





VANCOUVER (CP)—Rescue on the high seas yesterday saved the three-man crew of the fish packer Elwee III after waves, whipped by a Pacific Northwest storm, punched a hole in the hull of the vessel.

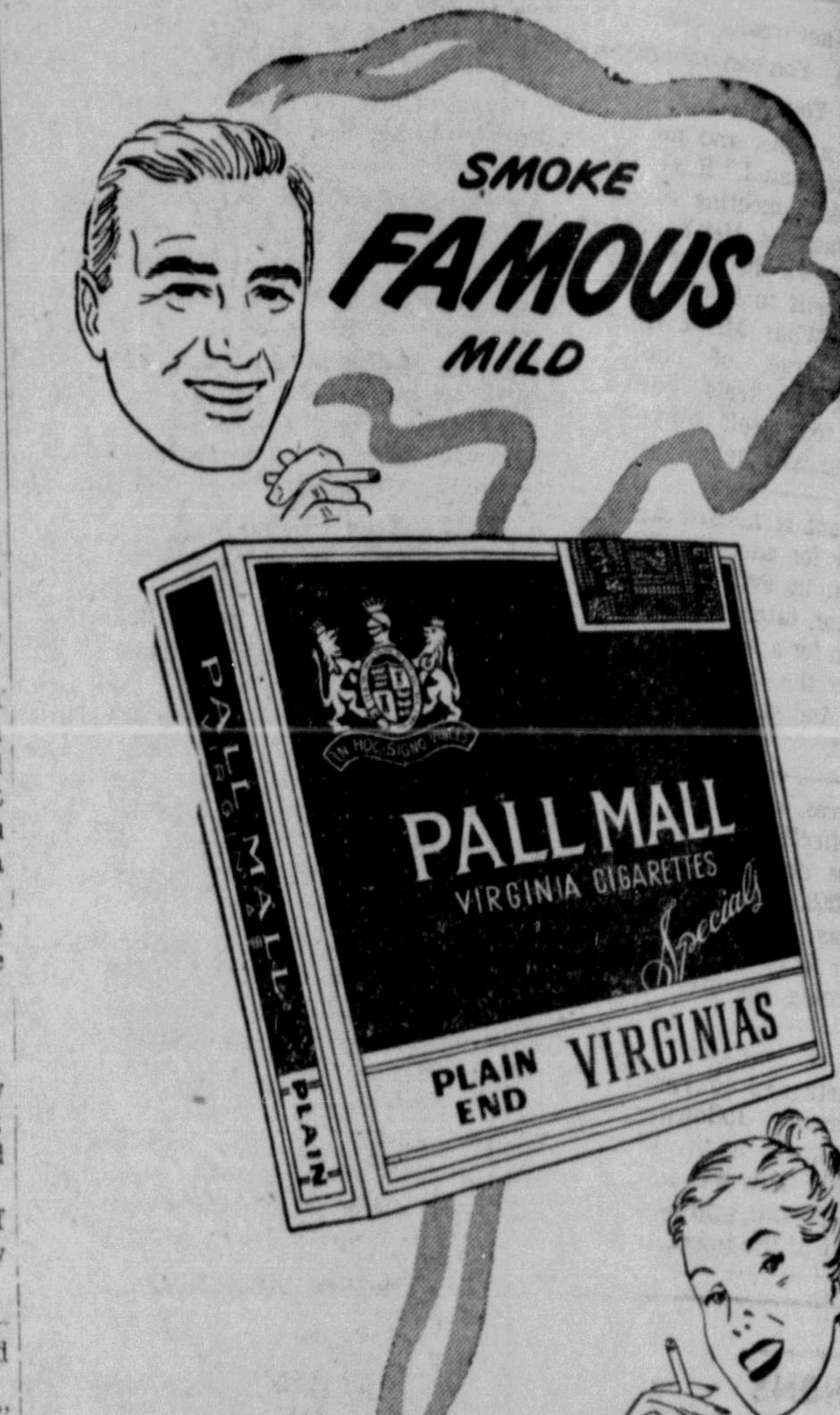

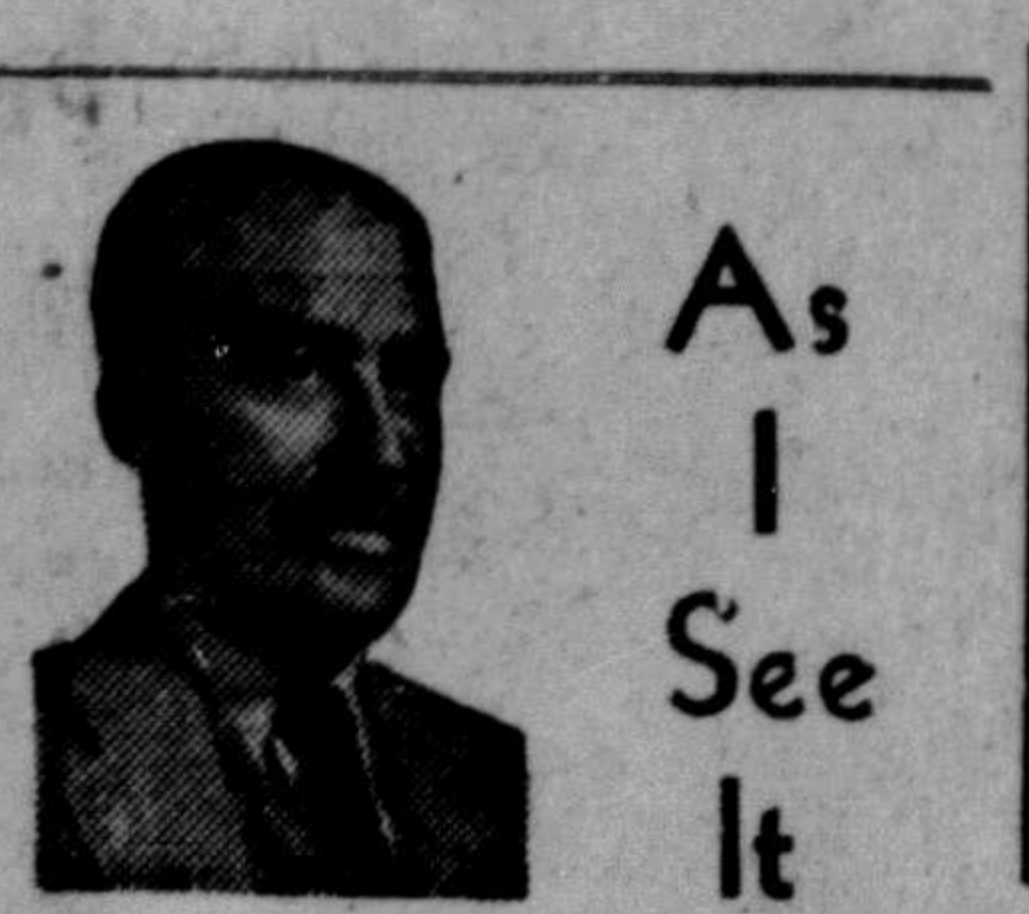

As I See It

THIS ERA of cold war has revived some of the worst features of bygone times.

In the old days, both in Catholic Europe and Protestant America, people were often arrested, tortured, or even put to death on mere suspicion of "witchcraft."

Now, east of the Iron Curtain, millions live in fear of the policeman's midnight knock on the door—with the whisking away to prison or death of somebody suspected of friendship for the western powers. And even in America the whole foundation of civil liberties is being undermined.

Political smears are ground out on a mass production basis. Character assassination has become one of the most highly-paid callings in the U.S.A.

ABOUT THE DIRTIEST part of this vile business in the great republic to the south is the mass production slander of the late and giantically great president, Franklin D. Roosevelt.

The 90 per cent of the newspapers who opposed Roosevelt without success while he was alive to defend himself now grind out their mean-minded revenge on the dead.

THE MEANEST of the lies that these slanderers still spread is that Roosevelt was "an appeaser," that "Stalin put it all over F.D.R."

Specifically, the slanderers charge that Korea and Germany would never have been cut in two at all had not Stalin got the better of Roosevelt.

That particular lie burns me up. For all during the war I was hired by the Canadian Broadcasting Corporation to do the nightly news analysis. If I now look up the strength and position of the various armies at the time of the Teheran or Yalta Conferences I see how

monstrously untrue is the charge that "Stalin put it all over F.D.R."

The truth is that, had there been no agreement between the Big Three, the Russians would probably have taken ALL Germany, and most certainly they would have occupied all Korea.

THE RUSSIAN First Far Eastern army crossed into Korea just after the Soviet declaration of war against Japan on August 8, 1945. It swiftly proceeded south to the 38th parallel, where it stopped, in line with the U.S.-Soviet agreements.

The American landings did not take place until September 8, 1945.

IN THE LAST few days of the war in Germany, American armies could obviously have cut through to Berlin ahead of the Russians. That outcome was the last fond hope, and dearest wish, of the Nazi conspirators like Himmler.

But had there never been a Teheran agreement the Russians would never have called a halt to their main drive west, through Poland and toward Germany. They would never have diverted the huge force to the Balkans, as they did in fact.

Instead of Red armies on the Elbe, we would have had them on the Rhine, or maybe at the gates of Gibraltar.

INCIDENTALLY, every agreement made by Roosevelt was made by Winston Churchill too. The slanderers of F.D.R. never attack Winnie. He's still alive—and capable of kicking back.

Mr. Muzzy is a nice enough chap but if there is a way, however remote, to misbid or misplay a hand, he will find it. He has a

positive genius in that direction.

The minute Mr. Muzzy opened the bidding with one spade Mr. Dale suspected there might be a slam. But, playing against the two best players in the club, he felt he would be very glad indeed to get any profit at all on this particular rubber—and he didn't intend to take any chance of prolonging it.

Note Mr. Muzzys jump re-bid of three spades, which is a gross over-bid. A six card suit always makes him extremely bullish. But even this did not urge Mr. Dale beyond the four level.

In the play Mr. Masters opened the jack of clubs and Mr. Muzzy won with the ace. He trumped his six of clubs in dummy, took three rounds of spades and led the ace and king of hearts, ditching a diamond on the second heart. Then he cashed the ace of diamonds and conceded two diamonds to the opponents. "With an overtrick, partner," he said proudly.

"Well done, Muzzy, well-done, indeed," replied Mr. Dale, laying a groundwork of good feeling for

Next another small heart from the board, trumped in the closed hand, followed by a high spade, picking up Mr. Champion's last trump. At this point the king and seven of hearts in dummy are good for two diamond discards and the ace of diamonds is there for an entry.
