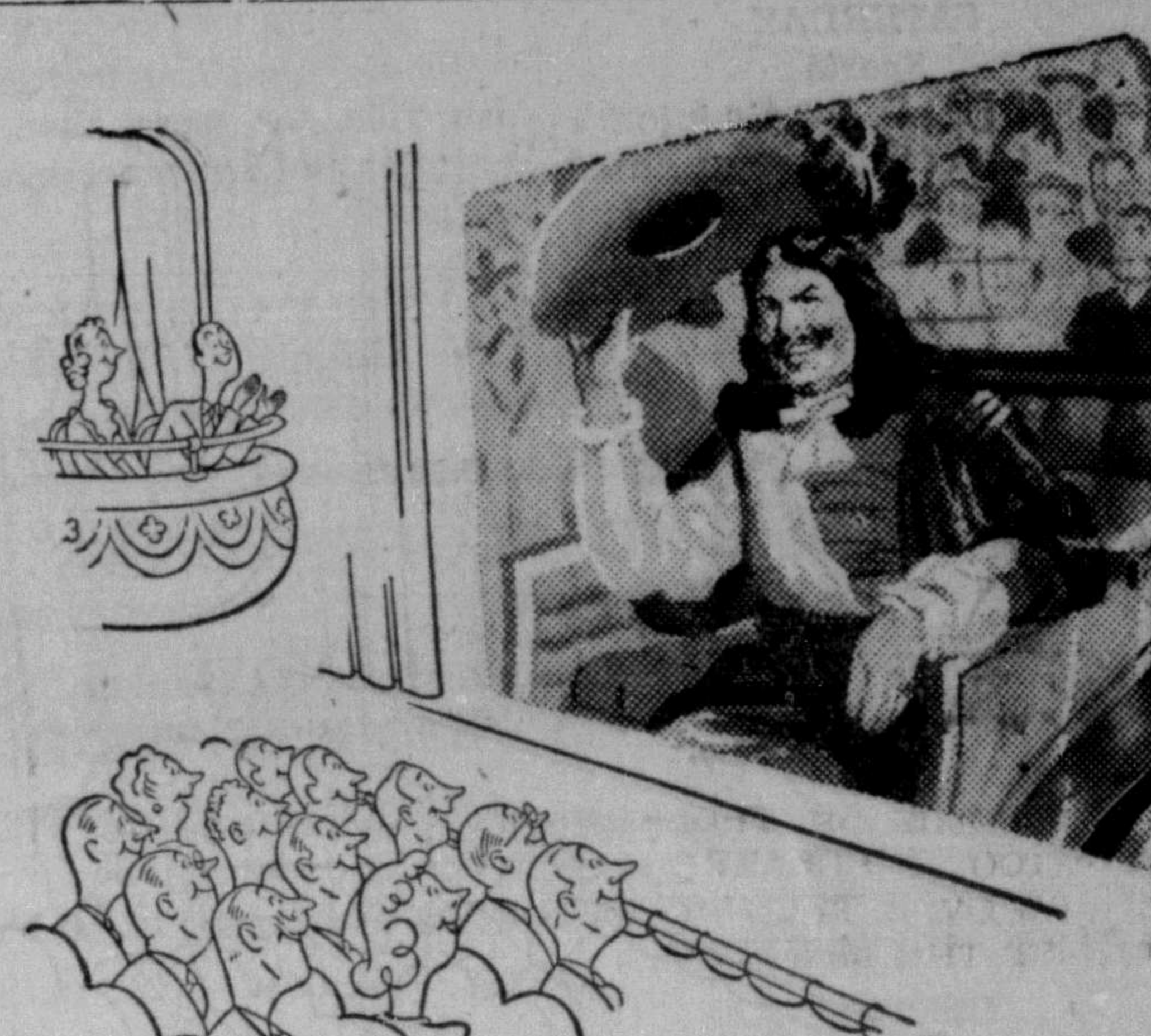

many new advances in engineering and science during the war years. "Man's mastery of the air, with its uneasy possibility of planes and rockets rushing through space at speeds faster than sound, has been construed by many as the victorious challenger of the railway. I do not agree with this school of thought. The aircraft has a zone of usefulness in our system of modern transport, the same as the automotive vehicle and water carriers. This zone must be determined by economic restrictions; therefore, I do not foresee how aircraft can replace the railway as the common carrier of the nation."

**OBSERVED AT HOBBY SHOW**

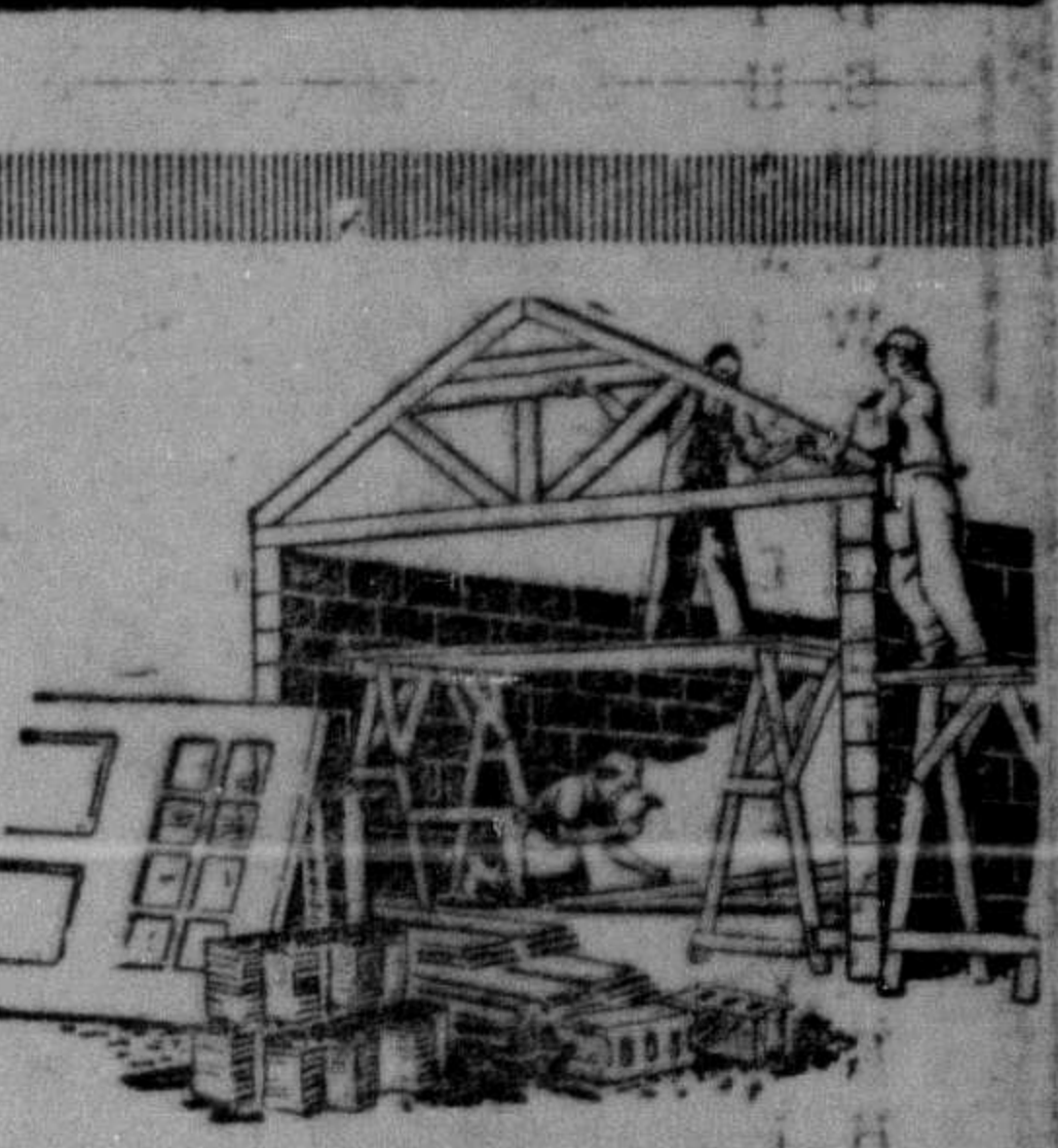
**SCHOOLS**  
This year the schools thought that, as the time of the Hobby Show was so soon after the Easter holidays, their exhibits would be less extensive, but this is unimportant as the exhibits have never been more attractive.  
The KING EDWARD exhibit, the first on along the wall, is a well planned display against the black and gold school colors. However, one is distracted from the paintings, maps and written work by the photos of a model of the new school that is to be built. The photos are taken from different angles and give an excellent idea of how modern and attractive the building will be.  
CONRAD STREET features holiday art. From the fat Thanksgiving turkey to the coquettish valentines and the birds in Easter bonnets with the foreground of waving daffodils, it all has a gay flavor. But it is serious too as one notices that the Grade IV and V art is illustrating social studies and the maple sugar mural is illustrating the whole sugaring process.  
The BORDEN STREET exhibit makes one feel spring-like. It runs chiefly to art work in pastel colors of spring flowers, the drawings of crocuses and daffodils being specially realistic.  
ANNUNCIATION SCHOOL has entered a selection of well arranged project books made by the pupils.  
HIGH SCHOOL—As one naturally expects, the Booth School exhibit is the most comprehensive of all.  
What catches one's eye at first is the row of large drawings of what different students visualize is at the bottom of the sea. Where one has a very realistic local looking fish swimming about, the next has odd fishes and sea horses of the south seas. The next has a deep sea diver sending up bubbles while others have very tantalizing mermaids among the seaweed.  
This is poster paint work and one looks above to effective pictures in India ink on white paper, then down to drawings of realistic birds and horses.  
Below this is a series of designs so original and attractive that one is left bewildered as to which would be best as a kitchen border, which one would be preferred for that leather belt, or which would be best if on material for a gay summer dress.  
If one wants to learn how to make the joints of a table, splice that electric wire, or even build a house, just examine the exhibits of the industrial arts section and a great deal may be learned.  
PHOTOGRAPHY — Creating a great deal of comment this year is the photograph exhibit. After looking it over, Miss Faure, for one, said, "I do believe that in Prince Rupert we are getting an appreciation of art."  
A favorite picture in the Teen Age Camera Club exhibit is Evening Sky, a sunset scene of the harbor taken by Odd Eidsvik, also the Inlet taken by J. Crawford.

The difficult industrial studies by Allan Kelsey lent variety and character to the exhibit as does the excellent local color study of the Indian mending fishing gear taken by George Farnlotis.  
Reg Ronald has the observers puzzled as to how he got that shot of the moose and that view of the elevator—if it is the elevator. Joe Chell's Fishing Fleet is typically Prince Rupert, even to the cloud effect, while his Flowers and Eventide show his varied ability and appreciation.  
This teen age group has done all its own developing and enlarging in the Civic Centre dark room. The neat lettering, large mounts, and artistic arrangement on the wall make this an exhibit of which Prince Rupert can be really proud.  
ADULT CAMERA CLUB—The fairly recently formed Adult Camera Club has also some valuable contributions to the show. Stan Vickerman takes one to various places abroad with very professional photos, the favorite being that of the river Nile, while Pheme Fraser has some very unusual indoor studies. But the most outstanding contribution is the original manner of displaying colored slides devised by M. Kullander. In the front of a black case with a diffused light inside one can see 16 slides of beautiful views in the mountain tops of the Bella Cooola Valley, fall scenes up country, an unusual shot of Rocher de Boule reflected in the Skeena River. And the best part of these slides is that they don't move on to a less interesting view.

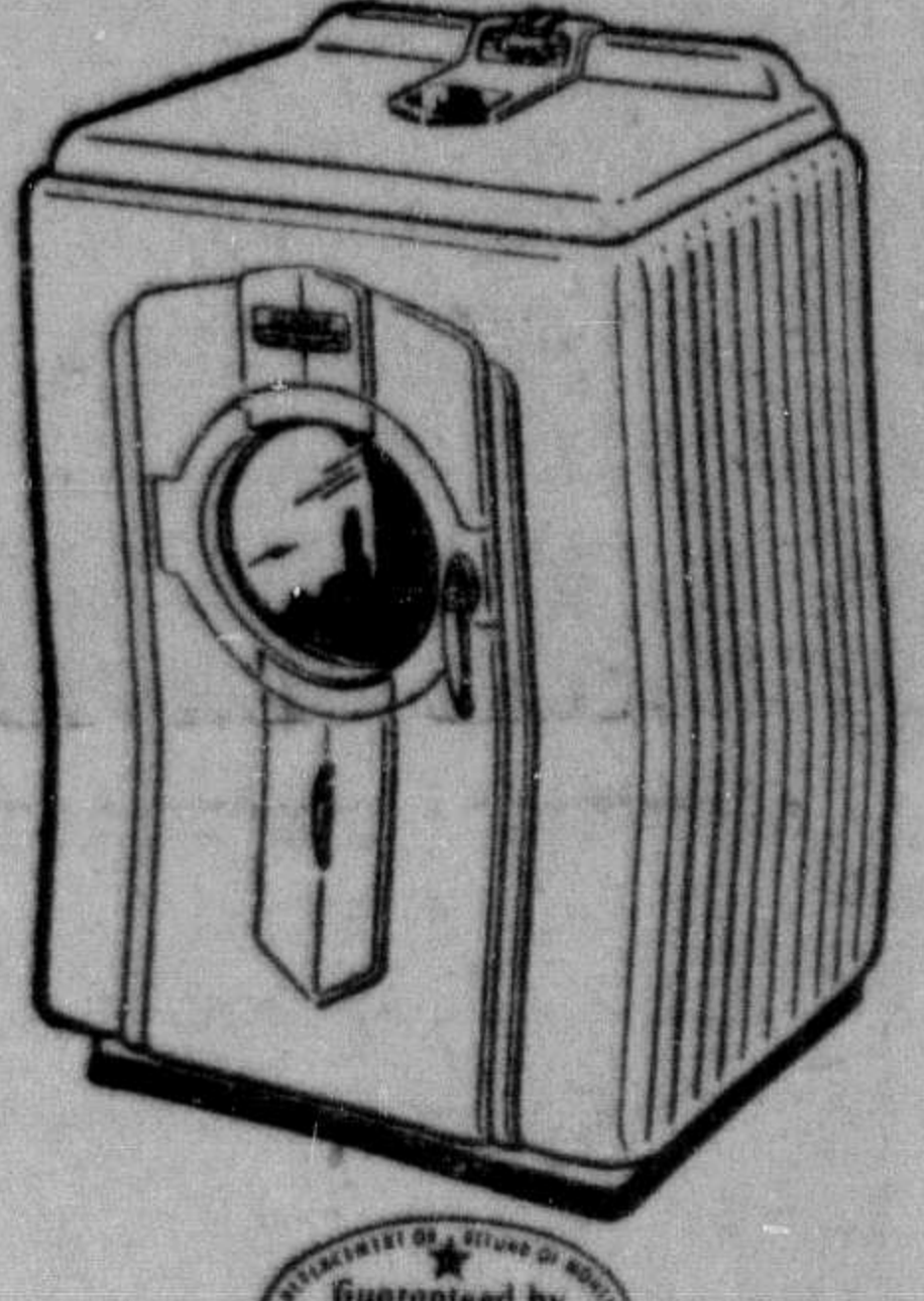

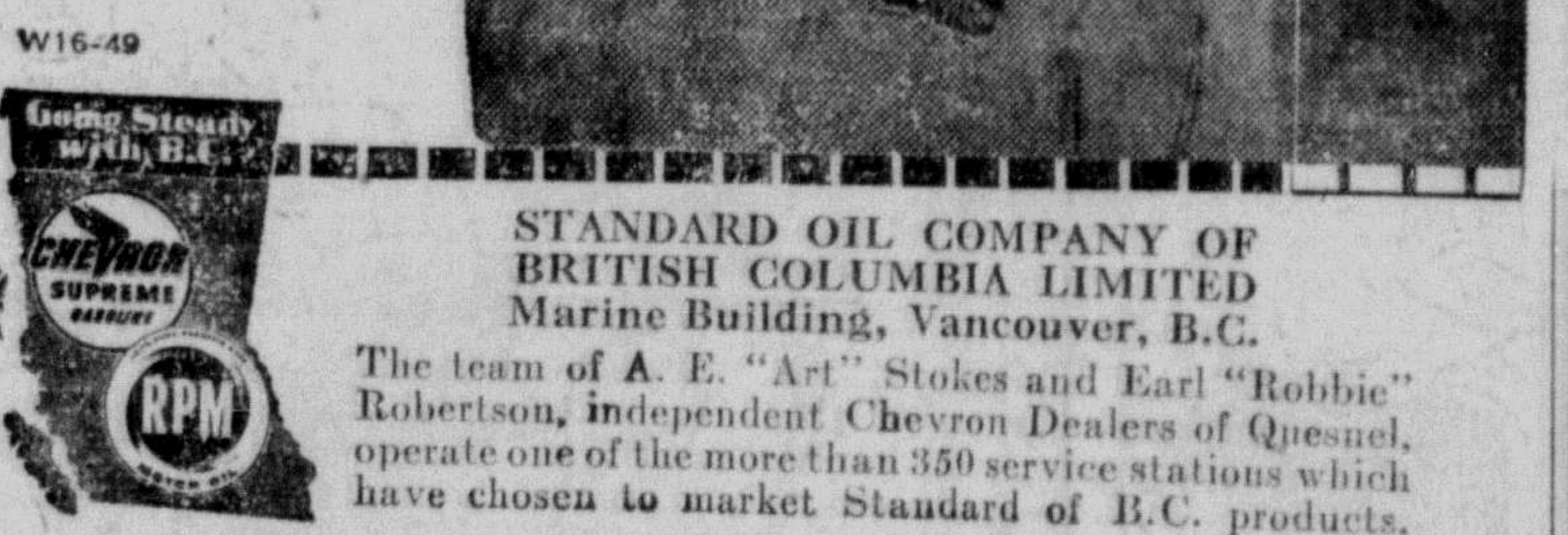
