LIVING COST DOWN

OTTAWA—The cost of living index in Canada has dropped for the first time in two years. It was down from 159.6 on November 1 to 158.9 on December 1—a drop of 7-10 point—the Dominion Bureau of Statistics announced today. A break in food prices was the principal reason for the drop in the general index. The food index was down from 204.7 to 202.

## WOULD STOP BATTLE

WASHINGTON-United States is pressing Israel and the Arab states to bring the Palestine fighting to a complete halt. Israel and Egypt have been urged to avoid acts which might spread the conflict and other representations will be made before the United Nations security council. State Department officials deny reports that the United States has threatened Israel with withdrawal of American recognition.

### SEVEN DIE IN CRASH

GOLFAX, Cal.—Seven men were killed and another is believed missing in the crash of a United States Air Force C-47 transport ten miles southwest of here last night. Coroner Francis E. West returned here early today after viewing the wreckage with a group of Air Force officers and said that seven bodies had been counted in the wreckage.

### WOULD PAY 50 PERCENT

EDMONTON—Speaking here yesterday, Minister of Mines and Natural Resources J. A. McKinnon expressed the opinion that the federal government should pay fifty percent as a minimum contribution to the completing of a TransCanada Highway. He said the government was anxious to undertake the work as soon as possible and that a good start would probably be made this year. Cost has been estimated at \$226,000,000.

## CHIANG TERMS REJECTED

SHANGHAI-There are growing indications that Communist China will reject Generalissimo Chiang Kai-Shek's New Year peace terms. It is reported that Chiang is preparing to move the government from Nanking to Canton and Formosa.


## RECORD COLD WEATHER

NEW YORK—The death toll as a result of tornadoes in the middle south is placed at 59 with 360 injured and more likely to die. Blizzard winter conditions, which brought 36 inches of snow in Nebraska and blocked rail and road traffic, has moved into the northwest. In California the thermometer dropped to a record 19 above in the citrus belts with serious damage to crops feared.

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# 1949 Politics

THAT 1949 will be an active year politically in Canada is acknowledged by students of public affairs. There exists the probability of a federal \_election. Speculation is rife concerning Quebec-a province that has always had a bearing on things nationally politic. More than once, it has been thought of as a determining factor. Influenced by the fact of a French-Canadian being once more the head of the government, the polling in Quebec might go largely Liberal. But, offsetting this opinion, is the further element of Maurice Duplessis, spirited provincial premier, who used to be known as a Conservative. He is not unfriendly to the new Progressive-Conservative chief. In no small degree he is a man possessing power in his own province.

It has been suggested the Liberals would like nothing better than to absorb the C.C.F. but that appears to be little more than a dim hope. The Progressive-Conservatives ponder a coalition administration. But nothing, at this uncertain stage can be said to be anywhere near a certainty. There are so many matters hinging on other considerations.

Wise indeed is the seer who can see through the cross-currents and complexities as the 1949 political curtain rises.

We are all for free enterprise and the other principles which we believe should be conponent of a true democracy but, too often, we fear some of those who profess liberty and freedom of action are not inclined to extend that freedom beyond the precincts of their own beliefs and philosophies. Unfortunately, there were many who profess freedom of enterprise, thought and action who scorned and despised the Red Dean and would have prevented that recognized churchman from a hearing in this country. To those people particularly we hope our reprint of "Anglican Outlook's" editorial will prove of interest with possibly a broadening effect.

Too often our own tolerance tends to dim our conceptions of the freedoms which we profess including the freedoms of worship, speech and expression. It was refrshing to us to run across what we consider such a very fine bit of editorializing as we found in this ecclesiastical publication many of whose own confreres were none too tolerant in this instance but much the contrary.




# RUPERT BACK ON NORTH RUN


