NEW DISCOVERY PROTECTS HUMAN FLESH-A new discovery expected to substantially reduce aviation fire hazards, a flame-resistant paneling that protects human flesh within an inch of fire up to 2,200 degrees Fahrenheit, has just been perfected by the plastics industry. The fireproof panel is made with a base of cellular cellulose acetate, a plastic material so light four cubic feet can be balanced on the fingertips, sandwiched between sheets of extremely thin carbon steel. In official tests the steel and plastic paneling withstood heat in excess of 2,200 degrees Fahrenheit for more than 30 minutes. Specifications for airplane fire-walls require material to withstand heat of 2,000 degrees for 15 minutes. At the end of the official test period a human hand could still be held comfortably less than an inch from the new panel on the side opposite the fire. This laboratory technician is holding 40 strips of cellular cellulose acetate, commonly called CCA, the heat-resistant plastic material which promises great things in reducing aviation fire hazards because of its light weight, strength and heat resistance.

The train crew managed to borrow a gun with which the animal was dispatched and the carcass hauled off the track.

Meantime four westbound freight trains were delayed at meets waiting for the tardy mixed train.

It is not the first incident of this kind where freight trains have been delayed by moose during heavy snow conditions such as now prevail, Superintendent C. A. Berner remarks.



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# Thanks Mr. Fraser

THERE HAS BEEN much beating of the drum these many years for federal co-operation with the provinces in building transcontinental highways and it is no new tune for Mr. Fraser, the Progressive-Conservative member for Peterborough, to talk in Commons along this line but, nevertheless, we are glad to have another county heard from. The Associated Boards of Trade of Central British Columbia is among the organizations that has been thus campaigning, especially advocating the inclusion of the Jasper-Prince Rupert in a transcontinental federally-aided highway system.

So far, unfortunately, the federal government appears to have some sort of an idea that federallyaided highway construction should be reserved until times get so bad that the work will be needed for relief.

Mr. Fraser is quite correct in pointing out that, in the meantime, Canada is losing millions of dollars annually, even of her own money, because there is no TransCanada Highway. With no such highway, driving Canadians take their money across the line to travel the good American roads and the Americans, who would like to drive in Canada, cannot. He might also have mentioned the proposed TransCanada Highway which would come through Yellowhead Pass and head to the coast in two tines, one to Vancouver and one to Prince Rupert, the latter almost completely linked up already, traversing through the most intriguing tourist country of central and northern British Columbia to the coast at Prince Rupert, a bare forty miles or so from Alaska.

We would like to have Mr. Fraser, and the other eastern M.P.'s too. drive out this way some time and see for themselves. They would be all the more enthusiastic about a TransCanada Highway, particularly one to Prince Rupert.

## WORTHY OF CONSIDERATION

CONSIDERATION is most certainly due the people of the Queen Charlotte Islands and many other parts of this far flung and sparsely populated district who are so far removed from medical and hospital facilities and are always running the risk of undue suffering if not death through their inability to speedily reach these services.

The letter of the New Massett Community Club, published in the Daily News this week, is, therefore, entitled to more than passing consideration.

The Canadian Pacific Airlines possibly cannot be blamed for the heavy charge involved in transporting a patient with its big Canso, the only aircraft available.

On the other hand, the plight of the patient or those who have to foot the bill is understandable.

The government might do something to relieve the situation. Certainly, as the New Massett Community Club says, the cost is prohibitive.

If there were a local air service out of Prince Rupert, using lighter and less expensive aircraft, the situation might be relieved.

Meantime, it is nothing short of something to be ashamed about that Queen Charlotte Islands people, when they require aircraft to bring their sick or injured to Prince Rupert, should have to appeal to the United States Coastguard to do so.

If we had a Canadian Coastguard service, the cost of which has been declared "prohibitive," notwithstanding the important life-saving aspects of the service, such mercy flights as this might also be taken in stride.
