Small Efficient Ocean-Going Fleet Advocated

Maritime Commission Presents Its Report

OTTAWA (CP)—A Maritime Commission report, made public today, recommended that Canada's security requires maintenance of only a "small and efficient" ocean-going merchant fleet. It also recommended that the shipping and shipbuilding industries should be maintained "on a nucleus basis capable of rapid expansion in an emergency."

The report, tabled in the House of Commons by Hon. Lionel Chevrier, minister of transport, was made by John V. Clynne, chairman of the Maritime Commission, established November 1, 1947. It covers the year ended last March 31. Cost of operating the Canadian merchant ship, exclusive of fuel, was the second highest in the world, the report noted. It was inadvisable as well as uneconomic for Canada to consider construction and operation of a Canadian-flagged, ocean-going merchant marine of sufficient dimensions to accommodate all her export trade or any fixed percentage thereof, the report said.

Air Conviction Sets Precedent

Aubrey Westinghouse Fined \$500 in First Case Laid in Canada

First prosecution of its kind in Canadian aviation history resulted in a Victoria pilot being fined \$500 on a charge of piloting an aircraft while intoxicated in Magistrate's court here Wednesday evening. Aubrey H. Westinghouse, proprietor of Westinghouse Airways at the provincial capital, was fined by Magistrate H. F. Glassey following his conviction under federal air regulations. He was found guilty of taxing a Seabee aircraft carrying two passengers in Ocean Falls harbor last May 31.

A second charge of piloting an aircraft while under the influence of a stimulant was dropped with consent of Crown Prosecutor R. M. Howard, of Vancouver.

Westinghouse was assessed \$13 court costs in addition to the fine, with an alternative of three months in jail. He was allowed until November 30 to pay the fine.

Defence Counsel T. A. Dohm said that he and his client were studying the possibility of appealing the conviction.

Future of Westinghouse's pilot's license, which has been under suspension since the incident almost six months ago, lies in the hands of the Civil Aeronautics Board of the Department of Transport, which launched the prosecution.

The trial, which resumed at 4 p.m. Wednesday, continued through until 9:30 with a brief supper pause as Defence Counsel Dohm presented witnesses. Witnesses for the prosecution were heard on September 9 when the trial opened.

A veteran pilot with 3,067 hours in command of aircraft during the last 17 years, Westinghouse admitted to the court that he had had "two or three" glasses of beer before an attempted flight from Ocean Falls to Bella Bella on May 31, with two passengers who had his plane under charter. The passengers were J. R. Boner and A. W. Rogers, Vancouver salesmen.

Prosecution witnesses, including Boner and Rogers, testified on September 9 that Westinghouse had been drunk when he attempted to take the plane off for Bella Bella on a charter flight.

Not Intoxicated? Defence witnesses Wednesday indicated to the court that while Westinghouse had visited the beer parlor of the Martin Inn for more than an hour on the afternoon of May 31, he had showed no signs of intoxication when he went to his plane to continue the flight south.

Westinghouse said that he was "very unwell" as a result of a week's continuous flying with irregular meals. He said that he had presumed

Atlin Road Is Opening Soon

ATLIN—Residents of this formerly isolated mining community in northern British Columbia, will have a highway connection to the outside world for the first time in history by the end of November.

Contractors, working under supervision of Canadian Army Engineers, will halt their season's work within a week, leaving a winter-passable road 60 miles to Jake's Corner, Yukon Territory.

While final surfacing of the road will not be completed at least before next year, the grade is completed and will permit traffic to the Alaska Highway and its long ribbon to Edmonton and Whitehorse.

Only possibility of traffic being halted is the danger of heavy snowfall, but it is expected that the road will be properly maintained during the winter.

Under arrangement between the federal and provincial governments, half of the construction cost was borne by the provincial government and half by the federal.



Reds Release U.S. Consul

WASHINGTON, (CP)—Angus Ward, American Consul-General at Mukden, has been released from jail by the Chinese Communists and ordered out of the country. The Communists also released four consulate aides who were jailed with Ward October 24 on what the State Department called "trumped up" charges of beating and assaulting two Chinese in a wage dispute.

A Communist "People's Court" found them all guilty and meted out varying prison sentences. Then, the sentences were commuted to deportation.

BLOCKADE-BUSTER — Unconfirmed reports say Bruce Rankin, 31, of Brandon, Man., used his diplomatic status to break through the Chinese Nationalist blockade of the Yangtze river, Rankin, Canadian trade commissioner in Shanghai, is believed enroute home on leave. He is said to have been on the British freighter Woosang when stopped at the mouth of the Yangtze by a Chinese gunboat. Rankin, pleading diplomatic immunity, was reported to have been transferred by the Nationalists to a British warship. (CP Photo)

Sterling Is Of Concern

OTTAWA (CP)—An economic expert yesterday said that Canada has a "deep interest" in any decision the United Kingdom takes concerning sterling balances which she holds for other countries.

Information reaching Ottawa is that India and Egypt, two of the biggest owners of sterling, are making persistent demands that sterling be released. The exact amount of these holdings has never been made public.

Talks towards formulating a decision are scheduled to be held among Canada, United States and the United Kingdom at a tripartite continuing economic committee established in Washington.

MORE UNEMPLOYED

OTTAWA—There are twice as many unemployed in Canada this fall as there were last. In October this year 165,000 were on unemployment insurance payments compared with last year.

NEWSPAPERS SEIZED

BUENOS AIRES—An Argentine congressional committee today seized business offices of the United Press and Associated Press and business offices of four newspapers opposing the regime of President Juan D. Peron were seized yesterday. While federal police stood guard, government auditors examined the financial records of the newspapers. The committee said it would investigate source of funds of the newspapers and the two news agencies.

SHOULD RESIGN?

OTTAWA—Angus McInnis (CCF-Vancouver East) said today Minister of Justice Garsion should resign for the way he had handled the report on an alleged price-fixing combine in the flour-milling industry. He made the statement as members continued a clause-by-clause study of a bill aimed at strengthening the Combines Investigation Act. Mr. McInnis said he agreed with George Drew, Progressive-Conservative leader, that the Minister of Justice had placed himself in a position where he should not be given any more power under the Combines Investigation Act.

EAGLE UNDER WAY

SEATTLE—The Panamanian ship Eagle, which was helpless for 24 hours in the Pacific after a fire in the engine room, got under way again shortly after midnight and is now heading for port.

Sees Full Nationhood

Prime Minister Attaches Importance to Forthcoming Conference

OTTAWA, (CP)—Prime Minister L. S. St. Laurent expresses hope that, "by the end of 1950, Canada will have assumed all attributes and all responsibility of full nationhood."

Speaking as leader of the Liberal party, the Prime Minister said "last traces of colonial status" will disappear only when federal and provincial governments agree on a method of amending the constitution on matters affecting both of them. A conference to seek that agreement is being called for January 10, he said, and its success will "depend on goodwill, co-operation and statesmanship of provincial governments as well as the federal government."

BUILDING BETTER CITIZENS AND BASKETBALL PLAYERS

Then each had its coach. Most are young players and they are doing a good job. There were Steve Dumas, Jimmy Flewin, Harold and Roy Webber, and Roy McIntosh. Two teachers were giving of their spare time and it was particularly interesting to note that one was a lady, Miss Maureen Adlard, of Borden Street School, is building up a team of beginners into a unit that will do much better as the weeks pass by. OTTAWA (CP)—Canada's house building parade swept ahead in the first eight months of this year with a total of 55,435 constructed, an increase of 12,000 over the same period last year. However, starts on new homes are lagging, said the Bureau of Statistics on Tuesday. In the eight months period total starts were made on 57,827 units, compared with 60,465 last year.

Wheat of Grain to be Vancouver

OTTAWA (CP)—The Vancouver-Herald said Wednesday learned details of wheat barter deal Japan and the Bunge Corporation of New York. The Corporation's representative, Fred Hager, as confirming a purchase of about 600,000 bushels of wheat from the Canadian Wheat Board at \$2.35 per bushel. The freight charge will be \$6 a ton. The deal will leave Vancouver in a position to say what Japan will do with the grain although it is suggested. Nor is it clear whether Japan will receive barter commodities.

NEW HOME OF LEGION

Contractors Make Progress With Renovations

Renovation from former quarters of wartime H.M.C.S. Chatham officers to the spacious and modern future premises of the Canadian Legion is expected to be completed by January—but not in time for any New Year's eve celebration.

James Greer, of Greer and Bridden, contractors, stated yesterday that major portion of work was done on only finishing of inside walls and floors re-work was done and only finishing of inside walls and floors remained. Plastering of walls and that phase of renovation yesterday made way for further and more rapid construction.

During the earlier stages of construction, it was decided by the building committee of the Legion to leave the front of the building untouched. But plans were changed and a shingle and siding front is now being added. It was expected opening of the new building would coincide with Armistice Day, but, finding out that this was impossible, local prophets set the date as Christmas or New Year's eve.

Polaris Taku Roasting Plant

An ore roasting plant which will permit Polaris Taku mine at Tulsequah to ship part of its production as refined gold will go into action soon, according to resident Mining Engineer Fred Hensworth, who has returned from a northern trip.

Mr. Hensworth arrived back in the city on the Princess Norah after a fortnight's visit to Tulsequah and Atlin, where he visited two of Northern B. C.'s promising gold producers, Polaris Taku and the Nolan mine.

Polaris Taku's roasting plant, which will go into use about the end of the month, will take about half of the mine's production, reducing the gold to a refined state. Its initial operation will be on a test basis.

Ore production is 300 tons daily, which is reduced to 30 tons of concentrate. Half of the concentrate will be processed in the cyanide roasting plant.

Currently, about 180 men are employed at the mine. At the Nolan mine, a placer operation near Atlin, two underground tunnels have been sunk to a depth of 200 feet. Forty men are employed there.

Operation plan, being directed by McLeod White, its new manager, is to run drift tunnels along the bedrock formation, taking out four feet of gravel and two feet of bedrock. Results so far have been high grade, Mr. Hensworth said.

Mr. White, formerly with Consolidated Mining and Smelting Co. is considered an expert on placer operation.

TASS MAY SOON BE DEMI-TASS

LONDON (CP)—The Government announced Wednesday that it may change the law conferring diplomatic immunity on Tass, the official Russian news agency.

A British court of appeal ruled last June that Tass had diplomatic immunity and could not be sued for libel. Lord Chancellor Viscount Jowett announced in the House of Lords that the law might have to be changed.

Safety First

CONSEQUENCES of fire that destroyed the steamship Noronic and took the lives of more than a hundred passengers at Toronto last September mean litigation. The official report of the disaster, as submitted to the Federal Government, makes it clear that responsibility can be attached to the company and the skipper. Those who suffered losses were awaiting the authoritative findings and can now proceed to whatever result court action will bring.

That there was negligence no one can now question. There was more than that. The investigation took weeks and it appears evident that, from the minute inquiry and careful probing of all the circumstances, discipline and system aboard the Noronic, on that night at any rate, had been permitted to drop to a low point. Whatever is done to enhance the security of the travelling public, must in future reach to the very root of where a possible source of danger exists. Any recommendations must be fearless and searching and, as far as humanly possible, forestall the risk of disaster. Nothing less than this will meet the views of the millions who, when they tour of travel take for granted that they are safe.

TRIBUTARY TO RUPERT

SINCE mining resumed at the Premier, near Stewart, at the Silver Standard, New Hazelton, and at Alice Arm, all within convenient distance of Prince Rupert, the difference seen in a business way has become obvious at once. The properties had their reasons for having been shut down. Mining camps have a certain similarity in that respect and, as such, are different from the average town without dependence on some other natural resource.

The fact of Premier, New Hazelton and Alice Arm being busy with hundreds of employees regularly occupied, whereas not so long ago there was no production, is today most gratifying. Indirectly, the new earnings to a substantial extent, find their way to Prince Rupert, becoming recognized more and more as the northern industrial and commercial hub.

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LETTERBOX

ANSWER TO MCKAY

Editor, Daily News:
In regard to Bob McKay's manifesto, I would like to take exception to a few of his statements:

H. Carl Goldenberg, in his report issued in 1947, while Mr. McKay was an alderman, condemned the form of taxation advocated by Mr. McKay. Mr. Goldenberg is a qualified expert and made his report after a detailed survey of municipal taxation throughout British Columbia. After all we do have to consider recommendations made by such experts as Mr. Goldenberg.

The present Council, of which I am a member, have already contacted Mr. Breckenridge and he advised us that he would not be available. Several other experts have also been approached in this respect. I might mention here that our own City Engineer, Don Stewart, is in agreement with having a consulting engineer engaged for some of our major problems.

The next Mayor and Council will certainly have some problems to contend with. In my opinion water and sewers are the first utilities to be given immediate attention. Contrary to Mr. McKay's statement, all pipe and fittings are not on hand to complete the line from Shawatans to the underwater main. As soon as fittings are available tenders should be called for this work.

I believe that the recommendations as reported by our telephone superintendent are very sound, in short, a pay as you go plan. Most certainly not the same plan as was put forth last year.

City Hall—We believe that co-operation can be had from any or all employees. It depends a lot in the way in which it is solicited. As a member of the Council, I have never felt that I was being given the run around as stated by Mr. McKay.

A city managership will have

its merits but we do not need the consent or approval of the Provincial Government. The Mayor and Council can pass a bylaw authorizing the city to appoint a City Manager. This would save the city the cost of Mr. McKay's proposed trip to Victoria.

In closing, Mr. Editor, I would like to ask Mr. McKay what special qualifications he has that would qualify him for special consideration from the Provincial Government.

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

that the two salesmen would require the whole afternoon to complete their business in Ocean Falls and that he, therefore, would not be required to do any further flying that day. He told the court that he felt convinced that the charge had resulted from annoyance on the part of Boner and Rogers at his refusal to continue the flight to Bella Bella and points south that afternoon.

Boner and Rogers earlier testified that they had had to order Westinghouse to return to the dock at Ocean Falls after he had insisted on making the flight while in what they believed was a drunken condition.

Defence witnesses, who testified as to Westinghouse's sobriety at the time were Capt. W. J. Main, Vancouver master-

mariner, who had been in the Martin Inn tavern with the accused, and Arthur Lancaster, waiter in the beer parlor.

Dr. John A. Dalton, of Victoria, expert on aeronautical medicine for the Department of Transport, said that Westinghouse's actions on May 31 might have been caused by an acid body condition arising from tension and fatigue. Dr. Dalton had examined Westinghouse on July 29.

Canada's Butter Stock Is Larger


OTTAWA (P)—Canada has almost 51,000,000 pounds of creamery butter stored in nine cities, an increase of 20,000,000

a loud voice, Mr. Vishinsky, the other day said to a committee on atomic control: "We are razing mountains; we are irrigating deserts; we are cutting through jungle and tundra." It could have been mentioned that atomic power has also been demonstrated in the razing of cities. It wasn't, of course.

Whenever you buy a cigarette, the government takes a cent. But what's a cent? A whale of a lot when it's realized Canadians smoke about 46,000,000,000 cigarettes annually. And the habit is not becoming any less.

Between October 1948 and June 1949, no fewer than 4,872 Orders-in-Council were passed in Ottawa. The passing of an Order-in-Council is said to largely concern the approach of an emergency. As a matter of fact there was one on the way—or a lot of folks scattered over Canada thought so, at the time.

3. The country made recovery from a heavy debit trade balance in favor of the United States.
4. Foreign industrialists showed renewed interest in establishing plants in Canada.
