# Averting Winter Crises

E CAN look forward to the next winter without having to worry about an electrical shortage such as threatened two years ago and really afflicted us last winter. In announcing the purchase by his company of the dry dock power plant wherein will be installed diesel generating units which will augment the power supply substantially, Mr. Black yesterday gave assurance that his company will be in a position to take care of all local requirements apart altogether from the hydro sources. That is an encouraging picture and, as Mr. Black suggests, will enable his company to deliberate on the possibilities of further power development to meet the needs which it seems certain will develop in the course of the next few years.

Now that we do not have to worry about the possibility of another power shortage, it is to be hoped that steps which are being taken by the city will avert the recurrence of another water crisis like those which have plagued us of recent years and left the city very vulnerable from a fire risk standpoint.

### AIR SERVICE TO ALASKA

\\// E have been notified of a coming hearing in the petition of Ellis Air Lines for the right to serve Prince Rupert on a weekly scheduled basis.

The case of needed service to Prince Rupert is fairly simple and since Canadian air operators don't yet seem interested in coming to Alaska, it is a case of Alaskan operators going to Rupert. With the development of highway and air travel to Rupert since the war, along with its historic water and rail travel infux, there is a large number of tourists, both American and Canadian, arriving at Rupert with the desire to come on over and see Alaska.

This desire is unfulfilled. We were in Rupert i early in May at a time when traffic normally is light, but all hotels were filled to the brim, even at that early date, and many of their customers were tourists. The situation will be the same all summer long.

Arrival of statehood will end the onerous part of the Jones act and increase commercial ties with Rupert. The day thus may come soon when Canadians and Americans will be able to buy a ticket at Vancouver or Victoria for Ketchikan, Juneau or Fairbanks, Alaska, using the local leg from Rupert to Ketchikan to bring them into Alaska.

## Crusty, Crunchy DINNER ROLLS



### CRUSTY DINNER ROLLS

• Measure into a large bowl 1/2 c. lukewarm water, 1 tsp. granulated sugar; stir until sugar is dissolved. Sprinkle with 1 envelope Fleischmann's Royal Fast Rising Dry Yeast. Let stand 10 mins., THEN stir well.

Add 3/4 c. lukewarm water and 1 tsp. salt. Add, all at once, 31/3 c. once-sifted bread flour and work in with the hands; work in 3 tbs. soft shortening. Knead on lightlyfloured board until smooth and elastic. Place in greased bowl. Cover with a damp cloth and set in warm place, free from draught. Let rise until doubled in bulk Punch down dough in bowl, fold over, cover and again let rise until doubled in bulk. Turn out on lightly-floured board and divide into 2-equal portions; shape-each piece into a long roll about 11/3" in diameter. Cover with a damp cloth and let rest 15 mins. Using a floured sharp knife, cut dough into 2" lengths and place, well apart, on ungreased cookie sheets. Sprinkle rolls with cornmeal and let rise; uncovered, for 1/2 hour. Brush with cold water and let rise another 1/2 hour. Meanwhile, stand a broad shallow pan of hot water in the oven and preheat oven to hot, 425°. Remove pan of water from oven and bake the olls in steam filled oven for I hour, brushing them with cold water and sprinkling lightly with commeal after the first 15 mins., and again brushing them with cold water 2 minutes before removing baked bans from the oven. Yield — 18 rolls.
