

Weather Service Here

ICTORIA, which has long been dissatisfied with the weather forecasts made for it in Vancouver, is to have a weather station of its own, it is announced. The decision has been made, it is explained, because of the peculiarly different weather conditions around Victoria.

Possibly, the meteorological authorities might be induced to do for Prince Rupert similar to what they have done for Victoria and establish a weather forecasting station here. Certainly, if inaccuracy and unreliability of the present forecasts is any good reason, there should be no delay in the matter. Indeed, the weather forecasts for Prince Rupert as compiled in Vancouver, have long been regarded as pretty much of a joke.

If weather conditions at Victoria are peculiar as differing from Vancouver, certainly they are even more peculiar away up here five hundred miles north of Vancouver-

It is very important that there should be the best and most accurate and up-to-the-minute reporting and forecasting here at this port out of which a large proportion of Canada's West Coast fishing fleet operates and to which reliable meteorological service is of utmost value.

Yes, if Victoria is entitled to a weather station of its own, even more so is Prince Rupert, we would think.

THE LIVING WORD

A LTHOUGH it might seem that Russia holds all the cards in China now, there is one significant exception, a card that yet may play an important part on the side of the West. It is the question of language. Russian is an unknown tongue in China. As the New York Times points out, a quarter century ago, when the Russian Communists sent Michael Borodin as their representative in China, he had to deal with the Chinese in English, the only language they both understood. It is no less true today. English has been the language of trade in China for generations past. Most of the Chinese educated class have at least some knowledge of English, while pidgin English, a form of basic English, has become almost a world language, and certainly is the language of trade and negotiation throughout the entire East. There is no likelihood that either English or its colorful cousin pidgin English can be replaced by Russian in any foreseeable future.

Therefore the West, which has lost so much influence in China, still has an avenue of approach. She is not shut off by an impenetrable "iron curtain," beyond which her voice may not reach. There is the remaining hope that the intelligent minds of China that can still be reached in a tongue they understand may be a factor in restoring a friendly relationship between China and the West




