

TINY PLANE

Spratling's airplane is equipped with a 75-h.p. Continental motor which gives it a cruising speed of about 110 miles per hour. It is a two-seater but Spratling is flying solo, having extra space filled with luggage. Spratling has been in Alaska about two months ,six weeks having been spent at Juneau. Prior to that he had made a swing in his plane around northern and western Alaska including calls at Fairbanks, Nome and Kotzebue. Britain aroused the French early this month when she made a joint announcement with the United States that the German people would be allowed to decide future ownership of the Ruhr's basic industries and that the Germans would be given immediate limited control of them.

## THE U.E.F.B.

IN THE MANY APPEALS to which Prince Rupert people are called upon to subscribe and with another festive season approaching our happy land, we consider it fitting and proper to draw special attention to the presently current United Emergency Fund for Britain which commenced this week and continues to December 5.

The purpose is very simple. Through co-operaation between Canadian and British governments, extensive savings have been made possible through the bulk handling and shipping of food and other supplies savings will result from free ocean transportation, free dockage and handling, free warehousing and exemption from customs and excise duties and from insurance charges. All moneys saved will be converted into more food and supplies for the United Kingdom.

Making dollars buy more and bringing urgently needed relief to ration-weary peoples of Britain is the two-fold objective of the drive.

Besides the financial co-operation of organizations and groups the Fund welcomes individual contributions. All such donations will be used for bulk purchases in Canada of food and other supplies and shipped in bulk to U.E.F.B. warehouses in the United Kingdom for general distribution to peoples who are not presently receiving gift parcels from Canada. Happy and well supplied Canadians would do well to subscribe generously.

## 'VANCOUVER'

THERE IS A CITY in British Columbia bearing the name Vancouver. There is a large island known as Vancouver Island. And there is a city called Vancouver in the State of Washington.

This has been causing more or less confusion for many years and it is becoming worse. The Chamber of Commerce in Victoria, feeling particularly aggravated, may possibly move to have the island renamed. That would give at least some relief.

There is but little misunderstanding on the coast for the people generally are familiar with the situation. But this is far from being the case thousands of miles away. There recently appeared in a Montreal publication, a trade article, a sub-head describing Victoria as the "leading city, largest seaport and commerce centre of Vancouver, B.C." One can understand the reaction to a blunder like this.

## CARRY GOSPEL AROUND WORLD

Appeals Heard at Meeting of Local Bible Society

Throwing out to the attention of the audience the command of the Lord Do "Go ye, therefore, and teach all nations," Judge W. E. Fisher, president of the Prince Rupert branch of the British and Foreign Bible Society, at a special meeting in St. Andrew's Cathedral Hall, said that thousands had already done so but pointed out that "Christian soldiers must have ammunition and it is up to us to provide it."

Briefly, Juage Fisher recounted how missionaries had had to learn unwritten languages, commit them to writing, then translate the Bible and send it to the Bible Society for printing. The Society, in turn, sent the Bibles back to the missionary. "This," said the udge, "is the ammunition without which they cannot win their battle."

Miss Margaret Fraser, secretary, read an interesting report. Converts on the foreign field grasped the real meaning of "Thus saith the Lord," Miss Fraser stated.

Major Yurgensen, Salvation Army, speaker of the evening, told the audience that transformation of the Africans war! was due to the Bible, giving several interesting and astonishillustrations. In Africa, Bibles are so prized, that occasionally a black market is discovered. Approximately 12,- 9 000,000 copies a year are sold, given away, or traded for eggs, chickens, peacock plumes. Inagainst their enemies in order to spread the news of Peace and Goodwill toward men.

Judge Fisher expressed on behalf of the Society appreciation to the Major for his vivid and informative address.

Ways and means were discussed for increasing the amount of gifts. It was with a feeling of optimism that the meeting was closed with the singing of the hymn, "Go, labor on; spend and be spent." Peter Lien accompanied the singing at the piano.
