"I can no longer recommend the necessity for people to leave town," Brig. Gen. A. Morton told the daily press conference. It was a direct reversal of his earlier statements.

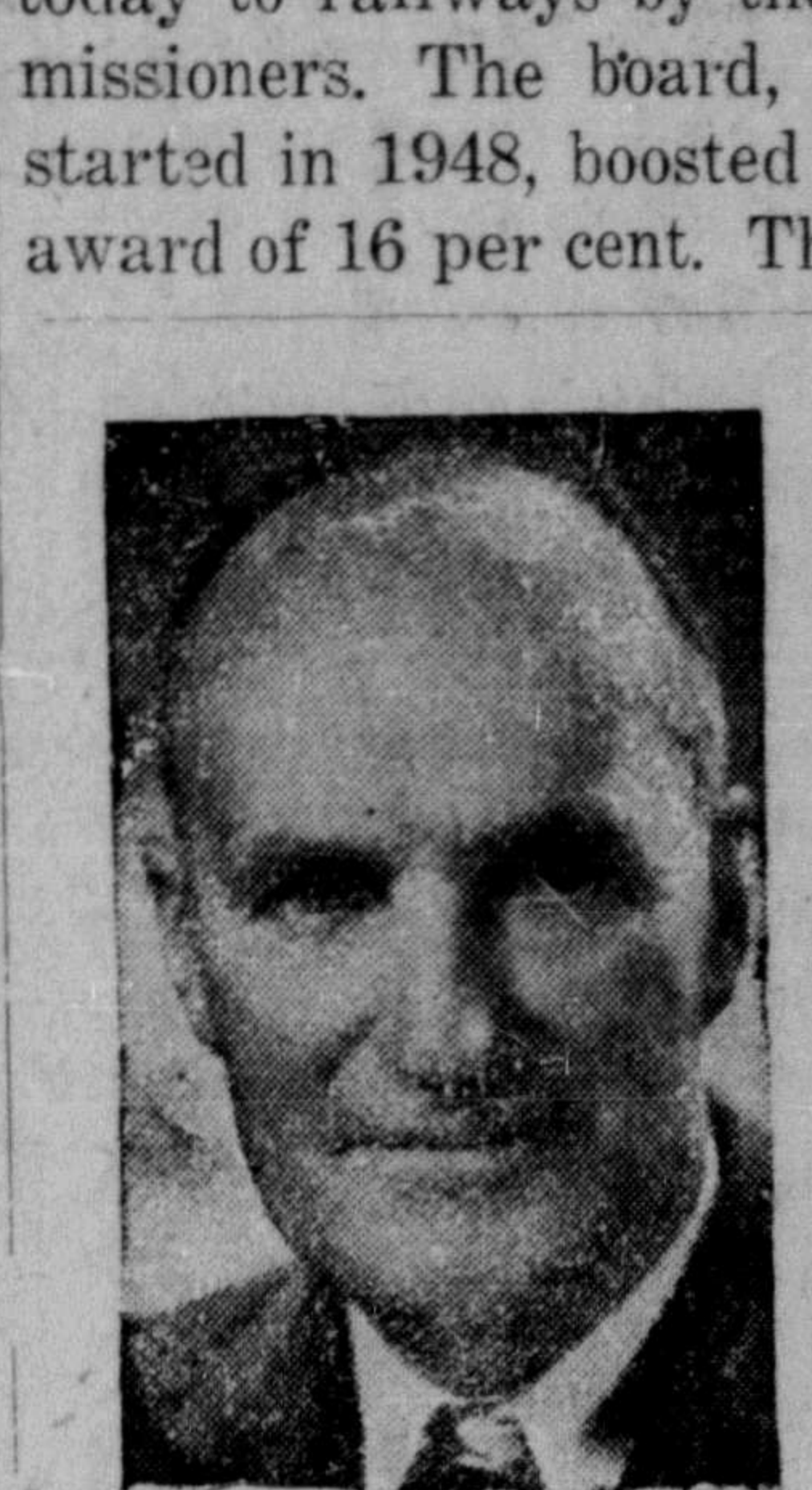

Railways Given Further Freight Rate Increase

OTTAWA (CP)—A freight rate of 3.4 per cent, amounting to about \$13,000,000 a year, was awarded today to railways by the Board of Transport Commissioners. The board, disposing of the rate case started in 1948, boosted to 20 per cent the March 1 award of 16 per cent. The net result was an increase of 3.4 per cent on rates put into effect through the March 1 judgment and which now are effective. The increase is effective on 15 days notice.

Police Change Under Survey

A letter from Attorney-General Gordon Wismer read at the regular meeting of the city council stated negotiations were proceeding between the federal and provincial governments regarding having the Royal Canadian Mounted Police take over the British Columbia Provincial Police. A survey was being carried out with all members of the provincial force, to find out how the change over would affect them financially and otherwise.

New Drive For Landing Field At Prince Rupert is Starting

Having won the support of the transportation bureau of the Vancouver Board of Trade, the British Columbia Aviation Council, and numerous other outside bodies including Prince George, Dawson Creek and Fort St. John Boards of Trade, a new drive is being instituted from Prince Rupert for the establishment of a federally financed air strip at the favored Tugwell Island site. Preliminary estimates have indicated the practicability of putting in a 4000-foot strip on the east side of the Island at a cost of \$350,000 and a 7,300-foot strip on the west side, which would be adaptable for military purposes, at greater cost.

The Weather

Forest Conservation

THIS is "Forest Conservation Week" when, by government proclamation, public attention is focussed on the importance of preserving this great source of wealth in British Columbia against injury, loss or decay and, in the words of M. W. Gormeley, Prince Rupert's district forester, "against unwise use of forests by man."

We have editorialized often in the past on the subject of forest protection. On this occasion we quote from Mr. Gormeley:

"Forest production forms the basic industry of this Province. Over 40 per cent of our income is derived from this source. Obviously then we must preserve and protect our greatest natural resource."

"Efforts at wise forest use (good forest management) need appreciation and encouragement. They need to be greatly expanded to cover a much larger percentage of our total forest area."

"What is of greatest need today is public understanding of the main forestry problems and the resulting beneficial encouragement and assistance to all who work in, and are associated with, our forests—the logger, the millman, the forester (private or public), the lumber dealer, the log towing companies, the shipping and railroad companies who carry lumber products, etc. We all need your clear understanding, your steadfast support and assistance if we are to succeed in our efforts to preserve, and thus conserve, our basic natural resource, the forest."

"Remember that forest conservation means the preservation of our forest from insects, fire, disease and unwise use. We look to you, the public, who own over 90 per cent of our forest lands, to strongly and effectively support our conservation efforts."

As I See It

By ELMORE PHILPOTT MORE GIRLS SMOKE?

ON A RECENT speaking tour in British Columbia one thing struck me:

More women than men now smoke, at least at dinner meetings.

Maybe it is because Dad just hasn't got the nerve to drag out the smelly old pipe, to puff away at such mixed social gatherings. Also it gives the girls a bit of a thrill to escape the chore of getting the meal and the washing of the dishes. Maybe the cigarette adds to the "night out" atmosphere.

Whatever the reason, it is a visible fact that more Canadian women smoke at such public functions than do men.

UNIVERSITY STUDENTS tell me that this is also true in their age groups. They guess that one reason is that more boys than girls are in training for sports. They tell me that among the young married folks groups it's about a fifty-fifty proposition.

I surely would like to see one of those scientific polls on this matter for it seems to me significant.

I HAVE HEARD OF A FEW women who once smoked who ever abandoned the habit. But I have heard of a great many men who have done so—and it seems to me that this quit-smoking movement is increasing among men. Maybe smoking will go out of fashion, just as taking snuff went out.

Women may be slower than men to quit smoking because the right to smoke was one of

the manifestations of the equal-rights-for-women movement of this century.

ONE OF THE BEST STORIES I ever heard about tobacco was this, told to me by my old boss, the late John Redpath Dougall of the Montreal Witness.

One of the two Macdonald brothers, whose "tobacco with a heart" was famous everywhere in Canada was travelling in Nova Scotia. A porter in a small hotel, thinking to ingratiate himself with the tobacco millionaire, sidled up to Macdonald and told him that he had saved a whole keg of those tin hearts which were affixed to each plug of the famous chewing tobacco: "It's a filthy habit" snapped the peppery tobacco manufacturer.

EVERYBODY KNOWS THAT, in deference to the ideals of its founder the great Eaton concern, still refrains from selling tobacco.

Even in my own time on the old Toronto Globe (1928-1933), the publisher refused to take cigarette advertisements. He did not draw the line against cigar ads or pipe tobacco ads—but he was adamant against cigarettes.

He stuck to his principles to the end too. The old Globe, known for generations as the "Scotsman's Bible" and long the most influential Liberal daily in Canada, was finally forced to sell out because it could not make ends meet.

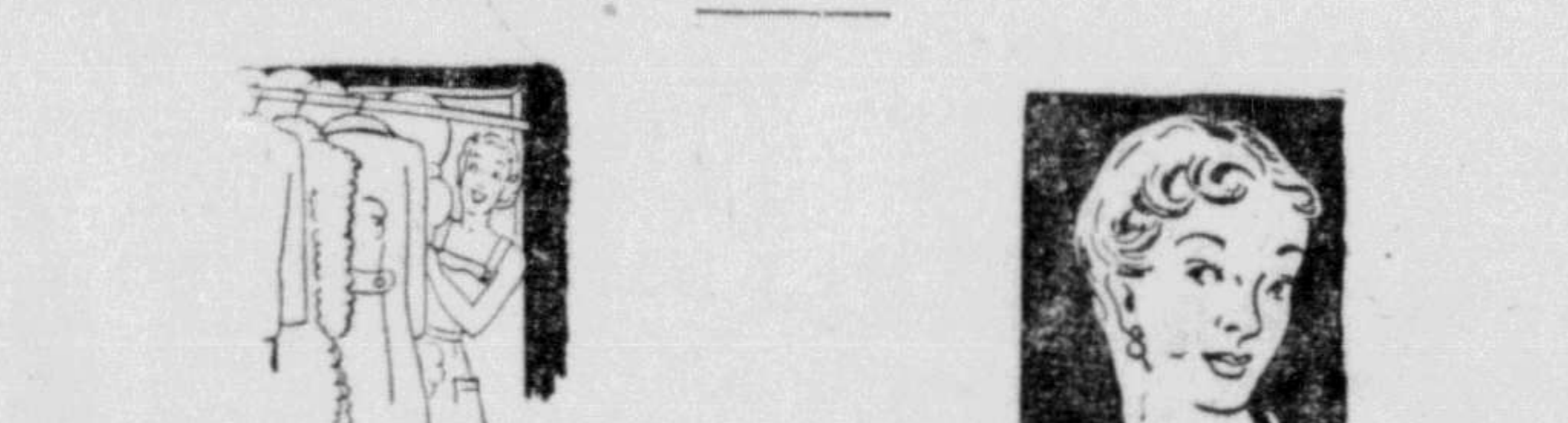

May Day Parade is Colorful

Crowds of people lined sidewalks and streets from the Bu Depot on Second Street, and up Third Avenue, Fulton and Sixth Avenue yesterday afternoon to witness the gala May Day parade make its way up the latter route to Roosevelt Park. **Game Matters
Are Discussed**

**Rod and Gun Club Meeting
Hears Convention Delegate
And M.L.A.**

Rod and Gun Club members, Tuesday night heard a detailed and comprehensive report of the recent British Columbia game convention from Jarvis H. McLeod who represented the north coast zone at Vancouver. The sportsmen were enthusiastic in their approval of the delegate's effort on behalf of game organizations in this area.

A recommendation from the Prince Rupert Club to control big game shooting by non-resident hunters on a quota system was rejected although Mr. McLeod found considerable support. Another resolution requesting the Game Department to have biologists study causes of depletion of certain game populations with a view to restoring satisfactory conditions was unanimously approved.

Mr. McLeod reported that officials of the Game Department were sympathetic to delegates' requests although they found themselves in a position where it was impossible to do much planning in view of the lack of a long range program by the government. Game Commissioner J. G. Cunningham reported that his department was severely handicapped by a shortage of biologists and a reduced budget.

At the meeting Jack McRae, M.L.A., reported from the viewpoint of the government and stated that, while strong representations had been made at the last session for a definite game program, the budget had been brought down and it could not be changed. The local member felt, however, that the govern-

ment had been made aware of the situation and that a business-like program of game management was in the offing.

TROUT EGGS COMING

Other business settled at the meeting was the matter of planting Kamloops trout eggs in local waters. It was agreed to plant the majority of the 100,000 eggs in Rainbow Lake, with an experimental batch to be deposited at the Lake at the head of Denise Arm. A good force of volunteers offered their help when the spawn arrives early in June.

The meeting concluded with the showing of an interesting film by Sgt. Potterton.

In 1920, an attempt was made to fly from New York to Nome. 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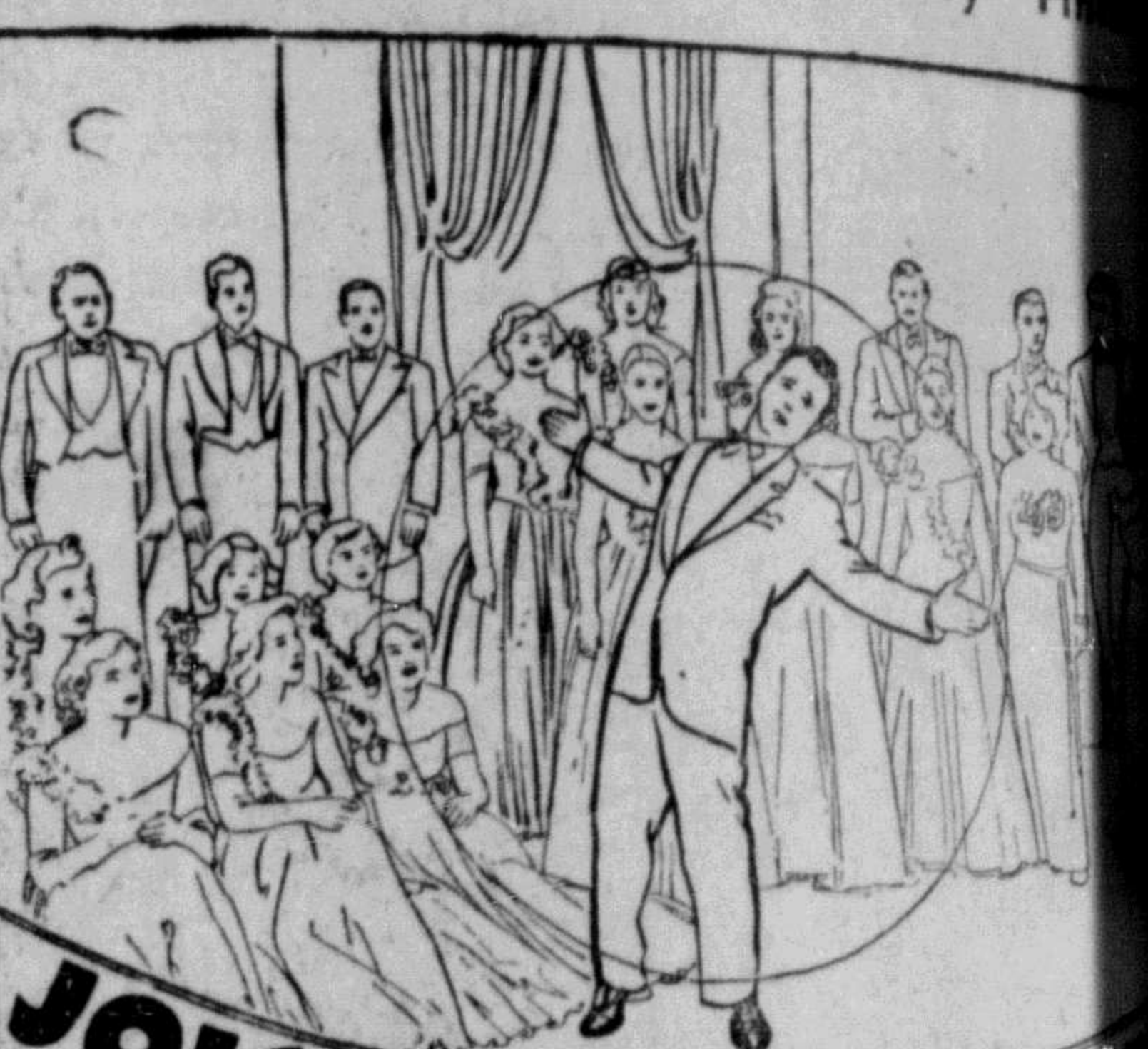
