Fearing War Swedes Leave

STOCKHOLM (Reuters)—Fear of impending war is driving some of Sweden's 27,000 Baltic refugees across the Atlantic in search of safety. No country in Europe will be safe if the Red flood breaks loose, they claim. They are homeless today because Russia annexed their countries—Estonia, Latvia, and Lithuania. In 1940 after signing treaties of military assistance and friendship with them. The United States is the favorite refuge among the few who have money or relations already settled there. Pioneering types choose Canada—When they can get visas.

Softening Up Action Begun

TOKYO — Gun bombardments from Allied warships and strikes by carrier-borne planes pounded far up on the Yellow Sea coast of Korea for two days from dawn to dusk. The new naval action behind North Korean lines was geared to softening up preliminaries for the promised U.N. offensive. The main blows, dealt Tuesday and Wednesday and disclosed today, fell on Inchon, port for Seoul, the long lost South Korean capital. Cities all the way from the 36th parallel to the 39th were attacked by Skyraider bombers.

Canadians Not Hurt

OTTAWA — Defence Minister Brooke Claxton indicated today that Canada's destroyers off Korea have suffered no losses. He was asked in the House of Commons if there was anything to reports that Canadians had suffered losses in naval action. Mr. Claxton said he understood there had been action but it did not involve Canadian ships.

Celtic Is Refloated

The 70-foot American fish packer Celtic, which was reported hard aground Wednesday near Klew Nugget in rugged Grenville Channel, south of Prince Rupert, was evidently refloated and proceeded on her way to Seattle later yesterday. The Armour Salvage Co.'s salvage boat F. H. Phippen, which left here at 11 o'clock Wednesday morning with Captain Henry Hansen and Driver Ray Montgomery to offer assistance, on reaching the scene, found no trace of the Celtic. They returned to port at 11 o'clock last night. The Celtic hit the beach dead on at full speed. Aboard were a crew of six men and a woman. They stayed on board. The United States vessel Matilda Foss was standing by and evidently succeeded in the attempt to refloat the Celtic on high tide later in the day. The Celtic is owned by the Fidalgo Packing Co. of Seattle. It is believed that she did not suffer any major hull damage in the stranding.

New Legion Head Named

WINNIPEG — Group Captain Alfred Watts of Vancouver was today elected Dominion president of the Canadian Legion in annual convention here. He succeeds Lt. Col. L. D. M. Baxter of Winnipeg.

Windsor Has Rampant Vice

WINDSOR — A prosecutor here has resigned and two police commissioners have offered to resign following the making of a report by two inspectors of the Ontario provincial police who made an investigation and have found that vice is rampant in Windsor and the authorities must have known it.

Reds Report Try At Beach Landing

TOKYO — A North Korean Communist radio at Pyongyang in a badly garbled broadcast tonight, appeared to be saying Allied forces have attempted an amphibious landing at Inchon, Port of Seoul, on the Yellow Sea. The Red propaganda broadcast heard here claimed the reported attempt was repulsed and six American vessels, most of them destroyers, were sunk. A bombardment by British and American cruisers of the port was announced earlier by Gen. MacArthur's headquarters. Inchon is 22 miles west of Seoul.

Applewhaite Puts Poser

OTTAWA (Special to Daily News)—In a brief speech in the budget debate last night, E. T. Applewhaite, M.P. for Skeena, referred to the lengthy criticism of the government's handling of matters connected with the European crisis and pointed out that no alternative to the government's policy had been offered. The Skeena member asked the Opposition: "What would you do?" As yet there has been no reply to Mr. Applewhaite's question.

Last Minute K.O. Saves Lamotta

DETROIT — Squat Jake Lamotta dramatically saved his world middleweight championship last night by coming from behind in the final 13 seconds to knock out Laurent Dauthuille in 2:47 of the 15th round. Cards of all three judges showed the underdog Frenchman ahead before the stunning ending.

War Inevitable, Senator Claims

OTTAWA — The Senate got another warning yesterday that a third world war is on the way and Canada faces the "greatest struggle we have ever faced" and should speed rearmament preparations. The warning came from Senator John Haig, Progressive Conservative leader, who said he is convinced of the inevitability of war "as sure as the sun will rise tomorrow."

Gyros Back Blood Bank

Prince Rupert Gyro Club, at its monthly business meeting Wednesday, decided that it should back up the forthcoming Red Cross blood bank campaign by having its members participate in donor canvass. C. G. Ham will assign Gyro members to house calls in an area between Donald Street and McLymont Park. Ben Parker, Jack Lindsay and George Murray were named a committee to proceed with the annual Apple Day sale. Other revenue producing efforts are also being contemplated by the club to raise funds against the retirement of indebtedness to members on the McLymont Park swimming pool project. The club will have a special evening business meeting next week.

Vivien Leigh Is Down To Earth

HOLLYWOOD—They had a press conference for Vivien Leigh and you'd be surprised at the things she discussed. Such things as avocados, square dancing, and nonshifting cars. A number of the press were ushered into an extra fancy dining room near the set of "A Streetcar Named Desire." Miss Leigh's first American film in 10 years. She soon appeared, dressed in a faded dressing gown and a blonde wig for her role. She proved to be more down to earth than the classy surroundings. "We discovered square dancing," she reported, speaking of herself and her husband, Sir Lawrence Olivier, also here for a film role. "It was the first we'd ever done and we found it great fun." "We went to a party for children at Edna Best's, intending to stay a half-hour. We stayed all evening and had a wonderful time. Square dancing seems to be the best possible way to get one's exercise." Someone asked if she is driving a car in California. "Oh, no," she replied. "The traffic is too terrible. And I wouldn't want to try one of those cars that shifts itself, like the one you have here. I like to shift gears and put in the clutch, not have the car drive itself. That frightens me." "What food is she enjoying most that she didn't get in England? There was no hesitation: "Avocados!" Miss Leigh dropped one remark that set the reporters scribbling. Asked about Olivier's plans to film more Shakespeare, she replied: "I don't think he'd reveal if he rir. Orson Wells might start filming the same thing immediately."

Churchill Challenge, Election May Result

LONDON, (CP) — Prime Minister Attlee announced today the Labor Government is going ahead with its plans to nationalize the iron and steel industry. Winston Churchill, Conservative leader, promptly declared he would ask Commons to adopt a virtual motion of censure. The motion will be debated next Tuesday. If passed it might lead Prime Minister Attlee to resign and ask for a new national election. Churchill said he will offer a motion "regretting that, at this most critical time in our national safety and affairs abroad, we should, by this act of Parliament, be plunged into fiercest party controversy at home." Clement Davies, leader of the Liberal party, chimed in with similar criticism. Labor has already brought under nationalization coal mines, Bank of England, railways, long distance trucking, gas, electricity, communications and airways.

No Forces To Europe

OTTAWA — The government "at this time" is not considering the raising of Canadian forces to dispatch to Europe, Prime Minister L. S. St. Laurent told the House of Commons Wednesday. He said that none of the Atlantic Pact nations had suggested that Canada send men to Europe. Canada's \$300,000,000 arms-for-Europe program, Mr. St. Laurent said, will do more for the over-all defence of Europe than money spent for an overseas contingent. The government survived two ballot tests during the day. Progressive-Conservative and C.C.F. motions calling for votes of non-confidence in the government were defeated. Both motions expressed dissatisfaction with the emergency budget.

Testing New Reefer Car

OTTAWA — Canadian scientists have been working with the railway people to make cold cars colder. "They've come up with some really chilly cars, too, but there will have to be high-level decision on railway policy before any changes can be effected. "There are... economic and operating problems that are a matter of policy," said the Fisheries Department in releasing the results of the tests. The National Research Council and Fisheries Research Board co-operated with the Canadian Pacific and Canadian National Railways in performing the experiments. The tests were made to meet demand for refrigerator-car temperatures below 15 degrees Fahrenheit for transportation of frozen fish and quick-frozen fruits and vegetables. Two experimental cars and a standard refrigerator car were used in the transcontinental tests. The standard Canadian car is cooled with ice and salt in overhead bunkers extending from end to end of the car. These provide uniform cooling and, even in warmest weather, temperatures of 15 degrees can be maintained on long hauls. In one test, however, one of the experimental cars maintained zero temperatures throughout. It was a C.N.R. car remodelled internally and equipped with two gasoline-driven refrigeration units. MANY DIFFICULTIES Although the car was a success, one big problem involved the replacement of the gasoline engines by a different type of engine to meet fire regulations. Other problems included the matter of maintenance crews and costs and the acceptability of such mechanical equipment on United States routings where Canadian cars must be operated and serviced. The other experimental car was a C.P.R. standard model cooled with ice and salt, but with new bunkers designed by the N.R.C. The C.P.R. maintained a temperature approximately five degrees lower than that obtained with the standard bunker. In a test from Prince Rupert, B.C., to Toronto, this car kept its load below 10 degrees. The Fisheries Department in its report said that previous tests had shown that the addition of 20 per cent ammonium nitrate to the salt and ice in the bunkers lowered the temperatures a further five degrees. Analysis showed that the new bunkers would involve a slight increase in capital expenditure, while the motor-driven system not only would involve an increase in capital costs, but also an "appreciable" boost in operating costs.

Tenders Called For New Homes

VANCOUVER — Tenders for one of the largest home building projects in recent years—probably to exceed \$4,000,000 in value—are being called by Central Mortgage and Housing Corporation. The project will provide nearly 800 units for Vancouver Island and the mainland, some of those cancelled last June when original estimates fell below bids received. Military homes comprise the majority of the units but 300 or more are planned for civilians. Belmont Park at Victoria will draw 280 new homes. There are 15 more at Esquimalt, 55 at Chilliwack and 110 more for the lower mainland—all these being previously-cancelled projects. The tense war situation is said cause of the large military allocation.

More Sabotage British Navy

LONDON — The British Admiralty has reported the thirteenth incident of sabotage in the navy since the start of the Korean war. Sand was placed in the lubricating system of the aircraft carrier Vengeance, the discovery being made recently after she had put to sea.

Flash

"SUPERFICIAL" DAMAGE WASHINGTON D.C.—Three United States destroyers suffered "superficial damage" in a naval bombardment of the Korean port of Ichon, the Navy said today. A spokesman said that reports from Far Eastern naval headquarters indicated American casualties in Yellow Sea action off Korea were "light." (The North Korean Communist radio had claimed that six American vessels were sunk).

WASHINGTON—The Federal Bureau of Investigation announced yesterday the arrest of ten persons in a \$2,000,000 international lottery ticket ring. The arrests were made in several cities, F.B.I. Director J. Edgar Hoover said.

ST. MERRYN, England — Four airmen were believed killed yesterday in two plane crashes. The crashes occurred during Royal Navy exercises.



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As I See It

WHITHER INDIA?

SOMETIMES the most important world news does not get reported in our papers; or else gets buried in a three or four line item on an inside page.

The recent upset in politics in India is a case in point. Here is the story in a nutshell: For many months there has been a struggle for power going on between Prime Minister Nehru and his conservative Vice-Premier, Sardar Patel. This came to a head in the recent elections for the executive positions in the Congress Party.

Nehru backed J. B. Kripalani for the Presidency. Patel backed Purshottamdas Tandon. The vote was

A brief cable from India to the New York Times says: "When Mr. Tandon has taken over the party machine he will dissolve

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The Congress executive and will reconstitute it with his own nominees, who will support Sardar Patel."

THE NEW PRESIDENT of the Congress Party has been a sharp critic of Nehru's foreign and domestic policies. He is a vehement advocate of rapid extension of the use of the Hindi language, which is not understood by vast numbers of people in central and south India. These call Mr. Tandon a "language imperialist."

To drive home the possible meaning of the Tandon victory the New Delhi Hindustan Times and Evening News printed the Congress party election report in the Hindi language—instead of the usual English.

A FEW MONTHS ago one of the most respected and shrewdest Indians summed up Indian politics as follows. This was for my personal information, but I pass it on for what it is worth: "Nehru," he said, "is a moderate liberal socialist of the type of Attlee or Coldwell, who nominally heads a cabinet dominated in fact by hard-boiled capitalists like Patel. The masses of India are potentially communist, because the peasant-landlord question is the most urgent unsolved problem."

THE MAIN EFFECT of the Nehru setback will be to weaken India's position of mortal influence in international affairs. We have already seen a spectacular example of this. Nehru himself was supposed either to be going to China on a peace making mission; or to be coming to the UN Assembly. Now it is definitely announced, he will stay home. With free India's first general election only a few months away, and with the "machine" of party politics definitely in rival hands, Nehru will have to mend his political fences.

ANOTHER UNFORTUNATE effect of the Nehru setback will be to lessen the chances of a conciliatory settlement of the Kashmir dispute.

If Nehru had only to consider his own wishes, he might be willing to reach some sort of acceptable compromise with the hard-boiled leaders of Pakistan. But now the hard-boiled old boys in Nehru's own rear are taking over the political machine from him. That will mean a more nationalistic, conservative position on the part of India. All this could not have happened at a worse time.

Ray Reflects and Reminisces

About seven years ago a nine million dollar port warehouse was built at Prince Rupert as a supplemental defence measure. Nothing in Canada surpassed it, for size, up-to-dateness and general excellence of construction. It was frankly an object of envy.

Everyone had a different guess Monday evening. Unexpectedly, H.M.C.S. Ontario had sailed. There was no question about that! But why? There was an official explanation of course. It had something to do with training. But this had no bearing on the scope and ingenuity of conjectures. No prizes were offered.

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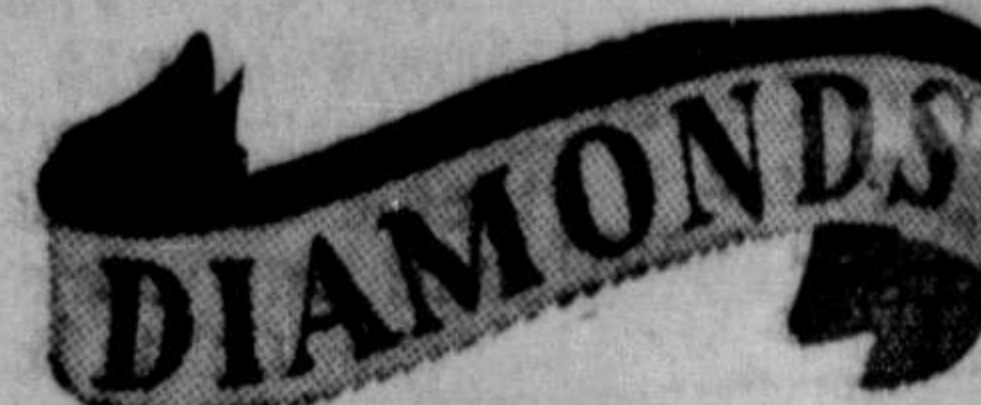

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

Musical Delight—

Singers Are Impressive

Horsfall Group Charms
 Prince Rupert For Third
 Successive Year

High in enthusiastic appreciation if not in numerical strength was the audience which attended at the Civic Centre auditorium last night and was transported to realms of tunesome delight by Horsfall Singers paying a third memorable visit to Prince Rupert. The attendance approached three hundred. Unless Prince Rupert people lend better patronage to such affairs, they are in danger of losing them. And that would be too bad for a city where it is so often lamented that there is only too little of such type of high-class entertainment.

Back for this show were the demure and diminutive soprano Vera Bryson, the sultry and tempestuous mezzo-soprano Wini Hutt, vigorous tenor Karl Norman while handsome Derek MacDermot is a newcomer who made a highly pleasing impression with his fine bass-baritone. As piano accompanist Reg J. Hawken is an able successor to the late lamented Basil Horsfall whose spirit lives on with the show although his presence may be gone.

Remembering the previous "Night in Vienna" of 1948 and "Cavalcade of Song" (1949), local music lovers anticipated "Melodies Immortal" with keen interest and they were not disappointed. Delightful memories of the previous production were kept green by this new offering which was on complete par if not excelling in some respects.

The fast-moving melodic program, made colorful with its introductory and closing numbers in costume, commenced with a full-dress scene from Julius Benedict's "Lily of Killarney," a musical version of the "Colleen Bawn" rendered with admirable lyrical expression and portrayed with stirring emotion by the full company.

The program ended with a familiar episode from Verdi's "Il Trovatore" with its high drama, also in costume.

Between the two impressive operatic excerpts the audience was treated with a succession of song hits which passed in quick and smooth sequence. Recitative

sentimental, passionate, comedy, classic and straight ballad items were intermingled with selections from such unforgettable works as Friml's "Firefly," "Rose Marie" and "Vagabond King," Monckton's "Country Girl," Herbert's "Mlle. Modiste," "Princess Pat" and "Fortune Teller," Coward's "Third Little Show," Norton's "Chu Chin Chow," Offenbach's "Genevieve de Brabant," Verdi's "Rigoletto," Cole's "Girl From Kay's," Monckton's "Orchid," Ruben's "Miss Hook of Holland" and Lehár's "Land of Smiles," "Count of Luxembourg" and "Merry Widow." Solos, duets and quartettes all being admirably adapted to the talents of the artists.

Using only English translations of their renditions of scenes and songs from the operas and operettas, some of which are rarely heard except in foreign tongues, made the show completely understandable and, therefore the more delightful. Nor this did detract from the effectiveness of gestures and emotional outbursts of the artists.

Civic Centre Manager Don Forward was assisted in putting on the show by members of the Soroptimist club in the persons of Miss Muriel Vance, Mrs. Mattson and Mrs. J. J. Ehy who acted as usherettes.

The singers arrived in the city from Vancouver. They are now commenced on a tour of the province which will take them through the central interior by car with their next stand tonight at Terrace.

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The Experts Say...

SMALL MEALS

If home to you means "one room with grill privileges" then a few tips on how to prepare small quantities of food tastefully should prove helpful.

Health and welfare Department officials say that even for working people keeping house alone can be easy and interesting. A little thought given to planning can make the preparation of varied, nutritious meals a pleasant hobby as well as an aid to health and vitality.

A double-boiler is the first "must" in every miniature kitchen. A pressure cooker also is invaluable as a time and fuel saver.

Here are a few cooking hints which might prove useful: Always remember that too high a temperature shrinks meat. Tougher cuts may be cooked slowly in tomato juice, canned tomatoes or water. Make gravy with the liquid later.

When frying meat, cook in hot

uncovered frying pan with fat sizzling on both sides and turn frequently.

To braise: Brown meat in hot fat, cover and cook slowly in its own juice or in a little water or liquid from vegetables.

To stew: Cover with water and simmer. Add vegetables.

Fish May be Served Several Ways

To fry: Roll in flour or cracker crumbs; fry on both sides in well-greased pan. It's cooked when it flakes.

To boil: Wrap in parchment paper, tie with string and boil in salted water. Allow five minutes a pound for fillets; eight to 10 minutes a pound for thick fish. Serve with a lemon wedge or white sauce with chopped hard-cooked eggs.

Left-over fish may be served creamed in white sauce; added to mashed potato and fried as fish-cakes; or used in salads.

Vegetables may be cooked together to save space and fuel. Put those requiring the longest cooking in first.

Pudding can be cooked in the top of a double-boiler while vegetables cook in the bottom.

Do not overlook vegetables.

Many left-over vegetables may be browned in the frying pan creamed, or served with cheese sauce. Left-over beets may be pickled in vinegar.

The Health Department has other homemaking hints for the single person or working couple in its booklet "Meals For One Or Two."

House Decoration In Post-War U.K.

LONDON—Interior decorating in Britain has shown interesting developments since the second world war. Housewives seem to have an increased feeling for mixing colors.

A fireplace will often be highlighted with a different color to the rest of the room or by a contrasting wallpaper. In a bedroom, the wall behind the bed may be treated similarly for emphasis.

Some people prefer to highlight the wall facing the bed, reasoning that this is the one that the sleeper sees most. One attractive bedroom designed recently—a young girl's room—had three white walls and one papered in blue with a white star pattern. The same paper was used on the ceiling, being brought down a few inches on the white walls in scallops, giving a canopied effect.

For rooms with a north or east aspect, pink, one of the warmer colors, is a popular choice. Several tones can be utilized in a single room. A room with pale pink walls and smoky pink carpet, for example, might have wallpaper on one wall in a pink background with a trellis

design in crimson. With too much pink apt to become insipid, crimson cushions and curtains of crimson or vivid green provide a good foil.

"TONE" IMPORTANT

The aspect of a room is still considered important, but the old theory of using yellow for a sunlight effect in a north room is becoming outdated. It is not so much color that matters as tone; it is as possible to have a cold yellow as a warm one, or even a cold red.

The color of light entering a window is also considered in choosing wall colors. In the country there may be a greenish reflection from the trees; in this case blues and pinks are avoided, with the nod going to yellows. Red or yellow brick garden walls and blue water views call for completely different decoration schemes.

Color also is being applied to alter the shapes of badly-proportioned rooms or to reduce or enlarge their size. Ceilings can be "painted out" or lowered. Blue, for instance, is a "distant" color, but orange, yellow and red seem to jump towards you.

Lighting, too, is being used

for its decorative effects. Contrasting lighting will focus attention on a particularly attractive part of the room or pieces of furniture.


