MARGARINE QUESTION

VICTORIA-Spokesmen for 1200 interior dairy farmers, members of the Shuswap-Okanagan Dairy Industries Co-operative Association, yesterday placed before the cabinet a program for the sale of margarine in British Columbia. They asked that legislation be passed to prevent margarine or other butter substitutes from usurping the merits of dairy products and that butter substitutes should not imitate butter in color or appearance. They said that margarine sales in Canada would wipe out the butter production of 200,000 cows and take away the livelihood of 100,000 Canadians. Agriculture Minister Frank Putnam said he is doing everything he can to ban the sale of margarine in British Col-

CONFERENCE FAILING

RHODES-Israeli-Egyptian negotiations on an armistice are on the edge of failure today. Failure of both sides to modify their stands appears likely to wreck the conference soon. Egypt has demanded that the Jews give up their gains on the southern desert. The Jews have refused.

VANCOUVER-H. R. MacMillan Export Co. yesterday announced that it will pay bonuses totalling \$600,000 to regular employees. In the case of hourly workers, the bonuses will amount to \$100,-

SEES WESTERN PLOT

MOSCOW-Russia issued a white paper today telling the world that the projected North Atlantic pact was part of a British-American plan for a new war. It is a plot against the United Nations and has as its object the domination of the world by force. It accused the United States and Britain of trying to isolate the Soviet Union, undermining the United Nations, instituting an economic boycott against the Soviet Union and friends and trying to start a new war.

ISRAELI RECOGNIZED

LONDON-Great Britain, Belgium and the Netherlands today announced they had given facto (limited) recognition to Israel. Separate announcements were made after foreign ministers, in meeting, had decided to give recognition. Other members of the group, France and Luxembourg, have already done so. They are planning to exchange representatives at an early date, the British statement said.

FOR RELIEF OF STEWART

The coastwise steamer Camosun of Union Steamships Ltd., arriving here tomorrow evening from Vancouver nortabount in command of Capt. John Boden, will make another attempt on Monday to reach Stewart, the snow and ice-bound mining community at the head of Portland Canala where the Alaska Pannanule borders British Columbia. On two previous runs recently, the icelocked canal, beaches of which are bordered with 21 feet of snow, has prevented the vessel from reaching the whar at Stewart. Three days ago warning was given that fuel supply of the community was running

Steamship officials beffeve that, unless the Camosun is able to reach Stewart this time. the Department of Transport will make arrangements to biast a passage through the Canal ice to the Stewart dock.

In order to tackie the Stewart problem in daylight, Capt. Boden will make his Stewart call before Affice Arm this voyage, in reverse of the regularly scheduled order.



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Mr. Eden's Suggestion

A NTHONY EDEN suggests some sentiment in business between Great Britain and Canada which should not be allowed to sink entirely into a cold matter of dollars and cents. It is good and timely advice which might well be heeded by both sides for there has been a tendency to disregard what Mr. Eden calls "friendship" but which some sense as "affection" such as could be expected to exist between members of a family.

It is all very well for there to be complete autonomy and independence among the members of our Commonwealth family but there does seem to be something unseemly, as it would be in the case of members of a family on the more literal level, about being too exacting in the driving of a bargain.

Some Britons and some Canadians probably did not need Mr. Eden to suggest to them that, in this matter of dollars, there might have been a little more latitude—that Britain could stretch points a little in dealing with Canada as Canada itself could have done with Britain without being too coldly "dollars and cents" conscious about it.

LABOR GOV'T'S DILEMMA

THE BRITISH Labor government, particularly Sir Stafford Cripps, repeatedly calls upon the people of Britain for more and more increased production so that the nation's economic equilibrium may be achieved with a minimum of delay. Once British economy comes into balance, however, the Labor government will indeed find itself on the horns of a dilemma. Once it succeeds in bringing about the condition of plenty towards which it strives, it must either go forward toward Communism, with complete and permanent controls, pricefixing, wage-fixing and direction of labor as would go with the complete nationalization of industry, or release controls and rationing and allow prices and wages to find their natural levels in a free market which is really democratic capitalism.

Before the war the British Labor party favored outright Socialism on the Russian plan with the exception of state control of wages and the direction of labor to which the labor unions were and are vigorously opposed. The British Labor party has discovered by the experience and responsibility of office that there is a wide differnce between theory and practice. Meantime, the growing indications that the British people are growing tired of controls and rations does not make their lot of the government any the easier.

WAITING FOR JOE

LVERY MOVE toward European rehabilitation since the war has had to be taken not only in disregard of whether it would provoke Russia but in defiance of direct Russian threats against it. The Atlantic pact and American measures to put a backbone of military power into it through a new lend-lease program to western Europe can hardly escape similar attacks from the East.

But, as to either Russian provocation over the western defense measures or the possibility that the West can find a more friendly basis for dealing with the Soviet Union and its international Communist affiliates—some reliable indications from Mr. Stalin's own headquarters would be of timely interest. Such hints as we so far hear are none too encouraging.

TRAFFIC SITUATION

--- \V/ITH THE EXCEPTION of Westview, most W of Prince Rupert's people reach the business district by way of McBride and Fulton Streets. That means the intersections at Third Avenue will become busier as the city expands and grows. Mc-Bride Street has the advantage of breadth and is not far from being level but this much cannot be claimed for Fulton Street which is more narrow although it also has an easy grade.

Prince Rupert is growing! The increase is not fast but it is a progress that makes for permanency. Estimating a present population of say nine or ten thousand, it is clear that the day will come when these two corners will present traffic problems. There will, anyway, be the necessity of providing certain precautions. Were Prince Rupert twice its present size, Third and Second Avenues would certainly be congested. Already, what to do with the cars is no simple question. Where they stand by the curb, sometimes in double row, block after block, a situation is created that will call for some thought as time goes on.

JURISTS WEAR VIOLET ROBES

Custom of Distinctive Garb Goes Back for Centuries

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




