Fifty of the uniforms are to be preserved as "museum pieces."

MARSHAL TITO is living dangerously. For months the whole power of the Cominform has been mobilized to overturn his nationalistic revolt against Moscow. But still he carries on.

Possibly we do not need to be too enthusiastic over Tito's boldness and such success as he may be enjoying. For he takes pains to reaffirm his allegiance to Marxism and shows no disposition to abandon despotism. Yet every evidence of his independence is a public embarrassment to Moscow. The very existence of a regime which dares to disobey the Kremlin encourages imitators.

The fact that the Communist world is a house divided is a great annoyance to Moscow. It is a disclosure of basic weakness for totalitarianism cannot tolerate diversity. For democratic peoples this might be a reminder that the successful practice of freedom that does not fear diversity is a key to their strength.

## 'GONE WITH THE WIND'

IT IS QUESTIONABLE if there ever was a story dealing with reconstruction days in the south following the American Civil War equalling in dramatic fire, passion and power; "Gone With the Wind" whose author, Margaret Mitchell, died in Atlanta, Georgia, Tuesday. **Sport Shots**

Husky Sam McCready is a golfer who grins and looks the other way when trouble threatens. That's the way he broke a United States grip on the British Amateur championship. Now he hopes to win the U.S. Amateur title, a feat that hasn't been done by a Briton since 1911 when the trick was turned by Harold Hilton, one of the great-est of all British linesmen. Along with other British Walker Cup players who meet the United States team at Mamaroneck, N.Y., Aug. 19 and 20, McCready will play in the National Amateur tournament at Pittsford, N.Y., August 29 to September 3.

McCready gained golfing fame when he whipped America's two top amateurs recently in walking off with the British title. He knocked off defending champion Frank Stranahan of Toledo, Ohio, in an 18-hole quarter final. Then in the 36-hole title match over the tough Portmarnock course outside Dublin, he downed Willie Turnesa of Elmsford, N.Y., the U.S. amateur champ and

British titleholder in 1947. There wasn't any fluke about his victory. He is a top notch golfer with a knack for complete relaxation between shots. But at 31, he's so new to big time golf that his name was hardly known inside the British Isles, much less outside, before his triumph at Portmarnock. He's six feet tall, weighs a solid 200 pounds and is strong as a mule. But he shows his strength more in his staying power in a long, tough match than in his ability to hit the ball for distance. His drives usually travel about 225 yards. He almost always is on the green with his second shot if it is within reach. Instead of going for birdies, he usually rolls his first putt to within inches of the hole for a cinch par.

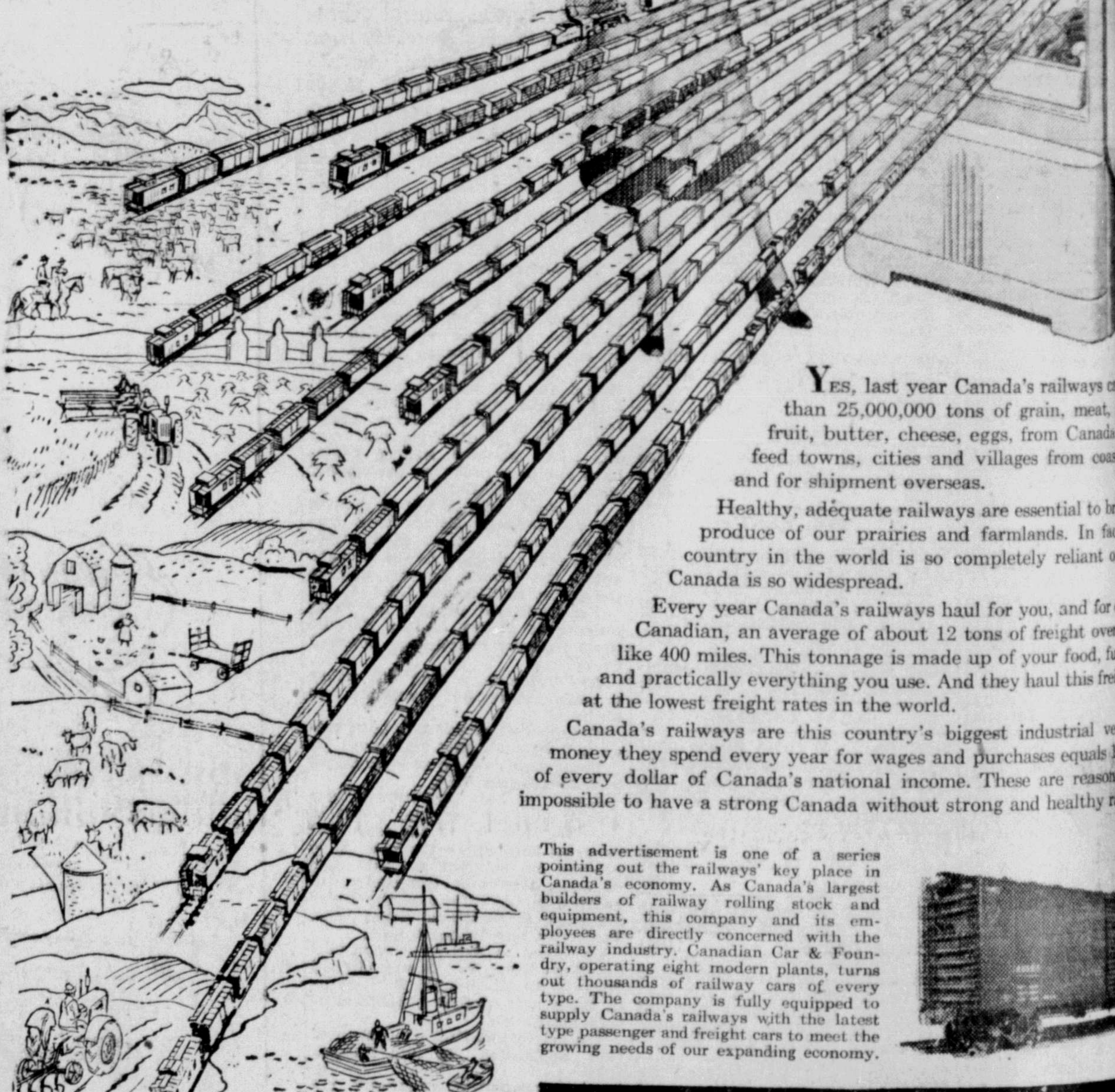

**Seasonable Ideas for Housekeepers**

**AUGUST, MONTH OF PEACHES, SOME NEW DESSERT RECIPES**

August is here and with it come peaches. Nothing can surpass this luscious ripe pearl freshly picked from the tree. This golden fruit is a general favorite not only because of its color and flavor but also because it lends itself to many different ways of eating. Eaten raw, in the hand, or sliced with cream are probably the most common and easiest ways of serving peaches but consider the multitude of desserts in which peaches play a stellar role... peach shortcake, peach pie, peach upside-down cake, peach pudding, peach ice cream and peach mousse are to mention only a few.

Brill - Savarin, a famous French chef once said "The discovery of a new dish does more for the happiness of man than the discovery of a new star." The Home economists present some new dessert recipes.

**PEACH MERINGUE**

**Peach Custard**  
2 cups peach pulp  
2 teaspoons vinegar  
1/4 cup sugar  
1 tablespoon cornstarch  
Dash of salt  
2 egg yolks  
1/4 teaspoon almond flavoring

**Meringue**  
2 egg whites

Dash of salt  
1/4 cup sugar

Prepare peach pulp by forcing fresh, ripe peaches through a sieve. Add vinegar to pulp. Mix sugar, cornstarch and salt and add to peach pulp, blending thoroughly. Bring to the boil and cook, stirring constantly, until slightly thickened. Place over hot water and continue cooking for 10 minutes. Add a little of the hot mixture to the beaten egg yolks then stir this into the remaining hot mixture and cook, stirring constantly for 3 minutes. Remove from heat, add almond flavoring. Pour into six individual serving dishes. Chill and serve, topped with a cooked meringue. Yield: six servings.

To make meringue: Beat egg whites and salt until stiff. Gradually add the sugar, beating until mixture stands in stiff peaks. Pour boiling water, 3 to 4 inches deep, into a large, deep pan or bowl. Drop meringue by spoonfuls into the water, making 6 meringues. Let stand 20 minutes.

**PEACH CRUSTY**

2 cups sliced peaches  
1 teaspoon vinegar  
1/2 cup crumbs (graham crackers or gingersnaps)  
1/4 cup sugar

3 tablespoons butter  
Place peaches in a greased 8" x 8" pan. Sprinkle with vinegar. Combine the finely crushed crumbs and sugar. Cut in butter with a pastry blender or fork. Sprinkle mixture over top of peaches. Bake in a moderately hot oven, 375 degrees F., about 20 minutes. Serve warm with cream. Yield: Six servings.

**PEACH MOUSSE**

1 teaspoon gelatine  
2 tablespoons cold water  
1 cup milk  
1/2 cup sugar  
Pinch of salt  
1 cup raw peach pulp  
1 tablespoon lemon juice  
1 cup whipping cream  
Soak gelatine in cold water for 5 minutes. Heat milk and dissolve gelatine in it. Add sugar and salt. Cool. When mixture is partially set, fold in peach pulp, lemon juice and whipped cream. Place in freezing trays of mechanical refrigerator and freeze or, put in mould, cover with buttered paper and tight-fitting cover and pack in ice and salt (6 parts ice to one part salt). Let stand 5 to 6 hours. Yield: six servings.

**670 VISIT X-RAY UNITS**

Number of persons x-rayed by the free tuberculosis clinics in the district was 315 on Tuesday dropping from 355 on the opening day on Monday, Prince Rupert Health Unit reported. Total for the two days was 670. The breakdown unit in the Health Unit building handled 235 on Tuesday while the mobile unit at Nelson Bros. cannery at Port Edward processed 80. The unit completed its survey at Port Edward at noon yesterday after x-raying 330 persons there during the two days. The breakdown unit x-rayed 340 in the city during the first two days.

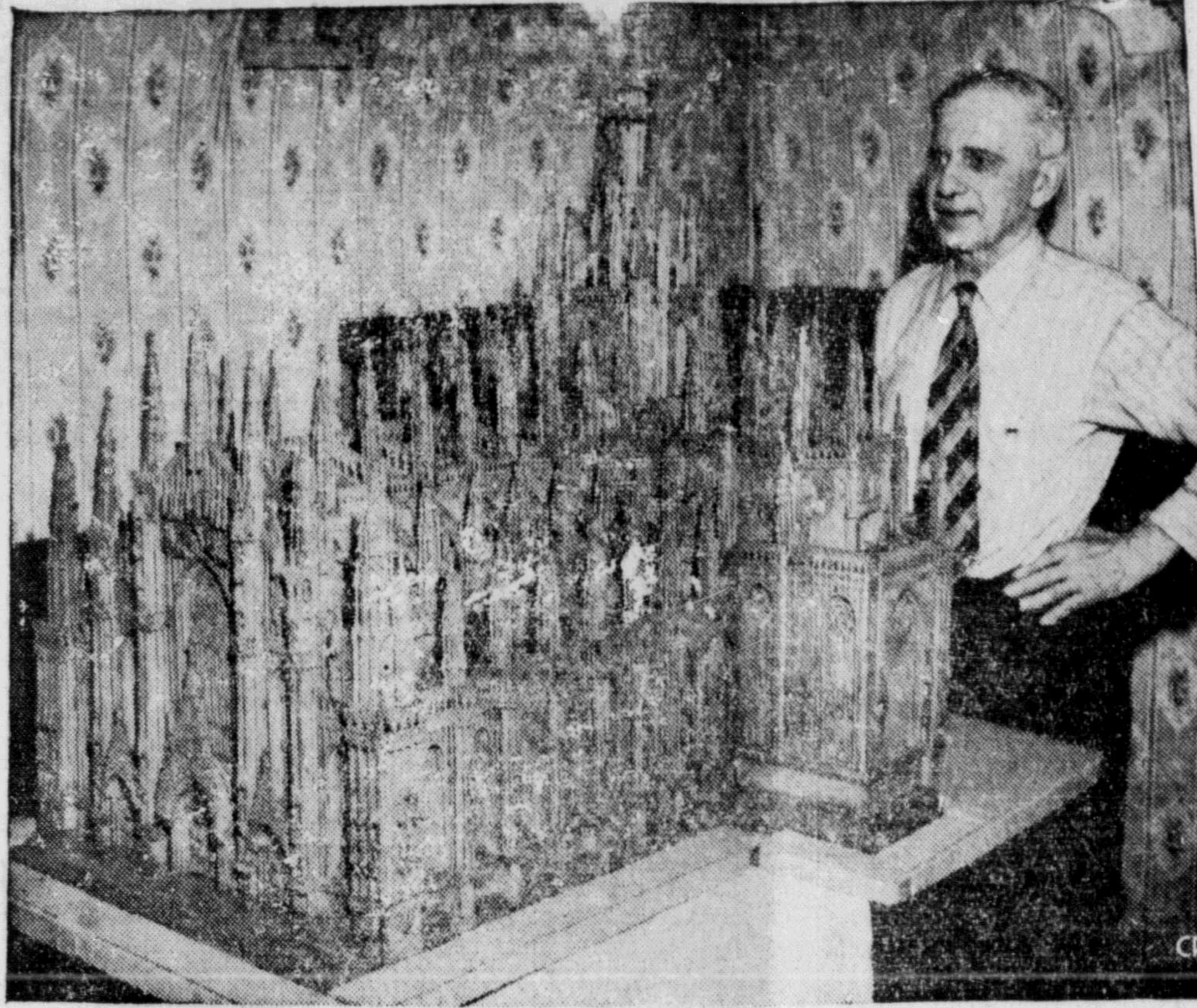
