

nged War Bride Mother Held in Vancouver Observation

COUVER (P-The body of chteen-month-old Francis Jenfer Jones was found by searchers today as the mentally deranged English war bride mother was held in custody. Previously three-year-old Linda Jones had been rescued by a fish rman.

Mrs. Leslie Jones, 28-year-old expectant mother, told police last night that she hurled her two babies from Kitsilano trestle, 30 feet above False Creek, into the ice waters.

Mrs. Jones was recently released from a mental ward of the General Hospital here. She will be examined by City Pathologist Dr. K. D. Panton.

The three-year-old child was saved through a freak prank of fate after being carried a quarter of a mile by outgoing tide.

SCOWLOAD OF LUMBER HERE

A scowload of lumber consigned from Ketchikan Spruce Mills to eastern United States points arrived here Tuesday after a stormy passage across Dixon's Enrtance.

Bearing 130,000 board feet of high grade, kiln dried spruce lumber, the scow suffered damage to its forward end from the seas as it was towed 90 miles from Kecthikan. The lumber is being unloaded at the C.N.R.

BLAMES BRITISH, AMERICANS

PARIS—A Soviet bloc delegate said today that British and American oil and military interests had wrecked the United Nations partition plan for Palestine. He said that the General Assembly's No. 1 political committee should order troops from the bordering states of Egypt, TransJordan, Syria, Lebanon and Iraq out of Palestine.

VESSEL FEARED SUNK

HALIFAX—Three Royal Conadian Air Force search planes continued search today for the British freighter Hopestar, missing with 37 men on board about 400 miles southeast of Halifax. United States Coastguard planes combed the area yesterday for the 5267-ton vessel which was last heard from November 13 when she reported "heavy weather damage." It is feared that the vessel sank with all on board.

TRYING TO BREAK CRISIS

PARIS—Six "neutral" members of the United Nations security courcil today again took up their task of trying to break through the east-west deadlock in Berlin. They will sift through British, French, United States and Russian answers in an effort to find a clue as a means of halting the cold

MONTREAL—A twenty-year convict was stabbed to death by a lifer in St. Vincent's Penitentiary, near here, today.

CANADA-NEWFIE TERMS

OTTAWA—After lengthy negotiations, Newfoundland and Canada have agreed on financial terms considerably different from tentative agreements suggested a year ago when entry of the Island into Confederation was discussed. An official source said the financial burden on Canada had not been increased. The original estimate of a \$15,000,000 a year drain on Canada's treasury has now been reduced to \$7,000,000.

INTERNATIONAL WHEAT PACT

WASHINGTON—The international wheat agreement, which was scuttled last year by the United States, may be revived almost at once. An informed source said the United States government was about to make a long-awaited announcement, calling the 11-country wheat preparatory committee into session.

LOUIS VS. GODOY

PHILADELPHIA—Promoter Herman Taylor announced Tuesday that he had signed the world's heavyweight champion, Joe Louis, for a six-round bout with Arturo Godoy of Chile at Convention Hall December 14. He said that the fighters will wear gloves of twelve ounces or less.

from the answer of the Minister of Public Works to the appeal of the Prince Rupert

Automobile Association for the instituting of a policy of improvement and more adequate maintenance of the Skeena River Highway. Mr. Carson states quite plainly the fact that the Department intends to modernize the Fraser-Cariboo highway before anything much is done about the Prince George-Prince Rupert road.

Mr. Carson appears to think that the primary factor of importance is that the northern transprovincial highway should be connected up with Vancouver. Local people will still feel, however, "that essential highway users" and "hardy tourists," as he puts it, should be given some consideration and provided with a half decent road. This, it is to be supposed, includes the increasing number of northern people who live along the highway and feel that they are entitled, now that the road exists, to some reasonable service in the way of improvement and upkeep without having to put up with the very deplorable conditions that so often exist on the road. These people after all are interested in intercommunication among themselves in their own area.

We have been hearing the explanation for a long time about lack of this or that making it impossible to do work on this road. Now it is lack of suitable surfacing material and shortage of maintainers. The promise of the minister to endeavour to secure equipment "so that a real surface may be put on the highways in the area" is noted. We hope it may not take too long before the Department can get organized to this much to be desired end.

The minister reminds us that we have already been assured that the improvement of the Prince Rupert-Port Edward section will be proceeded with when required and in time to meet the requirements of the pulp mill development. No doubt Mr. Carson is aware that the big pulp mill construction program will get under way next year and from that time on there will be such requirements. That does not leave much time for the improvements such as the straightening out of the road and the surfacing.

There will also be some disappointment over the minister's statement, although there has been the tendency even on the part of some of our people to concede the point, that "snow plowing of the whole Terrace-Prince Rupert road is not feasible or economical at the present time." Shortage of equipment is again given as the reason. There is no denying the fact that there is a shortage of adequate equipment—at least on the Terrace-Prince Rupert road. That is one of the things we complain about.

Here is something that the member for the riding should be constantly following up, sitting on the doorstep of the minister with his representations on behalf of his constituents.

News of the death of Brown Jack, equine idol of racegoers during the early '30's and bestloved stayer in British racing history, recalls mnay stories of his career.
