Candid, at Least

NOT MUCH SATISFACTION is to be derived from the answer of the Minister of Public Works to the appeal of the Prince Rupert Automobile Association for the instituting of a policy of improvement and more adequate maintenance of the Skeena River Highway. Mr. Carson states quite plainly the fact that the Department intends to modernize the Fraser-Cariboo highway before anything much is done about the Prince George-Prince Rupert road.

Mr. Carson appears to think that the primary factor of importance is that the northern trans-provincial highway should be connected up with Vancouver. Local people will still feel, however, "that essential highway users" and "hardy tourists," as he puts it, should be given some consideration and provided with a half decent road. This, it is to be supposed, includes the increasing number of northern people who live along the highway and feel that they are entitled, now that the road exists, to some reasonable service in the way of improvement and upkeep without having to put up with the very deplorable conditions that so often exist on the road. These people after all are interested in intercommunication among themselves in their own area.

We have been hearing the explanation for a long time about lack of this or that making it impossible to do work on this road. Now it is lack of suitable surfacing material and shortage of maintainers. The promise of the minister to endeavour to secure equipment "so that a real surface may be put on the highways in the area" is noted. We hope it may not take too long before the Department can get organized to this much to be desired end.

The minister reminds us that we have already been assured that the improvement of the Prince Rupert-Port Edward section will be proceeded with when required and in time to meet the requirements of the pulp mill development. No doubt Mr. Carson is aware that the big pulp mill construction program will get under way next year and from that time on there will be such requirements. That does not leave much time for the improvements such as the straightening out of the road and the surfacing.

There will also be some disappointment over the minister's statement, although there has been the tendency even on the part of some of our people to concede the point, that "snow plowing of the whole Terrace-Prince Rupert road is not feasible or economical at the present time." Shortage of equipment is again given as the reason. There is no denying the fact that there is a shortage of adequate equipment—at least on the Terrace-Prince Rupert road. That is one of the things we complain about.

Here is something that the member for the riding should be constantly following up, sitting on the doorstep of the minister with his representations on behalf of his constituents.

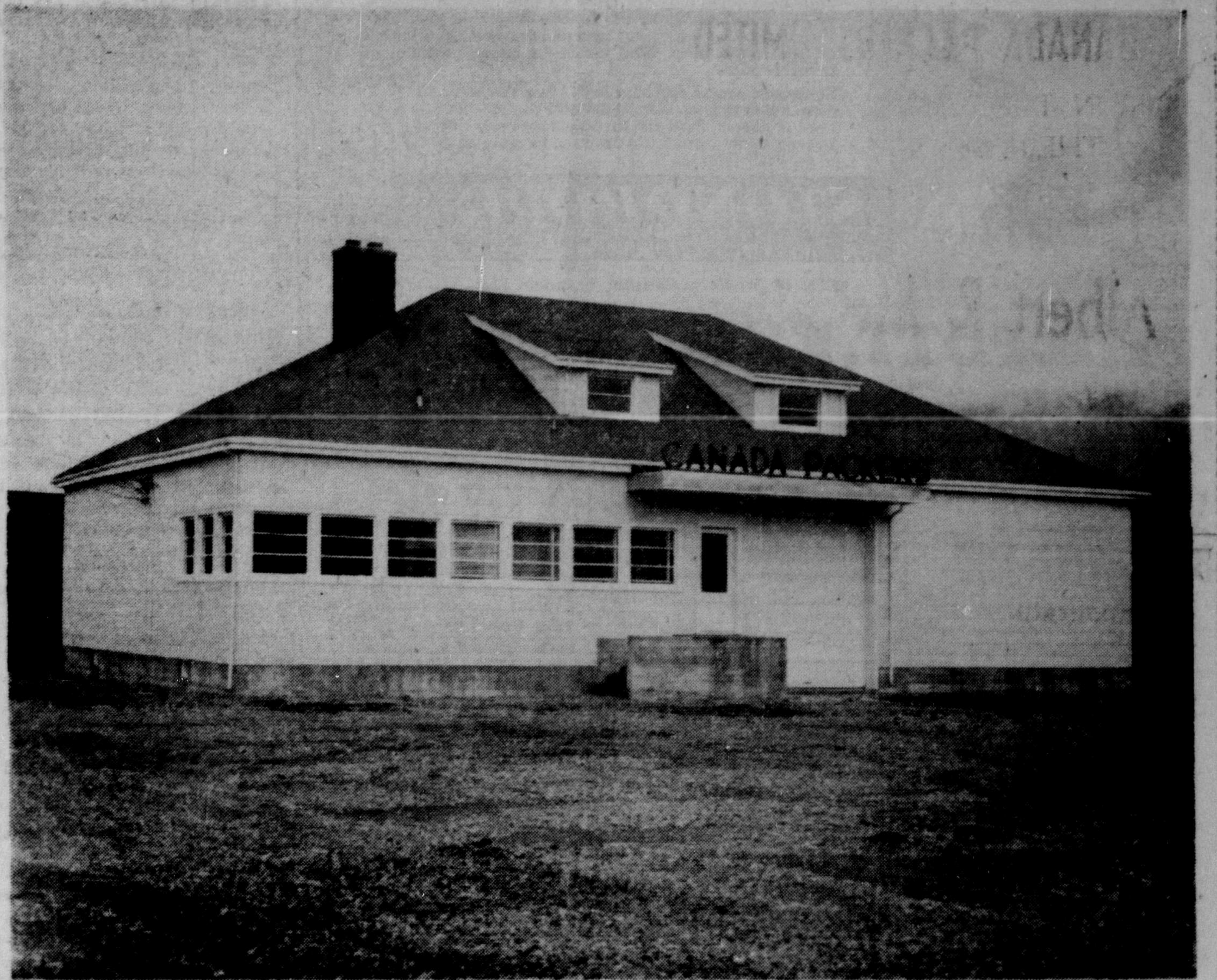

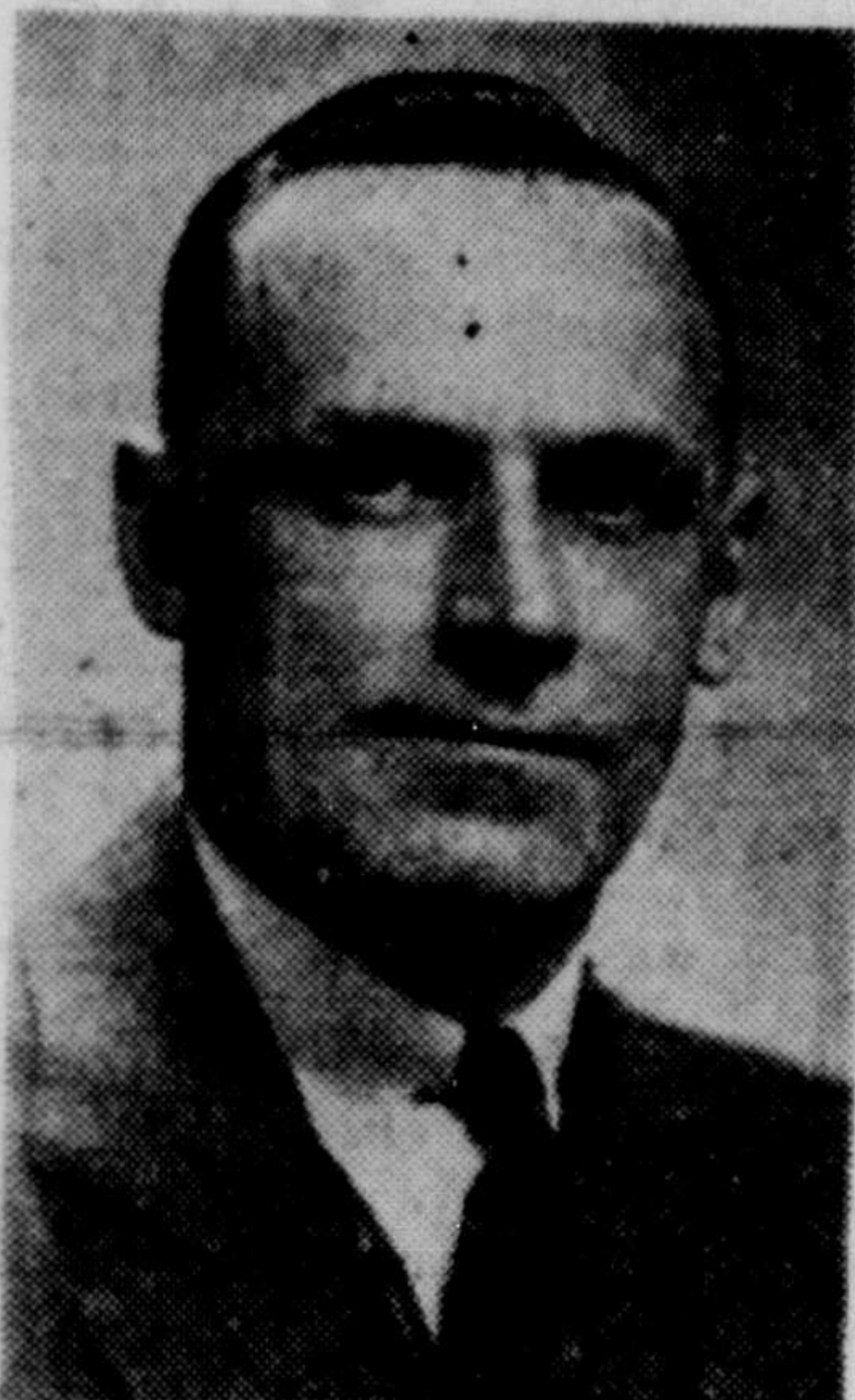

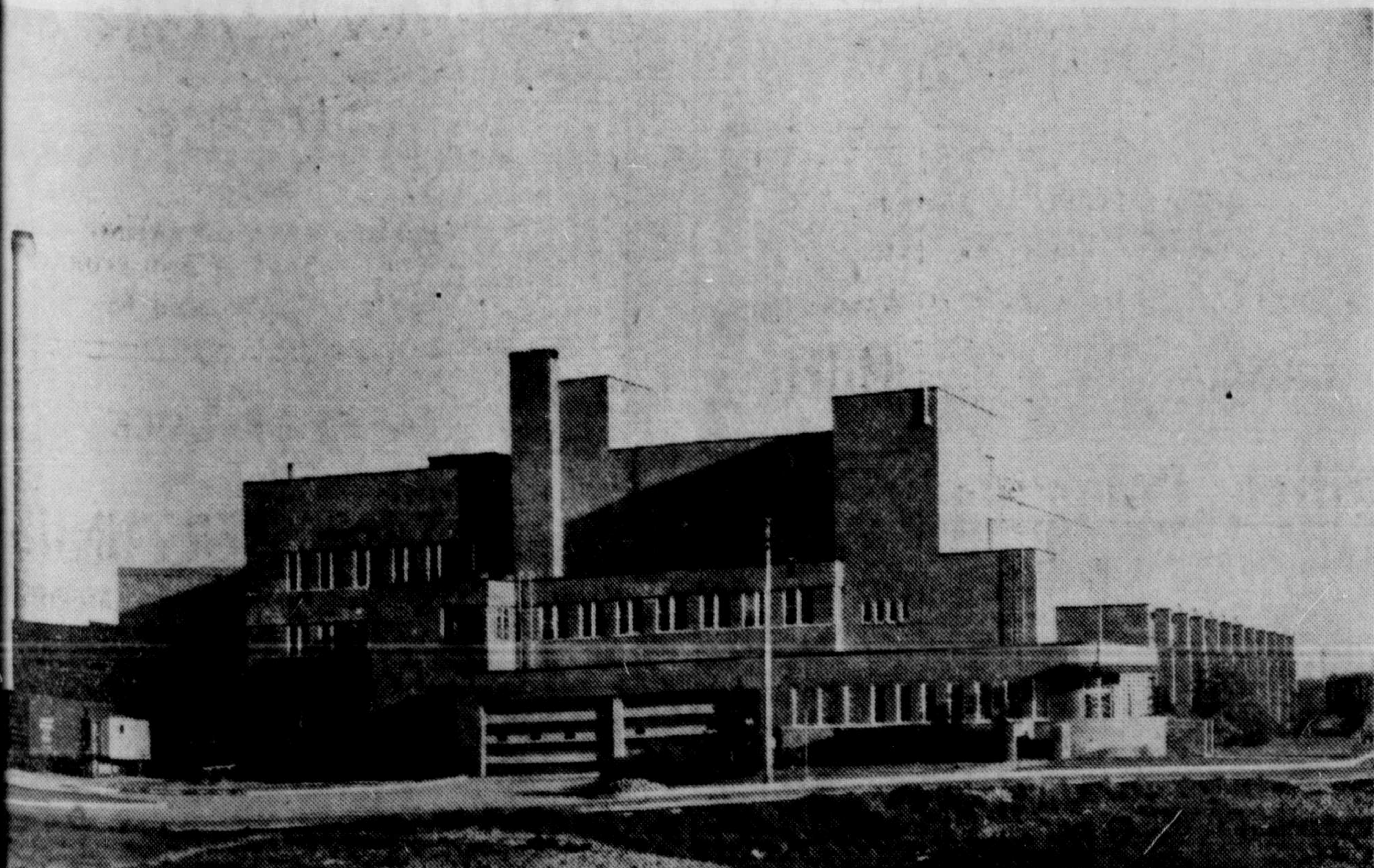

Seasonable Ideas for Housekeepers

MEAT LOAF IS ECONOMICAL AND FAMILY LIKES ITS FLAVOR TOO

Meat loaves are general favorites in most families. They are the answer to the dilemma of many a homemaker who wants to continue serving the type of meals to which she has accustomed her family.

The rich brown flavor of a meat loaf is much the same as an expensive roast and the meat is tender and juicy. Besides being made from less expensive cuts, a comparatively small amount of meat is extended by the addition of cereals so that it fits into the economy budget and gives a bonus for thrift.

Beef loaf is the common type out west, fresh and cured pork, liver, kidney and even lamb may be made into delicious loaves.

Canned pressed meat loaves may be used cold, just as they come from the can or re-heated and served in various ways. One interesting suggestion is to cover the loaf with a thick "icing" of fluffy mashed potatoes then bake in a moderate oven, 350 degrees F., until the potatoes are browned and the meat

heated through. When sliced this has a party air with the pink slice of meat surrounded by white potatoes with a brown crust. This may be done with home-made loaves also.

The home economists of the Consumer Section, Dominion Department of Agriculture, are particularly fond of meat loaves. Here are several of their favorites. One of them is a "meat" loaf without meat.

Vegetarian Meat Loaf

1 cup cooked beans
¼ cup peanut butter
4 teaspoons chopped onion
1 teaspoon salt
Few grains pepper
¾ cup soft bread crumbs
½ cup grated mild cheese
1 cup strained, canned tomatoes

¾ cup milk
1 egg, beaten

Grind the beans, mix with peanut butter. Add remaining ingredients. Pack into a buttered loaf pan and bake in moderate oven, 350 degrees F., for 360 minutes. Yield: six servings.

Golden Meat Loaf

1 ½ lbs. ground beef
¼ cup rolled oats (quick or regular)

1 cup grated raw carrots
¼ cup chopped onion
1 egg, beaten
1 cup milk
2 teaspoons salt
½ teaspoon pepper
1 teaspoon spicy meat sauce

Combine all ingredients thoroughly. Pack into a greased loaf pan, (4½x8½"). Bake in a moderate oven 350 degrees F. one hour. Yield: eight servings.

Kidney and Beef Loaf

½ lb. beef kidney
1 lb. beef, chuck or round
1 medium onion
1 cup dry bread crumbs
¼ cup chopped celery
½ teaspoon chopped parsley (optional)
1 egg, slightly beaten
Put kidney, beef and onion

through the meat grinder. Add bread crumbs, celery, salt, pepper, parsley and slightly beaten egg and mix well together. Shape into a loaf and place in a greased pan. Bake in a moderate oven 350 degrees F. for 1½ hours. Serve hot or cold. Yield: six to eight servings.
1½ teaspoons salt
½ teaspoon pepper

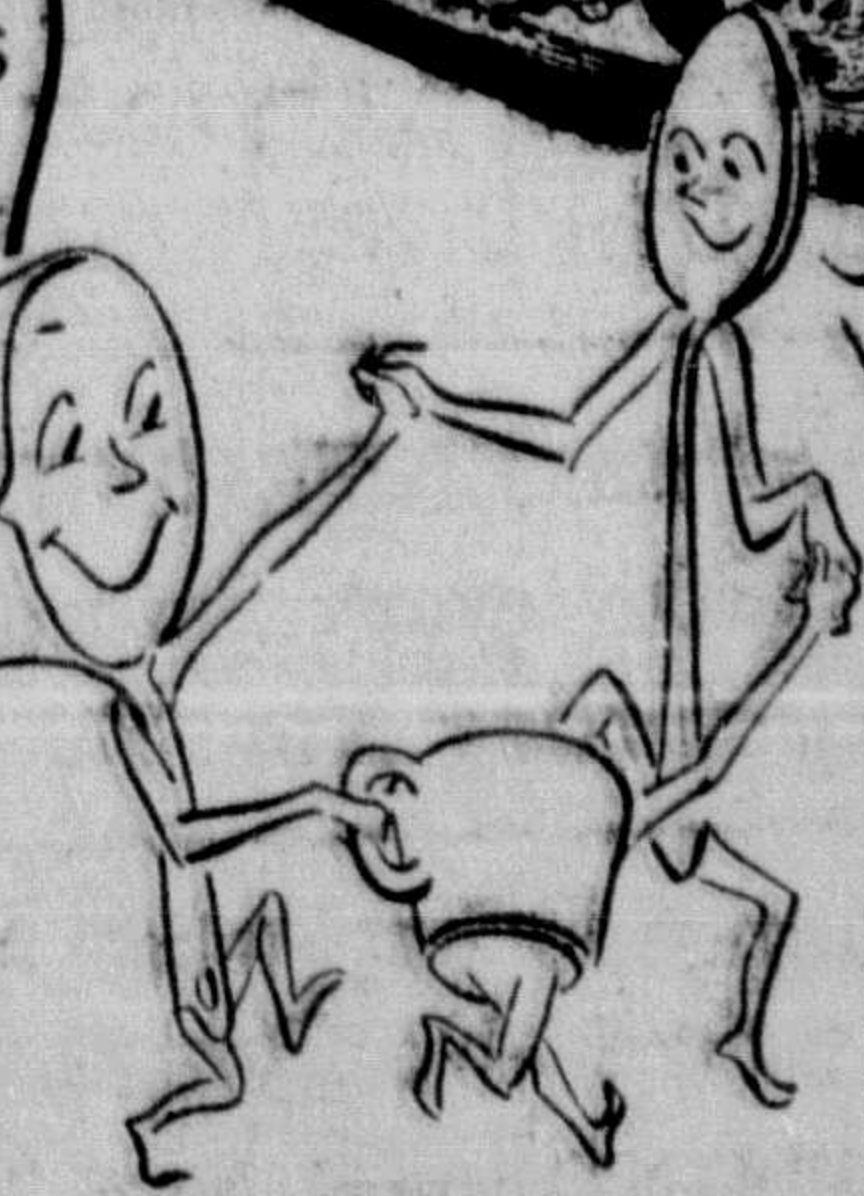
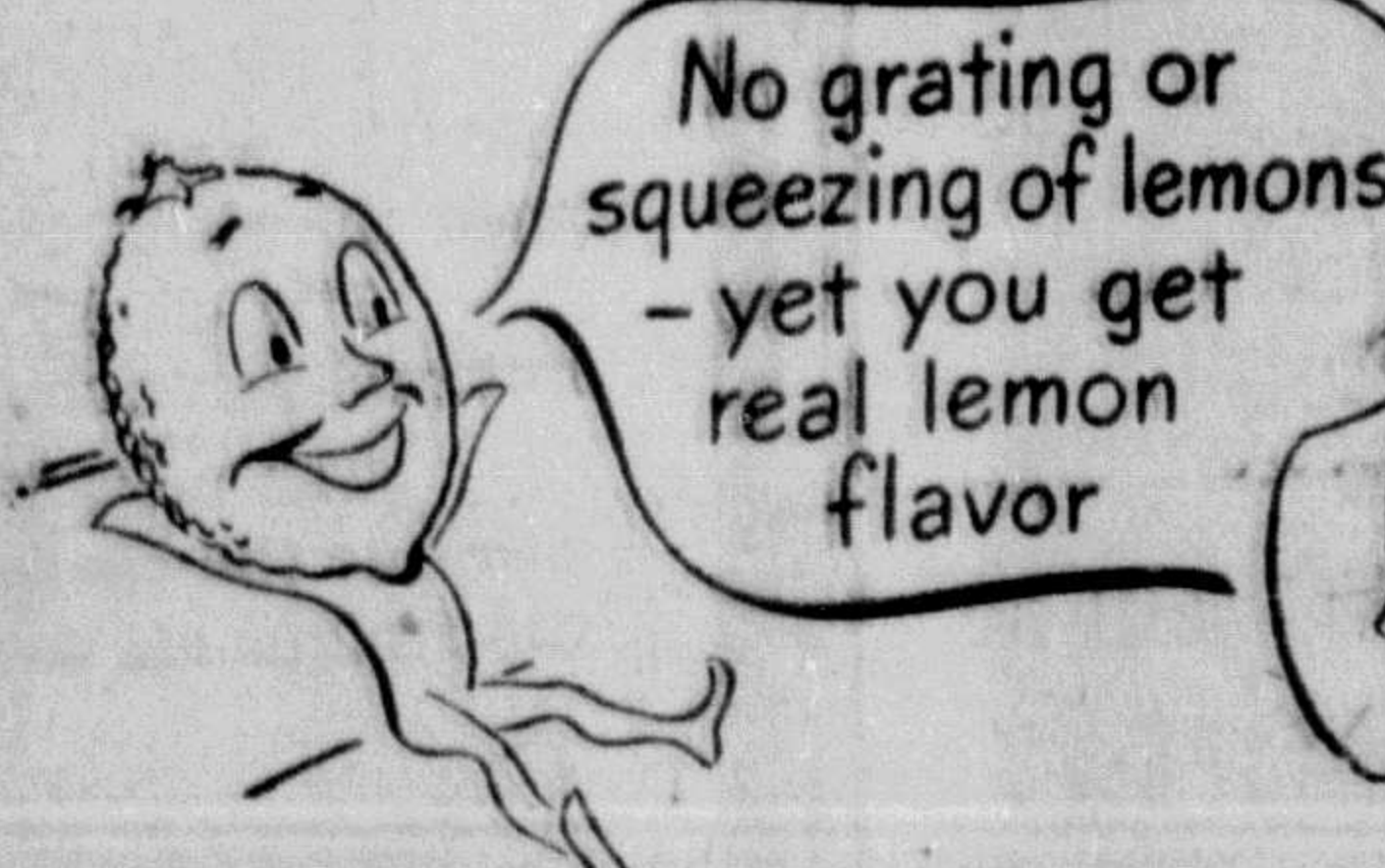
