## Prince Rupert Hoopsters Getting Hot

### BO-ME-HI BEATS VICTORIA TO MOVE INTO SEMI-FINALS

Locals to Meet Old Rivals, Trapp Tech, in Provincial Inter-High Basketball Tonight

NEW WESTMINSTER (CP)—Prince Rupert hoopsters handed Victoria cagers a 51 to 41 setback in the 1948 provincial inter-high school basketball tournament Thursday. Flaten and Carlson were hot for the winners with thirteen points apiece. Spring was good for twelve. Prince Rupert meets Trapp Tech which two years ago eliminated Prince Rupert in the semi-finals.

Finalists will be the winners of Prince Rupert vs. Trapp Tech and Penticton vs. Vancouver College.

In another game last night Penticton registered a major upset by defeating Duke of Connaughts, high tourney favorites, 36 to 34.

Trapp Tech defeated Coquitlam 51 to 41 last night and Vancouver College won 56 to 33 over King George.

Beginning strong in each quarter, Prince Rupert forged into a commanding lead last night only to slacken off the fast pace as Victoria would break through to come close.

At half-time Prince Rupert led 23 to 19. In the third quarter the northerners took a 34 to 21 lead but Victoria came right back to make the score 34 to 31. Rupert then broke away fast again and quickly put the game away.

Prince Rupert was never headed.

Olsen and Syd Scherk were banished on fouls. Spring played an aggressive game. The offensive was powerful but the defence was weak.

Twenty-six fouls were counted against Prince Rupert and nineteen against Victoria.

Carlson, Flaten and Spring monopolized the scoring count with Olsen, four; Davidson, 2; Don Scherk, 4, and Syd Scherk, two.

#### COQUITLAM GAME

Coquitlam put up a tough fight against Trapp Tech but Boy Doyle's fifteen points was not enough to match the 14 and 12 of Tech's Bill Jobb and Jack Hanley and the Tech cagers emerged winners. Brunelle snagged nine points for the losers and Boe garnered eight for the winners. Davis made eleven points and Loretto, ten.

### Maple Leafs Are Two Up

Toronto Takes Big Lead in Stanley Cup—Canadiens and Red Wings Even

BOSTON—Toronto Maple Leafs are two games up now in the best-of-seven National Hockey League semi-finals with a 3 to 2 victory over the pre-series favorites, the Boston Bruins. Big Harry Watson scored twice for the under-dog Leafs while Rookie Ray Timmerman fired in a third. Woody Dumart and Paul Ronty scored for Boston in a fast contest.

In a second overtime contest in as many games, Montreal squared the semi-final with Detroit Red Wings by edging them out 4 to 3 on Rookie Gerry Plamondon's counter which was his third of the game. Each squad now has a victory so far. Billy Reay fired in the other Canadian marker while Sid Abel scored twice for Detroit.

#### THE WEATHER

##### Synopsis

Fresh cool Pacific air was pouring across British Columbia this morning as last night's storm moved into the prairies. Clear weather prevails in most sections behind the disturbance although some shower activity is occurring in the interior. Another active storm is moving toward the coast from the Pacific and is expected to bring gales and rain to the north coast this evening and strong winds and rain to the south coast overnight and tomorrow. Clouds will also spread through the interior tonight and tomorrow, accompanied by light rain or snow and rain mixed.

##### Forecast

Queen Charlottes and north coast—cloudy, becoming overcast with rain this afternoon and cloudy with rain showers Saturday morning, clearing slowly in afternoon. Winds light, increasing southeasterly gales (40 mph) by this evening and shifting to southwesterly (25 mph) after midnight tonight. Winds westerly (15 mph) tomorrow. Little change in temperature. Lows tonight and highs tomorrow—At Port Hardy, 35 and 48; Masset, 37 and 47; Prince Rupert 35 and 42.

### BACK FROM RAIL TRAFFIC MEET

There will be no change during the coming summer in the train service on the local line of Canadian National Railways, it is stated by William Cruickshank, district passenger agent, who has returned to the city after a trip to Winnipeg to attend a passenger service conference. Trains will run east and west three times a week at the same times as now effective.

### CASEY TO ASK FOR ANOTHER VOTE ON CITY TELEPHONE SITUATION

Alderman George B. Casey picked up the bat again today with the intention of using it Monday night in a third-inning move against the city council's plan to float a \$550,000 loan to rehabilitate the municipal telephone system.

Alderman Casey's latest gambit is a notice of motion which he will present to the next meeting of city council that a plebiscite be held on three proposals. They are:

1. That the city install an automatic telephone system at a cost of \$550,000.
2. To extend, renew and repair the present system at a cost not exceeding \$150,000.
3. To advertise the existing plant for sale or lease together with a 20-year franchise for the operation of the system.

Alderman Casey's notice of motion follows an informal city council meeting Wednesday night at which an English telephone expert informed the aldermen, after an inspection of the telephone system, that it is in its last stages of serviceability and recommended that it be replaced with an automatic system.

Similar opinions have been expressed by other telephone engineers who examined the city telephone system.

However, Alderman Casey has been unable to persuade his colleagues to authorize Ernest Love of Stewart, who installed the original system, to come here and make a survey of the local telephone situation. Through correspondence between Mr. Casey and Mr. Love, Alderman Casey has supported a plan to install a less costly manual system. He bases his objection to an automatic system on grounds that the city cannot afford the cost of an automatic system.

At last December's civic election, the voters went on record as favoring the city council's plan to install an automatic system.

Mr. Isman, who is a barrister and solicitor in Vancouver, has spent considerable time this year visiting branches in British Columbia and his visit so far affixed from Vancouver is looked upon locally as a recognition of the importance of this branch.

Mr. Isman will return to Vancouver by plane on Saturday.

## Flash

#### OLIVIER-HAMLET BEST

HOLLYWOOD—Sir Lawrence Olivier was awarded the Oscar last night for the best male actor of the year in "Hamlet" which also won the award as the best production of the year. Jane Wyman won the best actress Oscar for her work in "Johnny Belinda." John Huston won the best director award for "Treasure of Sierra Madre" while his father, Walter Huston, was awarded the best male supporting award for the same picture. Claire Trevor took the female best supporting award for her role in "Key Largo."

#### CHINESE SHIP MINED

HONG KONG—Authorities estimate that more than 100 persons were killed or injured last night when the passenger-laden steamer Miss Orient struck a mine between here and Canton. It is estimated that 500 passengers were aboard bound for Hong Kong.

#### SALMON TAX SIGNED

JUNEAU—Governor Ernest Gruening has signed into law the canned salmon tax at the highest rate ever imposed in the territory. The Senate finance committee estimated that the measure would raise nearly \$4,000,000 during the biennium.

#### MINERS ASKING MORE

TRAIL—Five thousand members of the Union of Mine, Mill and Smelter Workers are asking a 30 percent wage increase from Consolidated Mining & Smelting Co. Ltd.

#### AXIS SALLY SENTENCED

WASHINGTON—"Axis Sally" was today sentenced to from 10 to 30 years imprisonment for treason. She was also fined \$10,000.

### CITY STUDENT HELPS TO THWART CENTRAL AMERICAN BORDER WAR

The story of how Pete Postuk, 21-year-old Prince Rupert student at the University of British Columbia, and two travelling companions thwarted a possible Central American border outbreak by running off with a carload of ammunition was revealed Thursday.

Postuk with Hemsby King, a former city youth and now of Ganges, and Bob Perkis, of Salmon Arm, exposed a gun-running plot between Nicaragua and Costa Rica when they turned over a load of ammunition which they had picked up from revolutionaries in the former state to the Costa Rican authorities.

The trio are on a tour by station wagon of Central America which began last August and which eventually will take them as far south as Panama. The trip is a break in their university studies.

Apparently, according to a Vancouver Sun story, the youths loaded the ammunition into their station wagon in Nicaragua at the urging of Nicaraguans in a gun-running plot aimed at Costa Rica. On crossing the border, they turned the arms over to the Costa Rican police. Seven Nicaraguans were arrested.

Pete Postuk is a member of a well-known city family and went to the University of B.C. after graduating from Booth Memorial High School. In his second year at the University, he decided to take a motor trip through Central America and started out with his two companions last August. Since then, they have been working their way south.

"Steve" King, jr., is the son of a former city business man who now lives at Ganges in the Gulf of Georgia.

### Would Hike Rail Rates

MONTREAL—The Railway Association of Canada today announced that it had filed with the Board of Transportation Commissioners application for a 15 percent increase in first-class passenger fares.

Announcement by J. A. Brass, general secretary of the Association, which represents all Canadian railways, said that the railways will file with the board "as soon as practicable" new tariffs increasing by fifteen percent coach class and other fares which are now lower than first-class passenger fares.

The announcement followed a two-day session of the Association which considered the effect on the railways of removal in Tuesday's budget of the fifteen percent federal transportation tax.

### ARCTIC CIRCLE PLANE CRASH

HALIFAX—An air search began today for a twin-engine United States aircraft which has not been heard from since last night when it was reported going to crash-land on a flight inside the Arctic Circle.

The Royal Canadian Air Force search and rescue organization here said the C-82 Fairchild packet radioed last night that she had one hour's fuel left, was lost and was going to crash-land. It was not heard from after that.

The plane was on a supply flight from Baffin Island to Resolute Bay.


The number of men aboard is not known.

### TRUMAN DINES MR. CHURCHILL

WASHINGTON—Winston Churchill, Great Britain's leader in the Second World War, former Prime Minister and now Leader of the Opposition, was the guest last night of President and Mrs. Truman at dinner in Blair House, the temporary home of the Trumans. Among those present were the Vice-President, Albin Barkley, General George Marshall and Dean Acheson.

Mr. Churchill has come to the United States to accept an invitation from the Massachusetts Institute of Technology to speak in Boston next week.

Mr. Churchill, interviewed shortly after landing in New York, made reference to a speech he made in Fulton, Missouri, about three years ago, when his remarks concerning British and American defence aroused some criticism. He said, if he had it to do over again, there would be no change.

## Mr. Archibald's Stand

HIS CONSTITUENTS in Skeena will be quite able to decide for themselves how they feel about the stand which their member at Ottawa is reported to have taken in regard to the North Atlantic Pact. The Vancouver Sun reports that he is leading a C.C.F. rump of revolt against the alliance. Possibly even Mr. Archibald's own party will not be so very happy about it.

As far as Socialists are concerned, we know that the government in Britain has been taking a leading part all the way through in the negotiations of the treaty which—there is no denying the fact now—has been made necessary because of Soviet Russia's aggrandizing and subjugative, if not aggressive, actions which have dug deep into Europe and are now enroaching into Asia and more or less subtly even into the Americas including Canada.

We know the political group in Canada which is opposing the Atlantic pact. They are making no bones about it.

We were not unaware that Mr. Archibald was somewhat radical but we did not think he would have gone this far. If his constituents and political comrades do not like it, they may have something to say about it.

## WAR VETERAN PASSES AWAY

Alfred George Smith Dies In Local Hospital

Death took place yesterday afternoon at the Prince Rupert General Hospital, after an illness of several months, of Alfred George Smith, a veteran of World War I and a former resident of Seal Cove.

Mr. Smith, who served with the Canadian Expeditionary Force, in the 103rd Battalion and 54th Battalion (Canadian Railway Troops) saw service in Canada, England, France and Belgium. He had no known relatives in Canada, but a brother, Charles Smith, resided in Woolwich, England.

Interment will take place in the Soldier's Plot, Fairview Cemetery, at a date to be announced, under the auspices of the local branch of the Canadian Legion of which deceased was at one time a member.

Canada makes more use per capita of railways than any other country in addition to having more railway mileage per capita than any other nation. The speaker could see no reason if Canada continues to grow in economic importance, why her demands for railway transportation should not grow in proportion.

In concluding he gave assurance that Canadian railways have achieved pre-eminence in the field of land transportation and the industry if given a fair chance will continue to serve the nation efficiently in peace and should necessity arise in war.

## MARKETS— City Butter Price Slumps

Threat of margarine, founded on government approval of a bill to legalize its sale in British Columbia, is held largely responsible for a slump in butter prices which penetrated to Prince Rupert Thursday after having made itself felt in other parts of the country earlier.

City grocery stores Thursday announced reductions of nine cents a pound, bringing the dairy commodity down from 73 cents to 64 cents. Wholesale price dropped from 69 cents to 61 cents.

Wholesalers here say that the drop was based on the market slump which has spread across Canada on the heels of the general margarine threat and that it has been exaggerated by the dairy industry itself which, apparently, is refusing to accept the government floor price in protest against the margarine legalization.

It is estimated that the Canadian dairy industry stands to lose in the neighborhood of \$1,000,000 from the sudden drop. For the consumer, however, the drop was substance for great rejoicing. For the average family, the decrease will mean a saving of about 20 cents a week on the basis of a nine-cent drop.


