### New Regional C. N. Police Head

WINNIPEG—Appointment of Charles R. Waterman, as superintendent of investigation for the Western Region, is announced by George A. Shea, of Montreal, Director of Investigation for the Canadian National system. Mr. Waterman succeeds J. B. Scott, who has retired on pension after 40 years of railway life.

A native of St. Thomas, Ont., Mr. Waterman started his railway career as a clerk in the motive power department, St. Thomas in 1915 and joined the investigation department in 1920. He served in several capacities in Toronto and London, being appointed inspector of investigation at the latter city in 1947, a position he held until his recent promotion. Mr. Waterman will make his headquarters in Winnipeg.

### Highest Tribunal Rules Rate Boost Was Too Low

OTTAWA, (CP)—An injustice was done the rail-ways in the September 20 freight rate decision of the Board of Transport Commissioners, the Supreme Court of Canada ruled today. The court ruled that the board had failed to perform its duty in its September award of an eight percent freight rate increase to the rail-

ways.

The high court gave this opin-

ion in handing down judgment

on an appeal entered by the Can-

adian Pacific Railway from a

Board decision which had dealt

with only part of the railway's

application for a general 20 per-

cent increase.

The court ruling does not

automatically upset the Board

award but it undoubtedly will

result in a review of the decision

by the board.

## Pioneers' Satisfaction

MANY of those who settled in Prince Rupert as adults prior to 1910 were comparatively young, yet old enough to be well beyond seventy if surviving today. For, after maturity, forty years is a large part of a lifetime.

Yet to think of the past, to live over again many a colorful occasion and to compare the swift growth of today with the stress and efforts of long ago, need bring no repining. It was a lusty, cheery, optimistic era. Often one hears the remark they came "about fifty years too soon." Well, what of it? Adventurous, confident and sturdy, it was not for them to linger somewhere else and from a safe distance contemplate the rolling back of an unpeopled frontier? Few ever thought of "security" which comes first in everyone's calculations today. Instead, they welcomed another opportunity — another chance at fortune in the development of a vast land. They had their dreams and it is a pleasure to know that many have lived long enough to see the commencement of what was once fond visions, turning at last to reality.

The indications today are unmistakable. A city to rank with the major ports of the Pacific is destined to rise here. How soon it is given no one to tell.

The men and women who spent their best days here enjoyed a privilege, and are entitled to feel a satisfaction and possibly a measure of pride to reflect that in a prominent or obscure degree, they at least shared in Prince Rupert's founding.

## NOW FOR SPRING

SHOULD January or February or both months turn cold, or produce snow, the winter will still be short so far as Prince Rupert is concerned. To date, while frost and ice have appeared there has been at no time great severity. Snowfalls have been brief and of small consequence. The end of the year is little more than a week away. Once past January the lengthening days will be more in evidence as spring advances.

East of the Rockies midwinter prevails and as such, is recognized. There is no getting away from that stubborn fact. But on the coast there is a happy difference. If, by New Year, weather remains reasonably kindly, even though at times a shade rough, there is usually no question as to doubt or uncertainty. The time is not so distant when it may be advisable to consider gardening.

### CELIBACY AND DECADENCE

The white man's child differs but little from the black baby. Their manners, their voices, their ready laughter and tears are all of a kind. What, then, can prevent young America and Europe from growing into the infantile senility of Africa with her six thousand years and more of bootless literary, artistic and religious culture, or of Haiti Porto Rico, or Harlem, the equally slummy young offspring of Africa's senility?

The religious and social institutions that have spread from Egypt into Europe and America are perhaps the real key to Africa's darkness and our own threatening decadence, for these institutions penalize questioning intelligence, and tend to reserve higher education to the hierarchy and the nobles or the privileged few who are forbidden to become many, while the unprivileged many are forbidden to become wise. But the many, by the inexorable force of propinquity and extended time, eventually find their way into the secret chambers, the harems, and the cradles of their masters until those that were last become both first and last by default, and those that were first become mummies, or mere names, or forgotten memories. The privileged few cannot preserve their privilege by military force or frightfulness, lynching for instance, or burning of witches and heretics. Such customs have endured in Africa to this day but have not made Africa into a paradise of intellectual culture and refinement nor a nursery of highly bred nobility.

Perhaps the rational way to intellectual culture and racial betterment would be to encourage all intellectual talent and energy, regardless of race or birth, and invest some effort, treasure, and risk in the physiological preservation and propagation of cerebral aptitude. But there is a broad rocky core of fact and experience that tends to crush any hopes of such practical salvation for the race. Italy, by the insane but persistent practice of consecrated celibacy, has sunk from first place to a somewhat dubious fifth or sixth, although her unprivileged masses have been prolific enough. That same Italian practice of professional childlessness is gaining many imitators in the United States of America, while at the same time America's former slaves are extremely busy propagating their own version of democratic humanity. The same dual tendencies are broadly visible in Canada. Much of Canada's best pioneer blood, for instance the Jesuit missionaries, were condemned to childlessness or miscegenation. The early H.B.C. factors and the early R. N. W. M.P. likewise brought no wives to Canada with them. Great honor is due to the pioneer wives of many Protestant missionaries but they were almost too isolated to found lasting families of their own kind.

The Hildebrandian political device of childlessness for the elite, a device imported here, has spread even faster than religion. Within the past year a daily paper editorialized that

## Seasonable Ideas for Housekeepers

### CHEESE

The story of cheese through the ages begins as an interesting fable and becomes a factual report in a vital food product.

Canada produces every year over a hundred million pounds of cheese, but eats only a small part of it. The larger amount is exported... chiefly to Britain where it has a very high standing and brings a premium over other cheeses of similar type.

Cheddar cheese may be white or yellow and mild or tangy to suit the purpose or individual taste. There is an almost endless variety of dishes to be made with this type of cheese.

Home economists say that the piece of cheese eaten after a peppy meal often has to take the blame for other dietary indiscretions. Cheese is easily digested if used with cereals, eggs or vegetables to make the main part of the meal and if it is properly cooked. High temperatures toughen protein and make the cheese stringy, unattractive and less easily digested.

There are many other types of cheeses made in Canada to tempt the gourmet but for the average taste, Canadian cheddar cheese is "tops."

The homemaker who buys Cheddar cheese gets full value for her money she does not pay for waste as she does with many other foods.

The culinary possibilities of cheese are endless and permit great variety of dishes. Here are a few choice ones. Medium Cheddar cheese is used in all recipes.

**Cheese Muffins**  
1 1/4 cups sifted all-purpose flour  
3 teaspoons baking powder.  
1/2 teaspoon salt.  
2-3 cup grated cheese.  
1 egg.  
1 cup milk or tomato juice.  
2 tablespoons shortening, melted.  
Mix and sift flour, baking powder and salt. Add cheese. Beat egg, add milk. Make a depression in flour mixture, pour in egg and milk mixture, then add melted shortening. Stir only enough to combine. Fill greased muffin tins two-thirds full. Sprinkle with additional grated cheese. Bake in a hot oven, 400 deg.F., 20 to 25 minutes.

**Yield: 1 dozen medium muffins**  
**Macaroni and Cheese**  
2 cups macaroni, cut in 1 inch pieces.  
1 1/2 cups grated cheese.  
Salt, pepper and paprika.  
1 cup milk.  
3 strips bacon, cut in small pieces.

Cook macaroni in boiling, salted water until just tender, about 10 minutes. Drain. Place alternate layers of macaroni and cheese in a greased baking dish, finishing with cheese. Season each layer of macaroni with salt, pepper and paprika. Add sufficient milk until it can be seen through the top layer of macaroni, about one cup. Sprinkle bacon over top. Bake in a moderate oven 350 deg.F., or 30 minutes.

**Yield: six servings.**  
**Cheese Soup**  
4 cups milk.  
2 or 3 slices onion.  
2 tablespoons butter.  
2 tablespoons flour.  
1 teaspoon salt.  
1-2 teaspoon pepper.  
2 egg yolks.  
3/4 cup grated cheese.

Scald milk with onion. Remove onion. Melt butter in top of double boiler, blend in flour, add hot milk and seasonings, stirring constantly until mixture thickens. Cook five minutes. Add a little of the hot mixture to the beaten egg yolks then add to remaining hot mixture. Cook one minute and add grated cheese. Beat with rotary egg beater and serve at once.

**Yield: six servings.**  
Note: Egg yolks may be omitted but they make a richer and more delicious soup.

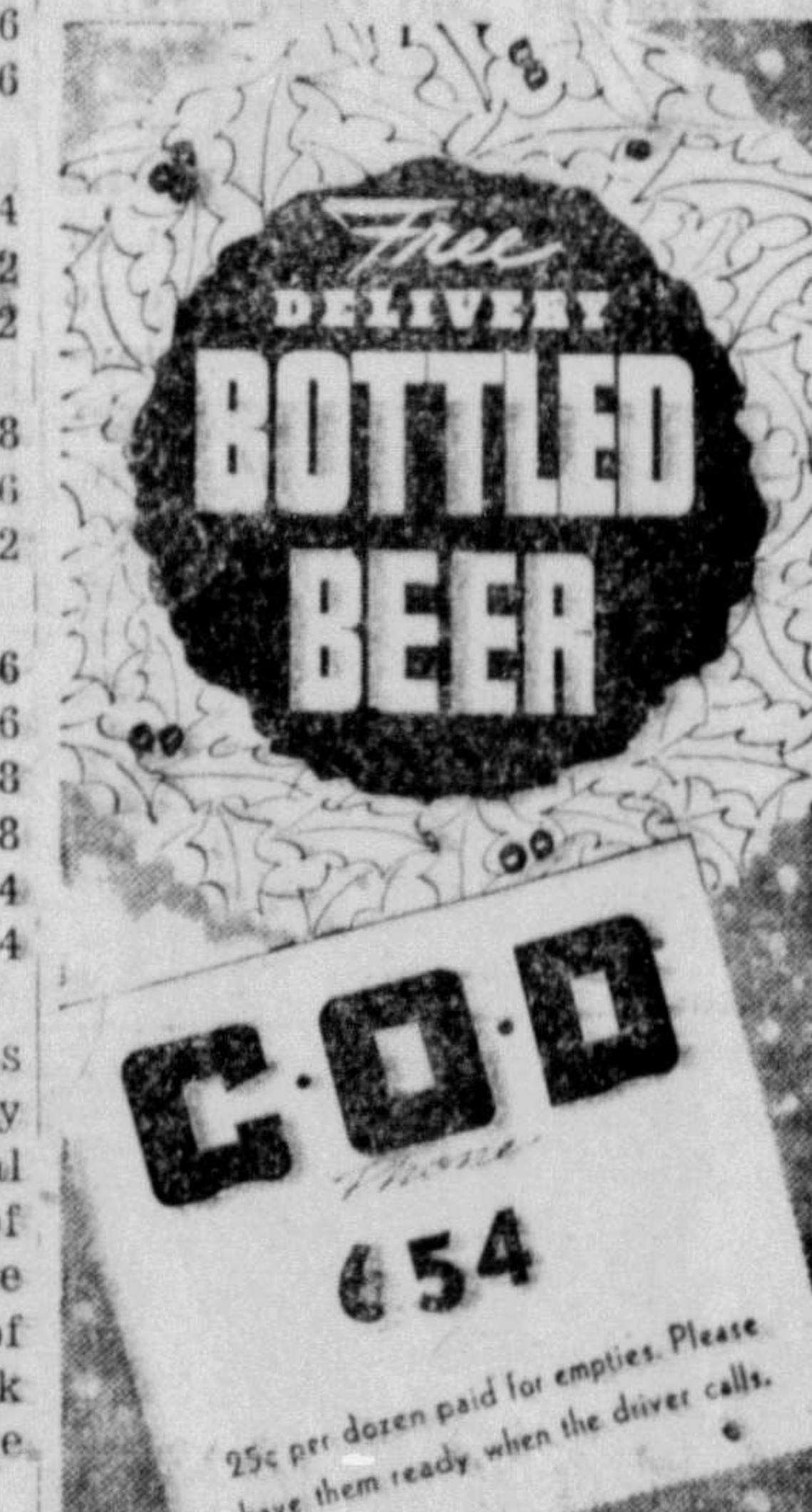

"Whereas the revenue derived from the three per cent sales tax in B.C. is now divided between the Social Security and Old Age Pension Fund and the organized municipal governments of the province. One third of all such money is now paid over to the municipal governments collected on a per capita basis, the remaining two thirds being used to meet social security and old age pension costs in the province.

"And whereas a movement is on foot to reduce the amount allotted to the old age and social security fund and increase the allotment to municipalities:

"Therefore be it resolved, by men and women in assembly present, that we oppose any such move and beseech the government to resist it and cast its eyes westward to the setting sun of human life. If any revision is made, let it be in the Old Age Pension Act by reducing the age qualification to 65 years and the abolition of the Means Test.

"And be it further resolved that a copy of this resolution be forwarded to J. D. McRae, L.M.A., a copy to Hon. Byron Johnson, Premier of British Columbia, a copy to the provincial Minister of Finance, Hon. Herbert Anscomb, and a copy to the Leader of the provincial Opposition, Harold Winch.
