Pleasing Tourists

TOURISTS will soon be streaming through Prince Rupert again by steamer, by train and by highway. Pleased and well impressed tourists can be effective and widespread publicity agents. Conversely, if they are dissatisfied and poorly impressed, they can spread far afield a bad name for a community. Much depends upon the people of a community itself on the impressions which are left upon such visitors.

Some tourist committee activities which might be taken up in Prince Rupert are as follows:

Work with hotel and restaurant managers, service station proprietors, merchants, and others interested to improve standards of service and accommodation.

Get the merchants to sponsor a "Courtesy Campaign" among their employees.

Plan now to run a "Beautification Campaign." Organize an information bureau to operate during the peak season. If hotel and resort accommodation is likely to be inadequate, a registry of available rooms could be set up. Compile a list of local places of interest and suggested drives and boat trips.
