Pair Sought In Alaskan Wilds

FAIRBANKS, Alaska (CP)—Missing for more than a week in the barren tundra country between here and the Arctic coast, a navy scientist and a veteran bush pilot are being sought. The scientist's name is withheld by the Navy pending notification of relatives. The pilot is Bert Galbreath, 39, an Arkansas ranch owner. Nothing has been heard of the duo since they took off last Tuesday headed for Barrow. Their Norseman plane carried fire arms and provisions—sufficient for many weeks, Alaska airlines officials said.

Switchmen Out On U.S. Lines

CHICAGO (CP)—Ten midwestern United States railroads are threatened with a strike Tuesday morning by 6,000 switchmen. The walkout was called last night by the Switchmen's Union of North America (AFL) in a wage dispute. It came less than 48 hours after settlement of the crippling six-day firemen's strike against five carriers. Five unions are not affected by the new walk out. Union President Arthur J. Glover said in Washington the strike was set to enforce demands for 48 hours' pay for a 40-hour work week.

Manitoba Aid Put To Senate

WASHINGTON (CP)—A resolution calling on President Truman to extend immediate aid to flood-harried Manitoba was introduced in the Senate by Senator Kenneth Wherry (R. Neb.) but Democratic leader Scott Lucas of Illinois objected to immediate consideration of the resolution on the grounds it was not a proper way to proceed. Lucas said Canada is in no financial distress. The resolution is likely to be discussed again.

Restating Democracy

LONDON (CP)—Hon. L. B. Pearson, Canada's external affairs minister, called on the free world to find fresh and imaginative phrases in the propaganda war with Russia. Democratic truths are as valid as ever, he said, but "they need restating in forms which penetrate the hearts and minds of our peoples."

Prince Rupert To Jasper Road In Government Plan

Minister Of Finance Sympathizes With This District's Highway Case

"I have always thought of the road from Prince Rupert to Jasper as a third transprovincial highway and the completion of the 60-mile gap east of Prince George is definitely in our long range plan which is now going along at accelerated pace," said Hon. Herbert Anscomb, provincial minister of finance, to the Daily News.

Mr. Anscomb is visiting the city for two days in the course of a tour of the central interior to inspect government agencies, a policy of visitations which he expects to make an annual institution. Mr. Anscomb expressed satisfaction with the work being done here by Government Agent G. F. Forbes and his staff.

In the carrying out of the long range highway program, for which there was a further \$87,000,000 loan bill at the recent session of the Legislature to provide for an eight year program from 1950 on, the highway from Prince Rupert and Prince George was definitely included for construction, reconstruction and hard surfacing, the minister of finance said.

The other transprovincial highways Mr. Anscomb, of course, explained as those which passed through the southern part of the province and out of the province through the Crows Nest and the Big Bend Highway which had been chosen as the TransCanada Highway route.

Mr. Anscomb expressed full sympathy with the contention of the people of Prince Rupert and Central British Columbia for the hard surfacing of their highway as rapidly as possible. "It is all in the plan," he assured.

Mr. Anscomb told of the original \$210,000,000 program which had been inaugurated in his regime as minister of public works and evidenced that he had lost no enthusiasm for the carrying out of that program in spite of the fact that it now devolved upon himself, as minister of finance, to find the money. In the meantime, the program was moving along even more rapidly than might be expected and the hard surfacing was moving northward with quite a stretch already on the lower part of the highway leading into Central British Columbia.

United States And Canada Are Totalitarian Target

Sounds Warning —
Serious Talk By American Envoy At Board Of Trade Get-To-Gether—Felicitations Exchanged In Atmosphere Of Goodwill

There are only two camps in the cold war. One is the united camp of totalitarian communism, which has world conquest as its aim and North American democracy as its definite target. The other is the disunited force of democratic capitalism, declared A. W. Klieforth, eloquent United States consul-general from Vancouver, who delivered the feature address of the evening last night when the Prince Rupert Chamber of Commerce entertained the touring goodwill party of the Vancouver Board of Trade at a complimentary dinner.

"The Communists are proud of their faith and are ready to die for the cause. How many of us would die for capitalism and our way of life?" asked Mr. Klieforth. Mr. Klieforth delved deep into 34 years' of experience in the diplomatic service of his country, much of it spent in the totalitarian nations of Europe—first in Russia in the last days of the Czar and the commencement of the regime of Lenin and Trotsky, later in Germany during the early days of Adolf Hitler's rise. He described in vivid word picture his impressions from personal contact of Lenin and Hitler both of whom he met—Lenin with his compelling, piercing eyes which spoke more than mumbling speech could utter; Hitler the universal human abnormality, the mad genius.

Totalitarianism—no matter which type, Communist, Nazi or Fascist—had the one cardinal idea—nationalization of all property and conquest of the whole world—and one technique—capturing the mind of the individual and milking out the brains and thought.

Taking pride in calling himself a capitalist ("although I may not have any capital") and a Christian, Mr. Klieforth deplored and contemplated with some trepidation the continued failure of those who realized the dangers of communism to unite against its peril. The capitalist was still ashamed and apologetic but not so the Communist who in his fanaticism was ready to die for his cause. Deep-rooted in the intensely

nationalistic mind of the average German had been the expectation of world conquest and the same Mr. Klieforth declared was the idea of the average Russian whose leaders were undoubtedly preparing for war in the accomplishment of this aim. And how was democracy to be sold to Europe, asked Mr. Klieforth. Democracy, he believed, could only be explained by the living and experiencing of it.

Canada-U.S. Relations
Turning to the subject to Canadian and United States relations and the development of trade, Mr. Klieforth felt he could presume in his position to speak frankly. "We Americans," declared the speaker, "feel that Canada lacks in imagination and modern advertising methods. Canada is unable to sell itself and you cannot complain of lack of markets if you do not advertise yourselves."

Canadians, Mr. Klieforth felt, were entirely unrealizing of the compelling value of that label "Made in Canada" in the United States. Despite the failure of Canadians, in their unjustifiable modesty to sell themselves, Americans knew they got value for their money in Canadian products.

The speaker alluded to the enormous possibilities of expansion of tourist trade by Americans in Canada. It seemed a big thing today but in reality it was only what came of its own momentum. Canadians themselves were really doing little to encourage it.

"After all," Mr. Klieforth concluded, "we are one people and it is in the selfish interest of the United States—militarily and economically—that Canada should develop, growing in (Continued on Page 4)

Huge Loan Is Already Sold

OTTAWA (CP)—Finance Minister Abbott today announced the \$745,000,000 record refunding loan launched Monday has been heavily oversubscribed. Bonds closed at 8:01 C.D.T. today. He also announced that the issue, largest of its kind in government history, has been allotted as follows:

\$50,000,000 will be in 2 3/4 per cent 18 year bonds.
\$395,000,000 in two per cent 4 1/2 year bonds.

Abbott said the government was "gratified" that investors had responded "so eagerly" to the offering. The response was substantial evidence of confidence in the future of the country.

Skeena Water Levels Drop

Water level of the Skeena River up to 1 p.m. Wednesday ranged from 18.5 feet at Amsbury to 15 feet at Shames. At Amsbury the level dropped six inches while at Shames, the drop was recorded as five inches. These figures were quoted by the Canadian National Railways.

Chusan Isles Fall to Reds

TAIPEI, Formosa (CP)—Nationalist China last night announced the abandonment of the Chusan Islands. The official announcement, coming on the heels of vows by Nationalists to defend the islands to the death, said 150,000 troops were evacuated. The Chusans were extremely important to the Nationalists. From that base, 100 miles southeast of Shanghai, an effective air and naval blockade of the big Communist port had been effected.

PRINCE RUPERT CAN HELP

PRINCE RUPERT has launched a Winnipeg relief movement and, if any city can well afford to do so, it is here.

Even since before incorporation, this has been a fortunate sort of place. There have been dull spells, but rarely serious. How many times has anything ever occurred here to warrant the call for help? CHOOSING A FLAG

ON April 17 the House of Commons without a dissenting vote, passed a resolution calling for the appointment of a committee to select a suitable design for a Canadian Ground Flag.

Ease of identification is of prime importance in any flag. A Royal Canadian Standard has been suggested which has this quality to a superlative degree.

It centres on its field the Maple Leaf which for many years has been regarded as a proper Canadian emblem. In two world wars our boys carried the Maple Leaf, with courage and honor, to all parts of the world, and today it is known as the emblem of Canada in every man's language. The Maple Leaf is a strong force for unity in Canada, because it is the one strictly Canadian emblem around which all loyal Canadians can rally.

Cornered prominently at the upper left of the Canadian standard is the Union Jack, the flag of the Commonwealth of Nations which proclaims the close unity of Canada with all the other free and peace-loving nations which constituted that model organization, of which Canada is a proud and valiant member.

A suggested Royal Canadian Navy flag closely resembles the Royal Navy flag of Britain, now on loan to our navy, the larger Cross of St. George being replaced by a red Maple Leaf. It should be a welcome companion to our Royal Canadian Air Force flag, and our Royal Canadian Ensign (Merchant Marine).

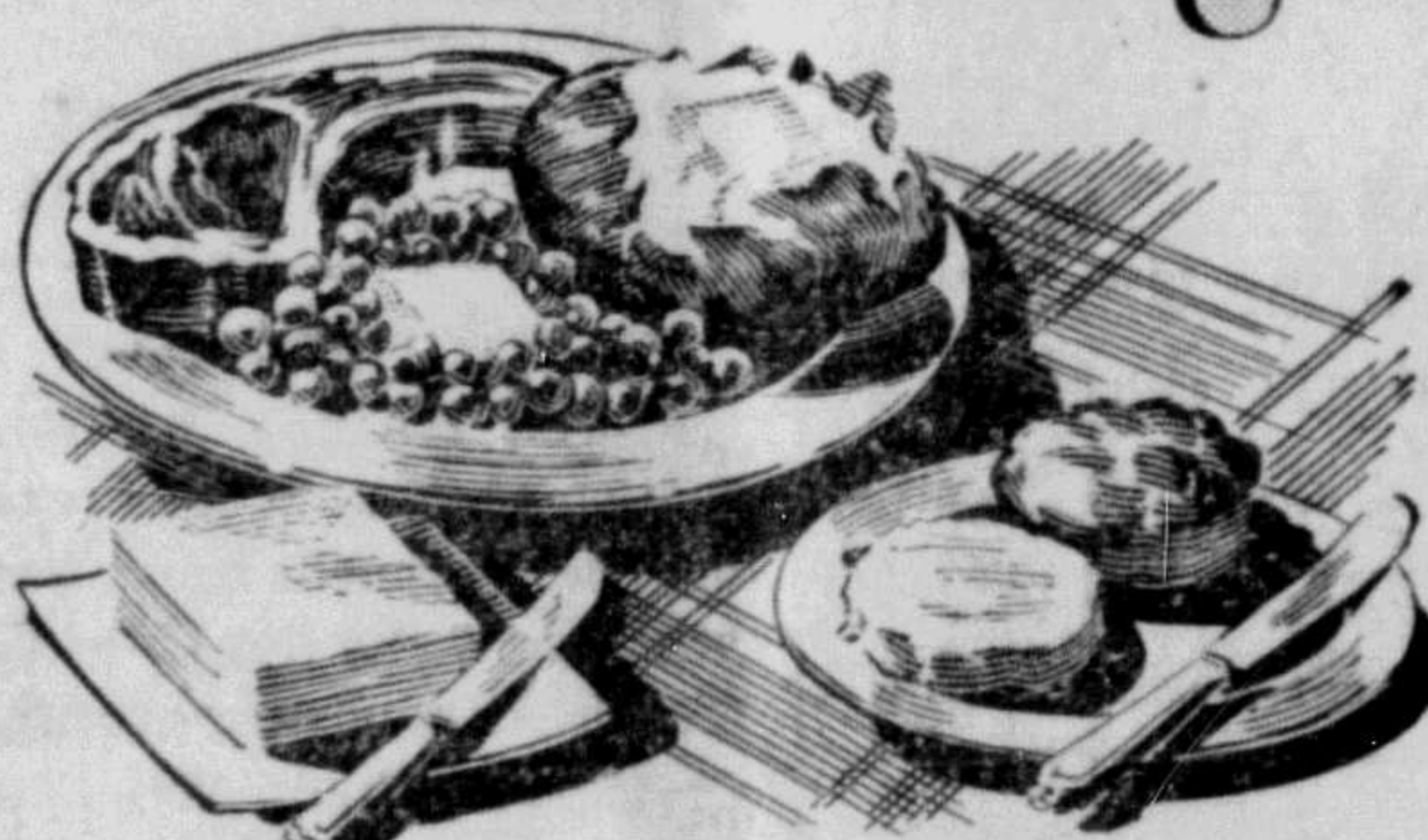

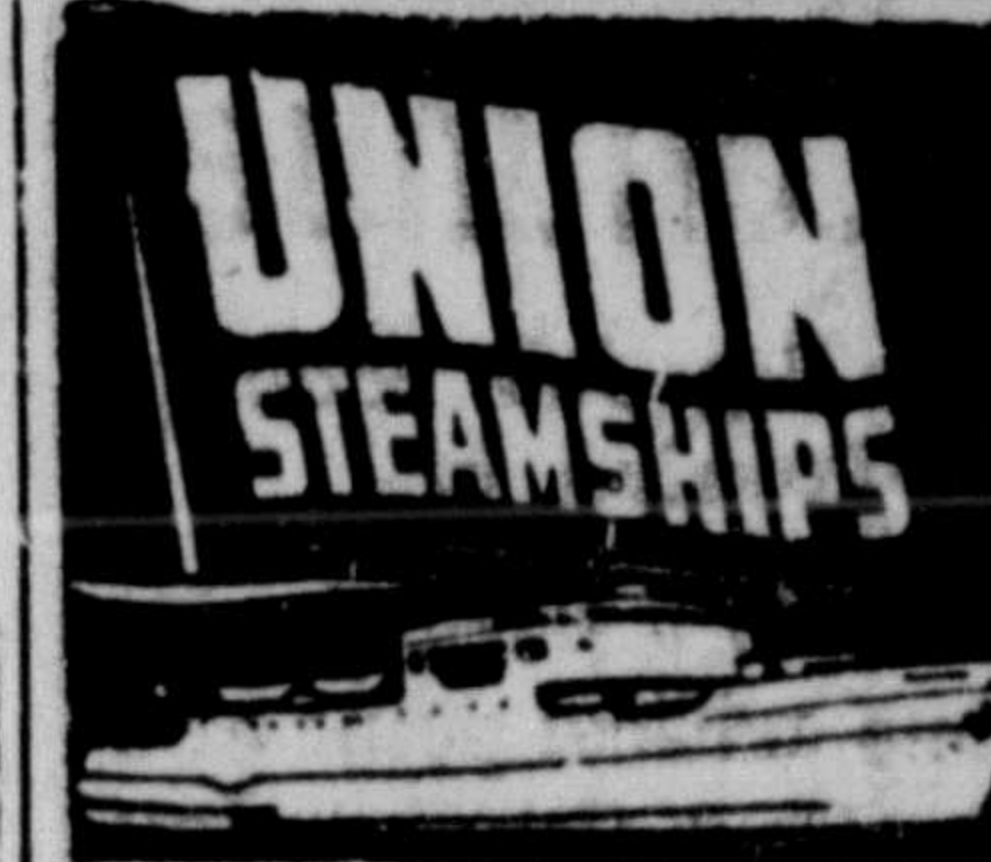

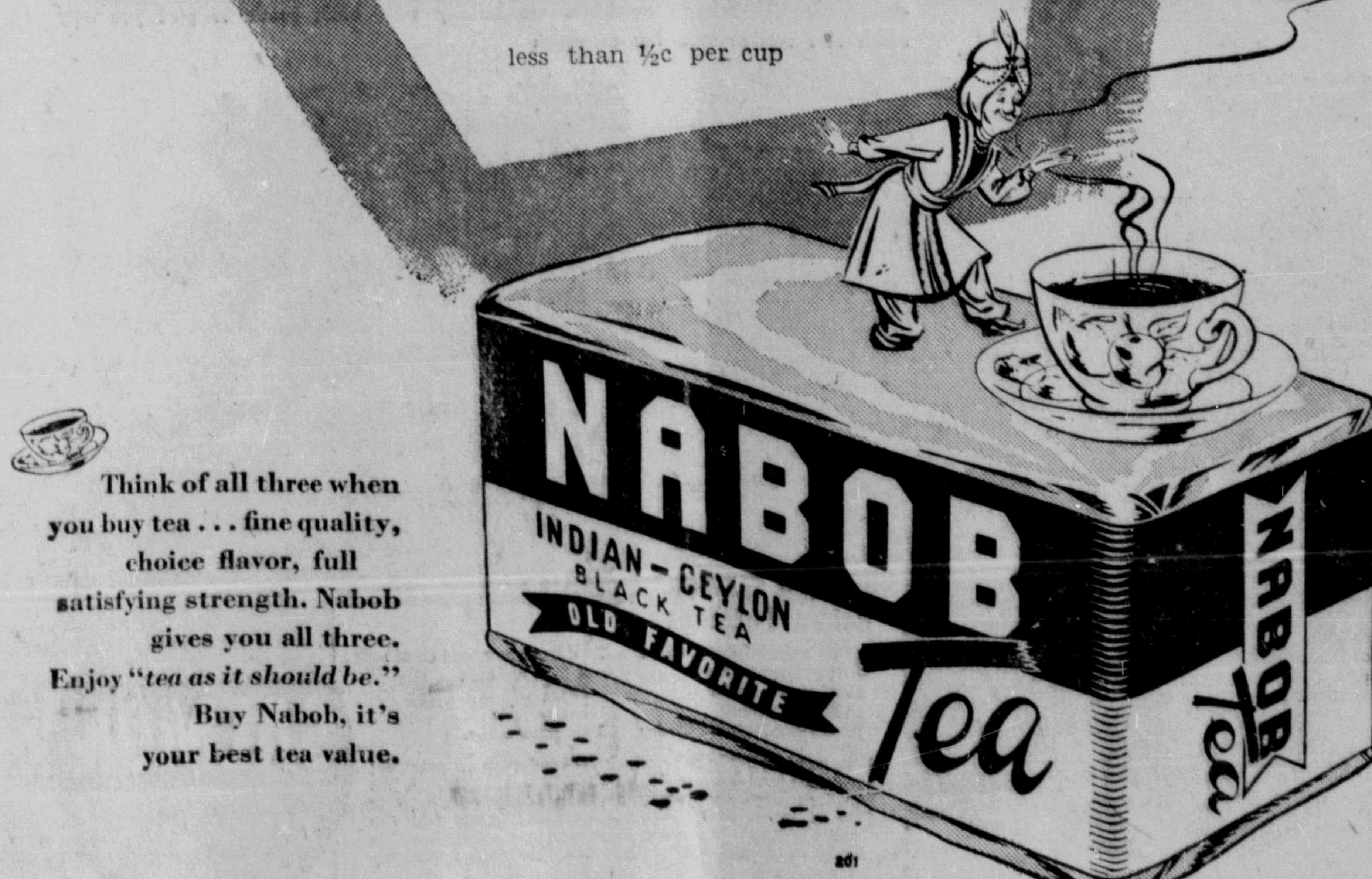

Vancouverites See Fishing
Industry and Marvel at Great
Cellulose Plant

Fish and pulp was the diet served Vancouver Board of Trade yesterday afternoon as they were conducted through Canadian Fish & Cold Storage Co. Ltd.'s plant at Seal Cove, Nelson Bros. Fisheries Ltd. plant at Port Edward and the new development of Columbia Cellulose Company at Watson Island.

At the cold storage plant they saw halibut being stored after they were taken off the boat, the deep freezing process where the frozen fish are handled like cord wood, the filleting plant and packaging tables. At Nelson Bros. they were conducted through the cannery, which, of course, is not in operation at this season.

But the awe-inspiring layout of Columbia Cellulose was the object of greatest interest by the larger part of the company. Here they saw the massive structures that will house the plant well advanced in construction. The huge

buildings are built of structural steel with cement slabs bolted on the walls and roofs. Floors have been poured with reinforcing steel rods 3/4 of an inch thick running through the 10-inch cement. The prefabricated slabs were adopted, after plans had been finalized, as being more modern and less costly than pouring cement walls. There would have been a slight modification of plans had the slab construction been decided upon before building commenced. As it is, the work has been little affected by the change.

Power for operation of the plant will be generated in the large company power house. Waste from pulp making supplemented by coal from Telkwa will produce the steam needed for the generators.

Pulpwood will be stored in a saw water mill pond formed by the land and the pier. From there it will be hauled up to the chippers located on a hill above the pulp plant and close to the pond. After being chipped it will move directly down hill to the main plant with digesters, going in the side near the sea and the finished product coming out the far end. A huge chip storage bin stands near the chipper.

It is not the intention of the company to go farther than the pulp-making stage at the local plant in the meantime. The pulp will be shipped from here to a plant in Mexico, where it will be further processed to make the hundreds of products that use cellulose as a base. The Mexican plant has been completed recently.

A number of guides were supplied by the company to answer the endless stream of questions asked by the visitors. It is hard to say who asked the most, the Vancouver visitors or those from Prince Rupert.

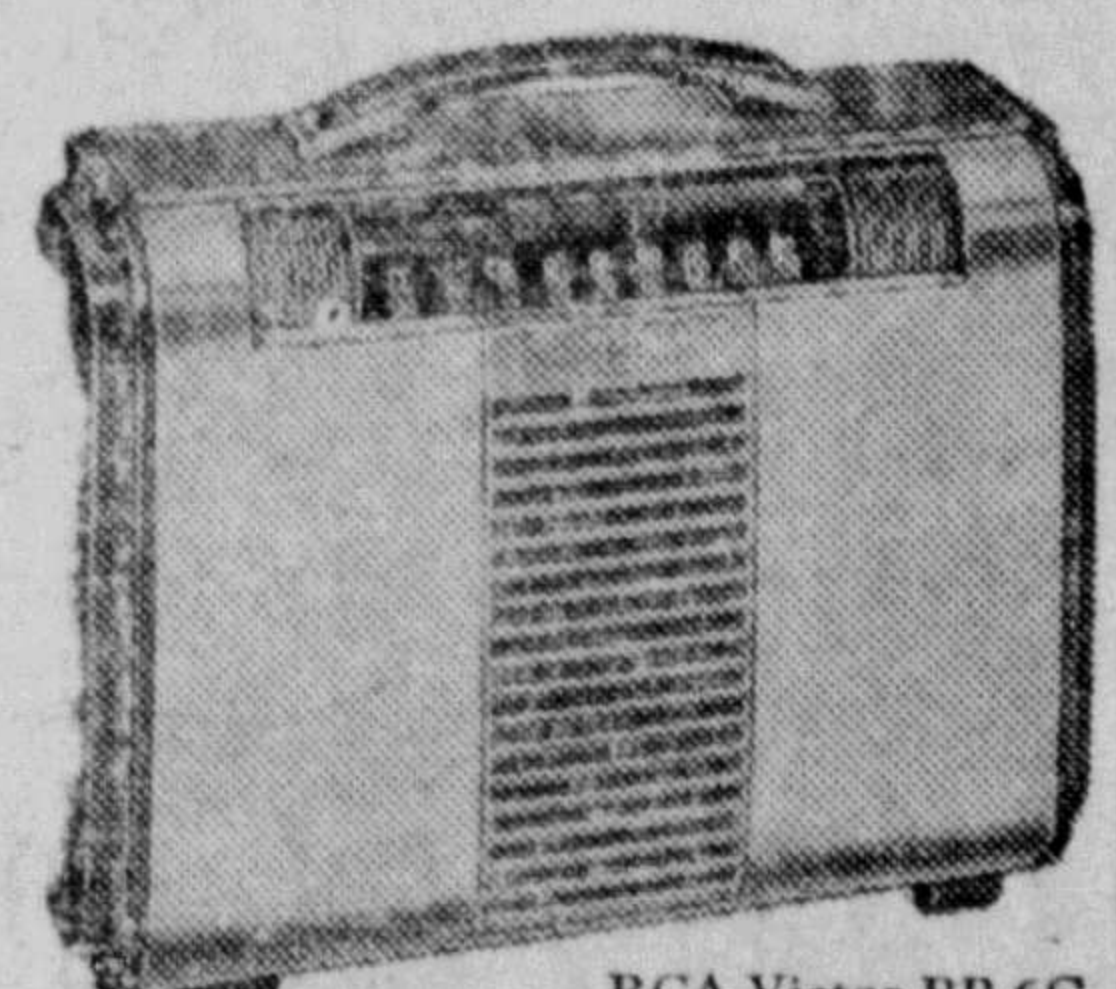

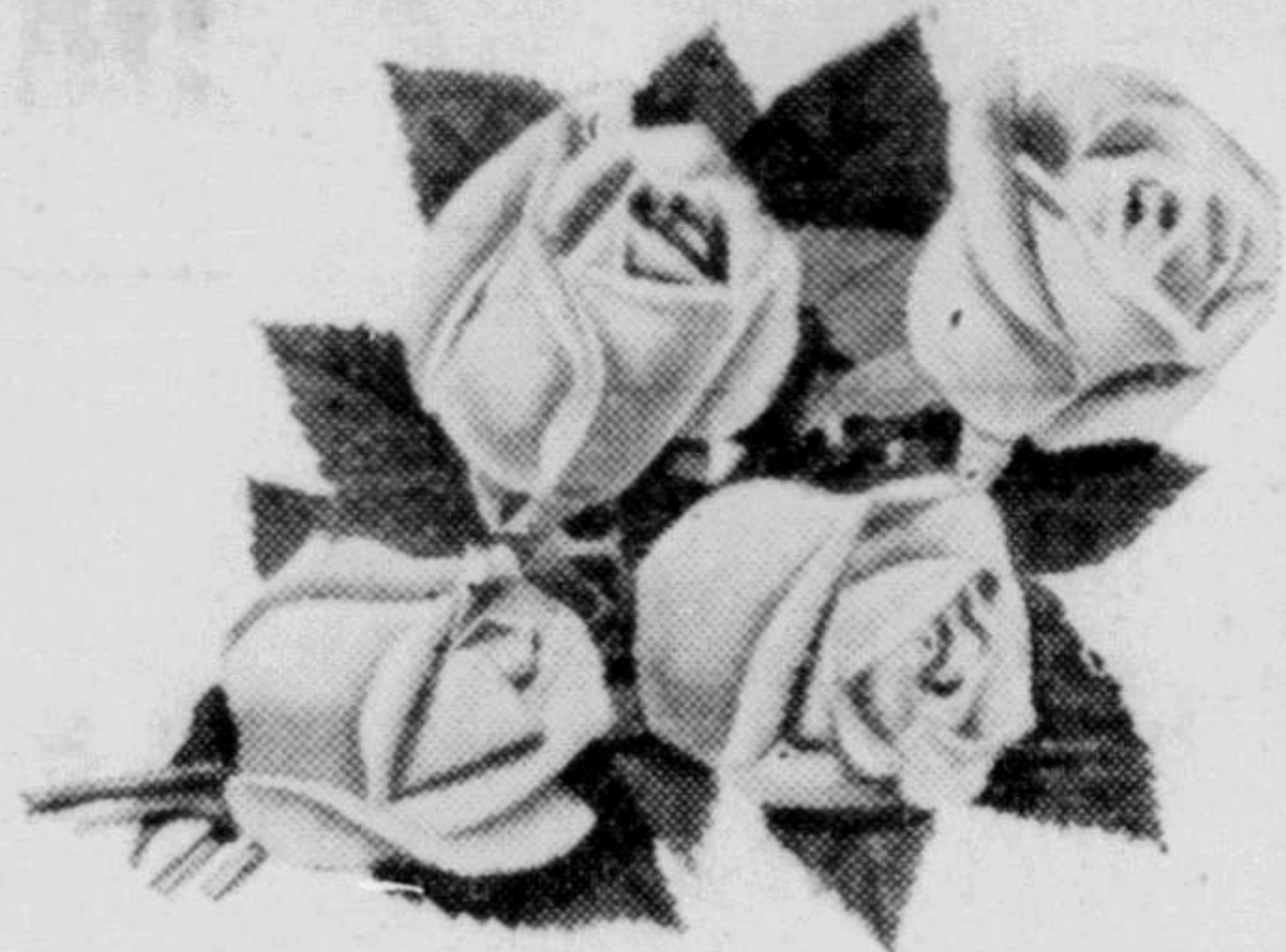

B.C. Exciting Living Place

British Columbia, a province of sagebrush, rolling hills, mountains, great rivers and lakes, whose resources have hardly been scratched, is destined to become one of the most exciting places to live in, declared J. W. K. Melville, on the executive council of the Vancouver Board of Trade and publicity agent for the Home Oil Company at Vancouver, who spoke to members of the Gyo Club at a luncheon in the Civic Centre yesterday.

With a rapid interesting talk, he skimmed over 100 years of B.C. history, which he called "immediate history," and explained to members that recent discoveries lead geologists to believe that one time—about 30 to 40,000 years ago—an oriental race inhabited British Columbia. He gave an account of domination, of this western coast by Spaniards, Russians, Americans and, finally, by the British, whose strong influence was through the Hudson's Bay Company.

Phases of development in this province make a glorious romance, he said. He paid tribute to the young Scots which left their country and built the foundation on which the present great province stands.

Speaking of population, he said that 100 years ago, B.C.'s population was less than 200. Figures now stand at 1,114,000. Last year, he continued, 5000 people came to live in this province and an additional 4,000 are expected to settle here this year.

The economy of this province sprang from agriculture and the gold rush in the late 80's, Mr. Melville stated.
