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Don't Be Fooled

WHILE hope springs eternal . . . it is hardly realistic to harbor any ideas that Russia has any altruistic intentions in her sudden decision to return to the Security Council of the United Nations and accept a turn at the presidency next week. It is much more reasonable to suppose that, with Jacob Malik as president of the Security Council, Russia intends to further her own purposes by exercising any advantages which that position might imply or present. True, Russia appears to be ending the boycott of the United Nations which she said she would keep up as long as Nationalist China continued to hold a seat. There has been some suggestion that Russia's return to her seat in the Security Council, vacant during the proceedings in connection with the Korean crisis, might result in a settlement of that crisis. But, if any settlement does come as a sequel to the move, only the most credulous and unrealistic could induce themselves to think that it could be in any way to the disadvantage of Russian influence or position or in any way conceding to the strong stand which has been taken by the United Nations and in support of which hard and almost desperate fighting is now going on.

There is little good reason to grasp at any ideas now that Russia's latest move is going to improve the international situation very much. That would only be deluding ourselves to drop the guard which is being raised and which must be maintained until Russia shows and proves a complete change of heart and intentions. More likely this latest move is merely a political machination to put Russia even in a more favorable position to continue her encroachments by non-fighting means and justify acts of armed aggression such as she is now abetting in Korea.

Return of Russia to the Security Council at this time can certainly not be taken as any reform of overt intentions.

CONGRATULATIONS, C.C.F.!

WE think we should express hearty approval of the C.C.F. national convention, now in session at Vancouver, for the positive stand it took yesterday on the Korean crisis.

Evidently the party has not yet completely purged itself of communistically-inclined elements but, nevertheless, is should in a fair way to doing so and, while they may be noisy, they are at least a minority.

M. J. Coldwell, the able leader of the party, is to be congratulated upon his effective guidance. He has long since shown his courageous and sincere desire to keep the interests of country above those party. That can be said of him even if one does not agree with all his views or policies.

IT'S A STALE COOKIE

QUITE A FEW CANADIAN newspapers are talking of the stale cookies served at Rideau Hall to the delegates to the recent Commonwealth press conference. One paper frankly states that the reception given to the visitors was as lukewarm as the tea. According to front-line dispatches, some of the English delegates went home all het up about doing something to restore the dwindling prestige of the Vice-Regal functions in Canada.

THERE IS A MOVE AFOOT to have B.C. follow the example of Alberta and Saskatchewan and close down the "official residence" of the Lieutenant-Governor. It is hard to get enough rich men to take on the job—with the lavish expenditure it involves. It is an open secret that some of the Lieutenant-Governors now actually in office in Canada are trying to quit. They are asking the government at Ottawa to relieve them earlier than the stipulated period.

AS TIME GOES ON, I COME more and more to the conclusion that it would be better simply to leave the appointments unfilled.

Our constitution says that whenever the office of Governor-General or Lieutenant-Governor is vacant, or whenever one of those officials is unable to act, the Chief Justice automatically does so. Hence, if no more Governors-General or Lieutenants-Governors were appointed, the "King's government" would still go on. The Chief Justice of Canada would sign the laws, instead of the Governor-General—just as he now does when the Governor-General is away. The Chief Justice of each province would do likewise for the provincial governments.

THIS CHANGE WOULD ALSO by-pass the move to have a Canadian instead of an Old Countryman, appointed as Governor-General. Of course, the Chief Justice would be a Canadian.

But he is thought of, by the public, in terms of his office and not by name or political background.

Australia appointed an Australian as Governor-General, then found that personage in the centre of a political and dog fight. Some old political enemy was unwilling to let sleeping dogs lie, and was taking lustrous cracks at the G-G because of some old partisan feud.

One can imagine that even if we appointed a most distinguished statesman as Governor-General, old partisan fires might blaze up again in a crisis. NONE OF THE ABOVE IS intended as a reflection on the distinguished soldier who represents His Majesty at Ottawa, nor on the many fine men and women who are serving or who served in the past in the Vice-Regal capacity.

There are some whose personal graciousness, dignity and vibrant spirit of democracy were able to add lustre to a waning institution.

But on the whole, the decline in the prestige of the office has been as progressive as it has been general.

Rather than adding to the ties of affection and esteem that the average Canadian has for the throne, the Vice-Regal office in Canada has increasingly worked in reverse.

It's the job itself that is the stale cookie—and it would take more than fresh cookies to bring it back.

Yet there still appears to be a misunderstanding or the existence of half-truths when there should be reality. And crowning it all is a suspicion that may be unjust. This, it can well be believed, could be removed through the unhampered and free recital of all essential facts by trained and experienced men on the ground.

We are not at all familiar with the words and music of the Belgian national anthem but, according to latest word from that country, there are many others who might regard with favor, some sort of change.

When anyone is indifferent to the outcome of a first class dog fight, it means he is beginning to die on his feet. We deplore and curse war, but it is heartening to see it waged, not for conquest, but for the sake of ending what could become a war-tidened world. It is in this sense that the will to fight is precious.

It still remains uncertain, apparently, if Government House in Victoria will continue to be Government House with all of its trimmings and trappings, or converted to some other use. The Colonist advises the latter, and the counsel is not without significance. For practically a century, the Colonist has offered advice, frequently heeded.

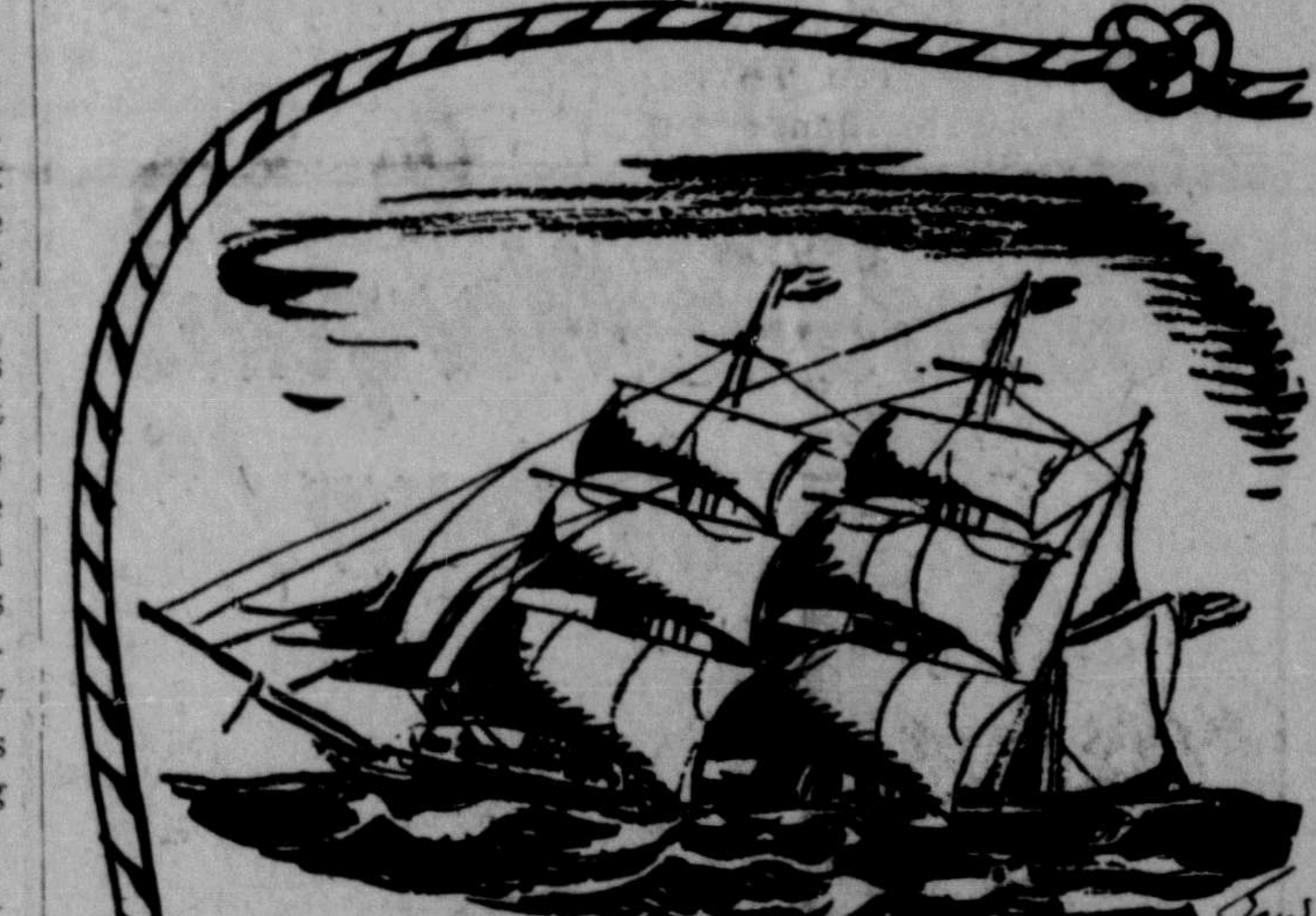
