MacARTHUR LANDS INCHON. — General Douglas MacArthur went ashore today with the victorious United Nations forces in their landing on Korea to personllay direct the continuing offensive. First objective is to cut the line between Inchon and Korea and then split the enemy forces.

CONFERENCE COMING OTTAWA.-Before adjournment of Parliament today, nounced that a federal-provincial conference would be held before Christmas to deaf with a possible taxation agreement, old age security and other matters.

FEWER AT U.B.C. VANCOUVER. - The enrolment at University of British Columia shows a drop of 1000, the third successive decrease. In 1947 the enrolment was 10,000. This year it is 6500. However, the University is still overcrowded.

HAMILTON SETTLEMENT HAMILTON. - Settlement was reached today in the fiveweek old strike of civic garbage workers and gravediggers. Terms were not immediately announced.

DOCKERS STRIKE SYDNEY—Dockers in all New Zealand ports and in the big Australian port of Sydney are on strike today. The walkouts involve 15,000 men and scores of vessels. Issues in dispute involve overtime pay rates.



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Big Three Meeting

A merican, British and French Foreign Ministers are meeting in New York. Their last meeting was in London in May. Between the two meetings there has been the invasion of South Korea. The whole situation has been changed. Armed communist aggression by a fully armed, equipped and train- fifth, at which almost every world problem will be discussed. ed army was in May no more than a possible contingency. In September it is a fact. There is no longer room for any doubt that the Soviet Government is prepared to use war as an instrument of policy. What it has done in Korea it would, if conditions looked favorable, do elsewhere.

This then is the problem which faces the three Ministers. How can they best guard against any attempt to repeat the Korean experiment in some other theatre? What variations of the experiment might there be?

In one respect Korean aggression does not differ from earlier Soviet attempts to disturb the peace of a free world and hamper the work of economic restoration. It has been carried out not by Russians but by their Korean auxiliaries. Russia herself remains ostentatiously not involved, loudly professing her own peaceful intention while she uses her satellites to make war.

That is true to form. The Soviet Union during the past few years has fomented civil war in Greece. She has encouraged armed revolt in Vietnam and terrorism in Malaya. But the Soviet Union itself has always remained carefully aloof. Satellite communists have been treated as expendable troops to be encouraged and even covertly assisted so long as they seemed to be succeeding; but to be cynically deserted (as in the case of the Greek communists) if they failed.

The other main subject for discussion by the foreign ministers is necessarily Germany. Three Foreign Ministers of the three occupying powers have to agree on the main line of their policy when -almost immediately—the question of the revision of the Occupation Statute must be discussed and decided at Bonn. They have to consider to what extent there shall be a further relaxing of Allied controls, a further transfer of power to the Federal Governments. They have, moreover, to decide whether to allow the Federal Governments to raise and equip an armed police force strong enough to deal either with communist risings or even with organised armed raids across the border from the Soviet zone. For the plain warning of Korea is that no possibility can be ignored and eventuality disregarded. The Soviet Government is prepared to use any and every method of disturbing the peace which it thinks that it can employ without inevitably involving itself in war.

OH, NO!

RAIN growers in Alberta, it is reported, are Deing told that the elevator at Prince Rupert is so full of wheat there is no more room at present. This, it would appear, is the reason why this great plant, completely idle for years, as well as empty, goes unused.

According to what is heard in Prince Rupert, a railroad man recently learned that a grainbuyer had questions asked him by the men who grow the wheat. Some were curious about the situation at Prince Rupert. They knew a fine, modern elevator stands here but, as far as they could find out, not a pound of wheat had gone through there in years. Naturally, they asked the reason. Elevators in Vancouver and other western ports had all they could do.

The grain buyer's reply was to the general effect that at Prince Rupert, no more wheat could be accepted. All available space had been taken, and until this was shipped away, no more trainloads could move to the northern port.



AS A RULE this column appears in several Canadian newspapers sometimes more, sometimes less.

But this one is for Vancouver. If the editors are not interested in Vancouver night schools they might just as well toss this into the waste basket right now.

The main purpose of this piece is to put in a plug for my own night school class, which deals with the news and its meaning. This year the class starts on Thursday night, September 21 at half past seven. Each session

lasts from 7:30 to 9 o'clockwith at least a half hour of general discussion. The preie is \$7 and there are 25 sessions. SEE THEY re-named my

course this year, and that it is now titled "This Changing World.' This will be my fifth year on

the night school assignment. Each year for the past three years we have joked a bit about whether or not we could finish the term before that much advertised "world war three" broke out, A betting man (especially of Scottish ancestry) would be pretty cautious before he would wager any real money that we will get by till next Easter without the outbreak of real world war. But I guess I'm just a congenital optimist. For right down in my bones I still don't feel we are going to have that big

However it is only fair to warn any prospective joiner-uppers of our night school group that you could have knocked me over with a feather when the Northern Koreans invaded the South.

That seemed to me-and still seems to me-the most foolish and uncharacteristic thing that the leaders of world Communism ever done.

HERE ARE TWO INDICATORS which I watch most closely to judge whether or not we are going to have or escape that world war three: Watch the UN!

Watch Germany. If the UN survives, with Russia still in it, there won't be any world war three. That is not to say that even if the UN splits there will be the world war. But if it does split the probability of war is obviously very greatly magnified.

GERMANY seems to me the very core and crux of the world struggle. I don't think that either Russia or the U.S.A. will allow the other to take over the whole of Germany, as a part of its power bloc, without going to war to try to prevent that out-

That is why I agree, for once, with both Dorothy Thompson and Walter Lippman. The best chance for world peace lies with an agreement to neutralize a re-

united and liberated Germany. Even yet, it may not be impossible to get Russia and the U.S.A. to sit down at a table and work out a plan to make Germany a demilitarized country like Sweden or Switzerland. By this I mean "demilitarized" in the sense of being unable and unwilling to fight on either side in another world war.

MAYBE IN KOREA Russia was trying out on a small scale what she might later try on a big scale in Germany. If so, the new German armies from the East will soon come crashing

But unless Uncle Joe Stalin has lost his senses I don't think he will give the o.k. for any such move. For the almost certain reaction of the Americans would be to say "This is It. Release those atom bombs."
