Why Not Plebiscite

ESTION of whether cocktail bars should be permitted in British Columbia as they are in - Ontario and Quebec is a live and controversial issue. The Attorney General has announced that, in view of a large measure of expressed opposition, nothing will be done about legalizing the dispensing of liquor in this manner this year or possibly for some years to come. To many this decision by the government will be surprising. To others it will not be satisfactory. Many of the people who had been disposed to cocktail bars felt it might tend to a discontinuation of furtive drinking in public places or of more or less widespread drinking in hotel rooms and such places. It has been suggested, in fact, that permissibility of drinking in the open might even lead to moderation.

SOUTH AFRICAN ELECTION

DRIME MINISTER D. F. MALAN of the Union of I South Africa has had his policy of "apartheid" (segregation) approved in this week's provincial election. Such segregation, Malan's government said, could alone save the country's 2,500,000 whites from submersion by its 9,000,000 African and colored people.

On its assumption of power last year after defeating Jan Christian Smuts' United Africa party by a narrow margin in the general election, the Malan government moved to give effect to its promises about segregation. Its immediate aim was to abolish the representation of Africans in the House and to remove half-caste voters from the common roll. In view of the narrow margin of the government
