Old Weather Brings New Water Crisis

No Racial or Religious Prejudice in Canada's Capital

For Skeena Would Make English and French Both Compulsory School Languages

Speaker of the evening, E. T. Applewhite, told the Junior Chamber of Commerce that he had heard many times of the racial and religious prejudices that existed in Ottawa. He said he had heard any criticism of race or religion during the last session. As a solution to the French and English problem Mr. Applewhite offered the suggestion that it should be compulsory for each student in Canada to learn to speak and write both French and English so that a greater understanding could be brought about between French and English speaking Canadians.

Mr. Applewhite concluded by calling on the young men of the district to work on the development of the Northern country and not expect the Dominion and provincial governments to develop it for them.

Mr. Applewhite was introduced by Harold Helgeson.

Invasion Is Denied

Reds Held Off in Their Attempt to Land on Hainan Island

TAIPEI, Formosa.—Generalissimo Chiang Kai-Shek's staff flatly denied tonight that the Communists had invaded Hainan Island. They said no invasion whatever had occurred.

Nationalist Navy units, patrolling Hainan Strait, were recently strengthened to prevent a Communist move from the mainland of Luchow coast, ten miles away.

The Nationalist Army reported today that it had sunk thirty or fifty Chinese junk which were trying to invade small Weichow Island off Lichow Peninsula in South China.

Additional Nationalist warships have been rushed to patrol duty in the area in the attempt to smash an expected Communist attempt to invade big Hainan Island.

Dispatches report a large concentration of Communist craft, mainly in Hangchow Bay, for an invasion of Chu San Islands, 100 miles south of Shanghai.

Mumps And Chicken Pox

Incidence Continues According To Report of Health Unit

Cases of mumps and chicken-pox are still being reported among the children of city schools, according to the monthly report for December of the Prince Rupert Health Unit. Driving has been dangerous and has been kept to a minimum but all the schools have been visited regularly and examinations are proceeding satisfactorily, says the report.

Statistical report on incidence of communicable diseases in the city during December shows 24 cases of mumps, 24 cases of measles and 15 cases of chicken-pox.

Well baby clinics were well patronized during the month with attendance of 73 infants and 29 pre-school children.

There were 26 infant visits, 34 pre-school visits and 47 school visits by staff during the month with 186 children examined at school.

The jail clinic functioned well. There were 11 positive reactions. Miss Margaret Steves spent two days with the Division of Venereal Disease Control in Vancouver observing the work done there.

Terrace Pacific school children were examined during the month. Thirty-five homes at Terrace were visited and there was attendance of twelve at well baby clinics.

In Smithers district 30 school children were examined and 41 attended the well baby clinic. Nineteen cases of measles, 10 tuberculosis and one of venereal disease were reported from Smithers. Arrangements are being made to send one child from Smithers to Vancouver preventorium.

Routine visits were also paid to the Hazelton area.

Visits were also made to milk producers in the interior whose product was found to be of high quality following inspections.

Weather conditions curtailed camp inspections.

NEW YORK—The New York Times said today that secret talks had been opened between United States and Russia with a view to ending the cold war.

Heading for Port

ABOARD FLYING ARROW—Escorted by the United States destroyer Bausell, this shot-riddled American freighter headed tonight for the mine-free Chinese port of Tsiangtao on Shantung Peninsula, diverting from the original destination of Shanghai.

Snow Down Coast

VANCOUVER—The angry winter last night dumped from two and one-half to eight inches of snow on the Lower Mainland, snarling transportation and communication along the southern coast of British Columbia. Five and a half inches of snow fell at the airport during the night and fourteen inches at North and West Vancouver. Heavy drifts are delaying railway trains.

Case for Union

MONTREAL—Two major railroad unions, in a brief presented to a federal conciliation board contended that thousands of Canadian railway workers were forced to live on wages "which fail to provide a decent standard of living."

Conference Progress

OTTAWA—The Dominion-provincial conference today made slow progress towards an agreement on formula for amending the Canadian constitution in Canada. Representatives of the eleven governments have agreed to form a committee to co-ordinate proposals of three provinces. Premier Duplessis would have had the recent federal constitutional legislation repealed but met with no support.

Lieutenant-Governor Of Gyros Is Coming

Prince Rupert Gyro Club will receive an official visit January 25 from the district lieutenant governor, Jack Higginbotham, New Westminster, who will conduct the installation of President-Elect A. J. Dominato and other 1950 officers. W. F. Stone has been appointed chairman of a special committee to make arrangements for activities in connection with Mr. Higginbotham's visit, principal of which will be the installation dinner and dance on the night of January 25.

Milk Brought Here By Air

To meet the short notice emergency arising from the uncertainty of train service due to snow conditions in the interior, milk supplies were brought to the city today from Vancouver by air. This afternoon's regular flight from the south is bringing in the ton-twenty cans—of the health-giving fluid from the south.

Keeping Road Open to Tye

By regular plowing tours the provincial department of public works is keeping the highway open from Prince Rupert to Tye on the Skeena River and District Engineer H. W. Stevens of the provincial department of public works reports that the condition is good although icy which makes advisable the use of chains.

The purpose of maintaining the road open to Tye during the winter is primarily to have the situation that far under control so that the entire road to the interior may be opened earlier in the spring without being delayed by having to dig through between here and the lower Skeena.

So far it is estimated that about 3½ feet of snow has fallen so far this winter on the summit in the neighborhood of Rainbow Lake.

The trench through the snow from Prudhomme Lake to Tye provides for passing of two cars although there are a few places where it is only wide enough to take care of one.

Protection By Warships

LONDON.—British warships will continue protection of British shipping off China from attempts of Chinese Nationalists to blockade Communist-held ports, the Admiralty said today. However, the Admiralty indicated that warships would not go beyond the three-mile limit in Chinese territorial waters.

The Weather

SYNOPSIS

Clear skies and sub-zero temperatures were general in most interior sections of the province during the night. Along the extreme southern coast a series of minor disturbances forming off the south coast of Vancouver Island brought considerable snowfall to this area. By 5 o'clock this morning 2.5 inches had fallen at Vancouver airport, over 5 inches at Abbotsford, while Pachen Point on the southwest coast of Vancouver Island reported over 8 inches of snow. Only slow improvement in the weather in this area is expected today. A fairly active Pacific storm is located about 500 miles west of the Queen Charlottes this morning and should bring rain to the northern coast by Friday night.

Forecast

North coast region—Thursday cloudy with snow flurries along Charlottes and Vancouver Island clear along the mainland. Winds northwesterly, 20 miles per hour. Friday—cloudy morning, becoming overcast Friday afternoon. Intermittent snow beginning over Charlottes Friday morning spreading to mainland, and northern Vancouver Island Friday afternoon. Snow changing to rain over Charlottes Friday evening. Winds southeast, 25 miles per hour. Milder Friday. Lows tonight and highs Friday— at Port Hardy 20 and 32, Sandspit 22 and 35, Prince Rupert 20 and 32.

Battle With Snow Is Won

Trains Moving Again in And Out of Prince Rupert After Clearing of Line

The Canadian National railway line between Prince Rupert and Terrace today was open and trains were running again following the clearing since yesterday of big snow drifts east and west of Kwinitza which had prevented carrying out of service since Sunday when the last train from the east came through. However, a strong wind was again drifting snow on the line before noon and at points had reached 10 inches depth.

By mid-afternoon yesterday one large drift east of Kwinitza had been penetrated by plows and the train which left here Monday night for the East went through to Pacific where it turned around and came back to Prince Rupert today after a second large drift west of Kwinitza had been cleared from the track. This train got in at 8:30 a.m.

Passengers from the Monday night eastbound train were left off at Terrace where they are to be picked up tomorrow by a train which is to leave here at 10 o'clock tonight for the East, this being the train which should have left last night.

Two freight trains with 25 cars of meat and groceries for Prince Rupert which had been held up at Salvus also got through this morning following the clearing of the line during the night and arrived at 10 a.m.

Railway offices stated today that they hoped to keep snow conditions under control on the line.

Railway crews were being rested today after some of them had battled as long as seventy-seven hours with the drifting snow. They will go into action again tonight.

A freight train with twenty carloads of frozen fish will be dispatched immediately behind the eastbound passenger train tonight.

Tonight's train, due from the East at 10:15, is reported seven hours late owing to connections at Jasper.

More Phones Are Coming Up

There is now room for 100 new telephone connections on the city's switch board. Of these 100 have been reserved for the Rushbrook Heights area, whose residents have for years been clamoring for telephones while sixty will go to fill applications since before 1948. No other new installations will be made until these have been completed. There are enough instruments on hand to complete sixty installations. Two hundred more phones are being brought in from Vernon.

This is announced in a telephone department report prepared by Superintendent Jack F. Edwards.

The report also states that during last month, 54 instrument troubles were cleared in addition to 200 cable troubles. Some of the cable trouble was at McBride and Eleventh Avenue due to a cut by an axe, and a rifle bullet in the cable by the old rifle range on the highway at Montreal Circle was another. The terminal shack at McBride and Eleventh Avenue is still down.

A new 400 pair cross connecting box is being shipped from the east and is due to arrive here at some time this month. This box will be installed by the Government Telegraphs with assistance from the local department. Meanwhile, a Government Telegraph man is stationed at Miller Bay to watch for small troubles in the open wire line.

The department has \$15,000 in the revenue fund and an estimated \$1800 per month from the increase in rates to spend this year on new cable installations.

During the month 18 new telephones were installed in the city, nine removed and 25 moved to other locations.

Float Ramp Is Being Repaired

Material for repair of the ramp leading from the Cow Bay road to the Cow Bay fishermen's floats is on the ground and the work has already started. Rebuilding of the ramp was made necessary because of a collapse earlier in the winter since which has been temporarily patched.

Plans are now being drawn up for the complete renewal of all the Cow Bay floats including one which went out entirely in a big winter storm one Sunday about a year ago.

DAMAGE OF \$2000 IN STREET SKIDDING

Skidding on icy Prince Rupert streets has brought an estimated \$2,000 damages to city vehicles. The city division of the B. C. Police announced that during the past two weeks, accident reports have been coming in rapidly.

M.P.'s WIFE VIEWS OTTAWA—

Mrs. Applewhaite Is Impressed By Beauty of Canada's Capital City

"There is so much in Ottawa that is beautiful and interesting," said Mrs. Applewhaite in speaking of her sojourn in the capital city, "that I feel I haven't half touched Ottawa but I hope to see much more on my next visit."

The wife of the member for Skeena was enthusiastic about the beauty of the city and of the Parliament Buildings. "Every time I entered the Buildings I felt proud that I am a Canadian," she said. "Ottawa is different from any other city I have seen," she continued. "It has an atmosphere all its own. With all the members of parliament and the many civil servants it is a busy city but it does not have the bustle of an industrial city. There is an old world atmosphere around the centre of Ottawa—the houses are very old and of former style architecture."

"Every street is lined with maple trees and from the Peace Tower Ottawa presents a scene of green with spires of buildings showing through, though of course in the fall the greens, yellows, the trees provide homes for many black squirrels and we can often see these cunning little creatures scampering about."

Mrs. Applewhaite attended

many of the sessions of Parliament, sometimes two a day. "I found the sessions intensely interesting and educational," she said. "I was particularly struck with the spirit of co-operation that existed. The members of the government and of the opposition too seemed to be working together for the good of the country. The members worked long, hard hours. My husband left for the buildings at 8:30 a. m. and often worked through until midnight."

Madame St. Laurent and Madame St. Laurent, Mrs. Applewhaite said: "Canada has reason to be proud of such wonderful leaders, they are so able and sincere. Madame St. Laurent is very charming and a true wife and mother."

"The members did not have to leave the buildings for meals as there is a very beautiful dining-room in the Buildings and in it one will see many prominent

men. Indeed it is the 'cross-roads of Canada. "Also in the Buildings there are rooms where the wives of members can entertain. Many functions are held in the Parliament Buildings. At the beginning of the session Mrs. Mayhew, wife of the minister of fisheries, gave a tea for the wives of new members. Mrs. Mayhew was very kind in giving advice and helping newcomers. We found time to do a little sight-seeing. There are many beautiful drives—through residential areas, along the Rideau Canal, and through the Gatineau Hills. Of course, Ontario is very thickly populated and there are many cities within easy access of Ottawa. We had a particularly enjoyable visit to Hamilton. Ice at Stewart and Alice Arm
Alaska Freighter and Tankers in Port

Ice conditions at the head of Portland Canal and at Alice Arm have been presenting difficulties for navigation into the parts of Stewart and Alice Arm during the past fortnight.
