#### VANCOUVER FIRE

VANCOUVER—An early morning fire which appeared to have started in an upstairs paint room today destroyed the top storey of the Columbia Furniture Co. in the Mount Pleasant district and caused considerable damage to the ground floor. Damage is estimated at \$20,000.

#### SIMPLIFIED TAX FORMS

OTTAWA—The Revenue Department today introduced to Canadians a new and simplified income tax form which it is said will be used by 3,000,000 of 3,500,000 individual tax payers who file 1948 returns. The new form is a pocket-size folder and will be known as "T1 Short Form."

#### UNEMPLOYMENT PROBLEM

VANCOUVER—Attraction of British Columbia's mild weather for prairie and Eastern Canada's jobless is becoming a problem for welfare authorities here. They have established a clearing house to feed and house transients who hitch-hike, ride the roads. Welfare officials are giving beds to 200 each night and meals to many more. In November British Columbia had 20,000 jobless.

#### CITY VOTERS MOVE TOWARD POLLS TODAY

##### MORNING VOTE LIGHT

Voting this morning was slow at the civic polling station, little more than half the number having cast ballots than did so during the forenoon of last year's election day. At 11:30, 150 ballots had been cast, compared with 256 for the same period in the 1947 elections.

Prince Rupert voters are making their annual trip to the polls today to select for the coming year five aldermen, three school trustees and to express their opinions on three matters of public interest in plebiscites.

#### ZERO WEATHER IS GENERAL

Below zero weather has been general for days up north, according to the reports. Chief of the cold weather points is Snag in Yukon, where thermometer has hovered around 69 and 70.

Mayo has gone 64, while Dawson had 38. Saskatoon with 30 below has been the coldest prairie point. Edmonton registered below zero. The cold wave, joining forces with the winds off Muir Glacier made regions around Juneau and Skagway icy enough. Away below zero was felt practically everywhere.

Prince Rupert's lowest temperature reading overnight was 22 above at 7 a.m.

#### Step Held Necessary To Protect Air Lift Planes

BERLIN (CP)—French forces today blew up the towers of the Soviet-controlled Radio Berlin, knocking the station off the air. The Russians, however, have another tower outlet, Germany's old Deutschland sender, 20 miles east of the city.

Brigadier-General Jean Ganeval, French military commander of Berlin, said that two towers had been demolished by the French forces. The station was not on the air at the time.

#### WOULD KEEP ROAD OPEN

Special Effort to be Made to Maintain Winter Access as Far as Tye

Special efforts will be made by the provincial department of public works to keep the highway open throughout the winter from Prince Rupert as far east as Tye, it is announced at the office of the provincial department of public works. Earlier in the week the road had been officially announced as being closed for the winter beyond Galloway Rapids. Whether or not it will be possible to keep it open to Tye will, of course, depend upon weather and equipment factors.

#### OLEO IS NOW UP TO PROVINCES

No Opposition Being Expressed to Manufacture in B. C. So Far

OTTAWA, (CP)—Canada's provinces are today pondering whether to take steps affecting the manufacture and sale of oleomargarine within their own borders.

It is now legal to make and sell margarine in Canada and, unless individual provinces move to bar the butter substitute, it is expected to go on sale early next month.

A man who was brought back from Vancouver yesterday to answer to charges here was found guilty in city police court this morning of theft and of failure to pay a board bill. Sentence was reserved by Magistrate W. D. Vance.

#### IS DISABLED IN ATLANTIC

Fishing Vessel Marjorie Parker in Trouble Off Cape Sable

HALIFAX, (CP)—The Royal Canadian Air Force today reported the 80-foot fishing vessel Marjorie Parker "disabled with engine trouble" 35 miles west of Cape Sable but not in danger. The Air Force said that a tug would be sent to tow the ship here.

#### DERAILMENT ON ALBERTA LINE

EDMONTON—Main line traffic on the Canadian National Railways was interrupted yesterday by the derailment of fifteen loaded coal cars 157 miles west of here. Passengers were transferred around the derailment.

#### CLARES INNOCENCE

Guilty Plea in Case of Hiss, Charged Espionage

NEW YORK, (CP)—Alger Hiss pleaded innocent today to a federal jury's charge that he had been denied giving secret government papers to the ex-Communist agent, Whittaker Chambers.

Indictment against Hiss returned last night as a child and 18-month jury probe charged communist espionage. Trial 24 has been set as the date for the trial of former high-ranking policy maker in the Department of State.

#### NO SUBSIDY FOR SHIPS

Australian Government Unable to Give Assistance to Matson Line

CANBERRA, (CP)—The government has refused dollar subsidy to American shipping interests to re-start a trans-Pacific shipping service, it was learned today.

Mattson Navigation Co. of San Francisco, owners of the only passenger ships between Australia and the United States, recently told the Australian government that they were considering re-opening trans-Pacific service.

A high Australian government source said the government had told the company officials it could not give a dollar subsidy to help the government recoup its losses.

## Chiang's Position Is Getting Worse

### Post Office Staff in Midst Hectic Christmas Rush

Augmented staff at Prince Rupert's post offices is in the midst of a pre-Christmas mail which will keep 28 workers busy from now until Christmas. Literally thousands of parcels and parcels are speeded in and out of the post offices across the country.

Wednesday saw the first line-up at the downtown office wicket while behind counters, more than a score clerks, permanent and temporary, sorted letters and parcels.

According to Assistant Postmaster Russell S. Smith, the volume of Christmas mail is approaching its peak. Many city residents are mailing vast amounts of outgoing parcels and parcels and at the same time, huge amounts of incoming mail are being dumped in trains and boats.

Last week, the outgoing volume was greatest and the volume fairly normal," he said. "This week, it will be just the opposite. Most local mailing will be done and we will have to deal with a flood of incoming mail. This week, however, are getting it from both directions."

#### Communists Pouring Into Ancient City of Peiping

PEIPING (CP)—The communists swarmed over the suburbs of Peiping today, rolling toward the thick arched gates of this ancient city's temples.

The advance of the Red troops was reported several thousand yards inside Peiping's northwestern gate.

Nearby points fell and the communists took over Yenching and Tsinghua universities, apparently without much opposition.

The communists have isolated Peiping by cutting all railroads leading into the city.

The nationalists have virtually abandoned two airfields and there are unconfirmed reports that the government has lost Tangku, a port of Tientsin, 30 miles east and the only supply port for North China.

NEW YORK, (CP)—The famous Harmsworth race, international speedboat competition, will probably be staged next year for the first time in 16 years. Canada has filed a challenge for the trophy which was won repeatedly by Gar Wood of Detroit in years preceding the last race in 1933.

## Prosperous Christmas

THAT NO ONE in Prince Rupert will lack the customary Christmas joys appears to be a foregone conclusion. There have been lean seasons—notably during the thirties—but even then there was efficient organization and situations as they developed were well handled. Numerous complaints, of course, are heard today about high costs but, if this did not exist, there would be other reasons for lamentation. The summer has been busy and, on the whole, Prince Rupert has been and remains prosperous, even allowing for seasonal decline.

## CONSISTENT INTEREST

WHILE THE DEVELOPMENT of a live interest in the civic election is to be welcomed, after it had been thought there was more indifference than concern, it does not end there. It is all very well to give attention to the city's welfare and study problem when a change in city hall leadership is taking place. But, too often has public watchfulness languished, if not all but disappeared for another year, once the votes are counted. How affairs are being handled is the business of every citizen, not for a few weeks but for every month in the twelve.

## NOT TOO NAIVE

THE NEWLY ELECTED chief executive of Vancouver, Charles Thompson, did not know much about city government up to the time he first ran for a seat on the council. This was not so long ago. But once there, his first care was to discover how much he was unfamiliar with and there was plenty. Thereafter, his questions—some almost naive—were numerous. But he kept on, finally making himself an authority on anything he should know as an alderman in a city like Vancouver. He was well informed, and this helped him score a notable victory in the recent civic election.

Holding office, equipped with partial or superficial knowledge, is taking risks. It is worse to pretend, unless this lack of what should be known is promptly corrected. Sometime the ignorance is exposed and that cannot but weaken whatever respect and confidence may have existed.

## THINKS WAR UNLIKELY

"SURELY ANY AGGRESSOR, no matter how powerful, would think several times before taking any action which was likely to cause war with a coalition of over 250,000,000 people controlling a very high proportion of the industrial capacity of the whole world."

So spoke Hume Wrong, the Canadian ambassador to the United States, recently addressing a regional conference of the Lions Club at Statesville, North Carolina. He was making reference to the Atlantic Security Alliance. He managed to say a great deal in a few words.

## SANTA CLAUS — TOWN

HOW THE UNITED STATES came to have a town called Santa Claus does not appear to be common knowledge yet there is such a community and it has been on the map for many years.

Santa Claus is in a northeastern state. It is much like many of the thousands of other small but prosperous and progressive cities between the Mississippi and the Atlantic coast.

Annually, Santa Claus has a wonderful post office rush. It need hardly be said that nearly every youngster out of a population of 146,000,000 makes it a point to write to his very special old friend, who is stout, with white whiskers.

## OLEOMARGARINE

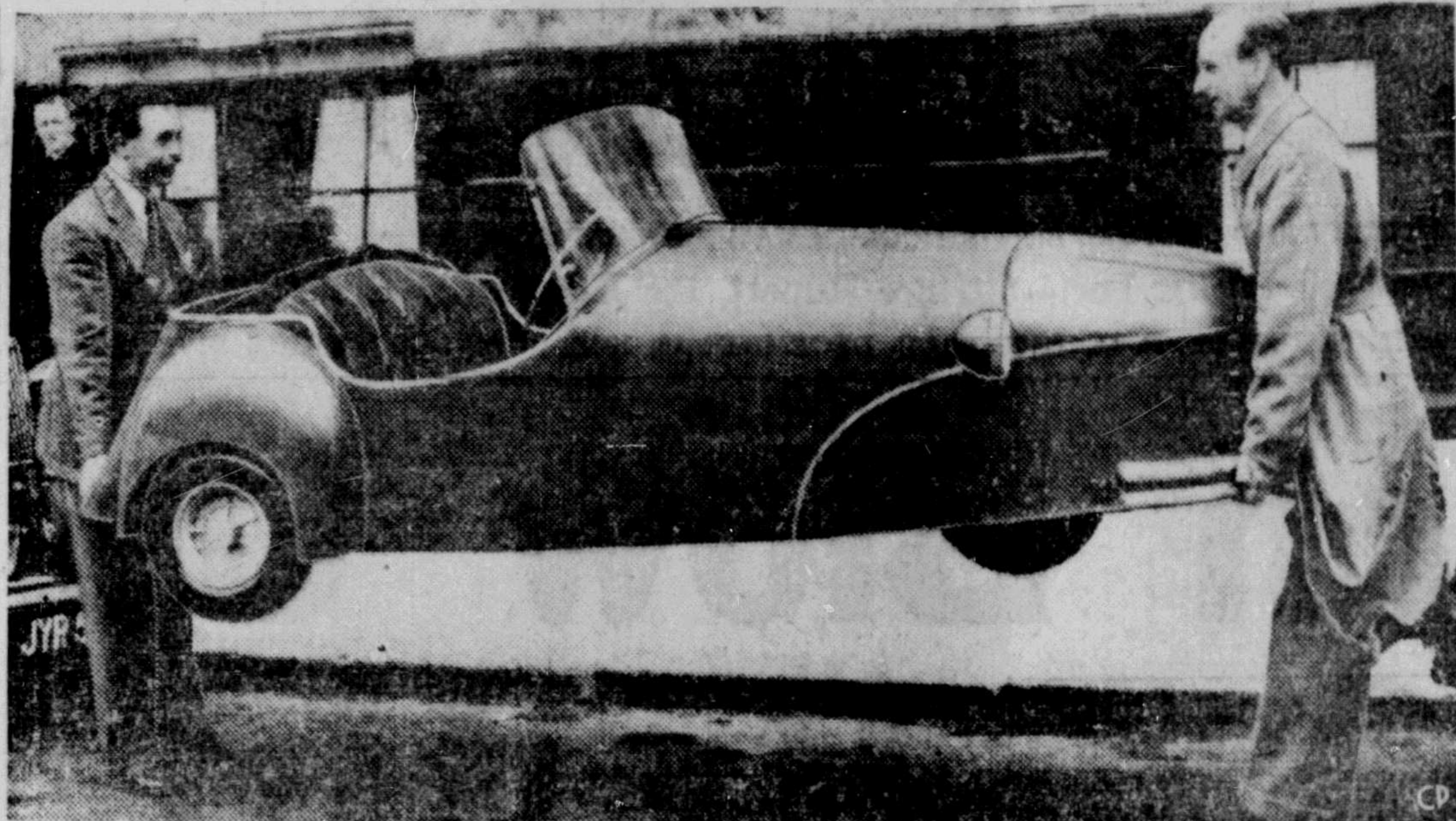
THE DECISION of the Supreme Court of Canada finding it ultra vires of Dominion Parliament to ban the manufacture and sale of oleomargarine and butter substitutes in Canada will be popular with the majority of the people, we think. Indeed, it has been these 62 years an anomalous situation where a good food product should be denied a market. It certainly has seemed to be a violation of the principles of free trade if not those of democracy itself. We can think of many, many things that the government might have banned with more benefit to the people.

The lifting of this unnatural and unjustified ban, we believe, is long overdue. Now that it has been effected, however, it is to be hoped there will be no further interference. The agriculture and dairy industry may feel some alarm at the outset but we venture to suggest that, even with margarine, things will level off with not too much damage to anyone.

Lo, a New Year is at hand. Let all continue to press on toward the time when the wicked shall cease from troubling and the weary are at rest. And many shall find, as time deepens, which side their bread is oleomargarined on.

The newest spy scare is the alleged finding of secret U. S. documents hidden in a hollow pumpkin. Isn't it a little late for Hallowe'en?

T. D. Pattullo, in a letter to the local press, was the first to introduce the idea of a telephone system for Prince Rupert, and, if ever a town needed

something like that, it was here. The convenience was in reality an absolute necessity. And it made one feel a shade consequential to talk over the phone instead of struggling across miles of muskeg and slippery plank walks to find the party whose ear (shell like or otherwise) you wished to have.

Back in 1912 local police court cases reflected a lusty community. A pioneer paper ran a front page, scare-head story, with juicy comment and black-face "sticks" all over the shop. A man had admitted having paid a police sergeant for protection—to keep him posted on spotters and new policemen. Oh, the tale was readable. Magistrate Carrs had questions about illicit liquor sales and gambling. And who owns that gun? The Chief knew. He had taken it from the accused. Prince Rupert might have been wet in 1912, but was never dull. "My learned friend," began the sergeant, to counsel for defence. "Don't call me your learned friend," remarked the lawyer.

To be sure, one can break the law while penniless, as well as while enjoying a happier state of existence. It's often done. In 1947, local police court fines here totalled \$10,461. So far this year, fires come to \$21,427. A happier state of existence? Perhaps! Manifold arrests and prosecutions more or less suggest an enhanced circulation of cash. A tough world! No whiskey, no intoxication! No money! No

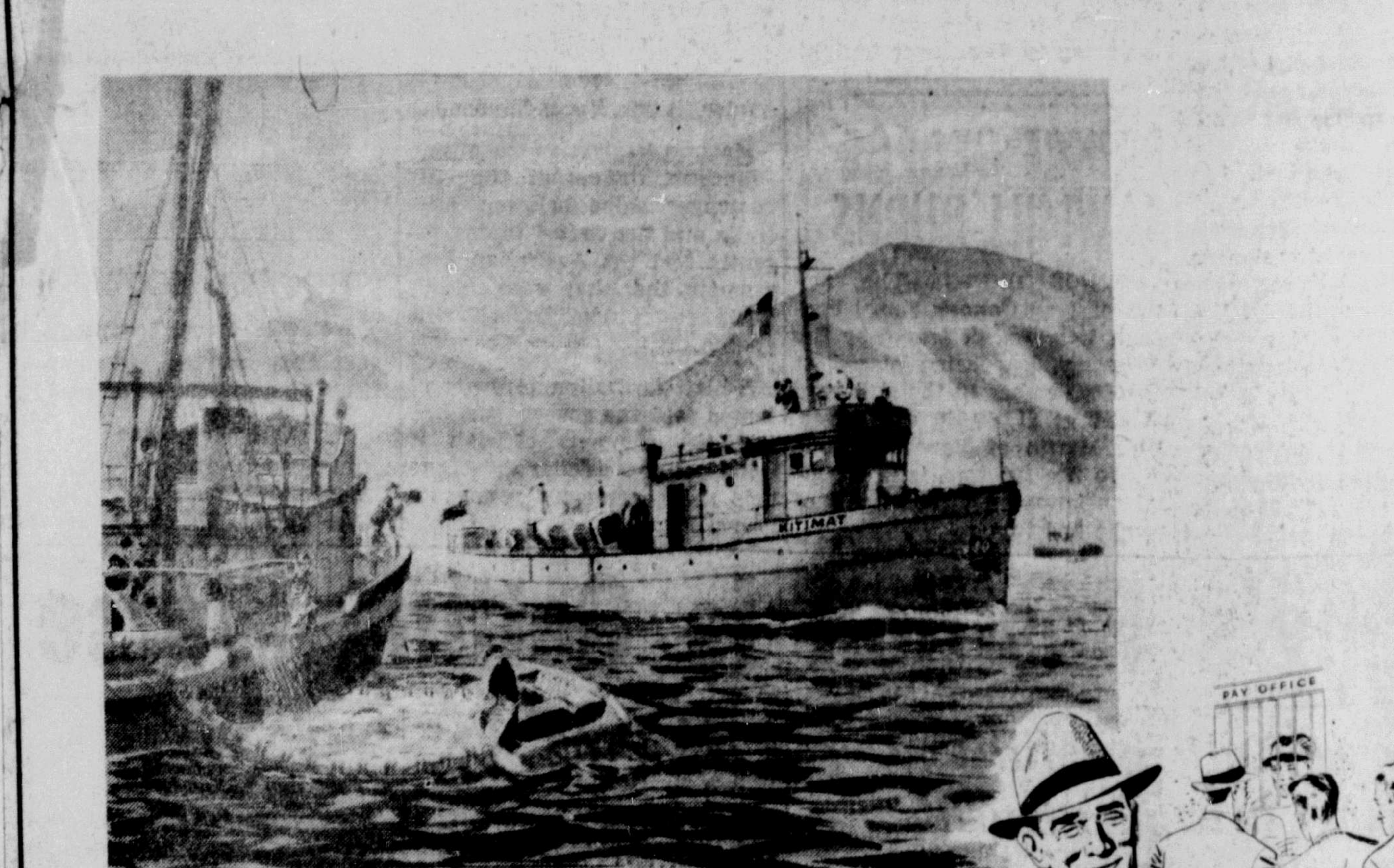

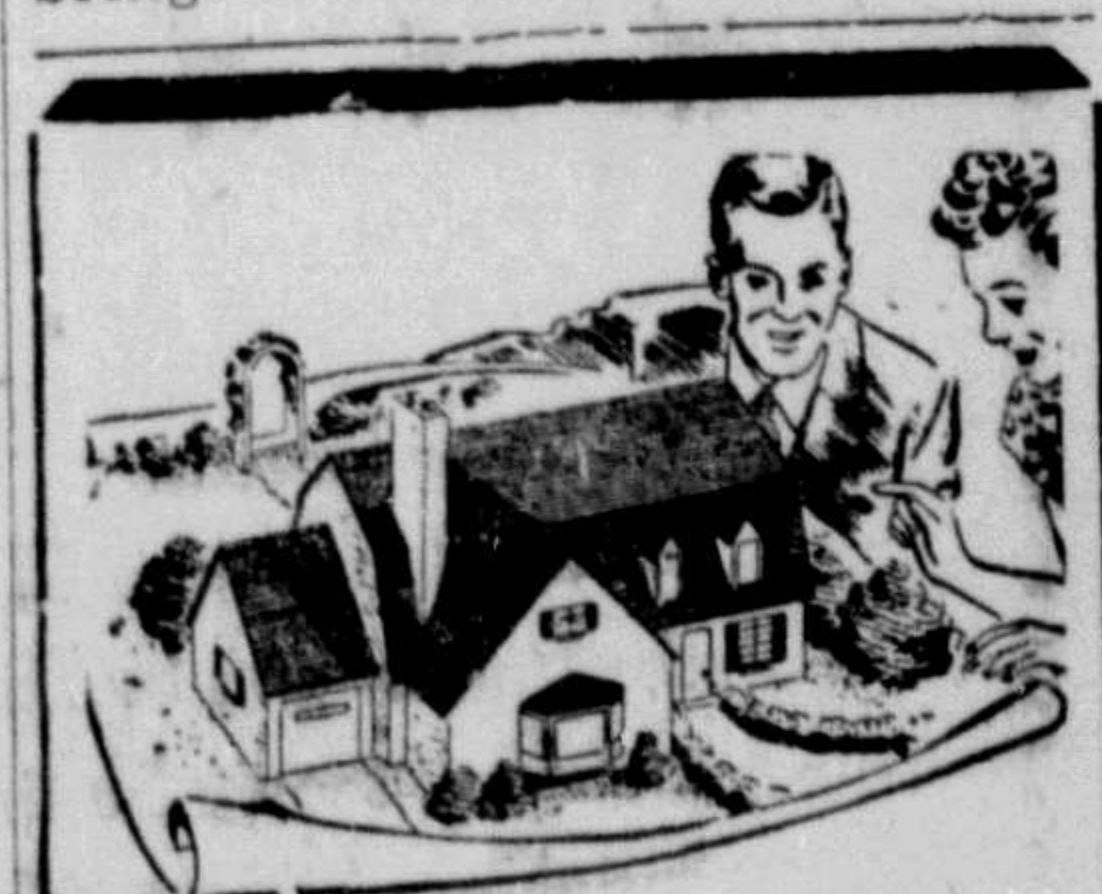

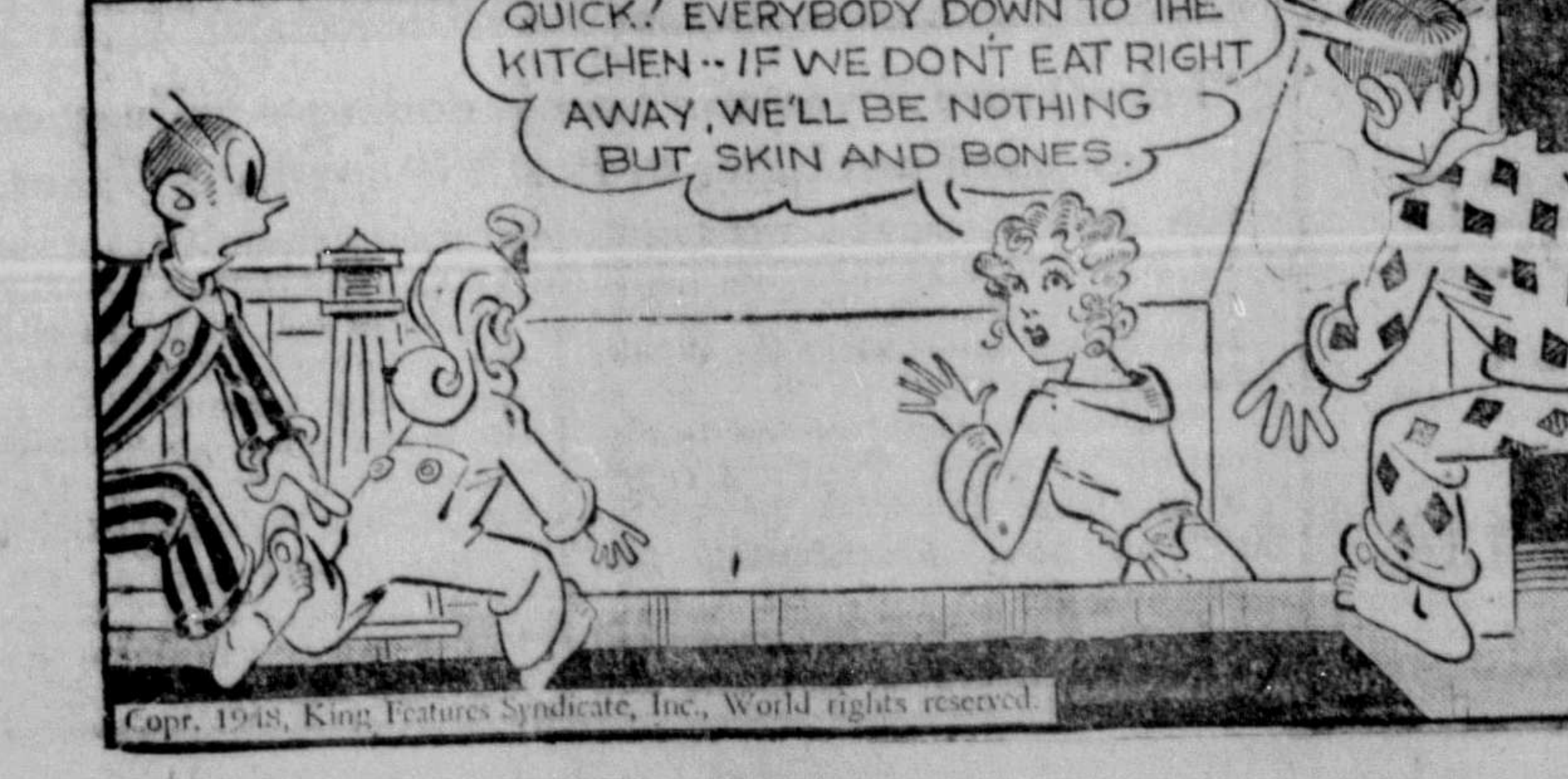

Roll in finely chopped nuts. Put on greased baking pan, press a hollow in the centre of each. Bake in slow oven five minutes. Remove and press centres again. Return for 15 minutes. While still warm fill centre with jam or jelly.

**CANADA MINING IS UNTOUCHED**

Not Only 'Unscratched But Hardly Walked Over, Says Railway Official

MONTREAL—As a mineral-bearing country Canada is hardly in the initial stage of development. M. W. Maxwell, chief of development, Canadian National Railways, told the Phi Epsilon Alpha Society of McGill University during a talk on "The Physical Background of Canada's Economy."

"The rather tiresome cliché that Canada's mineral areas have not yet been scratched is an understatement," Mr. Maxwell said. Adding: "The fact is that much of her mineral-bearing country hasn't even been walked over, let alone scratched."

The speaker told the McGill Engineering Society that Canada's great natural wealth, mining, agriculture and fishing, hinged to a large extent on such factors as geography, climate and transportation.

In the latter respect, Mr. Maxwell said: "I think it will be the case in the days to come, as in the past. You will find the Canadian railways still leading the way in development of the country by furnishing the lowest cost rail transportation offered any country in the world. As an example, this week, almost unnoticed by the general public, the Canadian National Railways is opening a newly-completed branch line extending 50 miles north in the Bell River Valley into the hinterland of northern Quebec."

He said this new line was built primarily to open up a new section of the clay belt for agricultural settlement and to

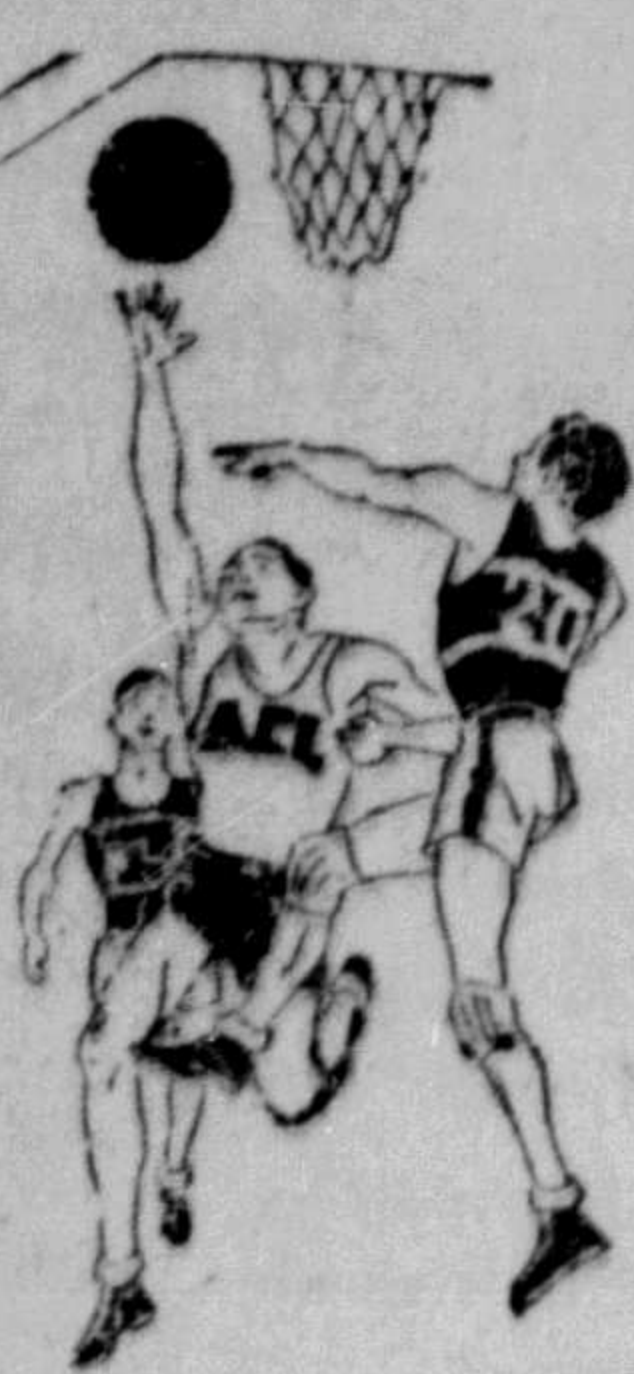
