HOW CAN I ???

By ANNE ASHLEY

Q. How can I make a good fruit punch?
A. By mixing one cup of pineapple juice and one and one-fourth cups of white grape juice. Add two cups of water and sweeten to taste. Then pour into a large punch bowl, add one quart of raspberry ice, and serve.

Q. How can I make sash cords last longer?
A. Before installing the new sash cords, soak them in boiled linseed oil, then allow them to dry thoroughly and they will last indefinitely.

Q. How can I clean the soiled leaves of house plants?
A. By applying equal parts of milk and warm water. Use a sponge, and rub gently to prevent breaking the leaves.

Mysterious "monsters" in a weir-pool on the upper Thames in England are thought by local anglers to be descendants of the huchen, Danubian salmon turned into the river years ago. The huchen disappeared, but sometimes an angler hooks a fish which behaves like an underwater train, smashes the strongest tackle, and escapes, leaving no clue to its identity. The way the bait is taken is different from the method of the big pike or trout—as well it may be if the monsters are huchen, which grow to 100 pounds in the Danube. Not all salmon need access to the sea, barred to up-river Thames fish by polluted lower reaches. Certain varieties have become accustomed to land-locked waters. They go up to the sources of tributary streams to spawn and return to the deep water to feed, just as river salmon migrate to the sea.

For years the hat worn by veteran British jockey "Midge" Richardson has been used as a football by other jockeys in their dressing-room on the last day of flat racing. The custom was followed at Manchester recently—but for the last time. "Midge," now 53, has ridden his last race. He hid his hat in the dressing room, as tradition demanded. It was found just before the last race of the day—and his fellow jockeys did not leave even the brim intact.

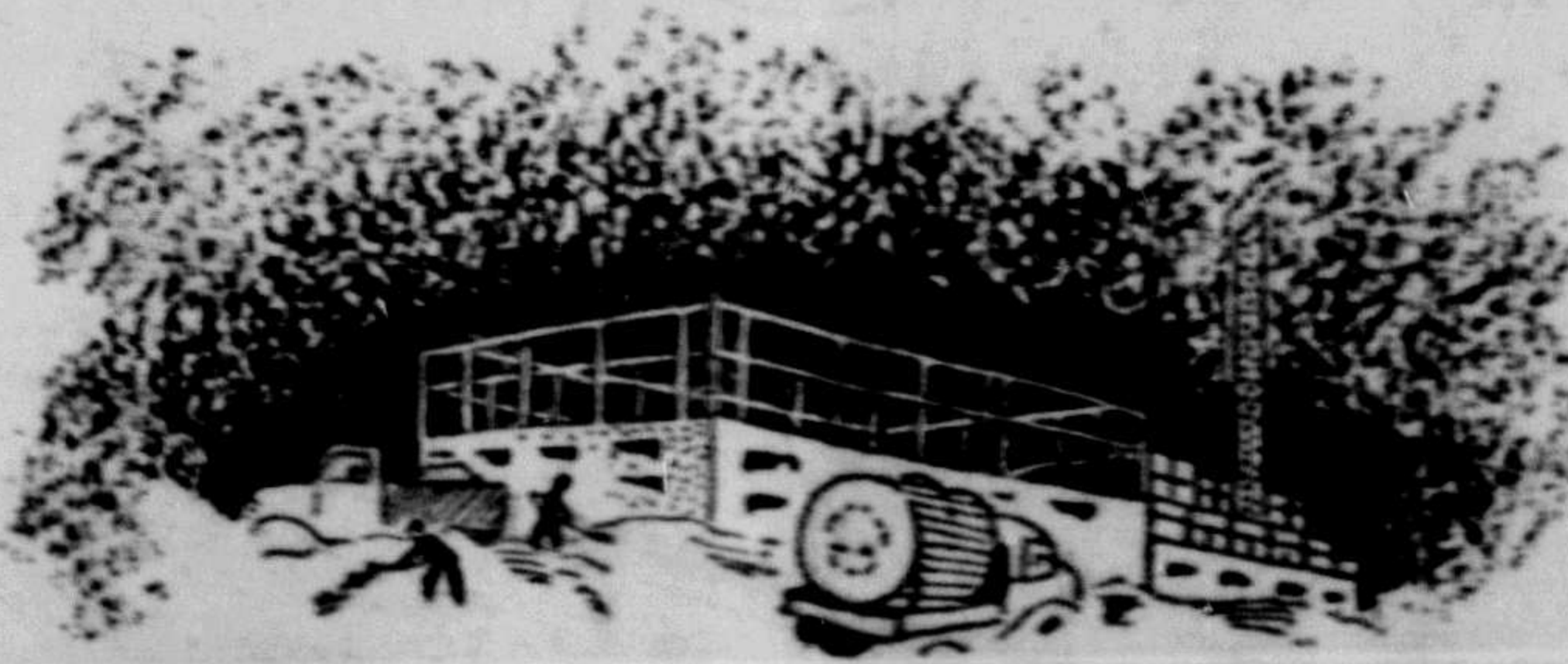

Waterfront Whiffs

Another Davis Raft Being Re-lashed—Crab Industry Pays Off—Cod Fishing Now Suspended

Half a million feet of logs, remnant of what was once a Davis raft containing more than twice that amount, are lying along the waterfront here near the government grain elevator waiting to be re-lashed into a seaworthy boom after breaking up early this week while enroute from Alaska to State of Washington ports.

The Davis raft partially disintegrated at the beginning of the week off the Portland Canal while under tow of the Seattle tug Hercules. Official surveyors who investigated the loss attributed it to poor construction of the raft. A well-built raft, they say, would have held together under the conditions encountered on the trip.

The Hercules, a Seattle Tug and Barge Co. towboat left port for the south shortly after bringing in the damaged raft.

The re-lashing job will be by Armour Savage Co. and is expected to be done within the next couple of weeks. Armour recently completed a re-lashing job on another Davis raft, one of two brought in by the Seattle tug Monarch, which suffered a mishap while seeking shelter in a Dundas Island cove.

The Hercules lost an estimated 650,000 feet of logs when the lashings loosened.

The Queen Charlotte Island crab industry paid off so well this summer that Massett fishermen are planning to go into it in a bigger way and, as a result, Alex Wylie and his son, Robert, Massett boat builders, are having a busy winter.

Recently, the Wylies, who went over to the Islands a couple of years ago from Prince Rupert, launched a fine 46-foot boat for Ray Benson of Massett and immediately laid the keel for a larger boat of their own. It will be a 52-footer, which will be used in the crab fishery. They plan to instal a 100 horsepower Caterpillar diesel engine.

The cod fishery, which has been the only form of fishing going on in the late fall, with the exception of course of some dragging, has folded up, at least for the Christmas season. Deliveries recently have been small and it is expected that they will now cease altogether. Some grey cod which has been landed is being sent to Vancouver for shipment to the American market, this type of fish having little appeal to Canadian tastes.

On her regular weekly sailing to Prince Rupert and the Islands, Union steamer Coquitlam, Capt. Alf Aspinall, docked here at 1 p.m. Friday from Vancouver. This week, she will visit Massett Inlet, returning Sunday afternoon and sailing for Vancouver Sunday night.

TRANSCANADA APPOINTMENTS

New Officials For Air Lines Are Named

MONTREAL — Appointments in the traffic department of Trans-Canada Air Lines were announced yesterday by W. Gordon Wood, general traffic manager. V. H. Fulcher becomes director of traffic procedure, R. E. Deyman is made director of passenger sales and H. Johnston becomes director of cargo sales.

Victor Henry Fulcher joined the Canadian National Railways in 1929, as assistant station agent, at Brandon, Manitoba, and after further transportation experience with the Chicago-Milwaukee Railroad, he joined Trans-Canada Air Lines traffic department when it was first organized in 1938 as secretary to the general traffic manager. In 1947 Mr. Fulcher was made general supervisor of methods, a post which he held until his new appointment as director of traffic procedure, with headquarters in Montreal.

Roy Edgar Deyman joined the Dollar Steamship Line in 1931 and in 1938 transferred to Associated British and Irish Railways as assistant manager, Toronto office. In August 1940, he entered Trans-Canada Air Lines service as traffic representative in charge of the Windward area and became field assistant to the general traffic manager, at Winnipeg, in 1944, and then general supervisor of passenger sales, a post which he held until his new appointment.

Hugh Johnston joined the Chicago-Milwaukee Railroad in 1929 and then owned and managed a freight audit bureau in Winnipeg until joining Northwest Airlines.

In 1942, he was appointed regional traffic manager for C.P. Air Lines at Edmonton. Five years later he joined TCA as manager of cargo sales and development.

The liner Aquatania, on a recent voyage from England to Halifax carried back 500 bags of mail not unloaded while she was in port due to the refusal of longshoremen to work overtime. This means that hundreds of Christmas parcels and letters for delivery in England cannot arrive until, in all likelihood, after Christmas.

Sockeye salmon pack in the Prince Rupert fisheries district for the year 1948 is placed at 162,584 cases as compared with 167,536 cases last year and 110,341 cases in 1946.

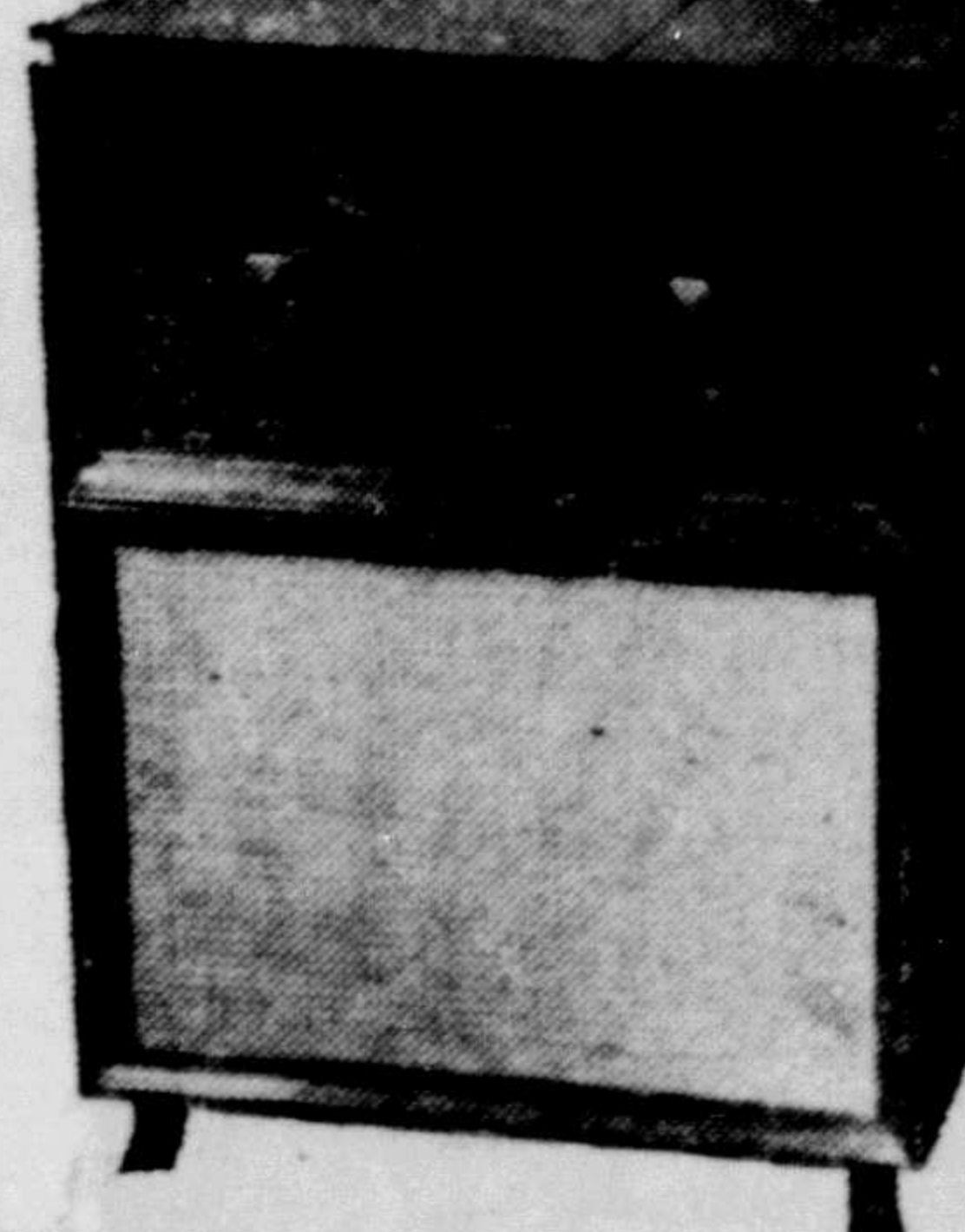
