## Why R.C.M.P.?

PRINCE RUPERT, having had its law and order upheld for twenty-five years now by the British Columbia Police which, on the whole, we would say, has done a fairly creditable job, is directly interested in the move whereby the respected provincial force would be replaced by the Royal Canadian Mounted Police. Legislation authorizing such a change has been introduced in the House at Victoria and, being sponsored by the Attorney General and, therefore, by the government, will, doubtless, be put through.

We suppose it might be considered rather unusual to wax sentimental about such a matter as policing but there does seem to be something harsh about the proposed "scrapping" of our British Columbia Police. Its tradition and honored record, like its age, is second only to the of the R.C.M.P. which would replace it. There is something sad about the prospect of its passing.

There may, of course, be good reasons for the change. Those of us who have through the years favored the policing of this municipality by the provincial rather than a local force did so because we felt it was important that such a service as the police should be well removed from local politics. We also saw the advantages of more efficient, economical and disinterested service. We also thought of the advantage of flexibility of personnel and the ready availability of augmented or special service when required.

It may be argued that the advantages which we saw in a provincial rather than a local force might be possible even more so with the national force. But we wonder if the national force, after all, might not be carrying things a little far. We wonder if the autonomy might be removed beyond the point of desirability. Of course, we should not be actuated entirely by sentimentality but to have our maintenance of law and order governed by a national force, no matter how fine its record and its personnel may be, seems embarking just a little far into the realm of bureaucracy and remote control.

We shall be interested to hear from the government and the Attorney General the reasons for this somewhat surprising and sudden move. There may be considerations other than that of the efficiency which could, no doubt, be derived from co-ordination and centralization.

At the moment we are not so sure that our favor for provincial over city policing would extend so far as bringing this important function under the remote national control.

## UNDESIRABLE SECRECY

THERE ARE THINGS which a government—local, provincial or national—cannot shout from the rooftops. But many things which a government thinks must be secret need not be secret at all and in a democracy should not be. Yet all governments, it seems, grow into thinking that the people cannot be told and that the public cannot be trusted with too much knowledge. It is something, apparently, that grows on those entrusted with power.

A lot of this secrecy by bodies conducting public business is not only inappropriate and unjustified if not insulting but is sheer nonsense. It would be better if governments and public bodies cultivated frankness wherever possible. It would not only impel co-operation but would inspire more confidence and it might even result in more progress in getting things done.

## REAL EMPLOYMENT

THE SERIOUSNESS of having 370,000 persons listed as unemployed in Canada is something that cannot be minimized. It is something over which real concern is justified and to which attention may be paid. However, there is no point in getting panicky or shouting calamity.

Suggestions are being made to federal and provincial governments that the time has arrived to embark upon large programs of public works some of which, indeed, are already under way (although not so many in this part of the country.) Possibly the more important aim toward which to strive is that of steady, general recovery with all industry moving forward. That, suggests Financial Post, is the goal we must keep in mind and we can achieve it if we keep our heads. Above all there must be the great possible encouragement for the investment of new capital for only in that way is there hope of more permanent employment, more national development, more prosperity for all. Panic measures and panic thinking at this time will only aggravate the situation. They cannot cure it.

Too often parents try to force a child into a preconceived pattern, instead of allowing him to develop naturally. The child is an individual, not a copy of his parents. This does not mean "free expression" which is "lack of discipline." Like the pony the child is controlled.

There is a sense of direction and purpose, of understanding, co-operation and companionship. This is the ideal home where the best and the finest in education can be achieved.

## No Reduction In Service Is Seen

OTTAWA (Special to Daily News)—Hearing of the Canadian Maritime Commission on application of the Union Steamships Ltd. for a subsidy on service to Queen Charlotte Islands and Northern British Columbia ports was adjourned yesterday.

# BIG INDUSTRY

Continued from Page 1.  
The lack of housing in Prince Rupert will be partially remedied when renovation of the former United States Army administration building near the waterfront is completed.

Frank Kafel, dynamic Toronto financier, last year purchased the building. He recently announced that a \$500,000 hotel will soon be erected. A 50 room structure will contain a theatre, bar, room, ballroom and business space. Reconditioning of the administration building into an apartment block will cost Kafel approximately \$220,000.

Francis Players is erecting a new theatre, a new fur storage plant is to be built, the Daily News building is being expanded, new schools are in the blueprint stage and other construction is underway.

**Aluminum**  
A half billion dollar industry

is being contemplated. The Aluminum Company of Canada may build an aluminum plant on the Kitimaat River, fjord like arm, continuation of Douglas Channel whose mouth is but 50 miles south of Prince Rupert. It penetrates far into the interior and is the likely site of the plant. Such an establishment would revolutionize the entire economy of this area, especially the port of Prince Rupert and interior town of Terrace. A branch railway would undoubtedly be constructed from Kitimaat to the Canadian National line at Terrace. This is a distance of 40 or 50 miles through two natural valleys.

Vast hydro-electric power in this area tempted the company to investigate the region as a potential plant site. All constituents required in the manufacturing of aluminum including the famous bauxite ore, would need be imported. Last year company president, McNelly Dubose ex-

pressed hope that development will attract a pulp and paper plant, a steel industry and fertilizer factories.

Large reserves of anthracite coal deposits exist in the Groundhog country. This fuel might greatly assist in the operation of future industrial plants, especially a steel mill.

The entire northern section of B. C. is a veritable storehouse of mineral wealth and if developed will enlarge the size of Prince Rupert make it wealthy and increase opportunities for the individual. An young man or woman can arrive in Prince Rupert and with initiative and ambition commence on the road to a successful livelihood. Opportunity exists here in practically every field.

Men like P. H. Linzey and L. M. Felsenthal, secretary and president of the Chamber of Commerce respectively, H. F. Glassey, secretary of Public Relations Council; to say nothing of such public figures as E. T. Applewhite, M. P. J. D. McRae, M. L. A. and Mayor George Rudderham who have spent a great deal of their life in Prince Rupert and well know the industrial future of the city and area.

The proposed landing strip at Twagwell island about six miles over water from Prince Rupert will aid this city. Businessmen from Vancouver or eastern Canada will find it more convenient to execute visits here if air travel time to and from Vancouver is cut two or three hours. Eventual completion of the expected

Department of Transport project, will eliminate the present out of the way stop at Sandspit on the Queen Charlotte Islands. This route takes approximately six hours and includes a stop-over at that Queen Charlotte strip. This is considered an inconvenience, especially to easily irritated business heads. As a defense airfield, it will be classed as one of the most strategically located along the entire Pacific coast.

The Queen Charlotte Islands are still to be vastly developed. While they are noted for the tin stands of spruce, other tin-touched resources such as agricultural areas exist. Royallite Oil began drilling at Skidegate near Queen Charlotte City in the early part of January this year but recently halted operations. After a depth of 3,500 feet had been reached, the company ceased drilling but announced further surveys will be conducted. Reports reaching Prince Rupert indicate the well has been capped. Anyone experienced in the oil industry, considers capping a dry well unusual. If oil is discovered the finding will be one of the greatest assets that central British Columbia has added to the wealth of this province.

**Gateway to Alaska**  
The establishment of a car ferry service between Prince Rupert and Haines, Alaska is being considered. A service of this type would be a boon to the port of Prince Rupert. Time and money would be saved by transferring perishable and other products from C. N. R. cars to the barge and finally into refrigerated trucks. The trucks, in turn would ship the products over the cut-off to the Alaska highway.

Prince Rupert, for the past few years has suffered from exploitation and its people have become slightly irked by the fact. They know that central and northern British Columbia possess untold resources awaiting development such as the manufacture of plywood products, furniture, manufacturing and others. They firmly believe raw material from this area should and must be turned into finished products here.

Prince Rupert is the most northerly railway terminus on the Pacific Coast, 480 miles nearer the Orient and with such

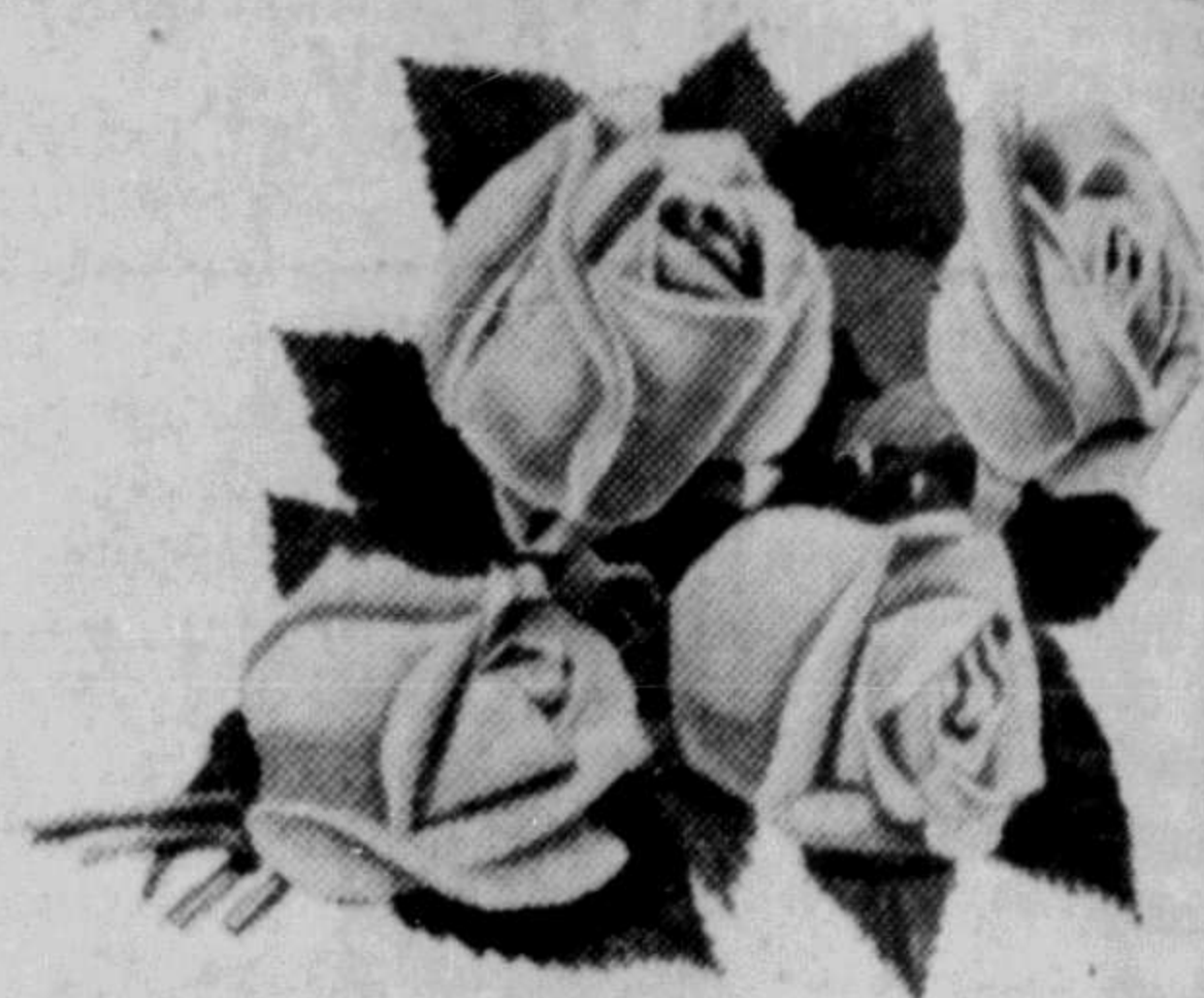

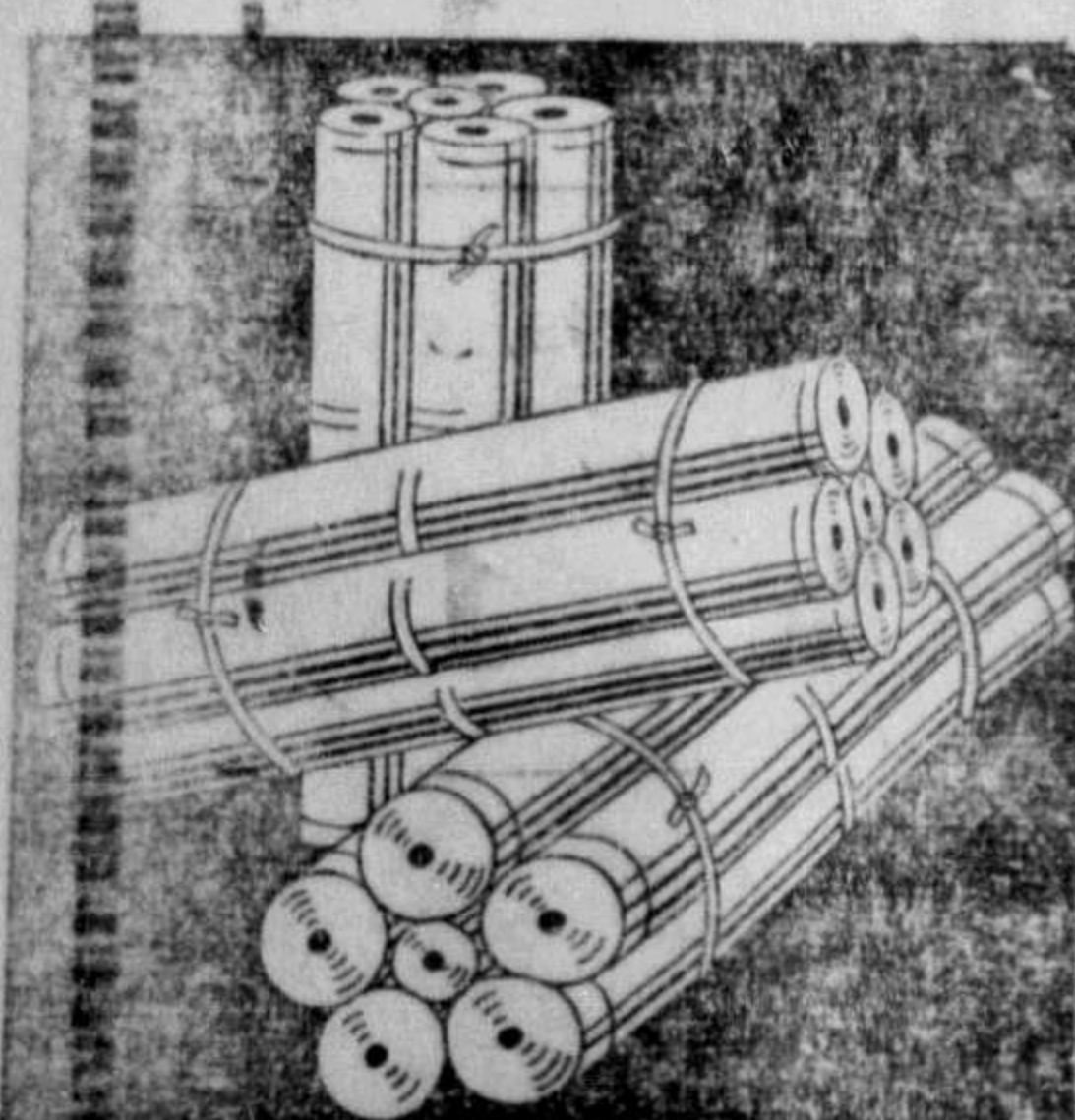

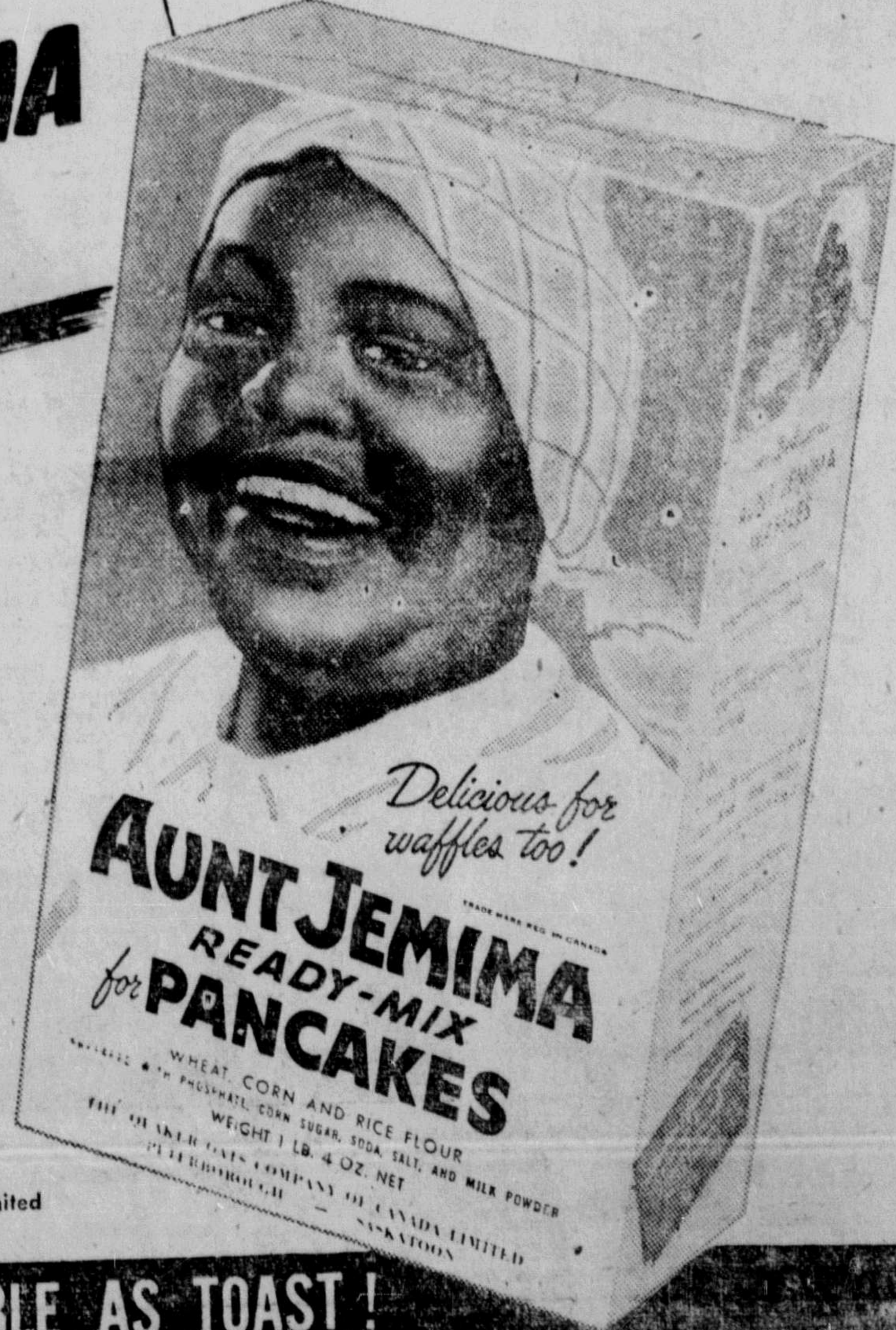
