THE DECISION of the twelve Atlantic Treaty States to create a single integrated defence force for Western Europe is important and without precedent...

The force to be created is not, one must stress, a "European Army" in the sense of the resolution passed in August by the Assembly of the Council of Europe...

That, for two reasons, the new force will not be entirely "European" since it will include U.S.A., and possibly Canadian, contingents...

This is a hard-headed, practical proposition based on the inescapable conclusion that it is sensible to do in preparations of peace time what would have to be done in operations of war time...

The details as always will be troublesome to work out, but the principle is decided. It is simply the application to peace time planning of methods which experience has shown to be essential for the conduct of war...

The result will be a great increase in the preparedness of the Western world to deal with any attempt to invade Western Europe, and not merely an increase but a visible increase...

As I See It

Price Runaround

I OVERHEARD some housewives talking the otherday about a threatened rise in the price of milk. One mother, who has strapping teen age boys in her house...

What amazes me about this crazy age in which we live is that the managers of our economy are undoing with one hand what they do with the other.

I SEE THAT OUR government again owns 23 1/2 million pounds of butter which it has bought in ORDER TO KEEP PRICES FROM FALLING.

Canada is a mere piker compared with the U.S.A. The latest official U.S. figure shows that butter in cold storage on September first was the highest in history—no less than 237 million pounds...

TAKE COFFEE, which is now selling for \$1 to \$1.05 per pound. Prices of coffee have more than doubled in Brazil and other great producing countries since June 1949.

But the hidden joker in this glib explanation is that coffee producing countries have all along been interfering with this so-called "law" of supply and demand.

At this very moment Brazil has in storage six million bags of "surplus" coffee. Even in the depths of the great depression of the 1930's, Brazil never had more than 16 million bags of this so called "exportable surplus" coffee.

IN THE 1930's Brazil burned vast stocks of coffee or dumped them in the ocean. In North America we ploughed under cotton, cremated vast numbers of young pigs, and destroyed

all sorts of food. We paid farmers not to produce.

We don't do anything so visibly crude today. But our governments directly or indirectly get the same result in a slicker, more hypocritical way.

They set up "price support programs" which take vast surpluses off the regular market. Thus on the one hand we have millions of people who live in the cities unable to buy the basic necessities of life...

We have the farmers, who produce those foods etc., unable to buy city made products because of the rising prices.

UNDER ANY KIND of sane economic system the farmer would be guaranteed and paid a fair price for all he produced. He would never suffer disaster because God had given him too big a crop.

But no sane government would ever permit the foods for which the farmer was fairly, fully paid to rot in warehouses or caves—or to lie unharvested!

They would sell them at any price, or even GIVE them to the people if necessary to have them consumed. You can justify food subsidies to get food to human beings—but not to keep food away from them.

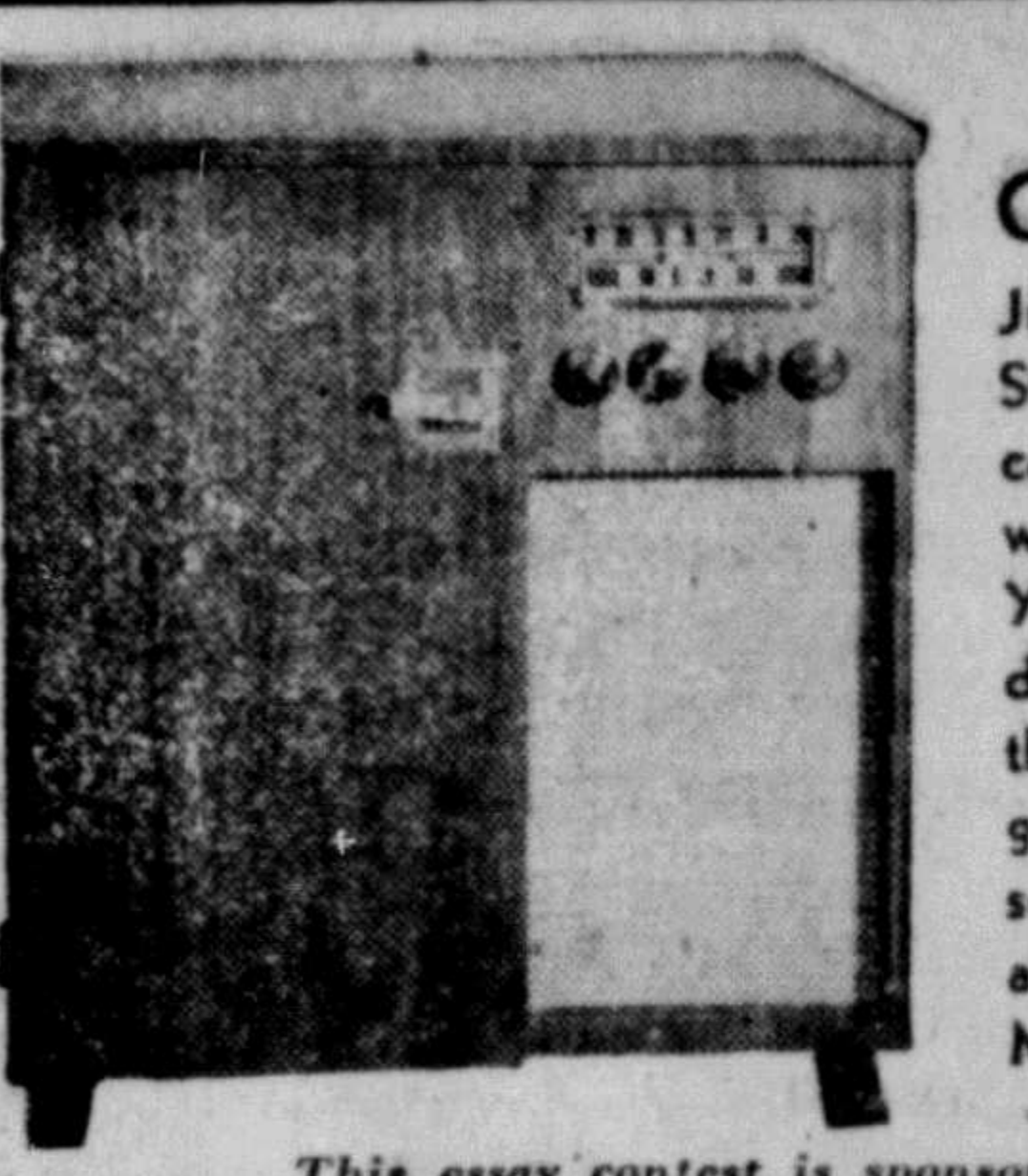
Open to the public from 1 to 3 p.m., there will be naval officers and men present to explain the displays to visitors to the drill hall.

tioned the good defect the latter had upon its patients. Then there were homes for children whose own homes had been broken up for one reason or another. There were also eventide or sunset lodges for the older people in large cities, shelters for unfortunate who, either through their own fault or through circumstances, found themselves destitute. He said there were

many of the latter who were brought back to a good life through coming to the centres. Some of them got there through drink, he said.

He told of how the first campaign was for a comparatively small amount, but that this year it was for \$1,500,000.



So, all in all, it is just as well that applicants be kindly, yet fully warned and informed. Those whose lifespan shortens, should, while there is time, be shielded from the dangers which lurk, even in an orchard.

Three Canadian destroyer sailed for Tokyo when the war in Korea was little more than a few weeks old, and the same may be said of the R.C.A.F. co-operation. You can't get an army together in a country the size of Canada, overnight. There was unseemly delay in doing it, with the result that today there is a land force practically ready to go anywhere. This is written, not as a space-filler but as a reminder.

Instalment buying in Canada, is more general today than ever before, says a government report. It is equally true that Canadians are taking longer to pay up, and the suggestion is made that a growing scope of credit purchasing be restricted. All this may have something to do with living costs, and the well known spiral nightmare. Anyway, if you do without plenty of things not necessary, you also do without plenty of bills and worries.

Kerr) that it had not been the intention of the department to leave the Copper City Highway as it is, but, due to the pressure of other work, they had not been able to complete the job. Work had ceased on the Prince Rupert Highway as this work could be done after the frost comes and there were several other jobs needing completion. Mr. Kerr stated that there was nothing further on the straightening of the rock cut approaching the Skeena Bridge and the Board decided to wire the department of Public Works urging that this work be done immediately.

It was decided to write to the Minister of Public Works asking if a survey had been made for the proposed road north of the Skeena River to Usk. It was stated that the cost of operating the Usk ferry for three years would put in the road from Terrace to that point. Such a road was necessary and would open up the north bank of the river. This matter would be of interest to the Indian Department as the Kitseas Reserve covers part of that area.

Highway and parking signs were again discussed and a statement was made that such signs are being taken up with the Department by the Attorney-General so there should be some action soon.

The town's utilities are in fairly good shape. Electrical power is good. Applicants for water are coming in faster than they can be serviced. However, there was one grievance—with regard to the local telephone system. There is a lot of work to be done here and there is no maintenance man available for the job. The Terrace maintenance man has a large territory and has been in Prince Rupert for one month and will be away that much longer. Therefore, it was felt that the district should not be without a maintenance man and the Board decided to write D. C. Schubert, requesting that this matter be remedied immediately.

A letter from Miller Lake, Ontario, inquiring about "raw" land between here and Prince Rupert suitable for farming was handed to the Agricultural committee for action.

It being the quarterly meeting, refreshments were served at the close of the business session following which C. J.
