A CHANGE TO more sober reading in the literary tastes of the public of Prince Rupert is indicated in the annual report of the Prince Rupert Public Library to which many new "worthwhile" books were added during the year. While general circulation for the year was down, an increase was shown in each division of the adult non-fiction section, the report shows. Another gratifying development at the library is the institution of the Young People's Section which the librarian says it to be given farther attention during the coming year.

All of which is a solid trend which indicates that Prince Rupert people are becoming more serious-minded and are endeavouring to improve themselves in the quality if not the quantity of their reading.

The public library has been an institution here so long that it tends to be taken for granted. It is gratifying to see that it continues to do good work. The board and staff are to be appreciatively thanked for the time and effort which they expend keeping it going steadily and satisfactorily.

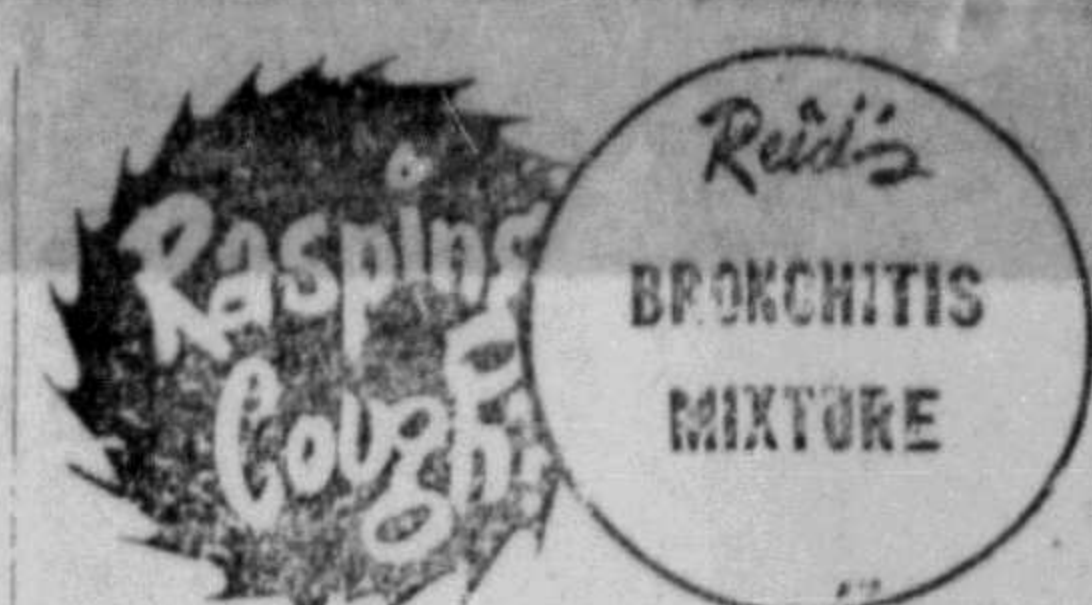

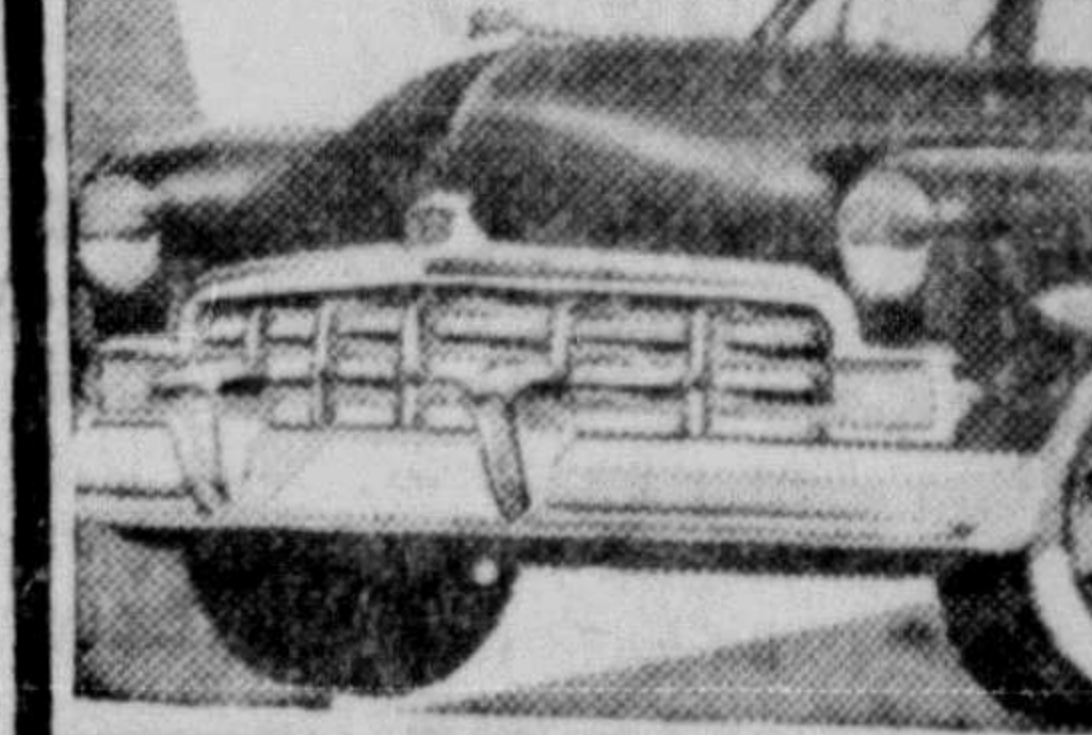

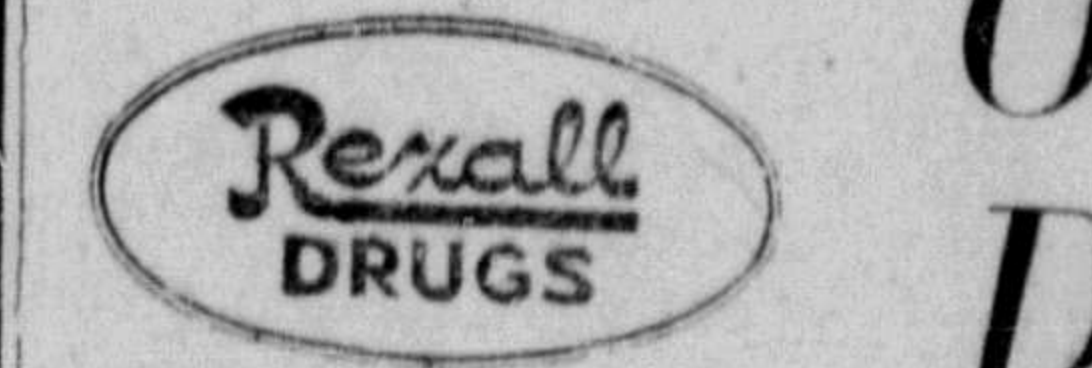
