RIO DE JANEIRO (CP)—A Real (Royal) Airlines DC-3 plane crashed in a rainstorm at an emergency field in Sao Paulo state yesterday, killing 20 of 22 persons aboard, the line announced today. A woman and her five-year old daughter were the only survivors of the crash which killed the other sixteen passengers and four members of the crew.

### Two Years In Prison

Man Who Cheated in Dice Game at Port Edward Sent Over  
Two years' in New Westminister Penitentiary was the sentence imposed by Judge W. O. Fulton in County Court yesterday afternoon on Eugene George Prezeau for cheating in a dice game at Watson Island recently.  
Prezeau was convicted on two counts and acquitted on a third. Sentences of two years' were imposed on each of the counts, the terms to run concurrently.

### Ski Lodge Is Burned

SEATTLE (CP)—Fire early today destroyed a big ski lodge at the Milwaukee Ski Bowl in the Cascade Mountains.  
An official of the Chicago, Milwaukee and St. Paul Railroad said the loss would probably run from \$100,000 to \$150,000.  
The lodge was operated as a scenic ski resort about a dozen years ago. It was at Yak on the east side of Snoqualmie Pass.

### Capilano Bridge Is Out Again; Seymour Creek Surge Stemmed

**More Power For Canada**

VANCOUVER (CP)—Army searchlights glared along half a mile of flood-raging Seymour Creek on the North Shore early today as four hundred men sand-bagged its banks to save expensive homes from damage or destruction. Heavy rain in the mountains which tower above the North Shore of Vancouver Harbor poured uncontrollably through narrow rock-rimmed river beds.

Today the flood risk seemed to be receding. Seymour Creek had dropped five feet from its peak. One water control official said there was little chance it would rise as high again.  
Cooler weather was turning abating rainfall into snow at higher levels of the North Shore mountains and the run-off was expected to drop.  
At dawn all dike workers were sent home.  
Since last Saturday throughout southern British Columbia early winter storms have taken nineteen lives, isolated towns and villages and caused damage counted in the millions of dollars.

The Seymour Creek upsurge in Northern Vancouver, one of this seaport's suburban dormitories, was an unexpected blow to hundreds of men fighting nature on the coast.  
A less spectacular new flood also occurred last night at Port Coquitlam, 20 miles east of Vancouver, on the north bend of the Fraser River. A tributary of the Coquitlam River slowly over-spread its low-dyked banks and forced evacuation of thirteen homes in low-lying areas.  
The Fraser Valley towns of Haney, Hammond and Pitt Meadows were without water because of a storm-broke main.  
Meanwhile, the Army's temporary Bailey Bridge across the Capilano River to West Vancouver went out again last night under pressure of new high water in Capilano Creek but was being replaced with another today and it was expected the permanent bridge would be up in ten days. Ferries are operating again between Ambleside and Dundarave, vessels of both the Gulf Lines and Union Steamship Co. being pressed into service.

### TransCanada Highway—More Than 50 Percent

OTTAWA (CP)—The government was told in the House of Commons that it should be prepared to pay more than fifty percent of the cost of the proposed 5,000-mile hard-surfaced TransCanada Highway.  
Some Opposition members and George Cruickshank (Liberal, Fraser Valley) said the government should undertake to provide more than fifty percent contribution in provinces where nature of territory makes road construction particularly costly. Other Liberal members praised the legislation and expressed the hopes that the provinces would agree to co-operate on the project.  
A C.C.F. amendment which would have called for more than fifty percent federal contribution was rejected 152 to 46. The division was on a Speaker's ruling which the House sustained.

### RUSSIANS CLAIM "AMAZING" WHEAT

LONDON (CP)—An "amazing wheat" that yields over 120 bushels an acre has been grown in the Soviet Union, the Moscow radio said yesterday.  
The broadcast, heard in London, said that a winter wheat bearing five heads on each stock had been developed at the Karagana Agricultural station at Kazakh, near the Iranian border.  
Yields above 50 or 60 bushels per acre are considered phenomenal. The U.S. government average for all wheat is 17.9 bushels per acre.

### Arms Flow To Europe

**Billion Dollars Worth to Go Over from the United States**

WASHINGTON, D.C. (CP)—A billion dollars worth of United States arms will start moving to western Europe in a few weeks now that Atlantic Treaty countries have unanimously agreed on their grand strategy defence.  
Defence Secretary Lewis Johnson was back from Paris today to present the plan to President Truman and State Secretary Acheson.  
Johnson is the United States member of the defence committee of the twelve-power Atlantic alliance which adopted the plan at a meeting in the French capital yesterday.

### More Power For Canada

LONDON (CP)—The House of Commons today passed the North American bill through all its stages. The bill gives to the federal Parliament of Canada power to amend the Canadian constitution in matters lying solely within its jurisdiction without reference to the British Parliament.  
The new bill had already been passed by the House of Lords and now only awaits formal Royal assent before becoming law.

### November Record Building Month

New Theatre and News Building Principal Items for Month  
Construction in Prince Rupert hit a six-year high in November soaring to \$145,136 on the strength of building permits taken out for a new theatre, Daily News building and 54 other building jobs. Total for the first 11 months of 1949 is \$348,489. The greatest since 1943.  
Construction of a new theatre by Famous Players Corp. and the Daily News building raised the value of permits issued to \$106,600. Other work, ranging up to \$4,000, accounted for an additional \$38,536.  
The 11-month total so far this year is already \$160,000 greater than the whole construction value in 1948 and exceeds the complete 1947 value by \$130,000.

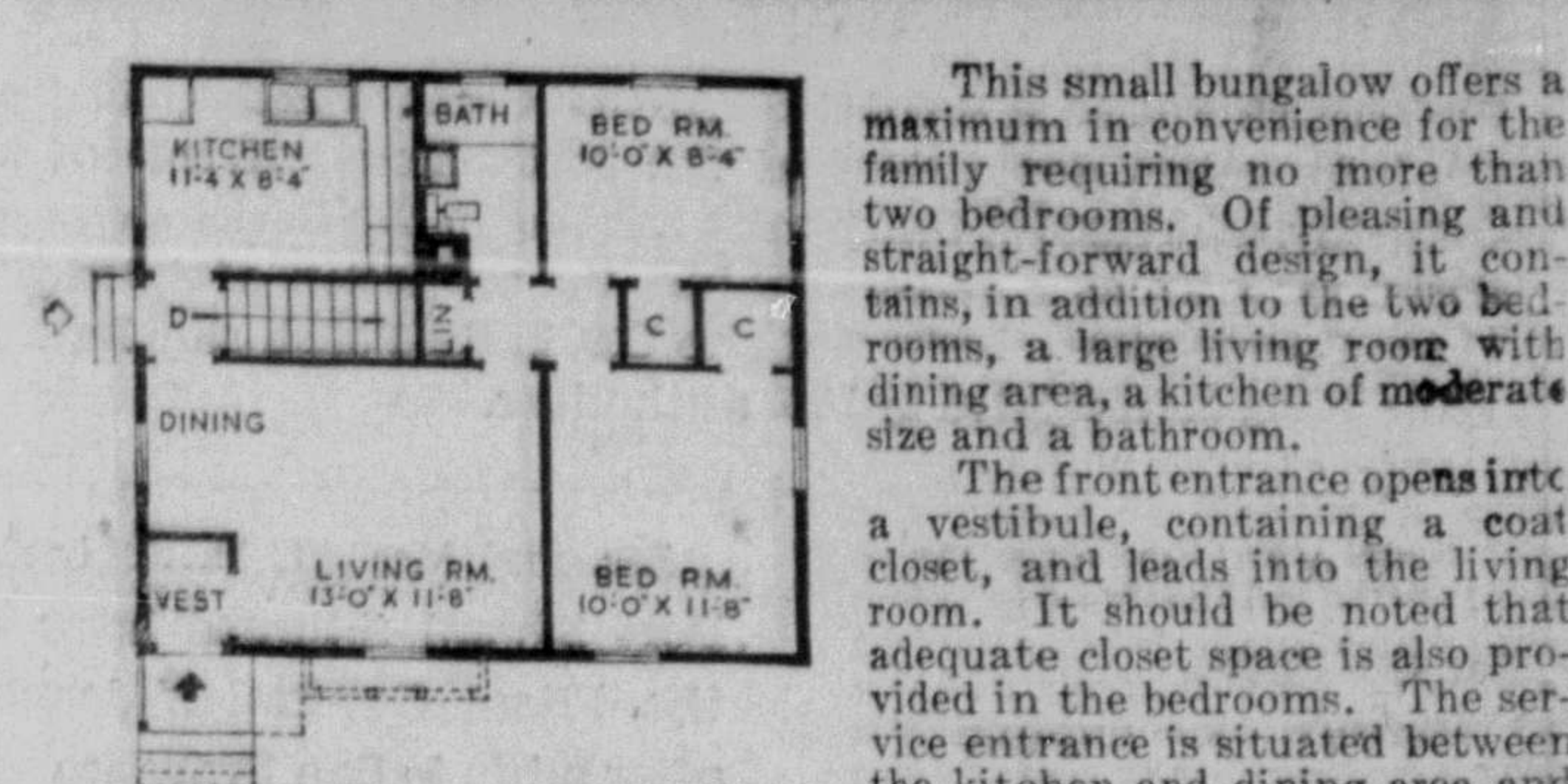

This small bungalow offers a maximum in convenience for the family requiring no more than two bedrooms. Of pleasing and straight-forward design, it contains, in addition to the two bedrooms, a large living room with dining area, a kitchen of moderate size and a bathroom.

The front entrance opens into a vestibule, containing a coat closet, and leads into the living room. It should be noted that adequate closet space is also provided in the bedrooms. The service entrance is situated between the kitchen and dining area and opens onto the basement entrance.

The compact kitchen is adjacent to the bathroom, cutting plumbing costs to a minimum.

While the working drawings show one window in the front of the living room, the owner of the house illustrated changed the design to include a bay window and, at the same time, projected the roof to protect the front entrance.

The floor area, for estimating purposes, is 681 square feet while the outside dimensions are 28 feet by 24 feet, four inches.

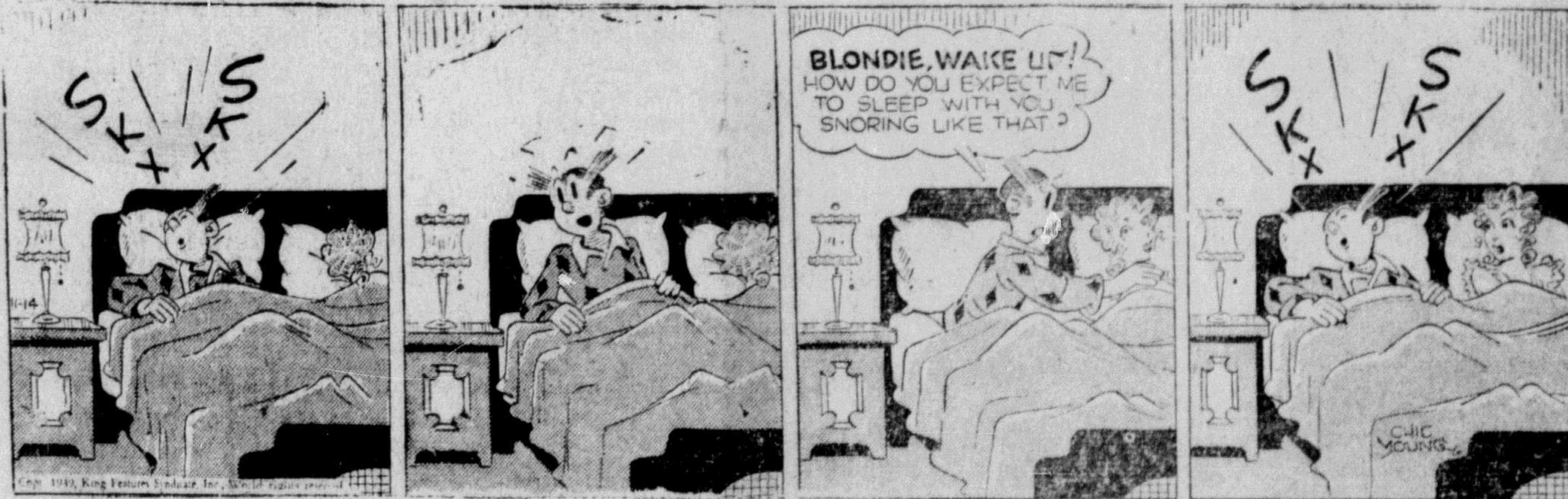

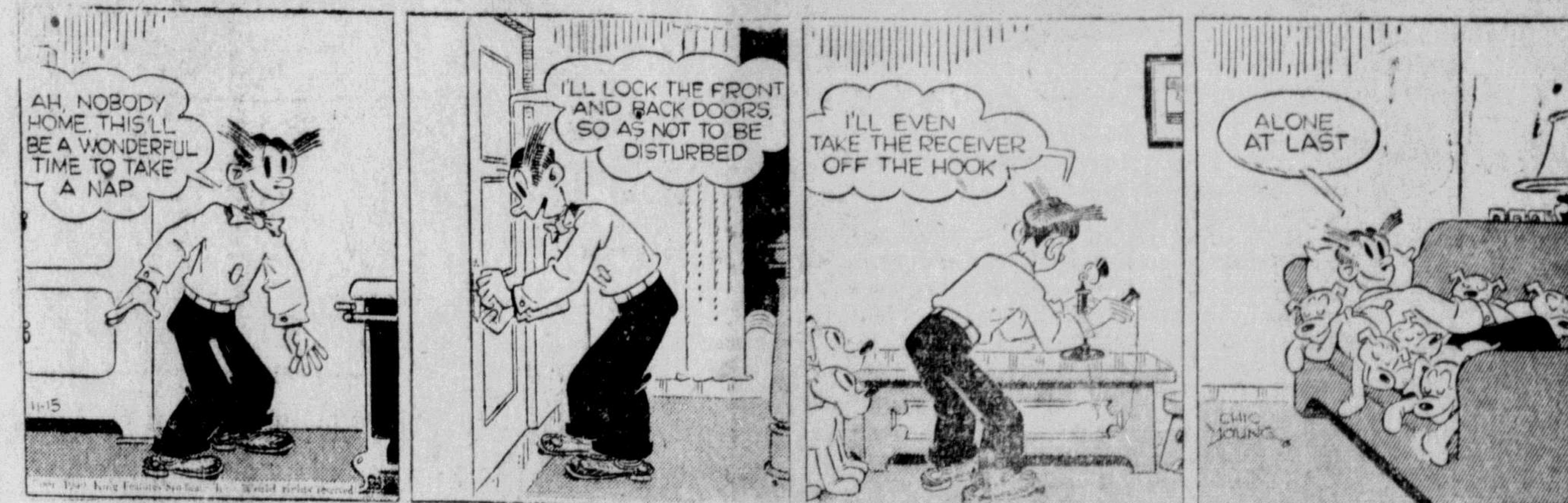
