LAKE SUCCESS (P-Protests 20,756 American from the Soviet Union and Nationalist China notwithstanding, 2,660 killed, 13,953 wound the United Nations Assembly's 4,134 missing. steering committee Thursday recommended a full airing of the question of Formosa, last bastion of the Nationalist leader, Chiang Kai-Shek.

The 14-member committee voted 10 to 3 for an American proposal to give the issue right-ofway in the Assembly.

In addition to Russia and China-strange partners-Communist Czechoslovakia also voted against the proposal.

Desperately Scraping Last Forces Together

TOKYO (CP)— South knock-downs. Almond weighed Korean Third Division troops stabbed another 20 miles up the east coast of North Korea today. They are now only 32 miles from the big Red industrial centre of Wonsan, where the Communists, staggered by great losses, are expected to make a

By nightfall, the swift moving South Korean force was approaching Tongchon, 75 miles inside North Korea, against virtually no Communist resistance. Fleeing Communists abandoned 11 artillery pieces—six 70 mm guns, four 45 mm guns and one 122 mm gun to the advancing

Third Division. The Communists were desper ately scraping together the rem nants of their shattered divisions—their losses have been placed by the Allies at a total 200,000 from all causes—against the possibility of a full United Nations invasion across the 38th

# TO THOUGH

United Nations Assembly Authorizes Occupation Of North Korea

NEW YORK ()-The United Nations general assembly today rejected a last minute Soviet attempt to get North Korean participation in the discussion of the Korean case. Then the assembly quickly moved toward final ratification of the eight power resolution authorizing General MacArthur to occupy North Korea.

By a vote of six in favor, 41 against and six abstentions, the assembly rejected Soviet Deputy Foreign Minister Jacob Malik's request that both North and South Korea be invited to appear before the United Nations &: equal parties to the dispute.

Malik opened the Soviet bloc s final attack on the eight nation resolution for unifying, pacifying and rehabilitating all Korea under U.N. auspices.

The defeat of the Russian last gasp fight was a foregone conclusion.
